2018 EDUCATION DEVELOPMENT CHARGES (EDC) BY-LAW: BY-LAW RENEWAL PASSAGE CONSIDERATION MEETING

Purpose:

This is the final meeting where the Board of Trustees will consider the proposed 2018 Education Development Charges By-Law for approval, and pass the implementing By-Law as required by the Education Act.

COMMENTARY:

Mr. Jack Ammendolia, Associate Director at Watson & Associates Economists Ltd, will facilitate the presentation for the By-Law Renewal Passage Meeting to the Board of Trustees, and answer any questions regarding the Background study.

Mr. Brad Teichman of Overland LLP, also in attendance, will facilitate the presentation of the By-Law Renewal to the Board of Trustees, and answer any questions regarding legal matters.

It should be noted that staff had previously anticipated that the Board would be able to pass the By-law on May 15, 2018. However, on May 8, 2018, the Capital Policy and Programs Branch of the Ministry of Education advised Mr. Ammendolia the Ministry will not be providing any EDC By-Law approvals prior to the completion of the Provincial election.

The Ministry Capital Policy and Programs Branch has not provided the necessary approvals for the Background Study to proceed with Board approvals.

This presentation addresses the matters and resolutions identified in <u>Action Report 8.1 2018 Education Development Charges (EDC) By-Law: Proposed EDC By-Law Renewal</u>.

If approved, the new charges will take effect five (5) days after the passage, on June 25, 2018. Note that delays have not impacted the ability of the Board to collect EDC charges.

- ✓ The Background Study received approval from the Ministry of Education on June 13, 2018.

The Public Process




In addition to the legislated public process, the Boards;

- Held an information session for all interested stakeholders in the Region.
 - Resulted in alterations to bylaw (ie. residential credit exemption)
- Boards received a memo from Altus Consulting on behalf of BILD on April 27, 2018
- Boards' consultant responded to Altus/BILD memo on May 8, 2018.
- Boards received a further memo from BILD on May 15, 2018 requiring no further action until next bylaw.

Board Staff Recommendation

BE IT RESOLVED THAT, a further public meeting is not necessary in regard to the proposed Education Development Charges By-law;

THAT, that the Halton Catholic District School Board enact an Education Development Charge By-Law Renewal to apply to the Region of Halton;

THAT, the By-Law levy an education development charge on both residential and non-residential development and that the percentage of the growth-related net education land cost that is to be funded by charges on non-residential development be 15%.

THAT, the Board's By-Law be in the form attached hereto with the following figures inserted into the Board's EDC By-Law 2018 in the following respects:

In Section 9, \$3,648 as the Education Development Charge on each dwelling unit in a residential development;

In Section 12, \$0.83 as the Education Development Charge per square foot of gross floor area applied to non-residential development.

In Section 11(2), "5 years after" as the time frame in which a residential credit will be granted for a replacement dwelling on the same site that was destroyed by fire, demolition or otherwise, or that was so damaged by fire, demolition or otherwise as to render it uninhabitable.

2018 EDUCATION DEVELOPMENT CHARGES (EDC) BY-LAW: PROPOSED EDC BY-LAW RENEWAL

Purpose

The purpose of this report is to seek approval from the Board of Trustees with regards to the proposed 2018 Education Development Charge (EDC) By-Law Renewal, as the current in-effect 2013 EDC By-law will soon reach its five (5)-year term.

This report also serves to present the elements of the 2018 EDC Background Study and related policies that were used in determining the proposed charges.

The effect of the 2018 EDC By-Law renewal will result in increased development levies for both residential and non-residential development, as a result of growing land requirements and increasing land values in the Regional Municipality of Halton.

HISTORY:

An Education Development Charge (EDC) is a levy that is imposed under a Board enacted By-Law respecting growth related net education land costs incurred or proposed to be incurred by a School Board. EDCs are the primary source of funding for the acquisition and preparation of school sites, and other costs related to accommodating growth-related pupil needs within a Board's jurisdiction. To collect the necessary funds, levies are applied to and collected from all new residential and non-residential development, with limited exceptions.

The 2018 Education Development Charges By-Law will be the sixth (6) EDC By-Law adopted by the Board since 1996. The five (5) previous EDC By-Laws, and their respective amendments are as follows:

The last by-law renewal took place on June 18, 2013, whereby the Board adopted a region-wide EDC By-Law under the Education Act, a joint undertaking with the Halton District School Board (HDSB). The 2013 EDC By-Law had an effective implementation date of June 24, 2013 and is to be in effect for no more than five (5) years, coming to term at the close of business on June 23, 2018.

Since the last 2013 By-Law renewal, a total of four (4) amendments were made to the parent by-law, as listed above. Note that one amendment was resolved by way of an Ontario Municipal Board mediation/settlement that arose from a dispute over the methodology utilized in calculating the 2015 EDC Amendment charge. All the amendments were prompted by increasing land/school site values experienced throughout the municipalities of the Regional Municipality of Halton.

To ensure the Board was not overextending its borrowing capability by further increasing the EDC deficit, annual amendments were implemented. This practice has been undertaken since the 2004-2009 By-Law renewal.

Note that the current 2013 By-Law recovers 85% of education land costs from residential development and 15% from non-residential development.

COMMENTARY:

The following subsections serve to summarize the 2018 Education Development Charges Background Study prepared by Watson & Associates, which is attached as Appendix A to this report.

Note that the two (2) public meetings required under the Act when passing a new by-law were held on April 17, 2018, presented by Jack Ammendolia and Brad Teichman. The two (2) Public Meetings were in relation to the EDC Policy Review and EDC By-law Renewal.

GENERAL EDC REQUIREMENTS:

Educational Development Charges are used to fund the acquisition of school sites and related costs to accommodate growth-related pupil needs. Due to current and future anticipated enrolment growth, the HCDSB is permitted to charge EDCs which are applied to all new residential and non-residential development, with certain exceptions. The EDCs are imposed by and collected through the Board's adoption of an EDC By-Law.

The current 2013 EDC By-Law recovers education land costs (i.e. the purchase price of school sites and associated costs) from two sources: 85% from residential development and 15% from non-residential development.

ELIGIBILITY & FINANCIAL OBLIGATION

In order to qualify for an EDC by-law and impose these charges, the Board must first satisfy certain criteria. The first criteria deals with the Board's average five (5) year projected enrolment compared to its On-the-Ground (OTG) capacity. The second set of criteria, available only to school boards which have an in-force by-law, deal with outstanding EDC financial obligations. The Board meets both triggers.

The Board has determined a permanent capacity of 23,474 on the elementary panel and 10,890 on the secondary panel. The five (5) year projected enrolment averages 24,210 pupils compared to a capacity of 23,474, leaving a shortfall of 736 spaces. On the secondary panel, the average projected five (5) year enrolment from 2018 to 2023 is 12,643, which is more than the permanent secondary capacity of 10,890 – resulting in a deficit of 1,753 spaces.

As of January 31, 2017, the HCDSB EDC reserve shortfall is approximately \$39.6 million, and it was projected to decrease to approximately \$32.1 million by June 2018 when the Background Study was being developed. As of June 11, 2018, the shortfall is now at approximately \$30.1 million.

POLICY MATTERS:

As was discussed in Action Report 8.11 "2018 Education Development Charges (EDC) By-Law: Application of Operating Surpluses and Alternative Accommodation Arrangements" from the April 17, 2018 Regular Board Meeting, Regulation 20/98 of the Education Act, requires that a school board evaluate certain policies as part of the process of adopting a new EDC By-law, and approve and integrate statements into the EDC Background Study.

The policies in question concern the following:

- 1) Alternative accommodation arrangements; and
- 2) Application of an operating surplus to capital needs.

As outlined in the aforementioned report presented to Trustees, the Board is unable to designate surplus funds for the purpose of acquiring school sites. Further, there were no opportunities or proposals for alternative accommodation arrangements advanced by the development industry, municipalities or the general public, nor did the Board identify any proposals that were considered appropriate having regard to its short term and long term needs.

The Board approved the following resolution at the April 17, 2018, Regular Meeting of the Board:

WHEREAS, the Board is unable to designate surplus funds for the purpose of acquiring school sites and is unable to identify feasible opportunities or proposals for alternative accommodation arrangements.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the Halton Catholic District School Board approves the statement that there have been no opportunities to implement alternative accommodation arrangements.

AND, that the Halton Catholic District School Board approves the statement that there is not an operating surplus available in the non-classroom portion of the budget that can be applied to reduce growth-related net education land costs.

APPORTIONMENT OF LAND COSTS:

Paragraph 8 of Section 7 of Ontario Regulation 20/98 gives the Board the discretion to collect a portion of the education land costs from non-residential development. The percentage that may be funded by a charge on non-residential development cannot exceed 40% of the total education land costs. The Board's current EDC By-Law is designed to recover 15% from non-residential development, and the balance from residential development.

Staff and legal counsel recommend that the Board retain the current apportionment of education land costs between residential and non-residential development since there has been no indication of any change in the development community's preference.

Staff will be recommending that the 2018 By-Law recovers 85% of education land costs from residential development and 15% from non-residential development.

RECOVERY OF NET EDUCATION LAND COSTS

The Education Act permits the Board to recover up to 100% of the projected education land costs through EDCs. The Board's current EDC By-Law is based upon 100% recovery.

Staff and legal counsel recommend continuing with 100% recovery while recognizing that granting some non-statutory exemptions and other policy decisions will reduce this level of recovery.

NON-STATUTORY **RESIDENTIAL EXEMPTIONS**

Section 257.59 of the Education Act permits the Board to exempt different categories and uses of residential development. The mandatory exemptions for residential development relate to limited housing intensification and municipally owned and operated property. An exemption is also provided for the replacement of a dwelling unit that was destroyed by fire, demolition or otherwise rendered uninhabitable. The Board's current EDC By-Law only provides for these mandatory residential exemptions.

Staff and legal counsel recommend that the Board not expand the list of residential exemptions beyond those that are mandatory, since the lost revenues cannot be recovered through increased EDCs on other developments or through the property tax base.

DIFFERENTIATED RESIDENTIAL EDC

Ontario Regulation 20/98 allows the Board to differentiate the residential EDC rate by housing type, so that, for example, a single family detached dwelling unit would pay a greater charge than an apartment unit. The Board's current EDC By-Law imposes a uniform residential EDC against all forms of dwelling units. The Board has the option of imposing a uniform residential EDC or a differentiated residential EDC that distinguishes between housing types.

During the Stakeholder meeting that took place on March 23, 2018, both Boards, Watson & Associates, the Board's legal counsel Overland LLP, and Cushman Wakefield met with stakeholders. During this meeting, the matter concerning differentiated charges was discussed, although there was not significant interest expressed by the Building Industry and Land Development Association (BILD) for a change. BILD representatives notified staff that the issue would be brought back to their membership for further consideration.

Two (2) letters were received from BILD on April 27 and May 15 2018, and neither requested that differentiated rates be explored. These letters are attached as Appendix B and Appendix D.

An additional brief was developed as additional information as to why Staff is note recommending that differentiated rates be implemented for the 2018 EDC By-Law. This is attached as Appendix E. This information is also found in Form H-2 of the Background Study, attached as Appendix A.

Staff recommend to the Board that a uniform rate be implemented for the 2018 Education Development Charges By-law.

Non-Statutory Non-Residential Exemptions

The Education Act allows the Board to exempt different categories of non-residential uses. Statutory exemptions include non-residential development of lands that are owned by and used for the purposes of a municipality or a school board. The enlargement of the gross floor area of an industrial building (up to 50

per cent) is also exempt from EDCs as is the replacement of a non-residential building that was destroyed by fire, demolition or otherwise rendered unusable.

In addition to the above-noted exemptions, there are other categories of non-residential development that are exempt from EDCs pursuant to specific legislative provisions. These include publicly funded universities and colleges, which are exempted from EDCs under the statutes that create them. The Board's current EDC By-Law contains the following additional exemptions:

- 1. A public hospital receiving aid under the Public Hospitals Act;
- 2. A publicly-funded university, community college or a college of applied arts and technology established under the Ministry of Colleges and Universities Act, or a predecessor statute;
- 3. A seminary of learning maintained for educational purposes that is exempt from taxation under the Assessment Act, the whole profits from which are devoted or applied to such purposes, i.e. a non-profit private school;
- 4. A place of worship owned by a religious organization that is exempt from taxation under the Assessment Act that is used primarily as a place of public worship;
- 5. A cemetery or burying ground that is exempt from taxation under the Assessment Act;
- 6. Non-residential agricultural buildings or structures that are owned by and are used for the purposes of a bona fide farming operation; and
- 7. Metrolinx (formerly known as Go Transit) which is a Provincial crown agency.

No additional exemptions were requested at the March 23, 2018, Stakeholder Meeting, and the April 17, 2018, Public Meeting. Furthermore, no additional exemptions were requested as part of any formal submission made by stakeholders in the Region.

Staff therefore recommends that the Board maintain these non-statutory non-residential exemptions, and not expand the list, in order to avoid sustaining financial shortfalls in EDC collections.

DEMOLITION/CONVERSION CREDITS

The Board's current EDC By-Law provides a demolition credit for the replacement of a dwelling unit destroyed by fire, demolition or otherwise rendered uninhabitable, provided the building permit for the replacement dwelling unit is issued within two (2) years of the date that the former dwelling unit was destroyed or became uninhabitable.

The Board's current EDC By-Law extends a similar credit for the replacement of a non-residential building that was destroyed or rendered unusable but the grace period is five (5) years. The HDSB's EDC By-Law provides for the same credits.

At the March 23, 2018, Stakeholder Meeting, a request was made to extend the credit period for residential demolitions from 2-years to 5-years to align with the Region's non-residential credits. Sections 4(2) and 5(3) of Ontario Regulation 20/98 prescribe the two (2) year grace period for the replacement of a residential building and the five (5) year grace period for the replacement of a non-residential building.

More specifically, there have been situations where due to administrative processes and planning approvals in some areas of the Region (i.e. Niagara Escarpment) the two (2) year grace period is not sufficient. The School Boards have the discretion to increase the residential grace period to five (5) years to match the non-residential and align with the Regional Development Charges By-law.

Staff has considered the financial implications of extending the timeline, and concluded that the cost would be minimal as there are a small number of these instances, and they would otherwise meet the two (2) year timeline if not for delays from approval authorities given the potential complexities of the rebuild.

Board staff therefore recommends that the demolition credit grace period for residential uses be increased from two (2) years to five (5) years in the 2018 EDC by-law. The demolition credit for non-residential uses will remain at five (5) years.

INDUSTRIAL EXPANSION EXEMPTIONS

Staff and legal counsel recommend that the industrial expansion exemption should be applied to a maximum of 50% of the total floor area of the industrial building as it existed before the first enlargement for which an exemption from the payment of EDCs was granted under this or a previous By-Law.

No other concerns were expressed at the March 23, 2018, Stakeholder Meeting. Therefore no recommendations are suggested.

BY-LAW TERM

Section 257.58 of the Education Act provides for a maximum EDC By-Law term of five (5) years. It is open to the Board to repeal its EDC By-Law prior to the expiration of the five year term. The Board's current EDC By-Law has a five-year term. Staff and legal counsel recommend a five-year term for the 2018 EDC By-Law.

FURTHER PUBLIC MEETING

Section 257.63(3) of the Education Act provides that where a proposed EDC By-law is changed following a public meeting, a Board must determine whether a further public meeting is necessary.

Staff and legal counsel recommend that the Board not convene a further public meeting for two (2) principal reasons:

- 1) The changes made to the proposed 2018 EDC By-law are minor and stylistic rather than substantive; and,
- 2) The public meeting that was held on May 15, 2018 was the second public meeting in regard to the proposed By-law whereas the governing legislation only requires that the Board hold one (1) such meeting. In addition, the Policy Review Public Meeting that was held on April 17, 2018.

The Board has exceeded the minimum requirements respecting public meetings, and sees no additional reasons to consult further. Staff therefore recommend that no further meetings be required.

SUMMARY OF BOARD ENROLMENT PROJECTIONS:

The Regional Municipality of Halton is expected to construct **over the next 15-year horizon a total of 85,711 net-new residential units, and approximately 65,616,969 square feet of net-new non-residential GFA**. Both of these elements will contribute to enrolment growth throughout the region.

The Board's total yields for the elementary panel range between 0.036 in Burlington to 0.157 in Milton, with Oakville and Halton Hills totalling 0.103 and 0.134 respectively. On the secondary panel, Burlington and Oakville have the lowest yields ranging from 0.017 in Burlington to 0.040 in Oakville; while Milton (0.061) and Halton Hills (0.052) have the highest secondary yields.

These yields are applied to the total projected new units by municipal area and unit type to determine the total elementary and secondary student projections.

Using the aforementioned yields in combination with the existing community projections, the total EDC enrolment projections for Halton indicate that by the end of the forecast period (2032/33), the Board can expect total elementary enrolment in Halton of 31,431 compared to the 2018/19 enrolment of 23,164 for a total increase of 8,267 pupils or 36%.

On the secondary panel, enrolment is expected to increase from 12,058 in 2018/19 to 14,949 at the end of the fifteen year forecast period for a total increase of 2,891 pupils or approximately 24%.

The summary of enrolment projections to determine the net educational land costs for the Board are as follows:

NET GROWTH-RELATED PUPIL PLACES:

The projected school board enrolments as well as the residential forecasts determine the net growth-related pupil places which in turn determine the number of required EDC eligible sites. This information can be found in Form E of the EDC Background Study (Appendix A).

These forms highlight, by review area, the net number of new units, the Board's pupil yields and the number of growth-related pupils.

The Board's projections forecast a total 9,677 net growth-related pupils on the elementary panel and 3,785 on the secondary panel.

NET EDUCATION LAND COSTS

As part of the 2018 Education Development Charges Background Study completed for the By-Law renewal, the Board identified a total of sixteen (16) new elementary school sites (one (1) which is already owned) and four (4) new secondary school sites required to meet net-new growth requirements within the Regional Municipality of Halton.

Paragraph 4 of Section 7 of O.Reg 20/98 states that, "The board shall estimate the net education land cost for the elementary school sites and secondary school sites required to provide pupil places for the new elementary school pupils and secondary school pupils."

To determine the costs of land acquisition, both the HDSB and the HCDSB retained the appraisal firm of Cushman & Wakefield. The appraisers were responsible for providing a land value per acre for each EDC eligible site identified in the analysis. In addition, the appraisers were asked to provide an annual land escalation factor (for 5 years) to apply to the current land values at the time of purchase, they recommend a rate of 4%. The effective date of the appraisal is June 1, 2018.

The net new educational school sites requirements as well as their per acre land values are listed as follows:

LAND PREPARATION COSTS

The Education Act prescribes the "costs to provide services to the land or otherwise prepare the site so that a building or buildings may be built on the land to provide pupil accommodation" as an EDC eligible cost. These costs typically include bringing services to the lot line of the property, rough grading and compaction of the site and ensuring that the site is cleared of debris.

To determine the land development and servicing costs, both Boards provided their recent historical site preparation costs. The new average cost was calculated as **\$75,056 per acre**.

Using historical economic data and construction cost indices, an escalation factor of 1.6% per annum was applied to the assumed per acre site preparation costs. Site preparation costs are escalated to the time of school site purchase.

TOTAL LAND COSTS

The total net education land costs including the site acquisition costs, the escalation of land over the term of the by-law (five years), the site development/servicing costs, as well as associated financing costs and study costs, are projected to be over \$363 million over the 15-year planning horizon of the proposed by-law to acquire the sixteen (16) elementary and four (4) secondary school sites.

2018 Education Development Charge

Once the net education land costs have been determined, the final steps in the process involve apportioning the land costs between residential and non-residential as well as differentiating the charge by unit type, if necessary.

For the 2018 EDC Renewal, it is proposed that the Board maintain an 85% residential charge and a 15% non-residential charge. EDC charges are to be uniform across all types of residential units.

The final net education land costs for the HCDSB that were allocated to the residential portion of the charge (85%) were estimated to be **\$308,642,388** and the total number of net new units in the EDC forecast for Halton is projected to be **84,597** yielding a residential EDC rate of **\$3,648** per dwelling unit.

The non-residential net education land costs (15% of total) are projected to total **\$54,466,304** and the total net non-residential square footage is projected to be **65,616,969** resulting in a non-residential EDC rate of **\$0.83** per square foot. The proposed levies are as follows:

Watson & Associates Economists Ltd. has completed their Background Report (Appendix A) and has calculated the final proposed charges. This information has been circulated to the Ministry of Education, co-terminous school boards, municipalities, the Region, and stakeholders. The information has been posted on the Board's website as of March 29: https://www.hcdsb.org/Board/EDC/Pages/default.aspx

Public Consultation & Submissions

On October 3, 2017, staff advised the Board of Trustees that the 2013 EDC By-Law would reach its 5-year term in June 2018, requiring a full EDC By-law renewal. A Trustee information session was later provided on November 8, 2017, to discuss the overall policies of the charge, and how it would be calculated. This informed the development of the Draft Background Report.

On March 22, 2018, a newspaper ad was published in all five (5) local newspapers, and notifications and reminders were sent to all community partners and to all persons and/or organization that have given the secretary of the Board a written request for notice of any amendments to the EDC By-Law. This notice was provided at least 20 days prior to the public meetings scheduled for April 17, 2018, as required by the **Fducation Act.**

On March 23, 2018, Watson & Associates hosted a Stakeholder Meeting at their offices inviting members from all four (4) municipalities, the Region, and BILD. At this meeting, the proposed 2018 EDC rates were presented. As indicated in previous sections, suggestions were made on how to improve the next iteration of the By-law, and were considered by staff.

The Board has also received two (2) letters from BILD on April 17, 2018, and May 15, 2018. The Board has received and responded to the April 17, 2018, correspondence from BILD. The May 15, 2018, correspondence required no further action. Board staff received no other submission from other stakeholders in the Region.

In the second letter from BILD, two (2) points were raised in the submission. The first point was in relation to the Catholic Elementary Pupil Yield Factors for the Town of Milton and the Town of Halton Hills, and whether they are over stated in the 2018 EDC By-Law.

Watson & Associates' response is that the increase in yields is reflective of the change in housing growth and occupancy patterns in newly developed areas in both Milton and Halton Hills. Additionally, the HCDSB increased its share of enrolment in many of the areas in question which has increased the Board's specific yields as compared to the yields derived in the 2013 EDC study. It is also important to note that the yields in question are largely consistent with similar housing types in adjacent development areas. Additional analysis was conducted with regard to the increase in yields and this information was provided to BILD and their consultants.

BILD's second point relates to stacked townhouses and that the Board should redefine them as high-density units and remove them from the medium density unit category in the EDC Background Study. BILD believes that this would ensure that the estimated number of pupils generated from new housing development is more realistic and does not assume that stacked towns are generating pupils at the same rates as traditional townhouses.

Watson & Associates' response is that the EDC residential forecasts are largely based on the local Municipal forecasts. At this time, the information that has been provided by the area municipalities (both historical and projected) would have made it difficult to adjust the forecast and to specifically extract stacked townhouses from the medium density category where townhouses are traditionally allocated. The Board's consultant is committed to continue to study and monitor this and to work with BILD to determine if these units could be re-allocated in future forecasts/bylaws.

Staff previously intended to bring forward to the Board of Trustees at the May 15, 2018, Regular Meeting of the Board an Action Report to consider the enactment of the 2018 EDC By-Law. Unfortunately, the Ministry of Education was unable to provide the necessary approval of the Background Study, as the writ was to drop in coming days and the Minister made an order to not approve any EDC By-law until after the election. Staff and the Board's consultant and legal counsel advised Trustees of this on May 15, 2018.

The Ministry of Education has not provided the necessary approvals for the Board to proceed with the approval of the 2018 Education Development Charges By-Law.

CONCLUSION:

Board staff from HCDSB and HDSB have undertaken a review of the joint 2018 EDC By-Law Renewal as a result of the 2013 EDC By-Law coming to the end of its five (5) year term as of June 2018.

Watson and Associates in collaboration with Board staff, Overland LLP, and Cushman & Wakefield have completed the Draft Background Report, attached as Appendix A, describing the 15-year forecast of netnew regional residential and non-residential growth; Board yields and 15-year student enrolment growth; net-new land requirements; land values and land preparations costs; and the resulting charge.

To address the increase in land requirements and rising land costs over the course of the By-Law, the levies will need to increase. It is proposed that the levy should be increased by:

- 1) Residential \$1,379.00 per dwelling unit for a resulting charge of \$3,648 per dwelling unit;
- 2) Non-Residential \$0.25 or per square foot for a resulting charge of \$0.83 per square foot.

The purpose of this report is to provide the Board of Trustees with the necessary information to understand the methodology used to calculate the charge, review the additional stakeholder submissions and comments, and consider the approval of the proposed 2018 EDC By-Law Renewal.

The recommended policy matters have been incorporated into the proposed 2018 EDC By-law, which is attached as Appendix G.

To this end, staff provides the following recommendation for consideration by the Board to renew the Halton Catholic District School Board 2018 Education Development Charges By-law:

THAT, the By-Law levy an education development charge on both residential and non-residential development and that the percentage of the growth-related net education land cost that is to be funded by charges on non-residential development be 15%.

THAT, the Board's By-Law be in the form attached hereto with the following figures inserted into the Board's EDC By-Law 2018 in the following respects:

- In Section 9, \$3,648 as the Education Development Charge on each dwelling unit in a residential development;
- In Section 12, \$0.83 as the Education Development Charge per square foot of gross floor area applied to non-residential development.
- In Section 11(2), "5 years after" as the time frame in which a residential credit will be granted for a replacement dwelling on the same site that was destroyed by fire, demolition or otherwise, or that was so damaged by fire, demolition or otherwise as to render it uninhabitable.

FOREWORD AND ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Section 257.61(1) of the *Education Act* states that, "Before passing an education development charge by-law, the board shall complete an education development charge background study." Section 257.61(2) of the Act as well as section 9 of Ontario Regulation 20/98, as amended, provide the information that must be contained in the background study. This report contains background studies for the Halton District School Board (HDSB) and the Halton Catholic District School Board (HCDSB).

The consultant would like to acknowledge and thank the staff at the HDSB and HCDSB for their work, time and effort over the past several months. Staff from both Boards provided invaluable input and assistance throughout the EDC process.

The consultant would also like to thank Mr. Brad Teichman of the firm Overland LLP, legal counsel for both School Boards and Mr. Chris Vardon and Mr. Andrew Browning of Cushman & Wakefield, the appraisal firm responsible for the site valuations and escalation rates. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Halton District School Board (HDSB) and the Halton Catholic District School Board (HCDSB) have Education Development Charge by-laws in force in the Region of Halton which will expire in June of 2018. Education Development Charges (EDCs) are a revenue source, for school boards that qualify, to purchase and develop land for new schools. EDCs are meant as a funding mechanism for Boards that are experiencing a growth-related accommodation need in their jurisdiction. In order to renew their by-laws each Board must follow certain processes and guidelines as required by Provincial legislation. This Background Study fulfills certain requirements while providing the background necessary to understand and determine the Education Development Charge.

The general authority for school boards to impose EDCs is provided by Division E of Part IX for the *Education Act*. Ontario Regulation 20/98, as amended, provides the requirements necessary to determine an EDC. In addition the Ministry has published a set of EDC Guidelines to assist boards with the EDC process.

Before an EDC by-law can be passed, school boards must ensure that they:

- Demonstrate that their elementary or secondary enrolment on a jurisdiction wide basis is greater than the elementary or secondary OTG approved capacity or that their EDC reserve fund is in a deficit position.
- Prepare a background study meeting the requirements of the legislation.
- Hold required legislated public meetings.
- Receive written Ministry approval.

Both the HDSB and HCDSB are able to renew their existing by-laws on the basis of:

- Reserve Fund Qualification both Boards have a deficit in the EDC reserve fund and outstanding financial obligations; and
- 2. Capacity Trigger both Boards have an average projected enrolment exceeding the approved OTG capacity. HDSB and HCDSB exceed capacity on both the elementary and secondary panels.

The School Boards intend to hold individual public meetings for both the EDC policy review as well as the new proposed EDC by-law. HCDSB will hold their public meetings on Tuesday, April 17th, 2018 and HDSB will hold their public meetings on Wednesday, April 18th. Both of the Boards will hold these public meetings at their respective Board offices in Burlington. Notice and details of each meeting will be provided consistent with legislative requirements. The HCDSB plans to consider passage of the new EDC by-law on May 15th, 2018 and the HDSB plans to consider passage of its by-law on May 16th, 2018 at their respective Board offices.

The EDC analysis in this Background Study has been completed for both the HDSB and the HCDSB. The Boards' jurisdictions are made up of the Region of Halton, including the city of Burlington, and the towns of Oakville, Halton Hills and Milton. This EDC study contemplates jurisdiction wide by-laws which includes all of the Region of Halton for each respective Board.

Demographic projections form an important component of the EDC analysis. The residential dwelling unit forecast is used both to project pupils from new development as well as determining the final quantum of the residential charge. The residential forecasts used in this analysis are consistent with the most recent municipal forecasts that were available at the time of study preparation. The total number of net new units projected in The Region of Halton for the 15 years in the EDC analysis total **85,711**.

The number of growth-related pupils is based on the aforementioned residential forecast and pupil yields have been derived from Statistics Canada custom tabulated data and historical board enrolment information. Pupil yields are mathematical representations of the number of school aged children that will be generated by particular dwellings. The total growth-related pupils must be offset by any available pupil places that are not required by existing pupils of the Boards. These calculations were done for both Boards on a review area basis to determine the total net growth-related pupil places.

The analysis projects a total of **17,170** elementary net growth-related pupils and **4,900** secondary net growth-related pupils for the HDSB. For the HCDSB, a total of **9,677** elementary net growth-related pupils were projected while the secondary panel projected a total of **3,785** net growth-related pupil places.

Once the net growth-related pupil place requirements have been determined, it is necessary for boards to decide the number of new schools that will be built to accommodate that need. The EDC legislation provides a table which relates pupil place requirements to school site sizes. The table as well as a description and methodology are provided in the Background Study. The Study also provides information on the approximate timing, size and location of the proposed new schools/sites.

The EDC analysis for The Region of Halton predicts that the HDSB will require approximately **22** new elementary sites, 3 of which have already been purchased by the Board (5 sites in Oakville, 13 sites in Milton, 4 sites in Halton Hills) and **5** new secondary sites (1 site in Oakville, 1 site in Halton Hills, 3 sites in Milton) in the 15 year EDC time frame.

The HCDSB's EDC analysis projects a need for **16** new elementary sites, 1 of which is already owned by the Board (3 sites in Oakville, 9 sites in Milton, 4 sites in Halton Hills) and **4** new secondary sites (1 site in Oakville, 2 sites in Milton, 1 site in Halton Hills).

One of the final steps of the EDC process involves translating the land requirements to actual land costs. Site acquisition costs are based on appraisals completed by the firm of Cushman & Wakefield. The per acre acquisition values ranged from \$1,590,000 to \$2,370,000 for elementary sites and \$1,259,511 to \$2,370,000 for secondary sites. The acquisition costs have been escalated for a period of 5 years (the by-law term) at a rate of 4% for each consecutive year until the end of the by-law term.

The costs to prepare and develop the school site for school construction are also EDC eligible costs. The assumed site preparation costs are based on historical data provided by the School Boards. A site preparation cost of \$75,056 per acre has been assumed for both the HDSB and HCDSB in this study. Site preparation costs are escalated to the time of site purchase at a rate of 1.6% per year.

The total land costs (acquisition and servicing costs) as well as study costs must be added to any outstanding financial obligations incurred by the board under a previous EDC by-law to determine the final net education land costs. A deficit balance in the existing EDC reserve fund is considered to be an outstanding obligation and must be added to the existing land costs. If a board has a surplus balance in the EDC reserve fund this amount must be subtracted from the land costs and used to defray the net education land costs.

The HDSB's total net education land costs are estimated to be \$486,884,332 which includes a deficit balance of \$20,312,206 in the existing EDC reserve fund that was added to the total costs. The HCDSB's total net education land costs are estimated to be \$363,108,691 which includes an existing EDC reserve fund deficit of \$32,134,899 that was added to the total costs.

On the basis of the aforementioned net education land costs and net new unit forecasts, the analysis resulted in a proposed EDC rate of \$4,892 per dwelling unit for the HDSB's residential charge and \$1.11 per square foot for the non-residential charge. The new proposed EDC rate for the HCDSB is \$3,648 per dwelling unit for the residential component and \$0.83 per square foot for the non-residential component. The charges contained herein are based on a uniform rate for all types of development, with a division of 85%-15% residential to non-residential allocation and applicable jurisdiction-wide to the Region of Halton.

1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background

Education Development Charges (EDCs) are a revenue source, for school boards that qualify, to purchase and develop land for new schools. EDCs are meant as a funding mechanism for boards that are experiencing a growth-related accommodation need in their jurisdiction. In order to qualify for Education Development Charges, it is necessary for school boards to meet certain "triggers".

School boards no longer have the ability to implement property taxes to fund education costs and now rely on a system of per pupil grants established by the Ministry of Education. The grants are set out to cover expenses such as teacher salaries, text books, heating of schools, renewing schools, building schools etc. Education Development Charges are meant to fund the acquisition and development of growth-related school sites outside this grant envelope. Education Development Charges are based on a formulaic approach which looks at three main areas – enrolment projections to determine need, the number of school sites necessary to meet need and the costs related to the purchase and development of those school sites.

The EDC may be levied by a school board on both residential and non-residential developments, subject to certain exemptions which are outlined in the legislation. Division E of Part IX of the *Education Act* is the legislation responsible for governing the EDC. Ontario Regulation 20/98, as amended, provides guidelines and requirements on the qualification process for a school board as well as the specifics on calculating the charge. The charges are collected at building permit issuance on behalf of the school board by the local area municipality in the by-law's area.

As mentioned earlier, not all school boards are eligible to implement EDCs due to qualification triggers that must be met. To qualify there are two triggers that can be met - the Board's total projected enrolment for the five year period following expected by-law passage must exceed the Board's Ministry rated On-The-Ground capacity on *either* the elementary or secondary panel.

The other qualification trigger deals with unmet financial obligations with regard to the purchase and development of growth-related school sites. If the school board has an existing EDC by-law in place and they can demonstrate that there are existing outstanding financial obligations, the school board will automatically qualify for a subsequent by-law. The *Education Act*, specifically Section 257.54, gives school boards the ability to "pass by-laws for the imposition of education development charges" if there is residential land in the jurisdiction of a board that would increase education land costs.

School Boards are responsible for providing school sites and can do so through such limited revenue sources such as, selling surplus school sites, revenue from leasing sites, entering into

joint use agreements with other school boards or public/private partnerships and the imposition of Education Development Charges - thus making EDCs an important revenue source.

1.2 **Existing By-laws**

This EDC Background Study has been prepared on behalf of the Halton District School Board and the Halton Catholic District School Board in consideration of renewing their EDC by-laws in The Region of Halton. Each Board's current in-force by-laws came into effect in June of 2013 and are based on 85% recovery of costs from residential development and 15% from non-residential development. Amendments in the Boards' EDC by-laws occurred in 2014, 2015 and 2017. The most recent amendment in 2017 has resulted in a new residential rate of \$4,364 for Halton District School Board and \$2,269 for Halton Catholic District School Board.

EDC Policy Review

It should be noted that all school boards with an existing EDC by-law in place must conduct a review of the policies contained in their existing by-laws before passing a new by-law. This process includes a policy review report as well as a public meeting to review the policies in a public forum.

Section 257.60 sub-section (1) of the *Education Act* states that:

"Before passing an education development charge by-law, the board shall conduct a review of the education development charge policies of the board."

Sub-section (2) goes on to state that:

"In conducting a review under subsection (1), the board shall ensure that adequate information is made available to the public, and for this purpose shall hold at least one public meeting, notice of which shall be given in at least one newspaper having general circulation in the area of jurisdiction of the board."

1.3 Area in Which By-law May Apply

The legislation states that an education development charge by-law may apply to the entire area of the jurisdiction of a board or only part of it. In addition, an education development charge by-law of the board shall not apply with respect to land in more than one "region" if the regulations divide the area of the jurisdiction of the board into prescribed regions.


Finally, "education development charges collected under an education development charge bylaw that applies to land in a region shall not, except with the prior written approval of the Minister, be used in relation to land that is outside that region" and "money from an EDC reserve fund established under section 16(1) of O.Reg 20/98 may be used only for growth-related net education land costs attributed to or resulting from development in the area to which the EDC bylaw applies."

EDC background studies should clearly outline the areas that will be covered by EDC by-laws. Four maps have been included on the following pages outlining The Region of Halton, the area to which the EDC by-laws will apply and the respective review areas for each Board and panel respectively.


1.4 EDC Review Areas

The EDC methodology allows school boards to examine growth-related needs on a jurisdiction wide basis – that is treat the whole EDC area as one review area - or to examine them on a sub area basis or review areas. Review areas are artificial constructs intended to divide the board's jurisdiction into sub-areas in order to more accurately determine the location of new school sites. Board review areas are likely to reflect attendance boundaries for families of schools, natural dividers such as rivers, creeks etc. or man-made barriers such as major thoroughfares. The Ministry of Education's EDC Guidelines recommend that review areas are consistent with Board review areas used for capital planning purposes and that they also maintain consistency with review areas of subsequent EDC by-laws.


Halton District School Board Elementary EDC Review Areas 2018:




Halton District School Board Secondary EDC Review Areas 2018:

Both the HDSB's and the HCDSB's review areas used in this background study are largely consistent with the Board's review areas used for accommodation planning and the review areas used in previous EDC studies. Minor changes have been made to account for changes in school boundaries or openings/consolidations. For the purposes of calculating EDCs the HDSB has used **26** elementary review areas and **8** secondary review areas and the HCDSB has used **20** elementary review areas and **9** secondary review areas.

The EDC calculation on a review area basis assumes that the total OTG capacity of all existing permanent accommodation within review area is considered to be the total available capacity for instructional purposes and required to meet the needs of the existing community. Determining board needs on a review area basis is premised on:

Available space is determined by subtracting the year 15 existing community enrolment number from the current OTG capacity figure. For the purposes of this analysis, the OTG capacity was adjusted to account for changes to classroom loading figures to incorporate loading for full day kindergarten.

- Pupils that are generated from new development must fill any available surplus OTG capacity first.
- Pupils generated from new development above and beyond those that fill any available surplus space within the review area, are net growth-related pupil place requirements and can potentially be funded through education development charges.

The review area approach to calculating EDCs has been undertaken by both Boards as it is consistent with the way in which future capital construction needs will be assessed over the long term.

2. THE EDC BY-LAW

2. THE EDC BY-LAW

2.1 Imposition of an EDC

The passage of an Education Development Charge by-law gives school boards the authority to impose and collect EDCs for the purpose of acquiring and developing growth-related school sites. Each by-law has a maximum term of 5 years and must be passed within one year of EDC background study completion. Before a school board can proceed with an EDC by-law it must receive confirmation in writing from the Ministry of Education acknowledging receipt of the background study and approving estimates of enrolment projections and future site needs contained in the background study.

Section 10 of Ontario Regulation 20/98, sets out the conditions that must be satisfied in order for a board to pass an education development charge by-law:

- The Minister has approved the Board's estimates of the total number of elementary and secondary pupils over each of the fifteen years of the forecast period.
- The Minister has approved the Board's estimates of the number of elementary and secondary school sites used by the Board to determine the net education land costs.
- The Board has prepared a background study and given a copy of the education development charge background study relating to the by-law to the Minister and each Board having jurisdiction within the area to which the by-law would apply.
- The Board has demonstrated that the average elementary or secondary enrolment within
 its jurisdiction exceeds the board's elementary or secondary capacity; or the Board's
 current EDC financial obligations exceed revenues reported in the EDC reserve fund.
- Hold at least one public meeting.

2.2 The Background Study

An Education Development Charge background study must be completed by a school board that wishes to pass an EDC by-law. The intention of the background study is to provide information on the process and methodology of calculating an EDC, as well as the background and assumptions that make up the estimates of the enrolment projections and site needs. Section 257.61 of the legislation requires that "before passing an education development charge by-law, the board shall complete an education development charge background study."

O.Reg 20/98, section 9 (1) sets out the following information that must be included in an EDC background study:

• Estimates of the number of new dwelling units for each year of the fifteen-year forecast period in the area in which the charge is to be imposed.

- The number of projected new pupil places as a result of new growth and the number of new school sites needed to provide accommodation for those students.
- The number of existing pupil places by school and the number of available spaces to accommodate the projected number of new pupil places.
- For every existing elementary and secondary pupil place in the board's jurisdiction that
 the board does not intend to use to accommodate pupils from new growth, an explanation
 as to why the board does not intend to do so.
- For each elementary and secondary school site, estimates of the net education land cost, the location of the site, the area of the site (including the area that exceeds the maximum set out in section 2 of O.Reg 20/98, and an explanation of whether the costs of the excess land are education land costs and if so, why).
- The number of pupil places the board estimates will be provided by the school to be built
 on the site and the number of those pupil places that the board estimates will be used to
 accommodate new pupil places.
- A statement of the board's policy concerning possible arrangements with municipalities, school boards or other persons or bodies in the public or private sector, including arrangements of a long-term or co-operative nature, which would provide accommodation for the new pupils without imposing EDCs, or with a reduction in such charges.
- A statement from the board stating that it has reviewed its operating budget for savings
 that could be applied to reduce growth-related net education land costs, and the amount
 of any savings which it proposes to apply, if any.

School Boards are required to provide the Ministry with a copy of the final background study at least 40 days prior to the anticipated by-law passage date. In addition, the background study must be made available to the public at least two weeks prior to the legislated public meeting.

2.3 **Public Meetings**

Before a school board can pass an EDC by-law, the legislation requires that the Board hold at least one public meeting. The purpose of the meeting is to advise any interested stakeholders and the public at large of the Board's intentions and address the new proposed EDC by-law. The public meeting also gives the community and stakeholders the opportunity to voice any issues or concerns they have with regard to the proposed by-law.

The Board is required to provide at least 20 days notice of the meeting and must make the background study as well as the new proposed by-law available to the public at least two weeks in advance of said meeting. O.Reg 20/98 states that notice of a public meeting can be given in two ways:

- To every owner of land in the area to which the proposed by-law would apply by personal service, fax or mail.
- By publication in a newspaper that is, in the Secretary of the Board's opinion, of sufficiently general circulation in the area to which the proposed by-law would apply to give the public reasonable notice of the meeting.

If a school board already has an existing in-force EDC by-law in place, the board must hold an additional meeting to review the existing policies of the current EDC by-law. This part of the process is necessary in order to fulfil the necessary requirements of the policy review process. It should be noted that this policy review meeting can be addressed by the board during its EDC public meeting.

The School Boards intend to hold individual public meetings for both the EDC policy review as well as the new proposed EDC by-law. HCDSB will hold their public meeting on Tuesday, April 17th, 2018 and HDSB will hold their public meeting on Wednesday, April 18th, 2018. Both of the Boards will hold these public meetings at their respective Board offices in Burlington.

Stakeholder Participation

In addition to the legislated public meetings, the Ministry encourages school boards to include relevant stakeholders in the EDC process and discussions. Local developers or development associations, as well as Municipalities should be contacted in advance of the public meetings to ensure they are aware of the proposed EDC and to make light of any potential issues etc. It is essential that stakeholders are part of the process and that the discussions remain transparent at all times to help ensure a smooth passage of the EDC by-law.

The HDSB and HCDSB have worked together closely on the preparation of the EDC background study and by-laws to ensure consistency in the included data and assumptions used in the calculation of the charges. Growth forecasts used for the EDC analysis are consistent with the most recent and available municipal forecasts. The School Boards will hold a joint information session on March 23, 2018 in advance of their legislated public meetings, to discuss the proposed EDCs with community partners, stakeholders and municipal officials.

2.4 Exemptions, Expiration, Collection

Exemptions

The EDC by-law is subject to certain statutory exemptions for both residential and non-residential collection. The exemptions for residential development deal with residential intensification and replacement of units. If a new unit is added to an existing dwelling unit, for example, a single detached unit is converted to a duplex; the additional unit is exempt from EDCs. Section 3 of O.Reg 20/98 sets out the classes of residential buildings and the maximum number of dwelling units that can be added under the exemption.

The legislation also allows for exemptions dealing with the replacement of residential units when the unit has been destroyed by fire, demolition or otherwise or has been rendered uninhabitable, subject to certain conditions prescribed under section 4 of O.Reg 20/98.

Non-residential statutory exemptions deal similarly with additions/enlargements of space and replacement of existing non-residential space which has been destroyed. A non-residential development that includes the enlargement of existing industrial space, up to 50% of the gross floor area of the existing development, is exempt from EDCs as per section 257.55 of Division E of the *Education Act*. Replacement of non-residential building space is exempt from EDCs if the existing space was destroyed by fire, demolition or otherwise or has been rendered uninhabitable, subject to certain conditions in section 5 of O.Reg 20/98.

In addition to the exemptions mentioned, the legislation allows for a limited non-residential exemption for certain institutional developments. S. 257.54 (5) of the Education Act stipulates that; "No land, except land owned by and used for the purposes of a board or municipality, is exempt from an EDC under a by-law passed under subsection (1) by reason only that it is exempt from taxation under section 3 of the Assessment Act.

School boards may also decide to impose their own non-statutory exemptions to certain developments, both residentially and non-residentially. These types of exemptions may be for developments like senior's housing, social housing or recreational developments. Non-statutory exemptions are entirely at the discretion of the board and any EDC revenues lost as a result cannot be recovered.

Expiration

A school board can specify any date as the expiration date of the EDC by-law as long as the term of the by-law does not exceed 5 years. The exception to this rule is that the EDC by-law of one school board automatically expires on the same date as an existing by-law of a coterminous

school board if they are in force in any part of the same area. Section 17 of O.Reg 20/98 prescribes the conditions dealing with this special rule of expiry of by-laws.

Collection

The EDC is collected by local municipalities on behalf of the school boards at the time a building permit is issued. The funds are deposited into an EDC reserve fund. The Municipality, under the legislation, cannot issue a building permit if the education development charge has not been paid. In addition to collecting the charge and transferring the monies to the school boards, municipalities are also required to provide the boards with detailed reports respecting all EDC transactions (Section 20 of O.Reg 20/98). At a minimum each report should cover the total EDCs that have been collected, the number of building permits issued (or GFA for non-residential), any exemptions granted and any permits that were issued without an EDC being paid.

The municipalities do not receive any remuneration for collecting EDCs on behalf of the school boards. However, municipalities are allowed to retain any interest earned on the monthly EDC balances.

2.5 **Appeals and Amendments**

Appeals

The Education Development Charge by-law can be appealed by any individual or organization in accordance with the provisions in the *Education Act*. Sections 257.64 to 257.69 of the *Act* outline the legislation dealing with the appeal of the EDC by-law. The by-law is subject to appeal for a maximum of 40 days after the by-law has been passed. The school boards must provide a written notice that an EDC by-law has been passed (within 20 days of passage) and this notice must include information on how to file an appeal.

An appeal of the EDC by-law goes to the Ontario Municipal Board (OMB) to be decided. All appeals must be filed in writing with the secretary of the school board within the allotted time allowed. The reasons for the appeal must be included in the notice. It is the responsibility of the secretary of the board to forward a copy of the Notice of Appeal to the OMB within 30 days after the last day of the appeal period. In addition to the Notice, the secretary must provide:

- A copy of the by-law certified by the secretary.
- A copy of the background study.
- An affidavit or declaration certifying that notice of the passing of the by-law was provided in accordance with the *Education Act*.
- The original or true copy of all written submissions and material relevant to the by-law.

After hearing an appeal the OMB may decide to:

- Dismiss the appeal in whole or in part.
- Order the board to repeal or amend the by-law.
- Repeal or amend the by-law itself.

If the by-law is repealed, the EDCs that have already been paid must be refunded. If the by-law is amended and the amended charge is lower than the original charge, the difference must be refunded. All refunds are due within 30 days of the by-law being repealed or amended. While the OMB does have the power to repeal or amend the by-law, they are not able to increase the quantum of the charge, remove or reduce the scope of discretionary exemptions or change the expiration date of the by-law.

Amendments

The EDC legislation gives school boards the authority to amend their by-laws. Section 257.70 (1) of the *Act* states; "Subject to subsection (2), a board may pass a by-law amending an education development charge by-law." There are certain limitations to an EDC amendment, specifically laid out in S257.70 (2) of the *Act*, "A board may not amend an education development charge by-law so as to any one of the following more than once in the one year period immediately following the coming into force of the by-law or in any succeeding one year period:

- Increase the amount of an EDC.
- Remove or reduce the scope of an exemption.
- Extend the term of the by-law.

There are a variety of reasons why school boards may feel the need to amend their by-law. School boards may be paying more for school sites than what was estimated in the EDC and may need to increase their land cost assumptions or they may need to change a discretionary exemption. The board does not need Ministry approval to pass an amending by-law, however boards are required to provide proper notice proposing an amendment and of the amendment itself. Boards are also required to ensure that the original EDC background study is available, as well as any additional information that would explain the reason for the amendment. A public meeting is not required to pass an amending by-law, but it is recommended.

3. THE PROCESS AND METHODOLOGY OF CALCULATING AN EDUCATION DEVELOPMENT CHARGE

The following chapter will outline the procedures and methodologies utilized to calculate the EDC. As mentioned earlier in this report, the EDC calculation is formulaic and technical in nature and encompasses three main components – demographic projections, determination of need (new school sites) and the associated costs.

3.1 **Eligibility**

School Boards must first qualify by meeting certain criteria in order to be eligible to impose EDCs. The first criteria deal with the board's average projected enrolment compared to its OTG capacity. The second set of criteria, available only to school boards who have an existing in-force by-law, deal with outstanding EDC financial obligations.

Capacity Trigger

If a school board's average elementary or secondary enrolment on a jurisdiction wide basis over the five years following proposed by-law passage is greater than the board's elementary or secondary OTG capacity than it is eligible to impose an EDC. Qualification on either panel allows the Board to impose EDCs throughout its jurisdiction for both elementary and secondary new school sites. Form A of the EDC submission sets out the Board's projected enrolment over the proposed 5-year term of the EDC by-law (2018 – 2023), as compared to the Board's OTG capacity on both the elementary and secondary panels.

The Board's OTG capacity for the EDC is typically based on the Ministry approved permanent capacity according to the School Facilities Inventory System on the proposed date the new bylaw is to come into force. Additional adjustments may be made to the capacity figure used in the study, in consultation with Ministry staff and for circumstances such as:

- OTG capacity of schools that are transferred from one panel to the other within 12 months
 of by-law passage may be attributed to the panel the school will be used for after the
 transfer is complete. Boards' must have a passed resolution for this to take effect.
- The capacity of all schools or additions under construction and that are planned for opening within 12 months of the by-law coming into force are to be included in the capacity determination.
- Purpose built space that cannot be reasonably used to accommodate pupils from new growth may be excluded from the permanent capacity determination.
- The capacity of a leased school must be included if the school has a "New Pupil Place" capacity attributed to it. The "New Pupil Place" capacity is the capacity used in the determination of Ministry grants.

58

Any schools that have been closed (in accordance with board's school closure policy)
may be excluded from the permanent capacity. In addition, if a school is scheduled to
close during the tenure of the by-law (with Board passed resolution) then the capacity
may also be excluded.

The permanent capacity used for the HDSB is **45,273** spaces on the elementary panel and **19,728** on the secondary panel. The HCDSB has determined a permanent capacity of **23,474** on the elementary panel and **10,890** on the secondary panel.

Both HDSB and HCDSB meet the capacity trigger on both the elementary and secondary panels. The HDSB average projected enrolment from 2018 to 2023 is **46,407** on the elementary panel compared with a permanent capacity of **45,273**, falling 1,134 spaces short. On the secondary panel the Board's average projected enrolment from 2018 to 2023 is **20,005** which is more than the current secondary capacity of **19,728** – resulting in a deficit of 277 spaces.

For HCDSB elementary panel, the five year projected enrolment averages **24,210** compared with a capacity of **23,474**, leaving it short by 736 spaces. On the secondary panel, the average projected enrolment from 2018 to 2023 is **12,643** which is more than the permanent secondary capacity of **10,890** – resulting in a deficit of 1,753 spaces.

Financial Obligations

A school board that has an existing EDC by-law in place and has outstanding financial obligations related to its existing by-law that exceed the balance of the EDC reserve fund, is eligible to impose EDCs. It is possible for a board to have sufficient capacity to accommodate projected enrolment, yet still be obligated to pay for sites that have been purchased as a result of a growth-related need. Outstanding financial obligations can result from a board not having collected enough revenue because of growth shortfalls or an increase in land prices or if a board has purchased school sites earlier than what was projected in the background study.

This financial obligation eligibility trigger was added to the original capacity trigger criteria with an amendment to O.Reg 20/98 and came into force on March 12th, 2002.

For school boards to qualify under this trigger, an EDC Financial Obligation must be demonstrated in the background study including the following required information:

- Have a previous by-law in effect after September 1, 1999.
- Funds borrowed from the EDC reserve fund must be reconciled back.
- Copies of Appendix D1 and D2 must be provided.
- A transaction history of EDC financial activity must be provided from the last Appendix D1 and D2 statements to proposed by-law implementation.
- A repayment schedule outlining the elimination of the EDC Financial Obligation.

An outstanding EDC Financial Obligation exists if the adjusted outstanding principal as per Appendix D of the Board's financial statements (plus any adjustments made), is greater than the adjusted EDC reserve fund balance from Appendix D (including adjustments).

The HDSB's EDC reserve fund has an existing EDC Financial Obligation of \$20,312,206 which means that the reserve fund is currently in a deficit position and qualifies the Board to pursue an additional by-law in the Region of Halton.

The HCDSB's EDC reserve fund has an existing EDC Financial Obligation of \$32,134,899 which means that the reserve fund is currently in a deficit position and qualifies the Board to pursue an additional by-law in the Region of Halton as well.

Form A, part A.2 of the Ministry EDC forms outlines the Board's existing principal commitments, reserve fund balance and total outstanding EDC Financial Obligations. Part A.2 of Form A for each Board's EDC reserve fund can be found below.

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3.2 <u>Demographic Projections</u>

The demographic projections respecting school enrolment and housing and population growth form an important basis for the entire EDC analysis. These projections ultimately determine eligibility, need and the final quantum of the charge. The housing unit forecasts contained in this study are consistent with the most recent municipal forecasts that were available at the time of study. Background, methodologies and overviews of both the enrolment and housing forecasts can be found in chapter 4 of this report.

The demographic projection requirements of the EDC consist of three distinct components; projecting the number of annual building permits that will be issued for new dwelling units and new non-residential space, projecting enrolment of the existing community and projecting enrolment from new housing growth.

New Dwelling Units/Non-residential Space

The number of new dwelling units in the area of the EDC by-law must be estimated for each of the next fifteen years. The forecast is set out by three types of development, low density (single and semi detached homes), medium density (townhouses) and high density (apartments), and is broken down by the School Board review areas that were outlined earlier in this report.

The forecast is set out by varying types of development for two reasons. The first is that different types of development produce school aged children in different ways. Lower density

developments typically produce greater numbers of school aged children than do apartments. Defining various types of developments allows for greater accuracy when projecting the number of new pupils arising from new developments. The second reason is to be able to calculate a differentiated charge should the Boards choose to do so. Each board has the ability to charge a uniform EDC rate across all types of development – meaning that the EDC is one rate for a single family home or an apartment – or can choose to charge separate rates depending on the type of development.

There are certain situations, as defined by the legislation, where certain developments are exempt from EDCs, such as housing intensification. Forecast of *net new dwelling units* should ensure that these exempt units are factored into any forecast and excluded.

In addition to a housing forecast, projections of new non-residential space must also be provided in the EDC study to allow for the calculation of the non-residential component of the charge.

A forecast of new non-residential space estimated to be built in the by-law area must be provided for each of the fifteen years following by-law inception. The non-residential forecast can be estimated in two ways; by gross floor area of non-residential space or by the estimated declared value of future non-residential construction. As with the residential component, there are certain statutory exemptions which must be factored into the non-residential forecast to ensure that exempt space is excluded. These exemptions are discussed earlier in the report.

Existing Community Projections and Projections of New Pupils

The enrolment projections required in order to calculate EDCs must be made up of two distinct projections, one for the existing community and one for pupils from new housing growth. This is done because ultimately the number of total growth-related pupils must be offset by any available pupil places that are not required by pupils of the existing community in year 15 of the forecast. The existing community projection must estimate by school, the number of students for fifteen years based on the number of existing students today and assuming no additional new housing growth. The Board's total OTG capacity of the review area (as of by-law inception) less the projected number of existing community pupils in the review area in year 15, is the Board's *total available space*.

The determination of pupils from new development is based on the aforementioned housing forecast and the use of pupil yield factors. Pupil yields are mathematical representations of the number of school-aged children that will be generated by a particular dwelling over the planning forecast and that will attend a particular school board. Pupil yields used in this analysis are based on Statistics Canada data and Board historical enrolment information. Multiplying the pupil yield factors by the appropriate type of developments in the net new dwelling forecast determines the projected pupils from new development.

To determine the total *net growth-related pupil place requirements*, the available pupil places (total available space referenced above) must be subtracted from the total pupils projected from new development. Enrolment projections and the determination of net growth-related pupil places can be done on a jurisdiction wide basis or on a review area basis. The EDC analysis in this study is based on a review area approach.

3.3 Site Needs

The final "planning" or "forecasting" step in the EDC process is determining the Board's site needs, specifically the number, location and size of sites for new growth-related schools. The calculation of net growth-related pupil place requirements ultimately determines the number of necessary sites and their size. The regulation governing the EDC provides a table of maximum sizes depending on the number of pupil places that will be constructed. These tables can be found on the following page.

While the tables ultimately determine the amount/size of land that will be necessary for new school sites, the legislation also recognizes that there may be situations in which the necessary site for a new school may exceed the size specified in the table. For example a board may need a larger site to accommodate certain municipal requirements or Ministry initiatives. Should a site exceed the legislative requirements, justification must be included in the EDC background study.

Form G of the Ministry EDC Forms submission provides specific details on each site the Board is proposing to acquire to construct new schools. On a site by site basis, Form G provides information on the general location of the site (by review area or greater detail, if available), the proposed size of the new school, the approximate timing of site purchase as well as the percentage of the site that is considered EDC eligible. The Ministry also recommends that proposed site purchases for new schools are consistent with the Board's long-term accommodation plans.

3.4 Growth-related Net Education Land Costs

The planning or forecasting component of the EDC analysis is critical to determining the overall EDC eligible needs of the Boards. To finalize the calculation process of the EDC, these accommodation needs must be translated into financial requirements. The analysis in the previous section determined the total growth-related pupil needs as well as the amount of land (in acres) that will be required to accommodate those pupils. EDC eligible expenses are determined by attaching costs to acquire and service the land needed.

Land acquisition costs have been determined by qualified appraisers and a summary of the methodologies used as well as relevant data can be found in chapter 5 of this report. A separate and detailed appraisal report has also been completed by Cushman & Wakefield. Servicing costs are based on historical costs provided by the School Boards with respect to sites that have been recently developed. Once costs for each site have been finalized, the next step is to determine the percentage of each site that is EDC eligible. This is based on the percentage of net growth-related students that make up the total capacity of the proposed new school. For example, if the new proposed school had a capacity of 450 and 400 of the spaces were accounted for by new EDC eligible growth-related pupils then the site would be 88.88% eligible for EDCs (400/450=88.88%).

In addition to site acquisition and servicing costs there are other EDC eligible expenses that can be included in the analysis. Examples of other EDC eligible costs are:

- Interest and borrowing costs related to site acquisition.
- Land escalation costs.
- Costs related to the preparation and distribution of EDC background studies.
- Costs related to studies of land being considered for acquisition (ie. environmental assessments).
- Costs to service/prepare land for construction (grading, service lines etc.)

Outstanding Financial Obligations

In addition to the costs that have been outlined above, any outstanding financial obligations from previous by-laws are also eligible education land costs. A negative balance in the Board's EDC reserve fund, established for the area to which the proposed by-law will apply, is considered as an outstanding financial obligation and can be added to the total net education land costs. It should be noted that if the board has a positive balance in the EDC reserve fund, these funds must be used to defray any EDC eligible expenditures. The total eligible costs are referred to as the *total growth-related net education land costs*.

3.5 Determination of the Charge

Once the total growth-related net education land costs have been determined there are certain prescribed steps that must be followed to determine the actual quantum of the EDC. As discussed in chapter 2, the legislation allows school boards to determine the type of EDC it will impose. Boards can impose EDCs on residential or non-residential developments and can also charge a uniform rate for all types of developments or can differentiate the rate based on dwelling unit types.

Apportionment of Land Costs

The legislation allows school boards to allocate up to 40% of their education land costs to non-residential development. If a school board had a non-residential component to their EDCs then the land costs would be multiplied by whatever percentage the board deemed to be apportioned to non-residential. For example, if the total land costs were estimated to be \$1 million and the non-residential allocation was 10% then the non-residential growth-related net education land costs would total \$100,000. The remaining balance would make up the residential growth-related net education land costs.

To determine the residential charge (assuming a uniform charge) the total residential growth-related net education land costs are divided over the projected number of net new dwelling units assumed in the EDC forecast over the next fifteen years. The result is the amount of the uniform residential EDC per dwelling unit. If charges are to be imposed on non-residential development there are two ways in which they can be calculated. If the board chooses to use a non-residential forecast of gross floor area, then the total non-residential growth-related net education land costs are divided by the estimated gross floor area of proposed non-residential developments. The board can also choose to use a non-residential forecast of estimated declared values where the non-residential land costs are divided by the projected declared values and multiplied by 100 to get a non-residential charge.

Once the residential charge is determined it can be charged uniformly across all types of development or different rates can be charged depending on the types of units being built. If the EDC is applied in a uniform manner then the total residential land costs are simply divided over the estimated net new dwelling units as described earlier. If the board chooses to impose a differentiated EDC then the charges are apportioned on the basis of different unit types producing different amounts of pupils. Boards may choose to define developments as they wish (i.e. low density, high density, condos, apartments, single family etc.) but are encouraged to stay as consistent as possible with categories used by the Municipalities impacted by the by-law.

A distribution factor is determined by the distribution of growth-related pupils amongst the various unit types defined by the board. For example, if 100 students were from low density

developments, 50 from medium density and 10 from high, the distribution factors would be 62.5% for low (100/160), 31.25% for medium and 6.25% for high. These distribution factors are then multiplied by the total residential land costs to determine the apportioned residential land costs by development type. Each separate amount is then divided by the number of net new units for the particular development type to arrive at the differentiated residential EDC per unit by development type.

3.6 Policy Statements


In addition to the demographic forecasting and financial components of the EDC analysis, there is also an important policy component. EDC policies are largely determined by the School Boards and help shape the type of by-law that will be imposed. Examples of some important EDC policies are the apportionment of land costs across residential and non-residential development or an area specific versus a jurisdiction wide by-law. There are two specific policies that the legislation requires the boards to produce policy statements for that must be included in the EDC background study.

The first policy that a statement must be provided for is the alternative accommodation arrangement policy. The statement must include information on the board's policy with regard to how it deals with alternative accommodation arrangements to provide pupil accommodation and how it could reduce or eliminate the need for EDCs. If the board has had a previous by-law then information respecting how alternative accommodation arrangements were implemented (or not implemented) must also be provided.

The second policy statement deals with the policy on operating budget surpluses. The EDC must include a board policy that states if savings are achieved in the operating budget they must be used to defray any eligible EDC expenditures. The statement included in the background study must state that the board has reviewed its current operating budget for potential savings that could be applied to the EDC. The statement must also include the amount of potential savings that would be applied to the EDC, if any.

A flow chart detailing the EDC process can be found on the following page. In addition, the Ministry EDC Forms, which detail the calculations required to determine the EDC can be found in Appendix A at the end of this report.

4. DEMOGRAPHIC PROJECTIONS

4. DEMOGRAPHIC PROJECTIONS

As mentioned earlier in the report, the demographic projections form the backbone of the EDC analysis, in that they are used to determine eligibility, need and ultimately the quantum of the charge itself. The demographic projections for an EDC consist of both forecasts of new housing development as well as projections of school enrolment. Projections of both new housing and enrolment must be provided on an annual basis for a 15-year period following by-law imposition. The following chapter provides the methodology and background to the demographic projections as well as the results of those projections.

4.1 The Residential and Non-residential Growth Forecast

Residential

The residential growth forecast for the EDC is critical to the analysis because of the direct link between new homes and new pupils for the school boards. In addition to determining a board's needs, the number of net new projected units in the forecast is what the total net education land costs get divided by to determine the final quantum of the residential charge. The dwelling unit forecast contained in this study provides a projection of the number of units on an annual basis for the next 15 years by low (single/semis), medium (townhouses) and high (apartments) density allocations. O.Reg 20/98, S.7(2) states that the board must, "estimate the number of new dwelling units in the area in which charges are to be imposed for each of the 15 years immediately following the day the by-law comes into force."

Housing developments and occupancy patterns have changed significantly over the last decade. Housing developments are offering more choice in terms of density, like singles, townhomes apartments as well as developments that cater to specific lifestyles or age groups (retirement residences). The new *Places To Grow* initiative by the Provincial government mandates that future developments will have more units on less land, increasing the likelihood of more urban type developments and infilling projects in the future. The combination of new initiatives, societal shifts in housing and the recent downturn in the economy have posed a set of unique challenges for municipalities in the area to develop long term population and housing projections.

The development projections contained in this study are mainly derived from recently completed Municipal Development Charge (DC) Background Studies, that incorporate regional residential targets (i.e. Best Planning Estimates). This ensures consistency with local and upper tier governments and other agencies. The forecast information may be supplanted with other relevant data garnered from historical building permit issuance, small area development plans and prior conversations/meetings with local planning departments.

According to information from Municipal building permit data, The Region of Halton has averaged approximately 3,331 new permits for residential construction in from 2013 to 2017. Residential building activity in The Region of Halton has fluctuated over the last decade with a high of 3,745 permits in 2016. This peak in building activity was preceded by a steady increase in building permits from 2,505 in 2013 – resulting in an increase of more than 46% in building permit activity between 2013 and 2017.

Watson prepared growth forecasts for the entire Region of Halton using Development Charge forecasts that incorporated regional targets (i.e. Best Planning Estimates), in addition to other demographic and economic factors thought to influence how and where growth will occur. The Region of Halton's Best Planning Estimates are working numbers showing when and where development is likely to take place within the Region; providing direction in determining the timing of both hard infrastructure (roads, water and wastewater) and community infrastructure (schools, community recreation etc). In addition to regional forecasts, the consultant reviewed historical forecasts and reports, land availability and market trends.

The growth forecast is premised on some significant changes in terms of how the Region will grow in the future - consistency with initiatives like Places To Grow are likely to result in more compact, intensified and urban growth. The EDC forecast projects fairly sustained growth over the next few decades with an average of approximately **5,714** new dwelling units per year from 2018/19-2032/33 (15 year EDC forecast term). The greatest shift in future development is expected to occur in the type of units being built. According to building permits reported by the Region of Halton, between 2013 and 2017, approximately 35% of all permits were for low density type units (singles/semis), 34% for medium density, and 32% for high density totalling 16,653 permits.

As noted earlier, the final growth forecast for the Halton EDC by-law for both the HDSB and the HCDSB totals **85,711** new units that are forecast to be built over the next 15 years. Of these new units, 35% are estimated to be low density, 29% medium density and 36% high density. While the forecast averages **5,714** units for the 15 year EDC term, it is expected that the first 5 years of the forecast will average 6,132 units per year, between years 5 and 10 the forecast is expected to average 5,769 and between years 10 and 15 the forecast is expected to average 5,240.

In order to account for the "intensification exemption", an adjustment to the projections was made to derive the "net" new units housing forecast. This adjustment is intended to estimate the number of units in the forecast created as a result of the "intensification exemption". The overall forecast was reduced by approximately 1.3% to estimate the number of exempt units and resulted in a projection of **84,597** net new units.

Non-residential

The non-residential growth forecast provides a basis for calculating a non-residential EDC, should boards elect to impose such a charge. O.Reg 20/98, s.7(10) states that, "If charges are to be imposed on non-residential development, the Board shall determine the charges and the charges shall be expressed as either: a rate applied to the gross floor area (GFA) of a new development or a rate applied to the declared value of development." The non-residential forecasts contained in this report are projections of GFA and have been derived from the same sources as the residential forecasts.

The non-residential forecast for the Region of Halton totals **87,489,293** square feet of GFA over the next 15 years. As with the residential forecast, assumptions must be made respecting certain exemptions of GFA. Industrial additions (up to 50% of existing floor area) and certain institutional properties (municipal and school board properties) are exempt under the legislation. Utilizing historical Statistics Canada data on non-residential construction by type, **21,872,323** square feet were exempted from this forecast and the total "net" new non-residential forecast totals **65,616,969** square feet of GFA.

4.2 Enrolment Projections

Enrolment projections for the purposes of the EDC analysis are completed as two separate components – enrolment of the existing community and enrolment expected from new housing growth. The enrolment projections of the existing community are based on a scenario of no new housing growth and examine projected enrolment of the existing population. The projections of enrolment from new housing focus on pupils that are generated from expected new housing developments. EDC eligible growth-related pupils must be offset by any available space in the existing community and thus the necessity to examine enrolment projections utilizing the two separate components.

Enrolment projections have been prepared for each review area in each Board's jurisdiction. The existing community projections have been prepared for each of the Board's schools contained in the EDC analysis. The projections of enrolment from new housing growth are provided on a review area basis.

The enrolment projections also assume that students are accommodated in their home attendance areas. This means that students that are currently in a holding situation at a school outside of their home school boundary are returned to their home boundary. Holding situations typically arise when students in a development area await new school construction and are "held" in nearby schools until the new school is open. Situations where students are permanently accommodated outside of their home areas (i.e. program) are not affected.

Methodology

The prediction of school enrolment involves the consideration of a wide range of factors. There are 3 common methods of enrolment projections; rate of growth, enrolment ratios and grade transition. The rate of growth method assumes that past rates of enrolment growth or decline will carry forward. In today's changing demographic and economic landscape this method of enrolment forecasting is unreliable. The enrolment ratio method looks at historical ratios of school enrolment compared with the overall population and then carries forward these ratios or makes assumptions about new ratios and applies them to a population forecast. The grade transition method examines historical progression rates from grade to grade and makes assumptions about the retention of grades from one year to the next.

Watson & Associates used a combination of the latter two methodologies – enrolment ratio and grade transition – in conjunction with strong demographic background data and historical Board enrolment to produce the enrolment forecast for the EDC. The enrolment projection methodology focuses on the relationships between demographic trends and actual historical enrolment of the Board. The basis of the assumptions for future trends comes from the analysis of these historical relationships.

Demographic Background

A demographic profile is compiled for each review area within the board's jurisdiction using data from the 2001, 2006, 2011 & 2016 Census. Trends in the demographic data are used to highlight changes in population on both a review area and jurisdiction wide basis. Examining these historical trends assist in providing perspective and direction when determining future assumptions for the projections.

The table below depicts the demographic trends for the Region of Halton. The total population in the Board's jurisdiction grew by approximately 17% between 2001 and 2006. In comparison population counts grew 6.6% in Ontario and 5.4% Canada-wide over that same time period. Between 2006 and 2011, the population in the Board's jurisdiction grew by more than 14%, slightly less than the earlier half of the decade and notably higher than the provincial and national rates for this same time period, which were 5.9% and 5.7%, respectively. More recently, the jurisdiction-wide population has continued to increase, growing by more than 9% between 2011 and 2016. This compares with a provincial and national population of approximately 5% during the same period of time.

More importantly, from a school board perspective, was the increase in the elementary school aged (4-13 years) population which grew by almost 10% from 2001 to 2006, by an additional 12.6% between 2006 and 2011 and by more than 13.7% between 2011 and 2016 – an absolute gain of 21,970 between 2001 and 2016. The secondary school aged (14-18) population experienced an increase of 19.4% from 2001 to 2006, and then further increased by 13.4% between 2006 and 2011 and 7.1% between 2011 and 2016 – an absolute gain of approximately 11,500 between 2001 and 2016.

In addition to the increases in the elementary aged population, there were increases in both the pre-school aged population (0-3 years) and the population of females aged 25-44 for both the 2001-06 and 2006-11 time periods. These two groups are important because they are excellent indicators of what is expected to happen in the school aged population in the short to mid-term. The pre-school population is the cohort that will be entering the school system in the next few years. Females between 25 and 44 years of age are the group of women that are said to be in their prime child bearing years and examining this population can provide input to future births/school aged children. In the Board's jurisdiction, the pre-school population grew by 24.3% and the population of females aged 25-44 increased by 12.5% between 2001 and 2006. Between 2006 and 2011, the pre-school population and females aged 25-44 population increased again by 12.5% and 7% respectively. More recently (2011 to 2016), the pre-school population has experience some decline however (approximately 5%), while the female population aged 25-44 continued to increase, by approximately 2% during the same period of time.

A description of the relevant population age cohorts is as follows:

- Pre-school aged (0-3) used as a lead indicator of potential anticipated enrolment in the short-term.
- Elementary (4-13) represents the predominant age structure of the students that attend elementary schools.
- Secondary (14-18) represents the predominant age structure of the students that attend secondary schools.
- Adult (18+) reflects the segment of the population that does not attend elementary or secondary school.

The Enrolment Projection Process

Determining Entry Year Enrolment

One of the most important and most difficult components of the enrolment forecast is predicting entry year enrolment or the Junior Kindergarten grade. Much of the overall projection relies on the assumptions made with regard to pupils entering the system. To develop forecasts for the JK grade, a review of historical births, pre-school (0-3 years old) population and historical JK

enrolment is undertaken. The participation rates of the Board's JK grade enrolment of the 4 year old population are examined from one census period to the next to determine future participation ratios.

In addition, a population forecast of the pre-school and school aged population (0-18 years) by single year of age is prepared for the study area. This forecast is based on the population trends of the 2001, 2006, 2011 and 2016 census periods as well as other relevant demographic trends of the area. Recent fertility and death rates are applied to the 2016 Census population and the population is aged to provide future births and future school aged population.

The challenge in this population forecast is to exclude growth/development in this phase of the forecast. The total enrolment forecast is divided into two separate components – existing enrolment and enrolment from future housing. To account for this, trends are examined for 2001, 2006, 2011 and 2016 census populations to estimate levels of growth and migration that occurred between the census periods. Assumptions arising from this examination are used to 'strip' growth/migration from the projected population forecast to ensure that growth is not double counted.

Comparing historical JK enrolment to actual population provides ratios that are used to determine future JK enrolment from the projected 4 year old population in the review area. This determines the projected JK pupils for the review area for the forecast period. These overall JK students then need to be allocated to their respective schools in the review area. This allocation is based on historical shares combined with any Board information on recent openings/closures or program changes that may affect future share. Table 4.1 depicts an example of JK/Elementary participation rates between 2006 and 2016.

At this stage of the projections, each school in a review area will have a projected number of JK's for the forecast period. The next step then involves using the grade transition method to advance each grade from one year to the next. For every school in the system, retention rates from grade to grade are calculated and applied to grade enrolments as they are advanced through each projection year. Each school and community can be unique when it comes to grade retention. For example, the ratio of kindergarten students to junior kindergarten students is often higher in the more rural areas and an indication that more students routinely enter the senior kindergarten grade than would be expected, given the junior kindergarten count from the previous year. Programs, such as French Immersion etc. can also have a significant impact on grade to grade retention. Table 4.2 provides an example of retention rate calculations based on historical enrolment.

Historical enrolment trends, overall participation rates/enrolment share as well as the overall demographics of the area are all examined in conjunction with the ratio of the projected enrolment to the population. This examination looks at the reasonableness of the projections and expected ratios and assumptions in light of recent historical trends.

Secondary Enrolment Projections

The secondary enrolment projections are based largely on the elementary projections and how the elementary students transition into the secondary panel. Each secondary school of the Board is assigned feeder elementary schools which form a "family" of schools based on Board data. As grade 8 students graduate they are assigned to their respective secondary schools. If Grade 8 students can attend more than one secondary school they are then allocated based on recent trends.

The other factor involved in projecting the entry year or grade 9 grade for secondary involves the concept of open access. In Ontario, students are permitted to attend the secondary school of their choice, regardless of Religious requirements, and assuming there is space and program availability. To account for this in the projections, the predicted grade 9 enrolment at a given secondary school based on its feeder schools and historical retention rates is compared to the actual grade 9 enrolment at the school. This ratio provides an approximation of the net students lost or gained due to open access.

The other important variable that is considered in the secondary enrolment projection methodology is the impact of the fifth year of secondary school being eliminated in 2003/04. The elimination of the fifth year of study does not mean that grade 12 students are not allowed to come

back for a fifth year of study. There are still instances where grade 12 students may come back to finish the four year program in five years or to upgrade or retake certain courses. The percentage of students that are coming back for a fifth year varies though-out the Province and even from school to school within a Board. The projections in this analysis typically utilize a 3-year average of grade 12 retention rates (putting greater emphasis on the last year or two) as well as input from the School Boards on their experiences and expected future trends.

The remainder of the secondary projection follows the same methodology used in the elementary projections. Grades are advanced by applying historical grade transition rates for each school in the system. Assumptions are derived using historical ratios of enrolment to population and are used to ensure that projected secondary enrolment relates back to the projected secondary populations.

Examining Historical Enrolment Trends

Historical enrolment provides trends that are used to help form assumptions for projected enrolment and provides an important basis to determine relationships with demographic data. The historical data can provide detail on things like how the change in enrolments compare with the changes in the school aged populations of the same area, how different sized grade cohorts are moving through the system and how enrolment has changed in light of new housing activity.

An important indicator when examining historical enrolment is the ratio of senior elementary enrolment compared to junior elementary enrolment. This ratio provides a quick "snapshot" of the current enrolment structure and can provide a short term outlook of expected enrolment.

The comparison is made between the senior elementary grades (6-8) and the junior elementary grades (JK-1). Assuming full day JK and SK, an equal number of pupils entering JK-1 to those moving through the senior elementary grades would result in a ratio of 1. If the ratio is higher than 1 it indicates that more pupils are leaving the elementary system or school than are entering, and could be an indicator of future enrolment decline, at least in the short term and absent of mitigating factors. A ratio lower than 1 indicates possible enrolment growth (at least in the short term) and is typically found in growing areas where housing attracts young couples or young families with children.

The ratio of senior to junior elementary enrolment for the HDSB's total jurisdiction based on 2011/12 enrolment was 0.96; in 2006/07 however the GSR was 1.14. More recently, the GSR has increased to approximately 1.24 based on 2016/17 enrolment. Table 4.3 outlines historical enrolment and historical grade ratios for HDSB.

Table 4.4 depicts the historical GSR for the HCDSB's total jurisdiction. The ratio of senior to junior elementary enrolment for the HCDSB's total jurisdiction based on 2006/07 enrolment was 1.34 and 1.15 based on 2011/12 enrolment. More recently, the GSR has decreased to approximately 1.04 based on 2016/17 enrolment. Table 4.4 outlines historical enrolment and historical grade ratios for HCDSB.

The Impact of Enrolment Share

Board enrolment share refers to the share or percentage of total enrolment a board receives between itself and its coterminous English language Board. Changes in enrolment share can have significant impacts on board enrolment. For example, increases in enrolment share can help mitigate declines or even increase enrolment in areas where the total school aged population is in decline.

The table found below measures the historical elementary enrolment of the HDSB and the HCDSB on a total Board basis. Board-wide, the HCDSB has decreased its share of enrolment over the past decade – dropping from 36% in 2006/07 to 33% in 2011/12 and 2016/17. Subsequently the Public Board has increased its share over the past decade increasing from 64% in 2006/07 to 67% in 2011/12 and 2016/17.

Comparably, on the secondary panel, enrolment share has remained more stable for the both Boards since 2006/07. Board-wide the HCDSB experienced a slight increase in share of approximately 1% from 2006/07 to 2016/17. The Public Board subsequently decreased its enrolment share between 2006/07 and 2016/17 – dropping from 63% in 2006/07 to 62% in 2016/17.

Enrolment Expected From New Housing

The second phase of the enrolment projection methodology involves predicting housing growth in the study area and its impact on school enrolment. Earlier in this chapter the residential unit growth forecasts were explained in detail. The residential unit forecast is used as the basis to predict future school enrolment from growth. Historical levels of occupancy by school aged children and by housing type provide us with factors and trends that allow us to make assumptions about how new units might produce children in the future.

From an occupancy point of view, the number of people per housing unit has been declining in practically every part of the Province over the last decade or longer. In addition, the number of school aged children per household has also been in sharp decline. New units today are not producing the same number of people or the same number of children as they have historically.

Each unit in the residential forecast is multiplied by a factor to predict the number of school aged children that will come from the projected number of units. To derive this pupil generation factor, the methodology involves using custom census data prepared specifically for Watson & Associates by Statistics Canada. The census data provides information with respect to the number of pre and school aged children that are currently living in certain types and ages of dwelling units. For example, the data is able to provide the number of children aged between 4-13 years that live in single family homes that are between 1-5 years old for any census tract in the study area.

Pupil yields were derived for both the elementary and secondary panels, for low, medium and high density housing types for each review area in each Board's jurisdiction. The pupil yields and trends can vary significantly from area to area in a Board's jurisdiction. In this way, factors are derived and applied to the appropriate growth forecast to get a forecast of school aged children from new development. This new development forecast must then be adjusted to reflect only the enrolment for the subject Board. Using historical apportionment and population participation rates, the enrolment forecast is revised to capture the appropriate share for the Board.

For the HDSB the total yields for the elementary panel in Halton range between 0.071 in Burlington to 0.269 in Milton, with Oakville and Halton Hills totalling 0.233 and 0.218 respectively (Table 4.5). Comparably, on the secondary panel, Burlington and Halton Hills have the lowest yields ranging from 0.027 in Burlington to 0.062 in Halton Hills; while Milton (0.079) and Oakville (0.085) have the highest secondary yields. The HCDSB's the total yields for the elementary panel range between 0.036 in Burlington to 0.157 in Milton, with Oakville and Halton Hills totalling 0.103 and 0.134 respectively (Table 4.6). On the secondary panel, Burlington and Oakville have the lowest yields ranging from 0.017 in Burlington to 0.040 in Oakville; while Milton (0.061) and Halton Hills (0.052) have the highest secondary yields. *Table 4.7 depicts a flow chart outlining the process of projecting enrolment from new development*.



Is The EDC Forecast Reasonable In Comparison To Other School Aged Forecasts?

The aforementioned methodology describes the process in which enrolment projections are derived, however before the projections can be finalized there is one final step. The projections are compared with an accepted school age forecast for the Board's jurisdiction to determine the reasonableness of the projections. The Board projections are built back up to a total school aged population forecast using assumptions on apportionment and participation rates.

The projections are compared to the most recent available forecasts in the Board's jurisdiction. These can include Ministry of Finance Population projections, Statistics Canada Population projections, Official Plan projections etc. If the enrolment projections and the population forecast have similar long-term trends, further adjustment is unlikely. However, should there be significant differences between the two forecasts adjustments may be made to the enrolment projections to ensure consistency with the population forecast.

4.3 **Summary of Projected Enrolment**

The total EDC enrolment projections for Halton indicate that by the end of the forecast period (2032/33), the Halton District School Board will have a total elementary enrolment of 61,764. This represents a total increase of more than 35% from 2018/19. On the secondary panel, enrolment is expected to increase by about 12%, with 2018/19 enrolment of 19,023 forecast to increase to approximately 21,341 by the end of the 15 year forecast term.

The Halton Catholic District School Board can expect total elementary enrolment in Halton of 31,431 at the end of the forecast period compared to the 2018/19 enrolment of 23,164 for a total increase of 8,267 pupils or 36%. On the secondary panel, enrolment is expected to increase from 12,058 in 2018/19 to 14,949 at the end of the EDC term for a total increase of 2,891 pupils or approximately 24%.

5. EDUCATION DEVELOPMENT CHARGE CALCULATION

Once eligibility has been determined, the charge is calculated using the aforementioned forecasts and methodologies. The calculation is dependent on the growth/enrolment forecasts to project need, the valuation of land and services to assign a cost to that need and the residential and non-residential forecast to provide a quotient to determine the final quantum of the charge. O.Reg 20/98, S.7 provides the basis under which the EDC is determined. The following section will explain and highlight the specific calculation components of the EDC.

5.1 The Projections

The residential dwelling unit forecasts as well as the non-residential GFA forecasts that were used in the EDC analysis are explained in detail in chapter 4 and outlined below.

Net Growth-related Pupil Places

The projected school board enrolments as well as the residential forecasts determine the net growth-related pupil places which in turn determine the number of EDC eligible sites. Form E of the EDC Ministry Submission for each board and each panel is set out below. These forms highlight, by review area, the net number of units, the board pupil yields and the growth-related pupils.

The HDSB's projections forecast a total of 17,170 elementary net growth-related pupils and 4,900 secondary pupils. The HCDSB enrolment projections predict 9,677 net growth-related pupils on the elementary panel and 3,785 on the secondary panel.

5.2 Net Education Land Costs

The enrolment projections and the EDC analysis ultimately determine the number of EDC eligible sites which are needed for new growth-related schools. Form F of the Ministry Submission outlines by review area the 15-year enrolment projections as well as the net growth-related pupil places. Form G of the Ministry Submission outlines the number of new sites that will be needed as well as the number of EDC eligible acres of land that are required for those sites and associated costs.

O.Reg 20/98, S.7, specifically paragraphs 4-7, deals with the steps involved in moving from the site component of the calculation to the financial or costing component of the calculation. A cost must be attached to the value of the land that needs to be purchased as well as the costs to provide services and prepare the land for construction. In addition, the balance of the existing EDC reserve funds must be calculated and incorporated into the analysis. Finally, the total eligible revenues, expenditures and existing deficits or surpluses are cash-flowed over a 15-year period to determine the final charge.

Section 257.53 (2) specifically describes what education land costs are:

- 1. Costs to acquire land or an interest in land, including a leasehold interest, to be used by the board to provide pupil accommodation.
- 2. Costs to provide services to the land or otherwise prepare the site so that a building or buildings may built on the land to provide pupil accommodation.
- 3. Costs to prepare and distribute education development charge background studies.
- 4. Interest on money borrowed to pay for costs described in paragraphs 1 and 2.
- Costs to undertake studies in connection with an acquisition referred to in paragraph 1.
 N.B Only the capital component of costs to lease land or to acquire a leasehold interest is an education land cost.

Site Valuation

Paragraph 4 of Section 7 of O.Reg 20/98 states that, "The board shall estimate the net education land cost for the elementary school sites and secondary school sites required to provide pupil places for the new elementary school pupils and secondary school pupils."

To determine the costs of land acquisition, both the HDSB and the HCDSB retained the appraisal firm of Cushman & Wakefield. The appraisers were responsible for providing a land value per acre for each EDC eligible site identified in the analysis. In addition, the appraisers were asked to provide an annual land escalation factor (for 5 years) to apply to the current land values. Specific details and background to the appraisals can be found in the firm's appraisal reports

which were provided to each School Board. The reports are titled "Hypothetical Analysis of Future School Sites To Serve As Input To The Education Development Charges By-law (2018)."

The effective date of the appraisals is June 1, 2018.

The tables on the following page set out the estimated EDC eligible sites that the Boards will require in the 15 year analysis term, their municipal locations and their appraised land values.

Land Escalation over the Forecast Period

As previously mentioned, the appraiser's report estimates an annual land escalation rate to be applied to the acreage values in order to sustain the likely site acquisition costs over the next 5 years. In arriving at an escalation factor the appraisers considered the recent historical general economic conditions at both the micro- and macro-economic levels. The purchase of school sites by the Boards takes place on a very local level, with Boards entering into negotiations with developers on a site-specific basis. Having regard for all of the above, the appraisers concluded escalation factors of 4% per annum for the first year through to the final year are reasonable for the purposes of projecting the land values over the five-year by-law period.

Land Development and Servicing Costs

The *Education Act* includes the, "costs to provide services to the land or otherwise prepare the site so that a building or buildings may be built on the land to provide pupil accommodation" as an EDC eligible education cost. These costs typically include services to the lot line of the property, rough grading and compaction of the site and that the site is cleared of debris. Costs related to studies of land being considered for acquisition such as environmental assessments or soil studies are also considered to be EDC eligible.

Discussions with stakeholders and the Ministry of Education in past EDC by-law processes has resulted in a list that includes some of the primary development and servicing costs that are considered to be EDC eligible:

- Agent/commission fees to acquire sites.
- Municipal requirements to maintain sites prior to construction.
- · Appraisal studies, legal fees.
- Expropriation Costs.
- Site option agreements.
- · Land transfer taxes.

Based on recent historical site preparation costs that were provided by the School Boards a figure of \$75,056 per acre for both HDSB and HCDSB was used in the study. Using historical economic data and construction cost indices, an escalation factor of 1.6% per annum was applied to the assumed per acre site preparation costs. Site preparation costs are escalated to the time of site purchase.

Total Land Costs

The total net education land costs including the site acquisition costs, the escalation of land over the term of the by-law (five years), the site development/servicing costs, as well as associated financing costs and study costs are projected to be over \$486 million for the HDSB. The HCDSB is projected to incur total education land costs of more than **\$363** million over the 15-year term of the proposed by-law.

5.3 Reconciliation of the EDC Reserve Fund

Before the final growth-related net education land costs can be determined they must be adjusted by any deficit or surplus in the existing EDC reserve fund. Any outstanding education development charge financial obligations that have been incurred by the board under a previous by law are added to the total land costs. If there is a positive balance in the EDC reserve fund this amount is subtracted from the total land costs and used to defray EDC eligible expenditures.

Section 7, paragraphs 5-7 of O.Reg 20/98 describe the process of deriving the final net education land costs.

"The board shall estimate the balance of the education development charge reserve fund, if any, relating to the area in which the charges are to be imposed. The estimate shall be an estimate of the balance immediately before the day the board intends to have the by-law come into force."

"The board shall adjust the net education land costs with respect to any balance estimated under paragraph 5. If the balance is positive, the balance shall be subtracted from the cost. If the balance is negative, the balance shall be converted to a positive number and added to the cost."

"The net education land cost as adjusted, if necessary, under paragraph 6, is the growth related net education land cost."

The reserve fund analysis can be found on the following pages for each board. The analysis summarizes the EDC collections (both actual and estimated) as well as the EDC costs that have been expended (both actual and estimated) and the estimated EDC reserve fund balance.

As noted, the EDC reserve fund includes certain estimates respecting revenues and expenditures. The EDC reserve fund reconciliation is based on the most recent Ministry Appendix D1/D2 form. This is a form that is submitted to the Ministry of Education by the School Boards that outlines all EDC eligible expenditures and revenues as well as the EDC reserve fund balance at the end of each year on August 31. Any EDC revenues or expenditures that have been incurred or are estimated to incur between August 31 of the most recent Appendix D1/D2 balance and the proposed date of bylaw passage must be included in the new balance.

The HDSB's EDC reserve fund balance had a deficit balance of **-\$28,608,998** according to the Board's most recent Appendix D1/D2 as of August 31, 2017. Incorporating actual and estimated collections and expenditures since August 31 to May 14, 2018, results in a new estimated reserve fund balance of **-\$20,312,206** for the HDSB. Actual and estimated expenditures are approximately **\$9,043,759** and actual and estimated collections are **\$17,340,550**.

The HCDSB's EDC reserve fund balance had a deficit balance of **-\$40,741,127** according to the Board's most recent Appendix D1/D2 as of August 31, 2017. Incorporating actual and estimated collections and expenditures since August 31 to May 14, 2018, results in a new estimated reserve fund balance of **-\$28,048,723** for the HCDSB. Actual and estimated expenditures are approximately **\$1,347,213** and actual and estimated collections are **\$8,047,830**. In addition, the Board has sold a site with EDC funds returned to the EDC reserve fund totalling **\$5,991,787**.

Tables 5.1 and 5.2 outline the EDC reserve fund balance for each respective Board.

5.4 The Education Development Charge

Once the net education land costs have been totalled, the final steps in the process involve apportioning the land costs between residential and non-residential as well as differentiating the charge by development type, if necessary. The existing EDC by-laws of both School Boards are based on an 85% residential charge/15% non-residential charge and the EDCs are a uniform rate across all types of development. The proposed charge in this background study is premised on the same assumptions, however a range of charges and residential and non-residential rates are presented in the cashflow analysis later in this chapter.

The final net education land costs that have been apportioned to residential (in this case 85%) are divided over the net new units from the dwelling forecast to determine a final EDC rate per dwelling unit. The net education land costs for the residential portion of HDSB's by-law are estimated to be \$413,851,683 and the number of net new units in the EDC forecast is projected to be 84,597 resulting in rate of \$4,892 per dwelling unit. The net education land costs that been apportioned to non-residential (15% of the total) total 73,032,650 and the net square footage in the forecast totals 65,616,969. This results in a non-residential charge of \$1.11 per square foot.

The final net education land costs for the HCDSB that were allocated to the residential portion of the charge (85%) were estimated to be \$308,642,388 and the total number of net new units in the EDC forecast for Halton is projected to be 84,597 for a residential EDC rate of \$3,648 per dwelling unit. The non-residential net education land costs (15% of total) are projected to total \$54,466,304 and the total net non-residential square footage is projected to be 65,616,969 for a non-residential EDC rate of \$0.83 per square foot.

Tables for the proposed by-laws, shown below, outline the total growth-related net education land costs, the net new units and the final EDC rates.

The Cashflow Analysis

A cashflow analysis was completed, incorporating all eligible EDC expenditures, current reserve fund balances and land escalation factors, to determine the necessary revenues that will be collected through the imposition of EDCs. When revenue in any given year is insufficient to cover the expenditures, interim financing (on a long-term basis) is assumed. The methodology used for the cashflow analysis is consistent with accounting practices used by many school boards, municipalities and financial lenders across the Province.

General Assumptions Used

The cashflow analysis must incorporate certain assumptions respecting interest rates, terms, escalation etc. The table below outlines the general assumptions that have been used for the EDC analysis.

Description of Cashflow

The first section of the cashflow deals with **revenue** – there are three distinct components to the revenue section of the cashflow:

- 1. The first component deals with board funds that are available to offset the total EDC costs. As mentioned earlier in the report, school boards must pass EDC policies dealing with alternative accommodation arrangements and operating budget surpluses that could be applied to EDCs. If funds were available from these policies they would be incorporated into Lines 1 and 2 of the cashflow. Both Boards did not identify any funds that were available from these EDC policies.
- 2. The second revenue component comes from any debt the boards incur. The total debt issuance for any given year will be identified in Lines 3 and 4 of the analysis.
- 3. The final revenue component deals with the actual expected collections through the imposition of the Education Development Charge incorporating the annual net new dwelling unit forecast and non-residential forecast. Projected EDC collections by year can be found on Lines 6, 7 and 8 of the cashflow.

The second section of the cashflow deals with **expenditures** – the eligible EDC expenditures incorporate the site acquisition and development costs, study costs and financing costs for incurred debt.

- Site acquisition costs are found on Line 10 of the analysis and are escalated for up to a 5 year period (term of the by-law).
- Site preparation/development costs are found on Line 11 of the cashflow and are escalated up to the time of site purchase.
- Study costs (Line 12) are based on historical board data and are included for each expected subsequent by-law renewal (every 5 years).

• Financing costs (debt carrying costs) are found on Lines 13 and 14 of the cashflow analysis.

The final section of the cashflow provides the projected opening and closing balances of the EDC reserve fund incorporating any existing deficit or surplus as well as annual interest earnings on any balance in the account. Total borrowing, debt payments and outstanding debt can be found in the bottom right portion of the cashflow analysis.

The cashflow analysis also provides a range of possible EDC charges based on different residential and non-residential allocations. All EDCs calculated in this study are based on 85% residential and 15% non-residential collection. The top right portion of the cashflow analysis highlights the possible residential and non-residential EDC rates with a range of 0-40% for non-residential allocations.

Cashflows for each School Board are included in Tables 5.3 and 5.4 on the following pages.

APPENDIX A - EDUCATION DEVELOPMENT CHARGE MINISTRY OF EDUCATION FORMS SUBMISSION

The Ministry of Education has prepared a set of standard forms that are required to form part of the EDC Background Study. The forms are used by the Ministry to review the EDC analysis and are standardized so that information is presented in a consistent manner for all school boards. The forms for each School Board's EDC analysis are found in this appendix. In addition, a description of each form and its purpose can be found below.

FORM A1 AND A2

This form is used to determine whether a school board is eligible to impose EDCs. The A1 section of the form includes the Board's approved OTG capacity for each panel as well as the projected 5 year enrolment. If the average 5 year projected enrolment is greater than the Board's OTG capacity (on either panel), the School Board is eligible to impose EDCs. The A2 section of the form deals with any outstanding EDC financial obligations. The form highlights any outstanding principal less the existing reserve fund balance. A positive financial obligation results in a board being eligible to impose future EDCs.

FORM B

Form B outlines the dwelling unit forecast that was used in the EDC analysis. The forecast is provided by EDC review area and by year for low, medium and high density types of development.

FORM C

This form provides the net new dwelling units that are requirement of the EDC analysis. Due to certain statutory exemptions (intensification) that were discussed earlier in this report, a certain percentage of units are removed from the forecast to determine the "net new units."

FORM D

This form provides the non-residential forecast of gross floor area in square feet over the next 15 years. In addition to providing the total projected square footage, this form also includes an estimate as to the amount of square footage that is exempt from the forecast. Similar to the residential forecast, because of certain statutory exemptions, an assumption must be made regarding square footage that is excluded from the final EDC forecast.

FORM E

Form E provides the total number of growth-related pupils by EDC review area. The form includes the net number of units, associated pupil yields and the number of pupils by density type for both the elementary and secondary panels. The bottom of the form provides the total number of growth-related pupils less any existing available space to determine the total "net" growth-related pupils.

FORM F

These forms provide the total "net" growth-related pupil places on a review area basis. Each form provides a projection of the existing community enrolment by school for each of the 15 years in the EDC forecast as well as their current OTG capacities. In addition, the total projected enrolment expected from new development is provided for the total review area. The total requirements from new development less any available existing space are the net growth-related pupil places for that review area.

FORM G

Form G highlights the EDC eligible sites that the board is proposing to purchase. Each site listing includes information on location, status, proposed school size and site size. The form also provides information on what percentage of each site is EDC eligible based on eligible pupil places as a percentage of the total proposed capacity of the school. In addition to providing site and eligibility information, Form G is noteworthy because it includes the translation from site requirements to site costs. On a site by site basis the form highlights the expected per acre acquisition costs, site development costs as well as associated escalation and financing costs.

FORM H1 & H2

These forms outline the EDC calculation – Form H1 is used for a uniform EDC rate and Form H2 is used if the board is proposing a differentiated EDC rate. This EDC analysis assumes a uniform rate and includes Form H1. This form includes all relevant information needed to calculate the final EDC. The total education land costs (derived from Form G) are added to any existing EDC financial obligations (Form A2) and study costs to determine the growth-related net education land costs for which EDCs may be collected. These costs must then be allocated to the proposed residential and non-residential splits. The amount determined to be borne by residential development (between 60% and 100%) is divided by the total net new units to determine a residential charge by unit. The portion of costs allocated to non-residential development is divided by the net non-residential GFA forecast to derive a non-residential EDC charge per square foot.



Altus Group Economic Consulting was retained by BILD to review the 2018 Education Development Charges Background Study, prepared by Watson & Associates for the Halton District and Halton Catholic District School Boards.

Pupil Yield Factors - Milton and Halton Hills

According to the EDC Study, pre-school population in the Region "has experienced some decline" by approximately 5%, and that the "female population aged 25-44 continued to increase, by approximately 2%" during the 2011-2016 period, but which is well below the jurisdiction-wide population change over the same period of 9%. Both of these trends would appear to indicate that pupil yield factors may decline, or if they were to increase, only moderately so.

The EDC Study goes on to state that the enrolment share for the Catholic Board has declined recently – "Board-wide the HCDSB has decreased its share of enrolment over the past decade – dropping from 36% in 2006/07 to 33% in 2011/12 and 2016/17". This would also imply that the pupil yield factors for the Catholic Board should be increasing at a slower pace than those of the Public Board.

However, upon review of the pupil yield factors, the opposite of these apparent trends has been incorporated into the factors. In fact, the pupil yield factors have generally increased since the 2013 EDC Study, and in numerous instances have doubled, tripled or quadrupled. For example, medium-density housing in Milton saw its pupil yield factor increase by 377%. The factors for medium-density housing in Halton Hills have increased by 445%, and high-density housing in Halton Hills increased by 376%.

Further, the increases to the factors are particularly high for Catholic elementary pupils in Milton and Halton Hills, where the ratio of Catholic Pupil Yield factors relative to the Public Pupil Yield factors in those municipalities has increased rapidly, so much so that the medium-density and high-density factors in Halton Hills for the Catholic Board are nearly equivalent to those of the Public Board. These relationship between pupil yield factors for the Catholic and Public boards appear to be disproportionate to the projected split in enrolment between the two Boards.

The pupil yield factors for Catholic Elementary are more akin to those seen in parts of the City of Vaughan that have historically been some of the more dominant Catholic populations in the GTA.

If pupil yields for Catholic elementary pupils in new units were expanding at the rates seen in Figure 2, we would expect that the number of projected pupils from existing units would also be projected to increase at a similar pace. However, when we review how pupils from existing units are projected to change over the 15-year forecast horizon, there is a decline of 9% across the entirety of the Catholic Board, with a 5% decline in Milton, a 10% decline in Halton Hills and an 18% decline in Oakville.

This 9% decline in Catholic elementary pupils from existing units over the 15-year horizon is equivalent to the projected change in the 15-year forecast period in the 2013 Halton EDC Study. In

the 2013 EDC Study, Catholic elementary pupils from existing homes in Milton were projected to increase by 16%, and decline from 14-18% in the three other municipalities.

If the pupil yield factors from the 2013 EDC Study were well lower than actuals, we would have expected to see a similar discrepancy in the number of pupils projected to be housed in existing units. However, as the projections of pupils from existing households from the 2018 EDC Study is decreasing at a similar rate as projected in the 2013 EDC Study, we question the validity of the significant increases in pupil yield factors in new units used in the 2018 EDC Study.

Site Preparation Costs

The 2018 EDC Study utilizes an assumption of \$75,056 per acre, which is based on recent historical site preparation costs, which is significantly lower than the Halton Boards used in the recent past. The 2013 EDC Study used a cost of \$153,385 per acre for HDSB and \$169,842 per acre for HCDSB. The decrease is being attributed to the costs of providing fibre optic communication lines no longer being required.

Can the background data on the historical site preparation costs be provided?

Stacked Townhouses

Based on the discussion at the stakeholder session, it appears that stacked townhouses are included within the medium density category. Are these stacked townhouse units assumed to have the same pupil yield as traditional townhouse units? As stacked townhouse units tend to be sized more similarly to apartment units, it may be more reasonable to remove these units from the medium density category, and into the high density category. If these units are included in the medium

density category and the medium density pupil yield factors are applied, it could lead to a significant overstatement of the growth-related pupils generated by new housing units.

Change to Boundaries of ERA 124 and ERA 126

We would want to understand why the boundary of review area ERA 124 (Silver Creek West) was changed to remove a significant part of the Georgetown urban area, which is now part of review area ERA 126 (Rural Halton Hills & Acton)? This change means that the Joseph Gibbons and Park public elementary schools are now being used to service the rural parts of the Town of Halton Hills, which was already operating under capacity and is forecast to be well into the future, while ERA 124, which covers much of the Georgetown urban area, no longer includes two schools that could help alleviate enrolment pressures from development elsewhere in that community.

Cushman Wakefield Appraisal Report

We have done a preliminary review of the Cushman Wakefield Appraisal Report and have the following questions:

- 1) The list of comparable land sales in Milton includes #16 5080 Ninth Line, at a value of \$1,302,228 per acre. This site is actually in Mississauga, east of Highway 407, and should not be included in the analysis.
- 2) The "Milton Summary" on page 50 of the Catholic appraisal report quotes an "average price of \$1,382,874 per acre". However, this is based on a simple average, and not a weighted average. If a weighted average is used, that takes into account the various site sizes, the average value of the land in the transactions is \$1,206,699 per acre (and \$1,160,652 per acre if site #16 is omitted as per the previous question). A similar issue is present in the Oakville and Halton Hills summary pages, but in those cases the weighted average and simple averages are much more similar.

INFORMATION REQUESTS

Based on the information received, we are requesting a few information items, listed below:

- 1) The EDC Study does not provide housing forecasts by elementary or secondary review area for either panel. We would like to request that this information be provided.
- 2) The EDC Study materials do not provide detailed breakdown of expenditures and revenues since the last EDC Study. We would like to request that this information be provided so that we can reconcile changes to the reserve fund balances of both Boards.

RE: Response To BILD Memo For Halton EDC 2018

The Building Industry and Land Development Association (BILD) retained Altus Group Economic Consulting (Altus) to review the School Board's Education Development Charge (EDC) Background Study which was prepared by Watson & Associates Economists Ltd. Altus provided a memo to BILD which was relayed to the Boards and their consultant. This memo is provided as a response to address the various issues and questions raised by Altus.

Pupil Yield Factors

Altus highlighted that pupil yields in certain areas of the Boards' jurisdiction increased significantly, particularly medium density yields in Milton and Halton Hills. The observation is correct, that in certain areas of Milton and Halton Hills the medium density yields have increased compared with the yields used in the 2013 Background Study. Altus also highlights certain factors in the Background Study regarding jurisdiction-wide trends dealing with the existing community and states: "However, upon review of the pupil yields factors, the opposite of these apparent tends has been incorporated into the factors." It is important to note that trends for pupil yields in new and growing communities can often be very different from jurisdiction-wide trends of the existing community that may include different segments of the population, age structures, housing types and housing size/age. In addition, actual data that was compiled for this study respecting the number of school aged children living in homes of a certain age in new growth areas in Milton was provided to Altus after the EDC Information Session showing the yields for certain growth areas in Milton.

Watson has also performed additional analysis and further reviewed the issues raised by Altus. Much of the data that forms the pupil yields the Boards rely on is based on actual pupil yield data that compiles the actual number of households, by size and density type, as well as the actual number of school aged children residing in these different dwelling types. As mentioned in an earlier email to Altus, the change in the yields from 2013 to 2018 was significant; however, the yields in 2013 may have been understated as many of the developments in Milton had not yet reached a stage of occupancy where there was a sufficient number of school aged children to provide a useful sample. In 2018, the actual yield data shows the medium density yields in Milton (and Halton Hills) had increased. In addition, the share of enrolment that the Catholic Board received in many of these newer growth areas has also increased since 2013. Altus also mentions that if the yields increased as significantly as they did, we would also see a substantial increase in medium density yields exhibited by existing units. My response is that new units often generate yields that differ from existing units, especially when considering price points and geographies. Pupil yields of existing units in built up urban areas are historically lower than yields from

new homes found in greenfield development. The threshold question is, do the yields reliably reflect the number of school aged children that medium density units are generating in Milton and Halton Hills. Based on the data we have used and the advice we received from school board planners, the answer is yes. Additional data has been provided for review that expands on the initial data that was sent to Altus – this is confidential and proprietary information.

Site Preparation Costs

Background to the site preparation costs is attached.

Stacked Townhouses

As part of the EDC analysis, Watson did not delve into that level of detail when distinguishing between townhouses for medium density yields or units. The medium density assumptions and allocations for housing are based on municipal forecasts. It is unlikely that the forecasts would be able to provide a level of detail that would be sufficient to enable us to isolate all the projected stacked townhouse units in a 15-year forecast for Halton Region. In addition, we are not able to isolate/identify historical yields for stacked townhouses from available data sources.

Change To Boundaries Of ERA124 and ERA126

Joseph Gibbons and Park schools would not be used to accommodate growth-related students generated by residential development in GT South due to proximity/distance from the proposed developments. These EDC revisions to the boundaries are consistent with the Board's long-term planning assumptions and are designed to address future residential development in Georgetown. Both school boards are careful to use available space to accommodate students from new residential development when such space is determined to be reasonable by school board planners and school board accommodation directives. Additionally, the analysis in the EDC Background Study uses every available space in each review area to offset projected students from new development. In review area ERA124, there are a total of 291 available spaces that are being used to reduce the overall growth-related need in the review area and reduce education development charges. In review ERA126 there are a total of 531 students projected from new residential development, of which all is being accommodated in available space in existing schools. There are a total of 648 available spaces in existing schools being using to accommodate projected future students, 164 of which are at Joseph Gibbons and Park elementary schools – the two schools with available space referred to in the Altus memo.

Cushman Wakefield Appraisal Report

The memo raises questions regarding the appraisal report and those questions were forwarded to the appraiser and answers are provided below. However, we would also like to have BILD's views on whether the appraised values are too high or too low?

Regarding the issues addressed by Altus in the EDC memo;

The appraiser has advised that the property referenced in the Altus memo (where Altus stated that the property sale the appraiser used was in Mississauga), is in fact in Milton. The Altus memo also highlights the use of a simple average over a weighted average. The appraiser responded that the difference between the simple and weighted averages would not be significant enough to warrant a change in their final values and assumptions.

Information Requests

- The EDC Background Study has not provided housing forecasts by elementary or secondary review areas because historical practice has been to compile the forecasts by each municipality in the Region. The forecasts included in the background study satisfy the legislative requirements and were developed on a consistent basis with previous background studies.
- During the EDC by-law amendment process the Boards have provided BILD with (i) historical background information relating to the EDC reserve fund balances and (ii) the actual Appendices D1/D2 forms that the Boards submit to the Ministry of Education. The Boards will provide BILD with the most current Appendices as of August 31, 2017 (which is the most recent available). In addition, the background study outlines estimated expenditures and revenues to the proposed bylaw enactment date. The estimated expenditures are a combination of actual Board expenditures and revenues (to most recent available) as well as projected expenditures and revenues. The estimated expenditures are based on Board planning and finance department estimates and revenue estimates are based on historical collections.

With more than 1,500 member-companies, BILD is the voice of the land development, home building and professional renovation industry in the Greater Toronto Area. Our industry is essential to the Region of Halton's long-term economic strength and prosperity. In 2016 alone, the residential construction industry in Halton generated over 15,500 on-site and off-site jobs in new home building, renovation and repair – one of the Region's largest employers. As a simple rule of thumb, one crane in the sky represents 500 jobs. These jobs paid over \$900 million in wages and contributed \$2.8 billion in investment value to the local economy.

It is the understanding of BILD and its Halton Chapter members that this evening, the Halton Catholic District School Board will consider for approval the new 2018 Education Development Charges By-law. This By-law presents a 61% increase to the Board's residential charges and 43% increase to non-residential charges. If approved, the new By-law is proposed to take effect on May 21st.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank your staff and consultants for the opportunity to engage in this process and provide feedback. In addition to BILD attending the stakeholder meeting on March $23^{\rm rd}$, comments on the Background Study were submitted through our retained consultant Altus Group on April $27^{\rm th}$. BILD received a response to this letter from Watson & Associates on May $8^{\rm th}$.

While we appreciate the dialogue that has taken place and the transparency in information sharing, the time to conduct an in-depth review of the material has been limited. BILD's consultants have reviewed Watson & Associates' May 8th response and submit the following comments as outstanding items to be addressed:

1. Catholic Elementary Pupil Yield Factors

We continue to question the appropriateness of the Catholic pupil yield factors in Milton and Halton Hills, and would like to continue the discussion on this topic at the next EDC by-law review. Not discussed thus far, but an emerging development of note related to this issue is that the French Catholic school board has acquired a site in Milton (across the street from Craig Kielburger Secondary School), which may divert much of the Catholic elementary pupils from HCDSB.

2. Stacked Townhouses

Given the significant proportion of housing units in Halton that are stacked townhouses, we would like to see the Boards consider re-defining high-density housing to include stacked townhouses, and remove these unit types from the medium-density category. This would ensure that the pupils generated from new housing development is more realistic and doesn't assume that stacked towns are generating pupils at the same rates as traditional townhouses. The Town of Oakville has recently shifted these units into the Apartments category in the definitions in its municipal Development Charges by-law.

MEMORANDUM

2018 EDUCATION DEVELOPMENT CHARGES (EDC) BY-LAW: **DIFFERENTIATED CHARGES OVERVIEW**

Purpose

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide the Board of Trustees with additional information pertaining to the calculation of the Education Development Charges as it relates to the ability of Boards to impose a uniform or differentiated charges by housing types for residential EDC rates.

HISTORY OF DIFFERENTIATED RATES:

Education Development Charges (EDC) were first introduced in their current form in 1998 through the Education Act and Ontario Regulation 20/98. This came as a legislative reform of Municipal Development Charges. This new reform permitted boards that qualified to impose through a by-law a charge against new residential and non-residential development for growth related net education land costs.

For the Halton Catholic District School Board, EDCs have been the primary source of funding for site acquisitions that are needed to serve the growth within its jurisdiction.

In 2002, following the implementation of the first EDC By-Laws across Ontario in jurisdictions of growth, the development industry requested that there be an option provided within O. Reg. 20/98 that would give boards the ability to impose a differentiated rate based on unit types.

Through Ontario Regulation 95/02, the legislation was amended, and boards were now granted the option to impose differentiated charges in addition to a uniform charge.

Since its inception, no Boards have implemented a differentiated rate for their by-laws since the introduction of the legislation in 2002.

2018 Education Development Charge Calculations

The 2018 EDC Background Report has maintained an 85% residential charge and a 15% non-residential charge. The final net education land costs for the HCDSB that were allocated to the residential portion of the charge (85%) were estimated to be \$308,642,388 and the total number of net new units in the EDC forecast for Halton is projected to be 84,597.

When calculating the uniform rate, the total net land needs would be divided between the total number of units (above), returning a residential EDC rate of \$3,648 per dwelling unit, and increase of \$1,379 from the existing charge of \$2,269 per unit.

When calculating the differentiated EDC rates, the charges would need to be apportioned on the basis of different unit types having different yields, and thereby generating different numbers of pupils.

Units would be defined as low, medium, and high density, with sub-classifications (single detached vs. semi) therein that would be consistent with the categories used by the Municipalities impacted by the by-law.

The levies in Form H2 – EDC Calculation – Differentiated Residential and Non-Residential are as follows:

For the Low Density unit types, the total charge would be \$6,825, an increase of \$3,177 over the proposed uniform rate of \$3,648. This would also represent a total increase of \$4,556 from the existing uniform charge of \$2,269 for low density units.

For the Medium Density unit types, the total charge would be \$3,688, an increase of \$40 over the proposed uniform rate of \$3,648. This would also represent a total increase of \$1,419 from the existing uniform charge of \$2,269 for medium density units.

For the High Density unit types, the total charge would be \$566, a decrease of \$3,092 over the proposed uniform rate of \$3,648. This would also represent a total decrease of \$1,703 from the existing uniform charge of \$2,269 for medium density units.

RATIONALE FOR MAINTAINING UNIFORM RATES

The points below provide a few key reasons as to why staff believes that a uniform rate is preferable for the 2018 Education Development Charges By-Law:

Yield of Students vs. Long-term Impacts of High Density Development

The underlying rationale behind an EDC is that growth should pay for growth, so that if new residential units are created that will generate a future load on school accommodations, then those new units should pay for the future infrastructure required to accommodate the resulting pupils.

This said, although lower densities produce higher yields than medium and high density developments, the presence and availability of a range of unit types within a community and the jurisdiction as a whole offers more housing choices to prospective purchasers, thereby facilitating future family transitions throughout the unit types.

Much like non-residential development charges, higher density units may not directly create students impacting the Board's accommodation, but their presence attracts younger families and equally provide more opportunity for younger families to grow in their respective municipalities. As such, the impact is not immediately apparent, but is spread over a longer period of time.

For example, a student that is now attending one of the Board's schools may not have be living in a higher density unit currently, but may have been born there and since transitioned into a larger unit as the family grew and more space was required. Accordingly, there is an impact on accommodation that is not necessarily tracked to the unit of origin.

Placing the majority of the cost burden on the single family housing imposes a disproportionate share of the cost of growth. It assumes that low density forms of development are in majority the originators of the pressures caused by growth, which may not be necessarily true.

Impact of the charge would be increased significantly for low density developments

When applying a uniform rate, the quantum of the charge is more distributed across all unit types. When using a differentiated rate, there is the potential (as is the case with the Board) that the overall charge will increased and decrease significantly on opposite spectrums of densities. The cost variances are as follows for differentiated rates:

For the Low Density units, the charge for one unit would be increased from the proposed total uniform rate of \$8,540 (\$3,648 HCDSB + \$4,892 HDSB) to \$11,717 (\$6,825 HCDSB + \$4,892 HDSB).

For the **Medium Density units**, the variance would only fluctuate by approximately \$40.

For the **High Density units**, the charge for one unit would be decreased from the proposed total uniform rate of \$8,540 to \$5,458 (\$566 HCDSB + \$4,892 HDSB).

Building Industry and Land Development Association (BILD)

BILD did not demonstrate an interest to pursue differentiated rates at this time. It is assumed that BILD continues to support a uniform charge as they represent different stakeholders from the development community that range in product offerings, from low density to high density developments. Choosing differentiated rates would favour one representative over the other with regards to EDCs.

Stakeholder Meetings and Public Meetings

There has been no indication from the Board's consultation with stakeholder groups, municipalities, and the general public that a differentiated rate is needed at this time.

HALTON CATHOLIC DISTRICT SCHOOL BOARD EDUCATION DEVELOPMENT CHARGES BY-LAW, 2018

A by-law for the imposition of education development charges

WHEREAS section 257.54 (1) of the *Education Act* provides that a district school board may pass by-laws for the imposition of education development charges against land in its area of jurisdiction undergoing residential or non-residential development if there is residential development in the area of jurisdiction of the district school board that would increase education land costs and the residential or non-residential development require one or more of the actions identified in section 257.54(2) of the *Education Act*;

AND WHEREAS the Halton Catholic District School Board has referred to the Minister of Education the following estimates for approval:

- (i) the total number of new elementary school pupils and new secondary school pupils; and
- (ii) the number of elementary school sites and secondary school sites used to determine the net education land costs;

which estimates the Minister of Education approved on June ●, 2018 in accordance with section 10 of Ontario Regulation 20/98;

AND WHEREAS the estimated average number of elementary school pupils and secondary school pupils of the Halton Catholic District School Board over the five years immediately following the day this by-law comes into force will exceed the total capacity of the Halton Catholic District School Board to accommodate the elementary school pupils and the secondary school pupils throughout its jurisdiction on the day this by-law is passed;

AND WHEREAS the Halton Catholic District School Board has conducted a review of its education development charge policies and held a public meeting on April 17, 2018, in accordance with section 257.60 of the *Education Act*;

AND WHEREAS the Halton Catholic District School Board has given a copy of the education development charge background study relating to this by-law to the Minister of Education and to each school board having jurisdiction within the area to which this by-law applies;

AND WHEREAS the Halton Catholic District School Board has given notice and held public meetings on April 17, 2018 and May 15, 2018, in accordance with section 257.63(1) of the *Education Act* and permitted any person who attended the public meetings to make representations in respect of the proposed education development charges;

AND WHEREAS the Halton Catholic District School Board has determined in accordance with section 257.63(3) of the *Education Act* that no additional public meeting is necessary in respect of this by-law;

NOW THEREFORE THE HALTON CATHOLIC DISTRICT SCHOOL BOARD HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

PART I

APPLICATION

Defined Terms

- 1. In this by-law,
 - (a) "Act" means the *Education Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c.E.2, as amended, or a successor statute;
 - (b) "agricultural building or structure" means a building or structure used, or designed or intended for use for the purpose of a bona fide farming operation including, but not limited to, animal husbandry, dairying, fallow, field crops, removal of sod, forestry, fruit farming, horticulture, market gardening, pasturage, poultry keeping and any other activities customarily carried on in the field of agriculture, but shall not include a dwelling unit or other structure used for residential accommodation or any building or structure or parts thereof used for other commercial, industrial or institutional purposes qualifying as non-residential development;
 - (c) "Board" means the Halton Catholic District School Board;
 - (d) "development" includes redevelopment;
 - (e) "dwelling unit" means a room or suite of rooms used, or designed or intended for use by one person or persons living together in which culinary and sanitary facilities are provided for the exclusive use of such person or persons, and shall include, but is not limited to, a dwelling unit or units in an apartment, group home, mobile home, duplex, triplex, semi-detached dwelling, single detached dwelling, stacked townhouse and townhouse;
 - (f) "education land costs" means costs incurred or proposed to be incurred by the Board,
 - (i) to acquire land or an interest in land, including a leasehold interest, to be used by the Board to provide pupil accommodation;
 - (ii) to provide services to the land or otherwise prepare the site so that a building or buildings may be built on the land to provide pupil accommodation;

- (iii) to prepare and distribute education development charge background studies as required under the Act;
- (iv) as interest on money borrowed to pay for costs described in paragraphs (i) and (ii); and
- (v) to undertake studies in connection with an acquisition referred to in paragraph (i).
- (g) "education development charge" means charges imposed pursuant to this by-law in accordance with the Act;
- (h) "existing industrial building" means a building used for or in connection with,
 - (i) manufacturing, producing, processing, storing or distributing something,
 - (ii) research or development in connection with manufacturing, producing or processing something,
 - (iii) retail sales by a manufacturer, producer or processor of something they manufactured, produced or processed, if the retail sales are at the site where the manufacturing, production or processing takes place,
 - (iv) office or administrative purposes, if they are,
 - A. carried out with respect to manufacturing, producing, processing, storage or distributing of something, and
 - B. in or attached to the building or structure used for that manufacturing, producing, processing, storage or distribution;
- (i) "gross floor area of non-residential development" means in the case of a non-residential building or structure or the non-residential portion of a mixed-use building or structure, the total floor area, measured between the outside of exterior walls or between the outside of exterior walls and the centre line of party walls dividing the building from another building, of all floors at or above the average level of finished ground adjoining the building at its exterior walls, and, for the purpose of this definition, the non-residential portion of a mixed-use building is deemed to include one-half of any area common to the residential and non-residential portions of such mixed-use building or structure; and for greater certainty, "gross floor area of non-residential development" includes any part of a building or structure used for the parking or loading of motor vehicles;
- (j) "local board" means a local board as defined in the *Municipal Affairs Act*, other than a board defined in section 257.53(1) of the Act;

- (k) "mixed use" means land, buildings or structures used, or designed or intended for use, for a combination of non-residential and residential uses;
- (l) "non-residential building or structure" means a building or structure or portions thereof used, or designed or intended for use for other than residential use, and includes, but is not limited to, an office, retail, industrial or institutional building or structure;
- (m) "non-residential development" means a development other than a residential development, and includes, but is not limited to, an office, retail, industrial or institutional development;
- (n) "non-residential use" means lands, buildings or structures or portions thereof used, or designed or intended for use for other than residential use, and includes, but is not limited to, an office, retail, industrial or institutional use;
- (o) "Planning Act" means the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. P.13, as amended;
- (p) "Region" means the Regional Municipality of Halton;
- (q) "Regulation" means Ontario Regulation 20/98, as amended, made under the Act;
- (r) "residential development" means lands, buildings or structures developed or to be developed for residential use;
- (s) "residential use" means lands, buildings or structures used, or designed or intended for use as a dwelling unit or units, and shall include a residential use accessory to a non-residential use and the residential component of a mixed use or of an agricultural use.
- 2. In this by-law where reference is made to a statute or a section of a statute such reference is deemed to be a reference to any successor statute or section.

Lands Affected

- 3. (1) Subject to sections 3(2) and 3(3), this by-law applies to all lands in the Region.
 - (2) This by-law shall not apply to lands that are owned by and are used for the purposes of:
 - (a) the Region or a local board thereof;
 - (b) a municipality or a local board thereof;
 - (c) a board as defined in section 257.53(1) of the Act;

- (d) a public hospital receiving aid under the *Public Hospitals Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c. P.40;
- (e) a publicly-funded university, community college or a college of applied arts and technology established under the *Ontario Colleges of Applied Art and Technology Act*, 2002, S.O. 2002, c. 8, Schedule F, as amended;
- (f) a seminary of learning maintained for educational purposes that offers courses accredited by the Ministry of Education, which is exempt from taxation under the *Assessment Act*, the whole profits from which are devoted or applied to such purposes;
- (g) a place of worship owned by a religious organization that is exempt from taxation under the *Assessment Act* that is used primarily as a place of public worship;
- (h) a cemetery or burying ground that is exempt from taxation under the *Assessment Act*; and
- (i) Metrolinx.
- (3) This by-law shall not apply to non-residential agricultural buildings or structures that are owned by and are used for the purposes of a bona fide farming operation.

Approvals for Development

- 4. (1) Education development charges shall be imposed against all lands, buildings or structures undergoing residential development if the development requires one or more of the following:
 - a) the passing of a zoning by-law or of an amendment thereto under section 34 of the *Planning Act*;
 - b) the approval of a minor variance under section 45 of the *Planning Act*;
 - c) a conveyance of land to which a by-law passed under subsection 50(7) of the *Planning Act* applies;
 - d) the approval of a plan of subdivision under section 51 of the *Planning Act*;
 - e) a consent under section 53 of the *Planning Act*;
 - f) the approval of a description under section 9 of the *Condominium Act*, 1998, S.O. 1998, c. 19; or
 - g) the issuing of a permit under the *Building Code Act*, 1992, S.O. 1992, c. 23 in relation to a building or structure.

- (2) In respect of a particular development an education development charge will be collected once, but this does not prevent the application of this by-law to future development on the same property.
- 5. (1) Education development charges shall be imposed against all lands, buildings or structures undergoing non-residential development which has the effect of creating gross floor area of non-residential development or of increasing existing gross floor area of non-residential development if the development requires one or more of the following:
 - a) the passing of a zoning by-law or of an amendment thereto under section 34 of the *Planning Act*;
 - b) the approval of a minor variance under section 45 of the *Planning Act*;
 - c) a conveyance of land to which a by-law passed under subsection 50(7) of the *Planning Act* applies;
 - d) the approval of a plan of subdivision under section 51 of the *Planning Act*;
 - e) a consent under section 53 of the *Planning Act*;
 - f) the approval of a description under section 9 of the Condominium Act, 1998, S.O. 1998, c. 19; or
 - g) the issuing of a permit under the *Building Code Act*, 1992, S.O. 1992, c. 23 in relation to a building or structure.
 - (2) In respect of a particular development an education development charge will be collected once, but this does not prevent the application of this by-law to future development on the same property.
- 6. The Board has determined that the residential development of land to which this by-law applies increases education land costs.

Categories of Development and Uses of Land Subject to Education Development Charges

- 7. Subject to the provisions of this by-law, education development charges shall be imposed upon all categories of residential development and non-residential development.
- 8. Subject to the provisions of this by-law, education development charges shall be imposed upon all uses of land, buildings or structures.

PART II

EDUCATION DEVELOPMENT CHARGES

Residential Education Development Charges

9. Subject to the provisions of this by-law, an education development charge of \$3,648.00 per dwelling unit shall be imposed upon the designated categories of residential development and the designated residential uses of land, buildings or structures, including a dwelling unit accessory to a non-residential use, and, in the case of a mixed-use building or structure, upon the dwelling units in the mixed-use building or structure.

Exemptions from Residential Education Development Charges

- 10. (1) In this section,
 - (a) "gross floor area" means the total floor area, measured between the outside of exterior walls or between the outside of exterior walls and the centre line of party walls dividing the building from another building, of all floors above the average level of finished ground adjoining the building at its exterior walls;
 - (b) "other residential building" means a residential building not in another class of residential building described in this section;
 - (c) "semi-detached or row dwelling" means a residential building consisting of one dwelling unit having one or two vertical walls, but no other parts, attached to another structure;
 - (d) "single detached dwelling" means a residential building consisting of one dwelling unit that is not attached to another building.
 - (2) Subject to sections 10(3) and (4), education development charges shall not be imposed with respect to,
 - (a) the enlargement of an existing dwelling unit that does not create an additional dwelling unit;
 - (b) the creation of one or two additional dwelling units in an existing single detached dwelling; or
 - (c) the creation of one additional dwelling unit in a semi-detached dwelling, a row dwelling, or any other residential building.

- (3) Notwithstanding section 10(2)(b), education development charges shall be imposed in accordance with section 9 if the total gross floor area of the additional unit or two additional dwelling units exceeds the gross floor area of the existing single detached dwelling.
- (4) Notwithstanding section 10(2)(c), education development charges shall be imposed in accordance with section 9 if the additional dwelling unit has a gross floor area greater than,
 - (a) in the case of a semi-detached or row dwelling, the gross floor area of the existing dwelling unit; or
 - (b) in the case of any other residential building, the gross floor area of the smallest dwelling unit already contained in the residential building.
- 11. (1) Education development charges under section 9 shall not be imposed with respect to the replacement, on the same site, of a dwelling unit that was destroyed by fire, demolition or otherwise, or that was so damaged by fire, demolition or otherwise as to render it uninhabitable.
 - (2) Notwithstanding section 11(1), education development charges shall be imposed in accordance with section 9 if the building permit for the replacement dwelling unit is issued more than 5 years after,
 - (a) the date the former dwelling unit was destroyed or became uninhabitable; or
 - (b) if the former dwelling unit was demolished pursuant to a demolition permit issued before the former dwelling unit was destroyed or became uninhabitable, the date the demolition permit was issued.
 - (3) Notwithstanding section 11(1), education development charges shall be imposed in accordance with section 9 against any dwelling unit or units on the same site in addition to the dwelling unit or units being replaced. The onus is on the applicant to produce evidence to the satisfaction of the Board, acting reasonably, to establish the number of dwelling units being replaced.
 - (4) Education development charges shall be imposed in accordance with section 12 where the dwelling unit described in section 11(1) is replaced by or converted to, in whole or in part, non-residential development.

Non-Residential Education Development Charges

12. Subject to the provisions of this by-law, an education development charge of \$0.83 per square foot of gross floor area of non-residential development shall be imposed upon the designated categories of non-residential development and the designated non-residential uses

of land, buildings or structures and, in the case of a mixed use building or structure, upon the non-residential uses in the mixed-use building or structure.

Exemptions from Non-Residential Education Development Charges

- 13. Notwithstanding section 12 of this by-law, education development charges shall not be imposed upon a non-residential development if the development does not have the effect of creating gross floor area of non-residential development or of increasing existing gross floor area of non-residential development.
- 14. (1) Education development charges under section 12 shall not be imposed with respect to the replacement, on the same site, of a non-residential building or structure that was destroyed by fire, demolition or otherwise, or that was so damaged by fire, demolition or otherwise as to render it unusable.
 - (2) Notwithstanding section 14(1), education development charges shall be imposed in accordance with section 12 if the building permit for the replacement non-residential building or structure is issued more than 5 years after,
 - (a) the date the former building or structure was destroyed or became unusable; or
 - (b) if the former building or structure was demolished pursuant to a demolition permit issued before the former building or structure was destroyed or became unusable, the date the demolition permit was issued.
 - (3) Notwithstanding section 14(1), if the gross floor area of the non-residential part of the replacement building or structure exceeds the gross floor area of the non-residential part of the building or structure being replaced, education development charges shall be imposed in accordance with section 12 against the additional gross floor area. The onus is on the applicant to produce evidence to the satisfaction of the Board, acting reasonably, to establish the gross floor area of the non-residential building or structure being replaced.
 - (4) Education development charges shall be imposed in accordance with section 9 if the non-residential building or structure described in section 14(1) is replaced by or converted to, in whole or in part, a dwelling unit or units.
 - (5) Education development charges under section 12 shall not be imposed in regard to a non-residential development with a gross floor area of 100 square feet or less.
- 15. (1) If a development includes the enlargement of the gross floor area of an existing industrial building, the amount of the education development charge that is payable in respect of the enlargement shall be determined in accordance with the following rules:

- (a) if the gross floor area is enlarged by 50 per cent or less, the amount of the education development charge in respect of the enlargement is zero;
- (b) if the gross floor area is enlarged by more than 50 per cent the amount of the education development charge in respect of the enlargement is the amount of the education development charge that would otherwise be payable multiplied by the fraction determined as follows:
 - (i) determine the amount by which the enlargement exceeds 50 per cent of the gross floor area before the enlargement;
 - (ii) divide the amount determined under paragraph (i) by the amount of the enlargement.
- (2) For the purposes of section 15(1) the following provisions apply:
 - (a) the gross floor area of an existing industrial building shall be calculated as it existed prior to the first enlargement of such building for which an exemption under section 15(1) was sought;
 - (b) the enlargement of the gross floor area of the existing industrial building must be attached to such building;
 - (c) the enlargement must not be attached to the existing industrial building by means only of a tunnel, bridge, passageway, shared below grade connection, foundation, footing or parking facility, but must share a common wall with such building.

PART III

ADMINISTRATION

Payment of Education Development Charges

- 16. Education development charges are payable in full to the municipality in which the development takes place on the date a building permit is issued in relation to a building or structure on land to which this education development charge by-law applies.
- 17. The treasurer of the Board shall establish and maintain an educational development charge reserve fund in accordance with the Act, the Regulation and this by-law.

Payment by Services

18. Notwithstanding the payments required under section 16, and subject to section 257.84 of the Act, the Board may, by agreement, permit an owner to provide land for pupil accommodation in lieu of the payment of all or a part of the education development charges.

Collection of Unpaid Education Development Charges

19. Section 349 of the *Municipal Act*, 2001 applies with necessary modifications with respect to an education development charge or any part of it that remains unpaid after it is payable.

Date By-law In Force

20. This by-law shall come into force on June 25, 2018.

Date By-law Expires-

21. This by-law shall expire five years after the date it comes into force, unless it is repealed at an earlier date.

Repeal

22. The Halton Catholic District School Board Education Development Charges By-law, 2013, is hereby repealed effective June 24, 2018.

Severability

23. In the event any provision, or part thereof, of this by-law is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be ultra vires, such provision, or part thereof, shall be deemed to be severed, and the remaining portion of such provision and all other provisions of this by-law shall remain in full force and effect.

Interpretation

24. Nothing in this by-law shall be construed so as to commit or require the Board to authorize or proceed with any capital project at any time.

Short Title

25. This by-law may be cited as the Halton Catholic District School Board Education Development Charges By-Law, 2018.

- 3. Sets measurable goals, objectives and directions for the Director that directly relate to the Board's Mission and Multi-Year Strategic Plan.
- 4. Ensures that the Halton Catholic District School Board's expectations and priorities are being effectively addressed by the Director.
- 5. Is completed annually by the Board of Trustees with all trustees participating in the evaluation process.
- 6. Provides for professional growth of the Director and ensures accountability.
- 7. Shall be based on duties as assigned in provincial statutes, regulations, policies and guidelines for the position of Director of Education.
- 8. Is led by the Chair of the Board.

REQUIREMENTS

1. The annual performance review for the Director of Education shall be initiated by the Chair of the Board in April.

This policy applies to all Board employees and external agencies and/or individuals who wish to conduct research at the Halton Catholic District School Board.

REFERENCES

Ontario Education Act

Tri-Council Policy Statement

DEFINITIONS

External Research is described as when an external agency/individual/institution wants to do research in a school or board. This includes requests from a Board employee collaborating with a non-Board agency or educational institution, and requests from a Board employee wanting to do research outside his/her own area of responsibility for the purposes of completing a professional course or program of study.

Internal Research is described as a central office, school or classroom research project that is related to Board or Ministry initiatives, conducted by any Board employee. It also includes a Board employee who conducts research within his/her own work environment to promote professional growth (e.g., AQ course).

PRINCIPLES

- The Board acknowledges the potential benefit of engaging in external and internal research activities as a means to gather data for educational and research purposes.
- The Board promotes and endorses the gathering of data for research purposes in keeping with the core values of the Catholic Church
- All research activities shall be consistent with HCDSB mission and values, policies, procedures, and strategic directions.

- The Board acknowledges that on occasion the Ministry of Education mandates that data be collected on various educational initiatives and that they may work with independent researchers and/or university partners to conduct research in our Board to inform provincial educational strategies.
- External researchers must actively seek permission from parents/guardians when interested in inviting students to participate in a research study.

REQUIREMENTS

- All research activities that involve our staff and/or students requires review and approval from the HCDSB Research Advisory Committee before the research is started. A checklist is used to assist the committee with the review process.
- The Board expects that all educational research proposals adhere to the <u>Tri-Council Policy Statement:</u> Ethical Conduct for Research involving Humans (TCPS 2).
- Informed consent is required for all research activities that are not conducted under the authority of the Education Act. The form of this consent may vary across projects, but it should be obtained from participants, before the study begins. Active consent from parent/guardian is required for participation in the School Climate Survey. When students participating in the study are under the age of 18, consent must be obtained from a parent/guardian.
- Consent must be voluntary, informed, and an ongoing process.
- All research activities shall be in accordance with Administrative Procedure VI-25 Educational Research and the Education Act, where applicable.

COMMENTS:

OVERVIEW

Trustees and Staff discussed the 2018-19 budget, including an environmental scan, at the Trustee Budget Consultation Session on March 7, 2018, as well as at Regular Board Meetings held on April 3 and May 1, 2018. Staff also provided Trustees with budget estimate updates including a draft budget at the May 15 and June 5, 2018 Regular Board Meetings. These discussions addressed the staffing and program enhancements as well as new initiatives for the upcoming year. Building on these updates, Staff has prepared a final budget estimate of revenues, expenses and priorities for the 2018-19 year. As a result of the budget discussions with Trustees during the June 5, 2018 Board meeting, Staff has

identified additional revenues and budget reductions impacting the 2018-19 Budget which is summarized below:

- Use of Schools/Rentals revenue increased by \$100,000, upon reviewing prior years' trends, current revenues received and remaining scheduled bookings.
- Reduction of \$200,000 to Curriculum Services' program enhancement for textbooks, as the release of the prospective Religion textbook us not expected to be available in 2018-19.
- Reduction of \$70,000 to the printing budgets of all elementary schools and various central departments, upon reviewing Board-wide printing trends.

The impact of these changes represents a \$100,000 increase in revenue and a \$270,000 decrease in expenses, for a net increase to surplus of \$370,000. Of the surplus increase, \$300,000 was directed to the Operating Reserve. Trustees have suggested to achieve an Operating Reserve of 2% of the provincial allocation in a shorter timeframe. Directing a total of \$800,000 annually, would reach the goal in 4 years. Table 1 summarizes the Board's final financial position, listing the opening and closing balances in the surplus accounts available for compliance.

REVENUE PROJECTIONS (APPENDICES A-1 & A-9 AND E)

Revenue has been estimated at \$427.9 million - \$377.9 million in grant revenue, \$3.7 million in other provincial grants (Appendix A-9), \$2.6 million in Federal grants, \$14.6 in other revenue including interest, recoverable salary, rental income, tuition and Education Development Charges. An additional \$13.0 million has been estimated for school generated funds and \$16.1 million in amortization of deferred capital contributions (DCC).

Appendix E outlines the Board's provincial allocation, including the capital allocation, as compared to the 2017-18 Revised Estimates, 2017-18 Original Estimates and 2016-17 Actuals. The operating allocation calculated through the EFIS forms is 4.9% higher than the 2017-18 Revised Estimates, primarily due to increase secondary enrolment, increase in the transportation allocation and additional Ministry initiatives, such as grade 7 and 8 guidance teachers and investment in multi-disciplinary teams.

The capital allocation is higher than the 2017-18 Revised Estimates. The capital grants are in part, based on the Board's estimated capital expenses for the year, which are higher than the 2017-18 Revised Estimates and include capital grants relating to: the new St. Nicholas Catholic Elementary School (CES) (Oakville South Central Consolidation); Bishop Reding Catholic Secondary School (CSS) addition; St. Mark CES classroom addition and child care; St. Michael CES addition and child care; and St. Peter CES child care. Temporary Accommodation funding has almost doubled and reflects the realized enrolment growth in the Board.

ENROLMENT (APPENDIX C)

Estimated Average Daily Enrolment (ADE) is the main driver for the Board's revenue and is calculated using the average of two enrolment count dates: October 31 and March 31. Enrolment projections were submitted to the Ministry in December 2017 and incorporated into the projections released by the Ministry in April 2018.

Ministry enrolment projections have been updated as of May 31, 2018, and comparing to the 2017-18 Revised Estimates forecast, projections have increased 104.0 ADE for elementary enrolment and 833.0 ADE for secondary enrolment, resulting in a net increase of 937.0 ADE or 2.7%. Staff conducted a final review of the enrolment projections against actual registrations, and no further adjustments were required.

The estimated elementary ADE is 22,805.5 and secondary ADE is 12,248.1 (Excludes International Students), for a total of 35,053.6 ADE for the 2018-19 school year.

EXPENSE PROJECTIONS (APPENDICES A-2 TO A-8, B TO B-3)

Total expenses have been estimated at \$418.7 million (including compliance adjustments). Refer to Appendices A2 and B. These expenses include staffing and program enhancements, as addressed in the Overview section above. The new initiatives listed in Table 4 have not been included.

The salary and benefits budget (Appendix B) has been estimated at \$328.0 million, which represents 86.2% of total operating expenses, and is \$14.6 million higher than the 2017-18 Revised Estimates. This is mainly due to enrolment growth, grid movement and compensation increases negotiated in labour agreements, as well as costs related to additional Ministry funding initiatives. Benefit costs have increased due to changes in WSIB regulations, growth and supplementary costs for non-union benefits.

The other operating expenses (See Appendix B) have been estimated at \$52.4 million or 13.8% of total operating budget. The capital expenses are estimated at \$8.5 million, school generated funds amount to \$13.0 million, amortization of capital assets is estimated at \$17.3 million, and employee future benefits and accrued interest adjustments amount to (\$635,000).

School budgets of \$4.7 million have been included in the operating expenses, with \$1.9 million for elementary, \$1.8 million for secondary schools, and approximately \$1.0 million for additional EPOrelated expenditures, reserves for in-year enrolment adjustments and central school contingencies.

The total transportation costs (outlined in Appendix A-8) are \$9.4 million, including \$700,000 funded from Capital Reserve for the Assumption CSS renovation project and \$161,000 for provincial schools. Overall the transportation expenses exceed the allocation by \$662,000.

The Special Education expenses (outlined in Appendix A-4) amount to \$52.2 million, of which \$50.4 million is for salary and benefits and \$1.8 million in equipment and other expenses. This represents an increase of \$3.6 million from \$48.6 million presented in the 2017-18 Revised Estimates. The increase in expenses is due to staffing additions to address growth and new funding initiatives with positions listed in Table 2 in the Overview section. The Special Education Allocation is \$45.7 million, plus \$0.3 million in Special Education Amount deferred revenue, \$1.9 million in funding for self-contained classes and \$2.9 million in EPO and GSN revenues allocated to Special Education, for total Special Education revenues of \$50.8 million for enveloping purposes. As a result, the Special Education shortfall for the 2018-19 Budget Estimates is \$1.4 million. It should however be noted that there are other areas within the GSN that are meant to complement the Special Education expenditures, such as the Qualification and Experience Grant, but they are not clearly tracked through the EFIS forms.

The Board Administration and Governance expenses, including salary and benefits and other operating expenses, amount to \$10.8 million (as listed in Appendix A-5), as compared to \$10.9 million at 2017-18 Revised Estimates. The decrease is a net impact resulting from reallocation of staff to the Program Leadership Allocation, addition of an IT Supervisor, Network Security, increasing legal fees and decrease to contractual services (one-time Financial Information System implementation cost captured in 2017-18). The expenses for the Program Leadership Allocation positions totaling \$1.1 million were reallocated to the Instruction expenses (listed in Appendix A-3), as the EFIS forms enveloped the revenues and expenses outside of the Board Administration and Governance Grant. The Board is in compliance with the enveloping provisions for this grant.

The 2018-19 Budget Objectives outlined in February 6, 2018 report directs staff to set aside sufficient funds to achieve an Operating Reserve of 2% of the provincial allocation while achieving a balanced budget, to comply with the Ministry's Risk Assessment Guidelines. Staff plans to achieve this 2% target over a 4-year period in order to maintain a low financial risk rating. As the Board is currently in a surplus position, transfers of \$800,000 to the Operating Reserve and \$550,000 million to the Capital Reserve were made.

CAPITAL PROJECTIONS (APPENDIX A-1, A-2, AND D)

As the Board reports to the Ministry using Public Sector Accounting Board (PSAB) standards, capital assets are recorded on the Statement of Financial Position and amortization and deferred capital contributions are recorded on the Statement of Operations. Appendix D outlines the capital projects budgeted for the 2018-19 fiscal year, including funding sources for each project.

Construction of capital assets is funded in part by the Ministry (referred to as supported funding), and in part by the Board's reserves (referred to as unsupported funding). Once construction is complete, capital assets are amortized over their useful life. The Ministry provides a grant to cover the portion of the amortization expense related to the Ministry supported funding, referred to as amortization of deferred capital contributions. This amounts to \$16.1 million, as outlined in Appendix A-1. However, as mentioned under the Expenses section above and in Appendix A-2, amortization expense is estimated at \$17.3 million. The difference of \$1.2 million is funded through other areas of the budget.

UPDATED 2018-19 BUDGET SCHEDULE (APPENDIX F)

As the budget schedule indicates, staff intends to file the final Budget Estimates with the Ministry by the June 29, 2018 deadline.

BALANCED BUDGET, ENVELOPING, FLEXIBILITY & OTHER REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

School Boards continue to be responsible for setting their budgets. Education funding recognizes that school boards need flexibility to decide how best to allocate resources within those budgets. At the same time, there are restrictions on how school boards may use certain components of their allocation. The different types of spending restrictions for boards are as follows:

- 1. Budgets must be balanced.
- 2. Class-size targets are to be met.
- 3. The Special Education Grant is limited to special education expenditures.
- 4. The allocations within the Student Achievement Envelope of the Learning Opportunities Grant are limited for use collectively on six programs.
- 5. The Library Staff Allocation is to be used to fund library staff.
- 6. The Per-Pupil Amount (PPA) and Board Action Plan (BAP) Allocations within the Indigenous Education Grant are limited to expenditures that support the Framework, including a maximum of the PPA Allocation that may be transferred to the Program Leadership Allocation (PLA) for the Indigenous Education Lead salary and benefits. If funds are remaining at the end of the school year, then they will be deferred to future year use to support the Framework.
- 7. The Rural and Northern Education Fund is to be used to further improve education for students from rural communities.
- 8. New Teacher Induction Program (NTIP) funding is to be used for eligible NTIP expenditures which are required to meet NTIP program requirements.
- 9. School Board Administration and Governance spending shall not exceed the envelope (excluding Internal Audit and Program Leadership allocations and expenses).

- 10. Program Leadership Allocation (PLA) funding is to be used for eligible expenditures, including salary & benefits and travel & professional development for the program leaders funded through the PLA. If the board does not hire any one of the six program leaders, the board will not generate funding for that particular program leader.
- 11. The School Renewal Allocation is primarily limited to capital renewal expenditures.
- 12. The School Condition Improvement Allocation is to be used for renewal expenditures that are capitalized.
- 13. Capital funding is to be used for approved capital projects.
- 14. The Temporary Accommodation Allocation is to be used for portable moves, leases, and purchases, as well as lease costs for permanent instructional space.
- 15. A portion of GSN funding is to be used first for minor tangible capital assets (furniture and equipment that is capitalized).
- 16. The Ministry also provides funding outside the GSN through Education Programs-Other (EPO) for a variety of projects. Restrictions related to this funding are included in Transfer Payment contracts.

School boards continue to be accountable for how they use all of the revenue that they receive from education funding grants, including the revenue that they can use flexibly.

CONCLUSION:

The final draft of the 2018-19 Budget Estimates reflects an update to the projected funding and the most current expenditures based on the best available information at this time.

Once information on actual enrolments and related staffing adjustments becomes available, budget revisions will be required. Any necessary budget revisions will be reviewed by Senior Staff. The Ministry will also require the submission of Revised Estimates in December 2018, based on the actual October 31 enrolment and funding from the Province will be adjusted to reflect any changes. All additional other Provincial operating grants that are announced up to the Revised Estimates date will also be included along with the corresponding expenditures.

HCDSB continues to have Budget pressures including: sick leave trends, repairs and maintenance of aging schools, and increasing transportation costs. To relieve these pressures, the Board will continue to explore revenue generating options, such as expanding or enhancing student programs (e.g. International Students, Advanced Placement, and International Baccalaureate) and expanding facility rental programs. The Board will also explore measures to achieve efficiencies including detailed expense analysis, which would realize continual cost savings beyond the 2018-19 fiscal year.

Trustees are asked to approve a 2018-19 Budget Estimates of \$418,680,019 (if no new initiatives are added, or \$419,162,019 (if all new initiatives are included in the budget).

Audit and business risk

As part of our audit planning, we identify the significant financial reporting risks that, by their nature, require special audit consideration. By focusing on these risks, we establish an overall audit strategy and effectively target our audit procedures.

Based on our assessment of the Board's operations as well as our experience with the organization in the past, we have not identified any unique significant financial reporting risks. This initial assessment will be re-evaluated upon the completion of our interim and year-end audit procedures.

Areas of focus

In planning our audit, we have identified areas of focus including revenue recognition, accrued liabilities, capital assets, employee future benefit liabilities and expenses including payroll.

Audit plan considerations

We have prepared this audit plan to inform you of the planned scope and timing of the audit for the purpose of carrying out and discharging your responsibilities and exercising oversight over our audit of the consolidated financial statements of the Board.

What has changed from last year

We have set out below a summary of changes that have been taken into consideration in planning the audit for the current period:

Your organization

A part of our audit planning process, we have not identified any specific changes to the operations of the Board that would result in significant change to our audit approach from the prior year. We will meet with management during our planning stage of the audit to obtain an update on the current year operations of the Board.

Regulatory environment

No significant changes.

Canadian Accounting standards

There are changes to Public Sector Accounting Standards for the current audit period as outlined in Appendix 9.

Canadian Auditing standards

There are no significant changes in Canadian Auditing Standards for the current audit period.

Appendix 1: Required communications

- Audit planning report as attached.
- Required inquiries professional standards require that during the planning of our audit we obtain your views on risk of fraud and other matters. We make similar inquiries to management as part of our planning process; responses to these will assist us in planning our overall audit strategy and audit approach accordingly:
 - 1. Are you aware of, or have you identified any instances of, actual, suspected, possible, or alleged non-compliance of laws and regulations or fraud, including misconduct or unethical behaviour related to financial reporting or misappropriation of assets? If so, have the instances been appropriately addressed and how have they been addressed?
 - What are your views about fraud risks in the entity?
 - How do you exercise effective oversight of management's processes for identifying and responding to the risk of fraud in the entity and internal controls that management has established to mitigate these fraud risks?

- Management representation letter we will obtain from management certain representations at the completion of the annual audit. In accordance with professional standards, copies of the representation letter will be provided to the Audit Committee.
- Audit findings report at the completion of our audit, we will provide a report to the Audit Committee.



Appendix 5: New Auditor Reporting

In response to investors demanding more than a binary pass/fail opinion from the auditors' report, the new and revised auditor reporting standards have introduced significant changes to the traditional auditors' report we provide.

In April 2017, the Auditing and Assurance Standards Board (AASB) in Canada approved the new and revised auditor reporting standards as Canadian Auditing Standards (CASs).

What's new?

When are the new requirements effective?

The new and revised standards in Canada will be effective for audits of financial statements for periods ending on or after December 15, 2018 with early application permitted.

The way forward in Canada

The AASB, working alongside the regulatory bodies, continue to deliberate how the disclosure of KAMs will be required to listed entities in Canada given the recent developments in the U.S.

Appendix 6: KPMG's Cyber Security Protocol

This summary is intended to provide management and Audit Committee members with some insight into KPMG's strategies and procedures regarding our cyber defence.

KPMG Global

KPMG Global provides managed security services for member firms which includes 24x7 monitoring and alerting services to identify potential attacks on our environment. We use a series of centrally managed firewalls among our network of member firms to identify and address potential attacks to member firms and to prevent attacks from spreading between member firms. This approach was in place during the Wanna Cry outbreak and was a critical element in our successful defence against that incident.

KPMG Global has also implemented enhanced email protection to address malware and attacks through email and we have implemented automated vulnerability detection services. This service scans equipment that is exposed to the Internet and identifies known vulnerabilities on a real-time basis. "Good housekeeping" is a central tenet of our approach and we continue to focus on known vulnerabilities and patching.

KPMG Global believes the cloud represents a secure environment when appropriately configured and monitored as a platform to deliver services. Our approach to secure the cloud includes deploying full-time, dedicated security and privacy resources, integrating the cloud platform into our managed security services to promote "good housekeeping," and deploying a continuous monitoring plan for each of the cloud platforms that we deploy to member firms and to our clients.

KPMG Global has invested heavily in enhancing the security of our environment, evidenced by the introduction of our Global Security Operations Centre, managed services and other enhancements to our cyber defence.

KPMG Canada Approach

- KPMG Canada does not currently use Office 365 or Cloud based email.
- Cloud environments provide robust security when properly configured, with proper password management.
- The Canadian firm's email servers are hosted in Canada and controlled and managed by KPMG Canada.
- In compliance with our global security controls, we enforce strong passwords that need to be renewed at regular intervals.
- We also maintain a specific IT security platform for the maintenance and management of privileged accounts.
- KPMG's Information Security Program is built on a comprehensive framework of policies, standards, and processes based on ISO 27001:2013.
- KPMG's security requirements are set out in Global Information Security Policies and Standards (GISP).
- The Canadian firm undergoes an internal audit every year to ensure compliance to key security controls in the GISP.
- Every three years, the Canadian firm goes through a Compliance Review conducted by a team from non-Canadian member firms.

Appendix 7: Current developments

Current Developments, created by the KPMG Public Sector and Not-for-Profit Practice, summarizes regulatory and governance matters impacting charities and not-for-profit organizations today, or expected to impact over the next few years. We provide this information to help not-for-profit organizations understand upcoming changes and challenges they may face in their industry. We attach this summary to every audit plan and audit findings report that we provide to our public sector and not-for-profit clients. Some of these developments may not impact your organization directly but we believe it is important for audit committee members of charities and not-for-profit organizations to understand what is happening in the sector.

Registered Charities: CRA's Charity Education Project

In the fall of 2017, Canada Revenue Agency announced the implementation of its Charity Education Project (CEP) initiative, as a complement to its traditional audit program. Per the CRA announcement the CEP program is "designed to conduct in-person visits with registered charities, providing them with information and assistance in understanding these obligations". A CEP visit by a CRA Charity Education Officer will include information sharing on the charity's purpose and activities, a review of the charity's books and records and T3010 information return, and a summary of findings and recommendations prepared by the Charity Education Officer. The registered charity will be requested to sign the summary of findings and recommendations to indicate their agreement with it.

CRA plans to perform 500 CEP visits per year. KPMG is aware of registered charities receiving notification that they have been selected for a CEP visit in January 2018. At KPMG, we will be tracking these initial visits at our clients to identify patterns in CRA's approach and in their findings and recommendations, to assist our clients in preparing for future CRA visits.

To paraphrase Shakespeare's "A rose by any other name would smell as sweet"; a CRA visit by any other name smells like an audit. We encourage our registered charity clients who receive a CEP request letter to contact us to discuss how to prepare for CRA's visit and to prepare a response to the summary of findings and recommendations.

As a matter of good governance, we also encourage all registered charities to do the following on a regular basis:

- 1) Review the charity's operations to verify that activities directly support their charitable objectives. Consider the level of time and resources invested in fundraising or political activities, as these are two activities that CRA monitors.
- 2) Verify that the charity's T3010 Charity Information Return is accurate and that it strategically and faithfully represents the activities and operations of the charity. Verify that the T3010 published on the CRA's website agrees with the submitted return.
- Assess the charity's accumulated reserves, surpluses and net assets, including the purpose for having them and support for the amounts. Consider developing a Boardapproved "net asset reserve policy" documenting the purpose and amount of reserves in the context of organization risks and strategic plan.

KPMG will continue to monitor this situation and will provide updates to you. We are available for further discussion on this significant issue for registered charities.

Tax-Exempt Status of Not-for-Profit Organizations

Over the past few years, the income tax-exempt status of not-for-profit organizations and the activities that should be eligible for this exemption have been the subject of significant political and public debate.

This debate intensified with the CRA's Non-Profit Organization Risk Identification Project (the "NPORIP") looking at entities claiming the exemption from income tax under Paragraph 149(1)(I) of the Income Tax Act of Canada, and the release of their report in 2014. The report emphasized three main risk areas which in the eyes of CRA would disqualify a not-for-profit organization from claiming the income tax exemption:

- having individual activities not related to their not-for-profit objectives; or earning non-incidental profits from individual activities
- using income to provide personal benefits to members
- maintaining excessive accumulated reserves, surpluses or net assets

In 2014, the Government of Canada announced its intention to hold public consultations with not-for-profit organizations on these issues, led by the Department of Finance. The election of a new government in fall 2015 appears to have delayed progress on this issue. While the official mandate letter of the Minister of Finance includes providing clarity on the activities of not-for-profit organizations, the Department of Finance has provided no indication as to when, or if, it expects to begin public consultations with the not-for-profit community on the issues surrounding the tax-exempt status of not-for-profit organizations.

In the interim, CRA has not performed specific audits of the income tax-exemption status of not-for-profit organizations to our knowledge. However, CRA continues to perform regular HST and payroll compliance audits of not-for-profit organizations and charities. As part of these audits, CRA has included questions relating to the accumulated surplus/net assets/reserves of the audited organization, and is seeking documented evidence of purpose, future plans and governance oversight related to these balances.

KPMG encourages the Boards and management of not-for-profit organizations, and of charities, to continue to prepare their organizations for the anticipated changes to tax legislation and regulations. Not-for-profit organizations should review and consider their not-for-profit or charitable objectives, strategic plans, risk assessments, financial results and operational practices in the context of the aforementioned risk areas identified by CRA. In particular, not-for-profit organizations should develop a written, approved Board policy relating to their net assets, accumulated surpluses and/or reserves explicitly documenting the reasons for maintaining these balances, how the amounts were calculated and quantified, and how the amounts will ultimately be used. Boards should also demonstrate and document their oversight of this policy on an annual basis.

KPMG continues to monitor this situation closely and will continue to update you and all of our NPO audit clients.

Commodity Tax Considerations

The GST/HST is constantly evolving. The kinds and pace of the changes affecting your organization will depend on your status and activities, and may result from new legislative and regulatory rules, court cases, and changes in the CRA's administrative policies. In addition, major organization changes, such as reorganizations, cessation of activities, major capital projects, new relationships (e.g., shared service arrangements), and new revenue generating activities may have significant GST/HST implications.

The CRA continues to increase its focus on public service bodies (e.g., municipalities, universities, colleges, hospitals, schools, associations, charities, non-profits etc.) for purposes of conducting GST/HST audits. These audits may be undertaken by GST/HST audit teams dedicated to the public sector or by auditors attached to the CRA's GST/HST Refund

Integrity Unit. Many organizations have undergone audits over the past couple of years. Based on our work with audited organizations, we offer the following general observations on the impact of the CRA's ongoing focus on the public sector:

- The CRA has been focusing on documentation, cost sharing and buying group arrangements, grants and sponsorships, as well as the allocation of inputs between taxable and exempt activities for input tax credit purposes (e.g. the filing of a Section 211 election and claiming of input tax credits on the use of real property).
- The CRA has not consistently been applying audit offsets (e.g., allowing unclaimed input tax credits or rebates) that would help minimize the impact of any assessments.
- Proposed assessments based on sampling and alternative valuation or allocation methodologies conducted by CRA auditors should be reviewed as fair and reasonable alternatives may be available that could significantly reduce an GST/HST assessment.
- The CRA is required to communicate the amount and basis for a proposed assessment to the registrant, and should allow the registrant a reasonable amount of time to review and respond to the assessment (i.e., generally 30-days). It is entirely appropriate to carefully review and question a proposed assessment. Our experience is that proposed assessments can often be significantly reduced at the audit stage. If a Notice of Assessment is issued, you will have 90 days to file a Notice of Objection with the CRA.
- It is important that you have a plan in place for a GST/HST audit, including having a fixed point of contact for the auditor. Planning and managing the audit is as important as having the appropriate policies and procedures.
- Organizations that have undergone significant changes in operations are more likely to be selected for an audit. Many of these organizations are completing compliance reviews by indirect tax professionals in advance of a potential GST/HST audit to verify that the GST/HST is being appropriately handled. A proactive approach can reduce compliance costs and the time needed to deal with CRA auditors.

Our experience with GST/HST auditors has varied from audit to audit. However, in each case, the taxpayer has the burden of proof. The best approach is to be prepared in advance of receiving that audit notification from CRA.

Reporting Requirements in the United States

Over the past few months, tax reform in the United States has received substantial media coverage, and could have significant impacts on Canadian business and individuals with activities and investments in the United States. Given this current environment, it is prudent for Canadian charities and not-for-profit organizations to consider whether they have any reporting obligations in the United States, which is dependent on their U.S. sources of revenue and activities.

For example, Canadian registered charities may be required to file the Form 990: Return of Organizations Exempt From Income Tax, depending on whether the Canadian charity is recognized as a U.S. public charity or a U.S. private foundation and depending on the total gross receipts that the Canadian charity receives from U.S. sources (including individual and corporate donations). The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) assumes that a Canadian registered charity is the equivalent of a U.S. private foundation unless it applies to the IRS to be recognized as a public charity. Normally, a Canadian registered charity receiving more than \$25,000 in gross receipts from sources within the United States will have a requirement to submit the Form 990 to the IRS.

The Form 990 reporting requirements are significantly more extensive than the Canadian reporting requirements. The Form 990 can easily be more than 50 pages long and includes an 8-page detailed questionnaire on the organization's governance, operations and activities, and very detailed information on the organization's donors, activities outside of the United States, grants provided to other entities inside/outside the United States, executive compensation, and related party transactions. The Form 990 is a Canadian registered charity's only public document in the United States and is available on the IRS information website.

We encourage all of our charity and not-for-profit clients to review their activities and sources of revenue on a regular basis to determine whether they have U.S. reporting requirements.

Cyber Security – Prevention and Response

Organizations are subject to increasing amounts of legislative and public pressures to show they are managing and protecting their information appropriately. Simultaneously, the threats from cyber criminals and hacktivists are growing in scale and sophistication. Organizations are also increasingly vulnerable as a result of technological advances and changing working practices including remote access, cloud computing, mobile technology and services on demand. The financial and reputational costs of not being prepared against a cyber-breach could be significant. Not-for-profit organizations are at particular risk due to the information they maintain, including research data, personal data, and health and financial information. The reputational risk of this information not being adequately protected can often outweigh the financial consequences of a breach.

Cyber Security is not solely about information technology; it is fundamentally an operational and governance issue. Not-for-profit organizations should document their assessment of operational threats, implement preventative safeguards against a cyber-attack, and create a comprehensive response plan to a cyber-breach. Every organization should have a Computer Security Incident Response Team (CSIRT) consisting of individuals from many areas of the organization, including those involved in finance, human resources, procurement, customer/member relations, upper management and Board members. Key elements to consider in developing your cyber plans include:

- Assessing the likelihood and intensity of a cyber-attack, based on the value of your information and your public profile
- Assessing your organization's vulnerabilities to a cyber-attack
- Preparing your people, processes, infrastructure and technology to prevent a cyber-attack from being successful
- Detecting, responding and reporting a cyber-breach within your organization
- Initiating your cyber response plan, including containing and investigating the cyber breach
- Recovering from a cyber-breach and resuming business operations
- Reporting on the cyber breach, including informing authorities and affected individuals, as required by legislation and industry common practices.
- Doing a "lessons learned" process to identify improvements

Not-for-profit organizations need to review their operations from the perspective of cyber risks, preventative measures against an attack and response plans for breaches. Of particular importance is the cyber response plan as most experts believe that it is now a matter of when, not if, a cyber-breach occurs. A proper cyber response plan includes the following elements:

- Define sensitive data and information -- what is important to your organization and of value to hackers
- Identify cyber breach scenarios perform a Threat Risk Assessment of threats, vulnerabilities and likelihood of exploitation

- 3) Assess detection and response capabilities what is your organization's capability to manage an incident (CSIRT structure and effectiveness, required performance metrics, business resumption, internal/external communication protocols)
- 4) Develop and refresh your organization's response plan Identify a target state and address gaps, including time to discover, time to manage, severity of post-mortem reviews
- 5) Test and improve response plan develop a testing strategy that includes key internal and external CSIRT responders (event simulations, live testing)

We encourage all not-for-profit organizations and charities to develop their cyber response plans and discuss them at the Board level.

Fraud Risk in Charities and Not-for-Profit Organizations

You only have to read the local and national news to understand the significant, adverse impact that a fraudulent or illegal act can have on an entity's financial position, on-going operations and public reputation. For charities and not-for-profit organizations, a fraudulent or illegal act can be absolutely devastating not only because of their reliance on public financial support but also their need to maintain public confidence and trust in their activities. With social media, and the 24-hour continuous news cycle, the financial, operational and reputational risk of a fraud on a charity or not-for-profit organization has never been higher.

Therefore, fraud risk management is now a very important element of an organization's overall governance and risk management. To protect against the risk of fraud, Boards and management need to maintain a robust fraud risk management program designed to address the core objectives of prevention, detection and response.

Prevention starts with having a heightened awareness of fraud including the key indicators that a fraud may have occurred, an understanding of the profile of a fraudster and what may drive otherwise good people to do bad things. In addition to a heightened awareness of fraud, conducting regular fraud risk assessments allows charities and not-for-profit organizations to identify the key fraud risks they are facing and what they need to do to mitigate these risks.

Detecting fraud can be difficult, so in addition to implementing and monitoring detection controls, it is critical for organizations to provide a mechanism for employees, volunteers and the public at large to report incidents of alleged fraud or wrongdoing to the Board.

An organization's response to a fraud is critical in mitigating potential damage, including reputational harm. As such, it is important to have a response plan in place before a fraud occurs, including investigation and communication protocols.

Boards and management of charities and not-for-profit organizations are beginning to incorporate fraud awareness in their training programs to increase fraud awareness, and to develop a greater understanding of the key organizational elements of a robust fraud risk management program.

The COSO Framework: Demonstrating Sound Management Practices and Internal Controls

Charities and not-for-profit organizations are facing increasing pressures and challenges from various internal and external stakeholders, who are demanding greater transparency and accountability. Chief among these is a heightened level of scrutiny and higher expectations on charities and NPOs to demonstrate sound stewardship, accountability, and achievement of results. This includes being able to demonstrate that resources are managed in a cost-effective manner and that funding received is used to maximize the achievement of the organization's mandate.

A charity's or not-for-profit organization's ability to clearly demonstrate sound management and use of funding and the achievement of objectives are of direct interest to donors, funders, partners, stakeholders and beneficiaries, and increasingly to the Canadian general public. This, combined with a general increase in competition for scarce resources, can compound the challenges experienced by charities and not-for-profit organizations.

In this environment, your organization will be asked to demonstrate that it is using and managing funds in an economical and efficient way and that is maintains a solid control environment supporting management decisions made by the organization. National charities and not-for-profit organizations are beginning to formally adopt the "COSO Framework" of management practices and internal controls to respond to their stakeholder demands. The COSO Framework is an internationally recognized framework for the assessment of management practices and internal controls in all types of entities.

The main reason that the COSO Framework is gaining acceptance in the charity and not-for-profit sector is that it considers internal controls from the perspective of achieving organizational objectives categorized into three areas:

- Effectiveness and efficiency of operations, at the entity-wide and divisional/program levels
- Reliability of financial and non-financial reporting to internal and external stakeholders
- Compliance with applicable laws and regulations

In the current environment of transparency and accountability, charities and not-for-profit organizations must not only achieve, but also explicitly demonstrate, their performance in these three areas. COSO provides a methodology to develop and maintain an effective system of internal control that reduces, to an acceptable level, the risk of not achieving these objectives.

The COSO Framework identifies five core components (Control Environment, Risk Assessment, Control Activities, Information & Communication, and Monitoring Activities) and seventeen key principles within these five components that are required for an effective system of internal control. The Framework is fully scalable to an organization's size, structure, funding sources, or mandate.

The Framework provides a recognized baseline against which existing management practices can be documented and assessed to confirm existing sound practices and identify areas for improvement to strengthen an organization's internal control structure and prioritize efforts and resources to the areas of most significance. As a recognized management control framework, an assessment of internal controls against COSO will also serve to provide both internal and external stakeholders with additional confidence in the stewardship, accountability and overall control environment of the organization.

PSAB projects underway

The following section discusses the major projects currently with the Public Sector Accounting Board that will likely have an impact on government not-for-profit organizations:

Asset Retirement Obligations

On March 9, 2017, PSAB issued an Exposure Draft for proposed Section PS 3280, Asset Retirement Obligations. The proposed new accounting standard would address the reporting of legal obligations associated with the retirement of certain tangible capital assets and solid waste landfill sites by public sector entities. The Exposure Draft proposes to withdraw existing Section PS 3270, Solid Waste Landfill Closure and Post-Closure Liability. The Exposure Draft closed for comment on June 15, 2017, and the stakeholder responses remain under review by the Public Sector Accounting Board. A final standard is expected to be released by PSAB during the third quarter of 2018.

The Exposure Draft proposes similar accounting for asset retirement obligations as in private sector accounting. An asset retirement obligation would be recognized when, as at the financial reporting date, ALL of the following criteria are met:

- there is a legal obligation to incur retirement costs in relation to a tangible capital asset;
- the past transaction or event giving rise to the liability has occurred;
- it is expected that future economic benefits will be given up; and
- a reasonable estimate of the amount can be made.

Public sector entities would be required to capitalize asset retirement obligations associated with fully amortized tangible capital assets, except in the following instances:

- Asset retirement obligations associated with unrecognized tangible capital assets should be expensed;
- Asset retirement obligations associated with tangible capital assets no longer in productive use should be expensed.

The estimate of a liability should include costs directly attributable to asset retirement activities.

The new Section is expected to apply to fiscal years beginning on or after April 1, 2021. Earlier adoption is permitted. This Section may be applied retroactively or prospectively. If retroactive application is selected, a public sector entity may choose to apply certain transitional provisions provided in the Section.

Public Private Partnerships

The public private partnerships task force was established to assist PSAB in developing authoritative guidance specific to public private partnerships. The project will include two phases. The first phase will relate to specific issues, including project scope, recognition and measurement of public private partnerships and disclosure requirements. The second phase will focus on the accounting for public private partnerships.

On July 20, 2017, PSAB issued a Statement of Principles that proposed a new standard on public private partnerships which closed for comment October 17, 2017. PSAB is currently deliberating stakeholder feedback, and anticipates releasing an exposure draft in the second quarter of 2018.

Revenue

On May 1, 2017, PSAB issued an Exposure Draft for proposed Section PS 3400, Revenue that proposes a framework describing two categories of revenue – exchange and unilateral. The Exposure Draft closed for comment on August 15, 2017, and the stakeholder responses remain under review by the Public Sector Accounting Board. A final standard is expected to be released by PSAB during the third guarter of 2018.

Transactions which give rise to one or more performance obligations are considered to be exchange transactions. Performance obligations are defined as enforceable promises to provide goods or services to a payer as a result of exchange transactions. Revenue from an exchange transaction would be recognized when the public sector entity has satisfied the performance obligation(s), at a point in time or over a period of time. If no performance obligations are present, the transaction would represent unilateral revenue, and be recognized when the public sector entity has the authority to claim or retain an inflow of economic resources and a past event gives rise to a claim of economic resources.

The proposed new section is expected to apply to fiscal years beginning on or after April 1, 2021, and be accounted for as a change in accounting policy applied retroactively with restatement of prior periods.

Employment Benefits and Pensions

PSAB has approved a project to review Sections PS 3250 Retirement benefits and PS 3255 Post-retirement benefits as a result of significant changes in types of pension plans and related accounting concepts. The project has been divided into two phases. The first phase will review measurement issues such as deferral of experience gains and losses and discount rate. The second phase will involve the accounting for new types of plans, including shared risk plans. Phase two will also include consideration on accounting for multiemployer defined benefit plans and vested sick leave benefits.

Two invitations to comment have been issued related to deferral provisions and discount rates. Government not-for-profit organizations should monitor this project as the eventual standard will likely have significant implications for the accounting for pension plans and employee benefits.

Concepts Underlying Financial Performance

The objective of this project is to review and amend, if necessary, the conceptual framework of public sector accounting standards. For government not-for-profit organizations, the most important component of this project is significant proposed changes in financial statement presentation. A Statement of Principles: "A Revised Reporting Model for the Canadian Public Sector" will be issued in the second quarter of 2018. Government not-for-profit organizations should monitor this project as the eventual standards will have a significant impact on their financial statements.

Board Policy # I-09 'School Accommodation Review-Consolidation/Closure states: "The Board is responsible for deciding the most appropriate pupil accommodation arrangements for the delivery of its elementary and secondary programs. These decisions are made by the Board of Trustees to further its primary responsibility which aligns with the guiding principles of fostering student academic achievement and well-being, and ensuring effective stewardship of the resources of the Board, including the Board's financial viability and sustainability. These guiding principles apply to any accommodation review conducted pursuant to this Policy, including those conducted under the modified accommodation review process. In some cases, to address changing student populations, the Board of Trustees must consider undertaking pupil accommodation reviews that may lead to school consolidations/closures. Wherever practical, pupil accommodation reviews will include a school or group of schools to facilitate the development of viable solutions for pupil accommodation that support the guiding principles. A pupil accommodation review of a school or schools will occur in the context of the Board's long-term capital and accommodation planning process in conjunction with Board Policy I37: Community Planning



and Facility Partnership if applicable, and after the necessary assessment of the options for the school(s) in accordance with that process."

The objective of the audit will be to determine whether the School Accommodation Review process described in the Board's Policy I-09 and the Administrative Procedure VI-35"School Accommodation review-Consolidation/Closure follows the requirements of the Pupil Accommodation Review Guidelines' (Guidelines) as communicated in 2018:B10 memo "Final Pupil Accommodation Review Guideline and Updates on Integrated Planning and Support for Urban Education (issued April 27, 2018), It will also be determined whether the inputs of enrolment projections, data and costs used to develop the accommodation review recommendation can be matched to source application data and are plausible in the circumstances.

RESULTS OF THE STAKEHOLDER CONSULTATION – PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO POLICY V-04, SCHOOL FUNDRAISING ACTIVITIES

PURPOSE:

To provide the Board of Trustees with the results of the stakeholder consultation undertaken for the proposed amendments to Policy V-04, School Fundraising Activities and the corresponding Administrative Procedure VI-59.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

At the Regular Board Meeting held on February 20, 2018, the Board of Trustees approved the following motion (**Resolution #61/18**):

WHEREAS, on January 19, 2014, Pope Francis wrote to the participants of the March for Life in France: "Let's say 'Yes' to life and 'No' to death" and

WHEREAS, donations are ways of asserting our "Yes" and our "No" for or against institutions which support or violate the upholding of the sanctity of life from conception to natural death,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Halton Catholic District School Board (HCDSB), because it is a Catholic Institution, will not provide or facilitate any financial donations to any charities or non-profits that publicly support, either directly or indirectly, abortion, contraception, sterilization, euthanasia, or embryonic stem cell research. For the purposes of this motion, "public support" for the issues listed above (i.e. abortion, contraception etc....) is not support when privately expressed but is support when publically expressed on a website, in press material or found in some other public area.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Director of Education will provide a list of all charities and non-profits, which benefit from financial donations from the Board by the board meeting of February 20, 2018.

At the Regular Board Meeting held on March 20, 2018, the Board of Trustees adopted **Resolution #91/18**, which required that amendments in Resolution #61/18 be incorporated into Policy V-04, and released for stakeholder input.

Stakeholder Consultation

The period of stakeholder consultation took place between April 13 and June 1, 2018 (inclusive).

Stakeholder feedback was gathered in the following ways:

- I. An online form was made available, as per the usual method for seeking stakeholder consultation on policies. This feedback was also accepted via email;
- II. Catholic School Councils were invited to share their feedback on a separate feedback form;
- III. A small group activity was undertaken at the Council of Chairs' Meeting held on May 23, 2018;
- IV. Delegations from community members were presented to the Board of Trustees


A summary and analysis of all the feedback received is attached as **Appendix A**.

I. Online Feedback Form/Email

A total of **992** responses were received through the online form; **24** responses (**18 unique emails**) were received via email.

Twenty-one percent (191) of the responses were in support of the proposed changes to the school fundraising policy and procedure.

Seventy-four percent (671) of the responses were opposed to the changes and/or process.



A total of 5 themes were identified through the responses in support of the proposed changes and/or process:

- 1. Uphold Catholic Values/Sanctity of Life
- 2. Distinguish Catholic Board from Public Board
- 3. Freedom to donate as one chooses outside of the School Board
- 4. Transparency and thoroughness
- 5. Promote change in charities

A total of 11 themes were identified through the responses opposed to the proposed changes and/or process:

- 1. Want freedom to donate to organizations that benefit others/society
- 2. Uphold Catholic values to love/help without discriminating
- 3. Personal connection to banned charity/organization
- 4. Not contemporary; doesn't align with current societal norms

- 5. Loss of funds for the HCDSB/Withdrawal of tax support for HCDSB
- 6. Potential demise of the Catholic school system
- 7. Logistical barriers/issues
- 8. Discontinuation of any donations/fundraising efforts with HCDSB
- 9. Hypocrisy of the policy/procedure
- 10. Negative Publicity for the HCDSB
- 11. Focus/priorities of the Trustees

II. Catholic School Council Feedback

In addition to the general community feedback gathered through the policy stakeholder consultation process, Catholic School Councils were invited to provided specific feedback on the proposed amendments to the school fundraising policy and procedure, as per Regulation 612/00.

A total of 43 (of 54) responses were received from Catholic School Councils. The Board's Catholic Parent Involvement Committee (CPIC) also submitted a separate response.

The responses were coded and analyzed by Research Services. The findings are provided in **Appendix A**.

To read all response forms received from Catholic School Councils, see **Appendix C.**

III. Small Group Activity - Council of Chairs

A small group activity was undertaken at the Council of Chairs' Meeting held on May 23, 2018. Catholic Council Chairs were invited to share their thoughts, opinions, concerns on the proposed changes to the school fundraising policy and procedure. Thirty-four table responses were submitted, which included 86 individual comments.

The three most common themes identified through this activity were:

- 1. Proper process/procedure for changing the Policy and Procedure were not followed
- 2. Catholic values are not being upheld via the proposed changes
- 3. Wanting the freedom to donate to organizations of their choice and that benefit others/society

IV. Delegations

A total of 29 delegations were presented to the Board of Trustees at Regular Board Meetings held between March 20 and June 5, 2018.

Other Feedback Received

In addition to the above-noted feedback, staff also received a petition, signed by 250 Corpus Christi Catholic Secondary School students, in opposition of Resolution #61/18.

CONCLUSION

The results of the stakeholder consultation for the proposed amendments to Policy V-04, School Fundraising Activities and corresponding Administrative Procedure VI-59 are provided in the attached appendices. In accordance with Resolution #91/18, this feedback is placed before Trustees for discussion.

Introduction

This report summarizes feedback from Halton Catholic District School Board (HCDSB) stakeholders about the amendments to **Policy V-04** and **Administrative Procedure VI-59**, regarding School Fundraising Activities. These amendments reflect the Sanctity of Life motion, or Resolution #61/18, which was approved on the March 20th, 2018 Board meeting. Beginning April 13th, 2018, the Director of Education invited stakeholders to review the amended policy and procedure and to provide input on the proposed changes.

Four data sources were included in the analysis by Research and Development Services for the purposes of this report:

- 1. Online form and email feedback;
- 2. Catholic School Council form;
- 3. Table activity from the May 2018 Catholic Council of Chairs Meeting
- 4. Delegations

The following sections provide a description of the method of data collection and analytic procedure, followed by a data summary.

1. ONLINE FORM AND EMAIL FEEDBACK

On April 13th, 2018, the Director of Education invited all HCDSB stakeholders to provide input about the amendments to the School Fundraising Activities policy and procedure, via an online form on the HCDSB website or email communication.

The data received were reviewed to obtain counts of the number of responses in different categories and to analyze themes that emerged from the comments. The following limitations should be considered:

- The online form was anonymous (aside from a field to include name voluntarily), and not password protected, so it was not possible to:
 - o prevent duplicate names and duplicate comments
 - ensure that the responses came from authentic HCDSB stakeholders who reside, work, or study in Halton (i.e., HCDSB ratepayers, parents, students, staff, trustees)
- The online form did not include a close-ended question to quantitatively collect number of votes for/against the amendments, so all comments had to be coded and analyzed qualitatively

However, care was taken to keep track of duplicate names/comments as well as comments that explicitly stated that they were not from Halton. As described later, the duplicate names and non-Halton comments were not included in the thematic analysis of the data.

A) Who Responded?

Number of responses submitted by the feedback form

In total, 992 responses were submitted using the online form on the HCDSB website. Respondents had the option to select the Policy (Policy V-04 School Fundraising Activities) or the Procedure (Procedure VI-59 School Fundraising Activities) when commenting. Of these, 868 were comments on the Policy and 122 were comments on the procedure. Two of the submitted responses did not specify either Policy or Procedure. Note that these counts include duplicate names, duplicate comments, non-Halton respondents, and Catholic School Councils.

Number of responses submitted by email

In total, 24 responses were submitted via email. After eliminating submissions by the same respondents, Catholic School Councils, and non-Halton individuals, there were 18 unique emails.

Number of duplicate responses received in total (form/email)

There were 136 duplicate names. Some of the duplicate names commented on both the policy and procedure, whereas others commented two or more times on the same policy name (i.e. policy or procedure).

There were 97 duplicate comments. Some of the duplicate comments were submitted by the same person, whether they were commenting on both the policy and procedure or on the same policy names. The remaining duplicate comments were submitted by different people.

Number of submissions that say they are not from Halton


Four online feedback form submissions and 2 emails were not from Halton.

B) Position on the Policy and Procedure Changes

Number of responses included in the thematic analysis of online form and email feedback. There were 906 responses included in the thematic analysis of the stakeholder data (18 emails and 888 online form responses). In this analysis, duplicate responses were deleted, the policy and procedure feedback submitted by the same respondent was combined, and non-Halton respondents and Catholic School Councils were excluded. There were 8 different stakeholder groups identified on the online feedback form represented in the thematic analysis. The original online form did not ask for respondents' roles, therefore 298 (33.6%) of stakeholder roles were unknown. Of the roles selected on the form, the majority were HCDSB parents (41.4%, n=375), followed by Halton Catholic Ratepayer (7.7%, n=70), and HCDSB students (5.5%, n=50).

The data from the online form and emails were first reviewed and coded on whether the respondent's comments indicated that she/he was 'For' or 'Against' the amendments. If their position on the proposed changes was unclear or not explicitly stated, this was coded as 'Neither'.





As shown in the chart above most of the responses received via the online form or email (74.1%, n=671) indicated that the respondent was *against* the proposed policy/procedure changes. In contrast, 21.1% (n=191) of responses were *in favour* of the proposed changes. And 44 responses (4.9%) either did not indicate their position on the proposed changes, or their response was uninterpretable. Note that all respondents were coded once, so respondents who submitted multiple comments under the same name were not counted multiple times in this tally.

C) Common Themes Found within the 'For' Comments

The responses submitted that indicated agreement with the proposed changes (n = 191) via online form or email were analyzed to uncover themes related to their agreement (e.g., what the respondent liked about the changes to the policy and/or procedure; potential consequences/effects). The comments can be aggregated into the following themes.

Note: The percentage provided with each theme refers to the proportion of stakeholders in agreement with the proposed changes who comment on the theme. The theme/topic counts are greater than the number of responses to the question, since some responses reflected multiple themes. These themes do not account for all opinions expressed but provide a summary of the most frequent comments. A complete list of responses is provided in Appendix B.

Theme 1: Uphold Catholic Values/Sanctity of Life. Respondents stated that they approve of the proposed changes to the policy/procedure because they promote and defend Catholic values (i.e. the Sanctity of Life) (76.4%, n=146). Examples:

"The Catholic Church courageously holds the Sanctity of Life as a core principle. As a Catholic school, we cannot but support this principle as well."

"Catholic schools have a duty to transmit Catholic teaching, values and ethos. That is the primary reason for having "Catholic" schools. There is no "opinion" as to what constitutes Catholic moral teaching. It is comprehensively to be found in "The Catechism of the Catholic Church.""

"Our Catholic Board must distinguish itself by following Catholic teaching. All activities, events, and values should reflect who the Church truly is. This Resolution is an obvious and necessary step toward honouring our Catholic faith."

Theme 2: Distinguish Catholic Board from Public Board, by upholding the beliefs that differentiate the Catholic school system from a secular school system (19.9%, n=38). Examples:

"... It is our Catholic faith and identity that separates us as a school board."

"We need to protect our values, even if they are not popular. If we don't care, then get rid of the separate school system."

" In the hard choice between society believes and Catholic faith the Faith is what make Catholic education different from public education."

Theme 3: Freedom to donate as one chooses outside of the School Board. Respondents suggested that those who wish to donate to charities not sanctioned by the HCDSB may do so in their own time, outside of the Board (7.9%, n=15). Examples:

"Those that do not support VI-59 have the option of donating to groups they support on an individual/external basis."

"Those who wish to raise funds for other charities & non-profits can do so on their own time and own dime and not through the school."

"If people wish to support groups that go against the teaching of our faith, they can do so on their own time."

Theme 4: Transparency and thoroughness. Respondents mentioned that they appreciate the transparent donation process, clear guidelines as to which organizations received HCDSB donations, and thoroughness in researching charities prior to donating (4.7%, n=9). Examples:

"The procedure VI-59 is open and transparent. It's a good procedure to keep control of our funds and guarantee its destination to institutions that promote the dignity of life and seek for an improvement in the society."

"I agree with this motion setting up standards of accountability and transparency for it's fund raising practices and vetting of charities and non profits."

"I believe it is very positive that the amended Administrative Procedure VI-59-Fundraising Activities includes specific directions for a transparent process and that the public has the opportunity to provide input and submit new research that may support or contradict the position of any approved or non-approved charity or non-profit organization."

Theme 5: Promote change in charities. Respondents mentioned the possibility of evoking change in charities' affiliations, procedures, and practices if the HCDSB refuses to donate to any organization that goes against the Sanctity of Life (3.7%, n=7). Examples:

"This initiative can even encourage key fundraising companies to reconsider their policies in practice in support of life as we chose to stand by our decision."

"Let's hold the recipient companies to a higher standard."

D) Common Themes Found within the 'Against' Comments

The responses submitted that indicated disagreement with the proposed changes (n = 671) via online form or email were analyzed to uncover themes related to their agreement (e.g., what the respondent liked about the changes to the policy and/or procedure; potential consequences/effects). Comments can be aggregated into the following themes.

Note: The percentage provided with each theme refers to the proportion of stakeholders against the proposed changes who comment on the theme. Note that the theme/topic counts are greater than the number of responses to the question, since some responses reflected multiple themes. These themes do not account for all opinions expressed but provide a summary of the most frequent comments. A complete list of responses is provided in Appendix B.

Theme 1: Want freedom to donate to organizations that benefit others/society. Respondents suggested that many of the potentially banned organizations help others and benefit society, and therefore the HCDSB should be able to donate to such valuable charities. Also, parents, students, and staff should have a say in where their money is donated (40.5%, n=272). Examples:

"Agencies and groups that work towards the betterment of society should not be judged through the eyes of policy makers, they should be made by those choosing to donate. Its the donors decision to donate, not policy makers."

"Many of the charities now banned do very good work and with the hard work of parents and students support should not be restricted to what trustees agree to only and only a few trustees at that."

"Sick Kids has helped so many in need as have many organizations that the catholic school board would like to stop donating to."

Theme 2: Uphold Catholic values to love/help without discriminating. Respondents suggested that the proposed changes go against the Catholic values that are taught and promoted within the Catholic church and school board (39.9%, n=268). Examples:

"Jesus said to "love thy neighbor" and to "treat others as you would like to be treated" so why are we going against his word and refusing to aid those in need. It dosent matter what you believe in for Jesus helped all people even if he didn't necessarily agree with their life choices."

"Children are taught to look through the lens "What Would Jesus Do?" This policy goes against everything we are taught and teach as forces us to turn our backs to those who need it."

"As people living in the Catholic faith I have not been called to judge others in this life. It is only for God to carry that out as he sees fit. This policy would be casting judgment and limiting our ability as a community to come together to support one another how we see fit."

Theme 3: Personal connection to banned charity/organization. Respondents indicated that they/their families, or members of the school community use or might benefit from the services/benefits provided by the potentially banned organizations (16.8%, n=113). Examples:

"How am I supposed to tell my son that he should not support an organization that helped cure a family member's illness."

"Resolution 61/18 Sanctity of Life Motion is absolutely absurd in that it limits the HCDSB from fund raising through many charities that we as parents and members of the community have personally supported and needed care from."

"Research for specific conditions like cerebral palsy, which one of my kids suffers from, often necessitates genetic experimentation with stem cells. I think this policy is absurd as it excludes exceptional institutions like Sick Kids hospital which supports so many of the board's students."

Theme 4: Not contemporary; doesn't align with current societal norms. Respondents suggested that the changes to the policy are outdated (e.g., not reflective of modern research/viewpoints; women's rights; the policies in other Catholic school boards) (16.4%, n=110). Examples:

"I strongly encourage the trustees to rescope this policy so that it is more closely aligned with contemporary norms while still respecting faith based values."

"These changes are putting our women's rights movement back 30 years. Disgraceful, and out of place for 2018."

"It is very telling that no other Catholic school board in the province, or any of our local parishes, have stood up in support of what you are doing. Even the Catholic Church itself does not impose these types of restrictions on the organizations it works with or supports."

Theme 5: Loss of funds for the HCDSB. (9.8%, n=66). Some respondents stated they are going to **revoke their tax money from the Catholic board** if the proposed changes pass (n=34). Examples:

" I will most certainly be pulling my tax payers money and putting it towards the public board."

"... I will withdraw my tax support if this ridiculous mess isn't cleared up quickly with an apology to the Catholic Ratepayers."

"If the HDCSB continue to pursue what is a short sighted decision I can confirm that I will no longer support the Catholic school via my property tax."

Some respondents mentioned pulling their children from the HCDSB or not enrolling their children if the proposed changes pass (n=32). Examples:

"If the Board of Directors of the HCDSB continues to make uninformed decisions that I firmly believe are NOT representative of both the culture of Catholicism and the wishes of the parents paying taxes into the Board, I will happily pull my children and enter them into HDSB, where everyone is considered equal under their own higher power."

"...100% will pull my 3 children out of the catholic school board if they try to reinstate this old school thinking, as this is not how I am raising my children."

"If the Sanctity of Life motion is passed I will seriously consider removing my child from catholic school as I do not feel such tyrannical policies hold a place in the educational system and would be detrimental to children's social development."

Theme 6: Potential demise of the Catholic school system. Respondents noted that the proposed changes to the policy/procedure could act as a catalyst to the amalgamation of the Catholic and Public school systems (9.1%, n=61). Examples:

"I will not be surprised if there is a push to defund the Catholic school board, something that has been done in many other provinces or have it amalgated into the public school board."

"Your out of date and radical thinking will be the demise of Catholic education. This is NOT the way to keep Catholic education publicly funded or to entice young people to stay in or join the Catholic faith."

"If we go ahead with this policy we are sending a very negative message to the public and to the government, who is already looking for reasons to amalgamate our boards."

Theme 7: Logistical barriers/issues (8.6%, n=58).

Some respondents were concerned with the **time, money, or resources** that will be given to implementing the policy or, specifically, vetting (n= 40). Examples:

"The cost associated to implementing this policy and then operating some form of committee is still unknown, but likely extraordinary. Not to mention, the Administrative procedure set out in these amendments are next to impossible to carry out. How are Board staff supposed to research the "subsidiaries, affiliates & associates" of every charity?"

"I believe there is a clear lack of process and it is a waste of board resources and time to research and vet charities to the degree as suggested by the motion."

Some respondents argued that the policy will not allow donations to **emergent tragedies due to the lengthy and costly vetting process** (n=18). Examples:

"This policy does not allow us to respond to emergent situations even within our community. It further prevents our schools from fund raising for our own students and their families in the event of a tragic event."

"We also take issue with the process of fundraising which now requires an application and a delay of 60 days. When tragedy strikes, help is needed immediately and is often supplied through monetary donations. An application process and a two month wait is ridiculous in cases where students are donating in response to a sudden tragedy..ie the Alberta wildfires or the Humbolt bus crash. The Board is creating unnecessary barriers where none existed prior. "

Theme 8: Discontinuation of any donations/fundraising efforts with HCDSB. Respondents stated that they will stop donating money and allowing their children to participate in fundraising activities if the proposed changes pass (7.5%, n=50). Examples:

"I will not be partaking in any further fundraising because of this new ruling."

"I will not be giving to any charity through the school until policy v-04 is revoked."

"If this proposal is upheld by the board my daughter will no longer be participating in any fundraising done by the school."

Theme 9: Hypocrisy of the policy/procedure. Respondents noted that it would be hypocritical for the HCDSB to ban fundraising to organizations that members of the school community/Trustees may currently use or will need to use in the future (e.g. Sick Kids; the Canadian Cancer Society) (7.0%, n=49). Examples:

"It is so hypocritical to reap the rewards given to us from the Canadian Cancer Society (Terry Fox, Relay for Life, Heart and Stroke) but refuse to fundraise to help them succeed in their goal to help those suffering from Cancer."

"It is wrong to not support the likes of Sick Kids hospital and the Canadian Cancer Society as many of our students, staff, and patents reep the benefits of these organizations - anything less and our school board appears hypocritical."

"Would you deny yourself or a loved one a life saving treatment that was developed because of embryonic stem cell research? Of course not. Do you not see the hypocrisy? How many of our own students have been treated at Sick Kids Hospital? Our community, our students and our families greatly benefit from the charities you are discriminating against."

Theme 10: Negative Publicity for the HCDSB. Respondents mentioned the bad press and negative attention the HCDSB has been subjected to due to the proposed changes to the policy/procedure (5.4%, n=36). Examples:

"Our board is drawing a lot of negative attention because of the controversial changes made to the fundraising policy."

"The attack in the media and the public response has been completely negative."

"Pulling our support from these organizations sends a strong negative message to the public about what we as Catholics stand for."

Theme 11: Focus/priorities of the Trustees (4.5%, n=30).

Respondents suggested that attention should be placed on more important educational/student issues, rather than the Fundraising policy and procedure (n=20). Examples:

"Their focus on both of the above policies has caused them to lose sight of more important issues going on in our schools that affect our students in urgent ways on a day to day basis."

"The trustees and the board should be more concerned with the education our youth (something test scores would suggest they are failing at) than where charitable donations are going."

Respondents believe that the proposed changes to the policy/procedure have stemmed from Trustees' personal agendas (n=10). Examples:

"... the political ambitions that drive your decision making are not. Your political agenda is self serving and damaging to our kids and our Catholic way of life."

"This fundraising motion has nothing to do wilth education but everything to do with inflicting YOUR personal views onto the schools, the teachers, the students, the administration and the parents."

ADDITIONAL RESULTS

E) Comments about the Process of Making the Amendments

Several respondents (For, Against, or Neither) commented on being upset about the decision-making process in which the policy/procedure changes came into place. These comments were either made on their own or in addition to feedback about the amendments from the 906 responses included in the thematic analysis.

In total, 13.8% (n=125) of the total number of responses commented on the process—specifically, the lack of consultation with stakeholders. Examples:

"At first, we were horrified to learn that the Board had not followed correct process to pass this motion, ignoring legislation and the Board's own protocol. We were also embarrassed at how Board members completely disregarded the Minister's remarks and commentary about their action."

"I believe the development and implementation of this policy was ill-informed, lacked proper procedures"

"I am disappointed in the manner in which our Trustees forced this policy on our Catholic community... I am embarrassed to be a witness to this display of unilateral decision making that gives false impression that it is supported by the majority of our Catholic parents."

"The above mentioned Trustees passed this motion illegally, without seeking the required and legislated input from school councils, parents and students. It does not reflect the input from our families and students."

2. CATHOLIC SCHOOL COUNCIL FORM

After the online feedback request was sent out to all HCDSB stakeholders, one representative from each Catholic School Council was asked to submit a different online form on behalf of their Council. This form displayed each of the amendments to the policy and procedure in red and requested specific feedback about the changes, as well as any additional feedback the Council may have.

A) Who Responded?

In total, 43 Catholic School Councils submitted the form. One form was also submitted by the Catholic Parent Involvement Committee (CPIC).

B) Form Analysis and Results

Respondents were asked to comment on the four amendments to the policy and the three amendments to the procedure. Because the proposed changes to the policy and procedure were similar, if not identical, many Councils either did not respond to the procedure questions, submitted the same responses as for the policy questions, or directed the reader to their previous policy answers. Therefore, Question 1, 3, and 4 relate to both the policy and procedure; however, the 'n' values provided correspond to the number of responses provided for the policy feedback.

Analysis was conducted to uncover themes that emerged from each set of comments per question. One limitation of the analysis is that the forms contained only open-ended questions and therefore had to be coded and analyzed qualitatively.

The main theme(s) for each question are discussed below. These themes do not account for all opinions expressed, but provide a summary of the most frequent comments. A complete list of responses is provided in Appendix C.

Question 1: Please comment on the above changes in red regarding the addition of the definitions of Registered Charity and Non-Profit Organization to the Definitions section. (n=40)

18 Councils (45%) explicitly agreed with the changes. Many Councils suggested adding health/well-being and disaster relief to the categories of acceptable use of a charities' resources.

Question 2: Please comment on the above changes in red regarding the addition to the Principles section. (n = 39)

17 Councils (43.6%) explicitly agreed with the addition to the section, whereas 16 Councils (42.1%) explicitly disagreed.

Question 3: Please comment on the above changes in red regarding the first addition to the Requirements section. (n=41)

33 Councils (80.5%) do not agree with the addition to this section of the Policy. Some Councils argued that the addition is too restrictive, thereby preventing schools from donating to worthy, live-saving charities/organizations.

Question 4: Please comment on the above changes in red regarding the addition of the Transparency and Public Participation section to the Requirements section. (n=42)

32 Councils (76.2%) explicitly disagree with the additional section. Many Councils suggested changes to this section, while others asked some clarifying questions. To review the specific feedback, please see the comments in Appendix D.

Question 5: Do you have any additional comments about the proposed changes to the above policy and procedure? (n=30)

23 Councils (76.7%) explicitly stated that they are not in agreement with the proposed changes to the policy and procedure. 9 Councils (30%) mentioned that they disapprove of the lack of transparency and consultation in the implementation and feedback process thus far. 7 Councils (23.3%) believe that the schools should be in control of which charities they donate to.

3. TABLE ACTIVITY FROM THE MAY 2018 CATHOLIC COUNCIL OF CHAIRS MEETING

Catholic Council Chairs were invited to participate in a "Table Activity" at a recent Catholic Council of Chairs Meeting. In this exercise, participants wrote down their views and opinions on the proposed changes to the Policy and Procedure. Their submissions were then transcribed into a document, which can be found in Appendix D.

The following limitations should be considered:

- Because their feedback was hand-written and then transcribed, the interpretation of the comments may not accurately reflect the answers provided.
- The comments also express segments of complete thoughts/sentences, and therefore some comments cannot be accurately and/or fully analyzed.

A) Who Responded?

34 submissions were reviewed in the Table Activity. In total, 86 individual comments were transcribed.

B) Table Activity Results

The three most common themes within the Table Activity include:

- 1) Proper process/procedure for changing the Policy and Procedure were not followed (n=13)
- 2) Catholic values are not being upheld via the proposed changes (n=7)
- 3) Wanting the freedom to donate to organizations of their choice and that benefit others/society (n=6)

4. DELEGATIONS

In total, 29 delegations have been heard at the HCDSB Board Meeting between March 20th, 2018 and June 5th 2018 on this topic. Note that 7 of these delegations were not about whether the delegate(s) supports or does not support the Policy/Resolution but rather their delegation highlighted no opinion, the importance of being pro-life, moral decision making etc. For the remaining delegations, 9 delegations were 'for' the policy or policy changes, while 13 delegations were 'against' the policy or policy changes.

There is no evidence to support this assertion. The Board has operated without this policy for decades, without any significant issues. Further, no other Catholic school boards in Ontario have seen it necessary to implement such a policy. It is an insult to suggest that the broad Catholic community of the HCDSB is not capable of acting in accordance with Catholic values without explicit instructions & restrictions dictated by the Board. Further, the policy is based on a faulty premise: that any co-operation with any charity or non-profit organization that is directly or indirectly connected to abortion, contraception, sterilization, embryonic stem cell research or euthanasia constitutes "co-operation with evil" and is therefore against Catholic teachings. As set out in Dr. McQueen's delegation to the Board of Trustees on May 15, 2018, it is permissible to support the good works of a charity, even when that charity may be involved in other work that is not in keeping with Catholic values. The policy is not benign. It has caused a great deal of anguish to students, parents, staff & families across the HCDSB. Many members of the HCDSB community have faced, or are currently facing, hardship or tragedy in their personal lives due to illness. Fundraising for specific charities, such as hospitals or disease specific charities like the Canadian Cancer Society or the Heart & Stoke Foundation provides a mechanism for school communities to show their support for their friends, neighbours and classmates. Many HCDSB families receive support from hospitals and charities. If a student is being treated for a serious illness at the Hospital for Sick Children, the policy would send the message to that student,
				Objections to the Specifics of the Policy The draft provided for review has a large number of significant problems: 1. There is no definition of "subsidiaries, affiliates & associates", so it's very difficult to know whether an organization can be struck off the list because of the actions of another group. eg. in a natural disaster, if a charity is working alongside Doctors Without Borders or the Red Cross in providing humanitarian assistance, are they struck off because those organizations don't meet the criteria? One example: Trustee Danko said the Canadian Catholic Organization for Peace and Development needs to be taken off the approved list, because some of its local partners in development projects are involved in restricted activities. The CCOPD is the official international development agency of the Catholic Church in Canada. Therefore, on the basis of "subsidiaries, affiliates & associates", no fundraising can be permitted for the Church, parishes, the HCDSB, or even the HCDSB's own charity, the Halton Catholic Education Foundation. There would be no hospital in Ontario that could qualify under the policy — even Catholic hospitals. For example, St. Joseph's in Hamilton is a teaching hospital "affiliated" with McMaster University, and therefore it could not qualify under the policy due if anyone at McMaster is involved in any research or practice concerning embryonic stem cells, contraception, euthanasia, abortion or sterilization. Every pediatric hospital in Ontario would be disqualified due to its own practices or those of their affiliated universities. 2. The policy cannot respond to emergent situations. For example, recently students were encouraged to wear hockey jerseys to show support for the victims of the Humbolt bus accident, but they were not able to contribute money to the victims' fund because there was not time to research whether the victims' fund could be "approved". 6. The policy does not allow donations to unapproved charities even when those donations are directed to a specific project unconnected to abortion, contraception, etc. For example, if a hospital was raising money to buy a new MRI machine, no donations towards that purchase can be made if the hospital is not on the approved list. 7. The policy prohibits donations to any charities that provide "financing or material support for abortion, contraception" etc. What does that mean? If a charity helps provide emergency generators to supply electricity after a hurricane, and some of that electricity is supplied to a health clinic that provides family planning & contraception, is that "material support"? If St Vincent de Paul gives money to a homeless person, and that person uses some of that money to buy condoms, has the charity provided "financing" for contraception? If the charities can't track every dollar and every recipient of material support, how is Board staff supposed to track to determine whether the charity can be approved? 8. The policy invites submissions from the public regarding a charity's eligibility. This is not restricted to people with a connection to the HCOSB. A pro-life group in another country could send in information alleging that a particular charity is involved in activities related to abortion, contraception, etc. Therefore, we can expect an ongoing process of people arguing whether a partic

No action needed to be taken. The Board of Trustees should simply rescind Resolution 61/18 and leave the previous fundraising policy in place until the next time it comes up for regular review. However, if the Board of Trustees decides to pursue the principles of Resolution 61/18, the draft policy is so flawed that it cannot be fixed by a few simple amendments. It requires a full rewrite, and any rewritten policy should go through a renewed process of community consultation, policy committee review and Trustee approval. I am vehemently opposed to the sanctity of life motion and the resulting consequences for fundraising at HCDSB schools. While I fundamentally respect the notion of instilling Catholic values and morals in a Catholic school, it is critical that the trustees not lose sight of the fact that the schools are PUBLICLY FUNDED. Therefore as a publicly funded school system the values and policies must reflect those of our broader society. While it is reasonable that school fundraising activities not directly support causes that are diametrically opposed to Catholic values, the policy as it has been written is far too broad and sweeping and does not reflect the values of the broader community that ultimately funds the schools.

				Further, the policy itself is so rigid that many extremely worthy charities are completely shut out from receiving support. Take for example, virtually every cancer related charity in Canada. Every single one would have some association with other cancer charities. Or Hospitals. Or Universities. Or research centres. And by that network of associations, every single one would be excluded even if they have nothing to do with Embryonic Stem Cell research themselves. Additionally, the research and vetting process proposed by the board means that support cannot be granted when it is needed the most. Recently, the Humboldt tragedy united most Canadians in grief and an outpouring of support came from nearly every corner of the country. Except our school board. Because it was not an "approved charity", schools' hands were tied and could not donate even if they wanted to. The same thing would happen for any such occurrence such as hurricanes and other natural disasters which would be completely denied. This is completely unthinkable.
				Secondly there are numerous topics on the way that the policy was adopted which raise serious questions about the functioning of the board of trustees. The resources required of the board to implement, and assuming it carries forward, enforce this policy are absolutely astounding. In the five months that this policy has been in front of the board, I can't fathom the amount of money that has been UTTERLY WASTED. This has been on agenda of virtually every board meeting since February eating up time of trustees, the Director, senior staff and countless parents, students and other individuals. The legal drama surrounding the policy has surely cost thousands of dollars in fees. This was particularly wasteful as the board was advised directly that they were in conflict of the Education Act and still decided to push forward practically inviting legal consequences with no regard for their cost. Then, if the policy is adopted, it will require a huge amount of resources from board staff. It will require constant research to ensure compliance, not only of the charities, but any and all associated organizations. Realistically this task itself is virtually impossible. At the very least, we can count on it being at least one full-time job to constantly verify each and every organization and their affiliates, most likely more. A complete waste of money in my opinion and something that drastically limits the difference the community can achieve.
				Next, the implementation of the policy underscores the complete disregard several trustees have for the feedback process. As stated above, the trustees were informed of their violation of the Education Act in not collecting feedback from the community. They still chose to push forward. They were threatened with legal action and still pushed forward. They were advised against the action by teacher's associations, the Trustee's Association, the Minister of Education and even the Premier of Ontario. And still they pushed forward. It became blatantly obvious that the trustees in question (mind you, not all of the trustees as some obviously cared about those concerns) have no regard for opinions except their own. They showed that they were completely unwilling to accept any feedback on the policy, to take any suggestions to improve it to something that would be acceptable by more parties. Instead they dug in their heels and made it more restrictive. Concerns were ignored or dismissed without cause. When finally forced to consult with stakeholders, they did so begrudgingly. Comments have been made publicly that while required to collect feedback there is no requirement to adhere to it. I am at a loss for words with regards to this sentiment.
				This process has caused serious concerns to be raised about the ethics of these trustees and whether they are actually fulfilling their role as stipulated under the Education Act and the board's own policy about the role of Trustees. On the same topic, the blatant vote trading which occurred in order to pass the motion is appalling to say the least. That two trustees would exchange votes, as flagrantly as it occurred, is inconceivable. It is very apparent that, in these cases, neither were voting in a manner they believed to be best for the board and instead working to further personal agendas.
				Finally, there is the matter of this feedback process itself. We must acknowledge that this is an extremely contentious issue. It has made national media several times. The policy, as written, is fundamentally flawed and is not actually in line with Catholic teachings. Further, the way the policy
			was forced on to the board shows a complete disregard for many of the stakeholders and utter contempt on the part of several trustees. On the matter of the policy itself, there was no need to amend the existing policy in the first place. In 25 years of being associated with this school board, first as a student and now as a ratepayer and parent, I cannot recall a single instance where a donation was made that directly contradicted church teachings. Not once in those years has a donation been made which was made with the expressed purpose of funding abortions, or embryonic stem cell research, or contraception, or euthanasia. In the event that donations have been made to organizations whose associations may contribute to those actions, we always have and always will have the ability to insist that funds are put to use where they don't contradict Catholic teachings. This common-sense approach is more than enough to ensure that we do not violate Catholic

consciences and requires no input from the board. The board of trustees has been made aware of this fact several times through recent delegations. It also appears that there was no formal consultation with the Church on the policy prior to its passing. Surely this should be the first step when implementing a policy which purports to exist solely for the purpose of aligning with Catholic teachings? Are these trustees more versed in these teachings than the Church itself? I sincerely hope that this is not accurate!

Further, the policy itself is so rigid that many extremely worthy charities are completely shut out from receiving support. Take for example, virtually every cancer related charity in Canada. Every single one would have some association with other cancer charities. Or Hospitals. Or Universities. Or research centres. And by that network of associations, every single one would be excluded even if they have nothing to do with Embryonic Stem Cell research themselves. Additionally, the research and vetting process proposed by the board means that support cannot be granted when it is needed the most. Recently, the Humboldt tragedy united most Canadians in grief and an outpouring of support came from nearly every corner of the country. Except our school board. Because it was not an "approved charity", schools' hands were tied and could not donate even if they wanted to. The same thing would happen for any such occurrence such as hurricanes and other natural disasters which would be completely denied. This is completely unthinkable.

Secondly there are numerous topics on the way that the policy was adopted which raise serious questions about the functioning of the board of trustees. The resources required of the board to implement, and assuming it carries forward, enforce this policy are absolutely astounding. In the five months that this policy has been in front of the board, I can't fathom the amount of money that has been UTTERLY WASTED. This has been on agenda of virtually every board meeting since February eating up time of trustees, the Director, senior staff and countless parents, students and other individuals. The legal drama surrounding the policy has surely cost thousands of dollars in fees. This was particularly wasteful as the board was advised directly that they were in conflict of the Education Act and still decided to push forward practically inviting legal consequences with no regard for their cost. Then, if the policy is adopted, it will require a huge amount of resources from board staff. It will require constant research to ensure compliance, not only of the charities, but any and all associated organizations. Realistically this task itself is virtually impossible. At the very least, we can count on it being at least one full-time job to constantly verify each and every organization and their affiliates, most likely more. A complete waste of money in my opinion and something that drastically limits the difference the community can achieve.

Next, the implementation of the policy underscores the complete disregard several trustees have for the feedback process. As stated above, the trustees were informed of their violation of the Education Act in not collecting feedback from the community. They still chose to push forward. They were threatened with legal action and still pushed forward. They were advised against the action by teacher's associations, the Trustee's Association, the Minister of Education and even the Premier of Ontario. And still they pushed forward. It became blatantly obvious that the trustees in question (mind you, not all of the trustees as some obviously cared about those concerns) have no regard for opinions except their own. They showed that they were completely unwilling to accept any feedback on the policy, to take any suggestions to improve it to something that would be acceptable by more parties. Instead they dug in their heels and made it more restrictive. Concerns were ignored or dismissed without cause. When finally forced to consult with stakeholders, they did so begrudgingly. Comments have been made publicly that while required to collect feedback there is no requirement to adhere to it. I am at a loss for words with regards to this sentiment.

This process has caused serious concerns to be raised about the ethics of these trustees and whether they are actually fulfilling their role as stipulated under the Education Act and the board's own policy about the role of Trustees. On the same topic, the blatant vote trading which occurred in order to pass the motion is appalling to say the least. That two trustees would exchange votes, as flagrantly as it occurred, is inconceivable. It is very apparent that, in these cases, neither were voting in a manner they believed to be best for the board and instead working to further personal agendas.

Finally, there is the matter of this feedback process itself. We must acknowledge that this is an extremely contentious issue. It has made national media several times. We have seen several times that outside factors are attempting to influence our board one way or another. Why then was it deemed appropriate to leave this policy feedback form completely open and unprotected? The board clearly has the ability to limit feedback to stakeholders as I have received several surveys since which include unique access codes. Instead, this feedback form has been shared publicly by third parties which attempt to sway support even though they are not impacted by the decision.

We request that this letter be distributed to all the HCDSB Trustees.

On behalf of the St. Anne Catholic School Council, we would like to take this opportunity express our concern and discontent with the board's decision to pass Resolution 61/18, the "Sanctity of Life Motion", and in particular, without any consultation from parents, schools, or school councils.

As Trustees, you are accountable to our school community and in your role, you are required to be available and accessible to the public to address concerns from the community with respect to Board policies. As outlined on the HCDSB website, in your *Guidelines for Trustee Communications*, you are responsible for recognizing "that communication is an integral part of the role of its elected Trustees. Effective communication enhances a Trustee's ability to represent constituents, and helps to encourage public participation, build understanding and consensus in the community, and build support for publicly funded Catholic education." Your recent actions in passing the Sanctity of Life motion and associated polices without consultation, goes against your own guidelines.

The Education Act indicates that fundraising decisions are to be made by school administrators. The Minister of Education has written to the Board of Trustees urging you to consult with schools, parents and school councils prior to enacting this policy. At the March 20th Board of Trustees, it was indicated that you would consult, however, the policy remains in place.

At the April 12th, 2018, St. Anne Catholic School Council meeting this policy issue was discussed. As representatives of the parent community of St. Anne Catholic School, it is important for us to ensure all questions, comments and concerns which had been brought forward to us by our school community be heard and addressed in a timely manner.

The majority of the comments heard to date focus on the following 2 items:

- 1. The lack of transparency that surrounded the process and the absence of stakeholder input prior to passing this resolution.
- 2. The overwhelming perception that this new resolution discriminates against charities that are important and valuable to our school community.

We believe that the Board of Trustees decision is short-sighted and ill-advised. Parent survey response re: fundraising policy

I am a parent of 2 children at St. Patrick school in Burlington and I also sit on the St. Patrick school council.

My husband and I are strongly opposed to the revisions being made to the fundraising policy and administrative procedures. The sanctity of life wording does not belong in the policy. We do not specifically call out any other tenets of the catholic faith in the policy and this one tenet of no greater importance than any others, so it should not be singled out. This wording makes the policy unduly restrictive and eliminates a number of charities that provide valuable services and support to our community, including our students and their families. When students support these charities with local fundraising initiatives (eg Canadian Cancer Society, Sick Kids Hospital, United Way), they are not supporting the activities these organizations may be involved in that do not align with our faith. Rather they

activities these organizations may be involved in that do not align with our faith. Rather they are choosing to support the activities of these organizations that they see as having an impact on our community daily, when family members, friends and fellow students are in need of their services. You are effectively eliminating student engagement in the process and are telling them that you know better than they do who is worthy of support, regardless of their own personal experiences and feelings. Instead we should be teaching students how to think critically, evaluate and make their own informed decisions.

The process for validating that charities meet the requirements of this policy is cumbersome and time consuming. Resources are scarce – as noted by another recent survey sent out by the board, we are always looking for ways to cut costs while maintaining high-standards for quality education. I believe that Board staff should focus their time and efforts on ensuring our students have access to the best possible learning environment and that their educational needs are being looked after, not administering cumbersome policies that do not enhance or add value to the learning experience for students. The process also does not acknowledge that some charitable acts are time sensitive and need to be addressed immediately – like the Humboldt Broncos tragedy. It is disappointing that schools could not raise funds in support of them because the policy was being enforced at the time of the tragedy....what kind of message does that send to our children? Furthermore, this policy was not up for review....suggesting these changes at this time has created a lot of unnecessary extra work for staff, which has again taken time away from their primary role of running the day to day operations of our schools.

I think the trustees in support of these revisions have lost sight of what their role is as a trustee. They have not been elected to be the moral compass for our children or to push forward their own personal agenda and views. Their job is to ensure our schools are safe, well funded and well run, and that students are given the opportunity reach their full potential through quality education. They are elected to represent the views of the community at large and we are extremely disappointed with the way they have gone about making these changes. You are setting a very poor example for our children of what a good Catholic should be. Your behaviour has been disrespectful to the other board trustees (walking out of a meeting when you don't get your way), the students (when you question their understanding of what it means to be a catholic when they voice their opinion) and the community at large whom you are supposed to represent (when you ignore the proper process for implementing changes by not consulting with stakeholders and instead collude with each other to forge ahead with your own personal views and agendas).

I suggest you take a step back and ask yourself if this issue is really the cross on which you want Catholic education to die. Your actions have generated so much negative press for the board and places our faith in a very poor light. It would be very easy for someone to take hold of this and use it to make a very compelling case for the elimination of the Catholic education system. It is very telling that no other Catholic school board in the province, or any of our local parishes, have stood up in support of what you are doing. Even the Catholic Church itself does not impose these types of restrictions on the organizations it works with or supports. For example, the church remains a member of the United Nations even though it does not approve of or support all of the actions the United Nations takes, because it recognizes that overall the organization does good work to make advancements for humanity. If the church can take that progressive approach, why can't you? I strongly urge the Board of Trustees to dismiss the revised wording put in the fundraising policy and administrative procedures and renew their focus on the students and the quality of education they are receiving.

- 2 This working does not belong in the policy. We do not call out any other tenets of the catholic faith and this one is of no greater importance than all the others. This line of wording makes the fundraising policy too restrictive

This part of our catholic faith is understood and considered in all our decision regardless of policy

3 - This wording makes the policy unduly restrictive and eliminates a number of charities that provide valuable services and support to our community, including our students. When students support these charities (eg. Canadian Cancer Society, United Way, Sick Kids), they are not supporting the activities these organizations may be involved in that do not align with our faith. Rather they are choosing to support the organizations that they see having an impact on our community daily, when family members, friends and fellow students use their services.

In light of the home, school, parish connection, there is onus on parents to educate their children as they see fit with regards to the tenants of the Catholic faith, trustees should not have the power to dictate what we as parents teach our children in the home.

4 - How do you justify the administrative costs for something of this magnitude? And why does this fall under the Director of Education? The resources are better spent directed towards the children in our care.

The process for validating that charities meet the requirements of this policy is cumbersome and time consuming. Resources are scarce - as noted by another recent survey sent out by the board, we are always looking for ways to cut costs while maintaining high-standards for quality education. I believe that the Board staff should focus their time and efforts on ensuring our students have access to the best possible learning environment and that their educational needs are being looked after, not administering cumbersome policies that do not enhance the learning experience for students.

As a Catholic Education system we are loosing sight of teaching the children about humanity, compassion and inclusion to ALL. We are disappointed with the action of our Trustees and this Board, and these action shines a poor light on Catholic Education. You have lost sight of the best interest of our children.

This policy hinders student and parent engagement, which is part of the renewed vision for education through the Ministry of Education.

We can not have a few Trustees make decisions for all of us with out stakeholder consultation.

As parents this does not reflect who we are as catholics and we are gravely concerned the actions of Halton Catholic District School Board Trustees will spark an end to Catholic education in Ontario.

Strike from the policy, prevents us from being responsive to community needs.

This policy in its totality, restricts critical thinking and problem solving skills for our children, their ability to conceptualize their understanding of the world around them.

Our Catholic Graduate Expectations outlines distinctive expectations that integrated into the full Catholic School, this policy does not support any of those expectations.

As a Board we allow the families in our schools to make decisions regarding their participation in the sacraments (first communion and confirmation), which are fundamental to our faith. Those who choose to not participate are still welcome in our schools and fully participate in the activities offered by the board. I would ask how the restrictive policy being proposed is any different. If we cannot force parents and students to participate in sacraments, how are we now going to implement policy that is unnecessarily restrictive and inflexible. Each of the charities that have been removed from the list do wonderful work to help those who need it most, and that act of charity and love is the ultimate representation of our faith.

According to statistics from The Cancer Society, about 1 in 2 Canadians will develop cancer in their lifetimes and 1 in 4 will die of the disease (report, 2017). What happens when a student or a teacher gets cancer and we want to help? What about a student who gets diagnosed with any disease and has to go to Sick Kids? (Do you even have any idea how many students have been treated at Sick Kids?) For disasters: what about supporting Red Cross if there is another disaster like the Alberta Wildfires? Does the new definition under non-profit mean we cannot give to those without a charity designation? How would one-off tragedies be handled in future âe" such as the recent Humboldt accident? Students were told they couldnâe™t donate to Humboldt but were given no reason âe" was it because it wasnâe™t a registered charity? Or was it because the recipients, those injured, are being treated in hospitals âe" currently not on âeœthe listâe?
Q2	One of the important words in that sentence is $\hat{a} \in \omega UNTIL\hat{a} \in \hat{a} \in \omega'$ which encompasses the many challenges that people deal with between conception and death $\hat{a} \in \omega'$ illness, disease, disasters, etc. that they have no control over. We can $\hat{a} \in \omega'$ ignore that fact in what we support. The list of charities should reflect a breadth of support people need $\hat{a} \in \omega'$ including mental and physical health. and â∈œsubsidiariesâ∈ . Associates and affiliates, in particular, are very broad terms. It creates a lot of ambiguity about how far-reaching the interpretation could be. Examples: Currently on the HCDSB website there is promotion of a Team Unbreakable fundraising event. If you look at Team Unbreakableâ∈™s website and go down a layer, they are affiliated with 3 hospitals. Does that take them off the â∈œlistâ∈ as ASSOCIATES or AFFILIATES? Also on the Board site is reference to Halton Families for Families â∈" a mental health related organization that lists United Way of Halton/Hamilton as a supporter. United Way didnâ∈™t pass the new policy â∈œtestâ∈ . So, would that make Families for Families an â∈œASSOCIATEâ∈ OR âe[~]AFFILIATEâe[™] of United Way and, therefore, something that couldnâe[™]t make our list in future? As mentioned in Section 1, what about Wellspring, just down the road from Holy Trinity. that provides family counselling, financial planning, cooking classes, yoga, etc. for people living with cancer and their families? (As noted in previous section, 1 in 2 Canadians will get cancer). What about the volunteers who drive people to cancer appointments? What about Ronald McDonald House since many of the patients are getting treated at Sick Kids? Are these examples all "affiliates" or "associates"? What about a hospitalâ∈™s mental health unit â∈" is that a â∈œSUBSIDIARYâ∈ under the new policy? (Then refer to section one feedback). If research is the primary issue with Trustees who want this policy, then, for hospitals, could we, as a Board, raise money for a piece of specific piece of hospital equipment â∈" e.g. an MRI machine at Oakville or Joseph Brant hospitals? No other Board has such a complex process $\hat{a} \in \text{``}$ my Halton? $\hat{a} \in \text{``}$ Most charities have volunteers working in their offices and try to minimize the amount of administration, so they can focus on their charitable activities. Many would not even bother filling in a complex form at all. $\hat{a} \in \text{``}$ Has anyone calculated the TIME AND RESOURCES to administer this as an ongoing process? It seems that to administer this, if it goes ahead, the Board would need to hire someone who has experience in the charity/non-profit sector. It could be almost a full time job (approx. \$60,000 a year) to do the research, maintain the list, post the list, keep it up to date on the website, etc. Some specific feedback on wording: POINT #1: Why was June 1st put as the date for posting the list of charities, when that is the deadline for stakeholder feedback? It is not fair that

	stakeholders are asked to comment on a list without having an idea of what types of charities will/wonâe™t be on the list. The initial âeœapprovedâe list was pulled down in March after an onslaught of media coverage and requests made to those on the list. POINT #8 is of particular concern. The words âeœindirectâe and âeœmay never enterâe¦ a financial relationshipâe are excessively broad and restrictive. Does that mean The Red Cross could not offer Babysitting or First Aid classes at a school anywhere in the Board? Does that mean a parent who works for a hospital can no longer donate to anything at the school his/her children attend? Does that mean companies that offer Employee Volunteer Grants for their employees who donate time to schools cannot donate to the Board if the company is involved with hospitals or similar âeœunapprovedâe organizations? POINT #9: 5 years seems to be a very arbitrary number. So, a charity must say they haven't done "the bad thing" for the past 5 years and won't for the next 5 years? Q8	This Council disagrees with the current state of Policy V-04 School Fundraising Activities and Procedure VI-59 School Fundraising Activities. This School Council feels that HCDSB should not put restrictions on charities that could potentially be supported and those which deliver good to the community. This Council feels that every effort should be made to include support of charities that provide great benefit to the community with their provision of life-saving measures, and those that provide opportunities whereby the quality of life for those they serve is improved; especially, the poor, the marginalized, the disenfranchised, and persons suffering from illness, diseases and whose safety and mental health and wellbeing can be improved via support from these organizations. At present, the opinion of this Council is that the Policy V-04 remains in an incomplete state. It raises many as yet unanswered questions due to it's ambiguity and vague definition of "Registered Charities," and "Other organizations," as well as it's omission of health and well being and disaster relief from it's purview. In it's present form Policy V-04 is restrictive to a great number of charities viewed by this Council (and other Council's with whom we've consulted) as contributing many valued benefits and life-saving opportunities, as well as opportunities that work to improve the quality of life for many of our own children, those within our immediate families, those in our school family/community, those within the umbrella of our family of schools in HCDSB and well beyond. As faithful Catholics, this School Council believes support of charities that deliver an overwhelming amount of good to the community to support various members of the community should continue to be supported by the HCDSB. This School Council feels that a charity that one school community supports and should be decided based on variables unique to these individual communities. The decision

on what charity to support should be a decision made by the school's Administration, and informed by the advice of the specific school community/sentiment/climate represented best (in most cases) by it's presiding School Council which in most cases has the best pulse on this. It should be further considered that as it relates to the statement regarding stem cell research, the HCDSB is urged by this Council to be clear in stating that the exclusion if maintained as such, pertains to "embryonic stem cell research only", but does not exclude support of non embryonic (adult) stem cells, cord blood stem cells and amniotic stem cells, and induced pluripotent adult stem cell research which the Catholic church deems ethically appropriate and is known to champion in it's efforts to argue against the utilization of embryonic cell research. This area deserves more clarity as it may not be a widely know fact within the Catholic community, and may unfairly exclude charities based on this lack of elaboration. This School Council will also remark that HCDSB should consider the effect and implications which the restrictive nature of Policy V-04 will have on student moral. This Council feels that students will be find it very hard to understand why it is that they cannot participate in the Terry Fox Run, Why "Pink Day" can no longer happen at their school to raise awareness for anti-bullying, why they are not able to participate in "WE" Day, anymore and why collections for tragedies like the recent one experienced by Humboldt can no longer be supported. This Council also seeks to express that the Golden Rule we seek to profess by Jesus' example and in teachings to our children, and by modelling to others within and beyond our Catholic community, as one that is essential to uphold. The current Policy V-04, with it's very restrictive "Requirements" rather than modelling our aims to broaden our relationships and outreach as Good Samaritans following in the footsteps of our Saviour Jesus Christ by widening our scope of charity to save lives and improve the quality of life for many, instead will, in it's current form work to contradict and defeat this aim. Rather than modelling inclusivity this very restrictive and undefined document models exclusion and exclusivity. It saddens many on this Council that the document is so prohibitive to the greater goals for good charitable outreach, and we hope that this perspective will be taken into consideration in hopes that the document will be refined to uphold broader goals of Catholic faith teachings we ought not to neglect as followers of Christ. As a School Council we seek to remind the formulators of this document that we as Catholics should ask at every opportunity: "What would Jesus do?" as we profess to teach and model to our children and our community our best mirroring of the ways of Jesus. "Schools will be able to decide on charities themselves without restrictions therefore, section three does not require (and shouldnâ∈™t be necessary at all): - a list of approved charities, as the board will not govern charitable giving with a broad and blanket statement. - a list of compliant charities and the documents to support it - all charities will be allowed - board approval will not be necessary as it is time consuming and board employees should be using their time for more pressing and important educational issues. If the board, against my request and goes forward with this policy, charitable organizations should be approved in a more timely manner - 60 days is too long when students or teachers could be dying, relief funds are needed immediately, etc. a clause that includes: if your parish priest deems your charitable giving an act of Christ and completes a form (to be created as an appendix to this policy), the fundraising efforts should be permitted regardless if it is on the list or not. a clause that states that the schools and/or board can support a charity that is not on the list, if they have written documentation that will allow them to specify the area in which their donations are to be used. i.e. donations to a local hospital for the purpose of: new books for the pediatric ward or to the cancer society for research that is specific to Gene mapping. It does not cover Disaster Relief or other fundraising initiatives in a community outside of Canada. It also removes the Principalâe™s discretion in deciding which charitable initiatives should be considered. This is particularly true of local charities. The Council has issue with these limitations and would suggest to remove the above amendment from the Policy.
Q2	We support this statement.
Q3	council agrees that we should not participate in fund raising activities that directly support abortion, as an example. However, this change prevents schools from fund raising for organizations that are related in some way due to no act of their own - ie. any department or services within a local hospital. There are several charities that do not directly participate in stem cell research, but support cancer patients. An example of this is Wellspring Cancer Support Centre. Like most cancer support centers, they may be affiliated in some way to Canadian Cancer Association. This amendment would remove our ability to support essential community services that most of our studentsâe TM families will require at some point in their lives and may likely not afford if public fund raising was not in place. We cannot support this form of exclusivity. It is not what our Catholic values stand for. We feel this amendment should be removed completely, as it is too restrictive and does not allow for equally important Catholic values to be represented.
Q4	The Council does not feel that any changes were necessary to the Boardâe™s current fund raising policy. We also challenge the ability of the Board to implement these procedures in a realistic and feasible manner. The previous fundraising policy represented the schoolâe™s ability to use sound judgment with respect to fundraising activities within the school and community. #1-4. Who is the staff performing this research? Has there been a committee established? What is the associated cost? Will there be an approval process in place to approve the associates" of every charity? 

It is unreasonable to not offer support to organizations which support the use of, and provide access to, contraception and sexual health services to those who are impoverished and in need of such services. If these services are not provided and supported through our fundraising we are contributing to a situation which results in dire consequences to those who are most vulnerable, not limited to teenage pregnancies and pregnancies to women who are not in a safe position to carry a pregnancy or to care for a child; furthermore we are depriving those who are in most need of sexual health service. If you do not provide the service - the problem does not go away but the outcome is much more dire. It is short sighted to believe that abstinence is a reasonable expectation in this society
Q8	The refusal to support charitable organizations that support or help finance initiatives not supported by the Catholic religion, notwithstanding those very same charities likely support many initiatives highly consistent with Catholic values is narrow minded and extremely short sighted. BUDGET REPORT FOR SEPTEMBER 1, 2017 TO MAY 31, 2018

Purpose:

To provide the Board with the 2017-18 Budget Report for the nine months ending May 31, 2018.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The following information regarding the Board's 2017-18 Budget was provided to Trustees:

- 1. Information Report 10.4 "Budget Report for September 1, 2017 to February 28, 2018" from the March 20, 2018 Regular Board Meeting.
- 2. Action Report 8.7 "2017-18 Revised Budget Estimates (Including September 1, 2017 to November 30, 2017 Actuals)" from the December 19, 2017 Regular Board Meeting.
- 3. Action Report 8.5 "2017-18 Budget Estimates (Final)" from the June 20, 2017 Regular Board Meeting.

GENERAL:

This report compares the revenues and expenses (including commitments) with the 2017-18 Revised Budget to show the percentages received and spent to date. The report also provides the same information for the previous fiscal year for comparative purposes.

The attached budget report includes both the nine-month period from September 1, 2017 to May 31, 2018 and the comparatives for the same period in the 2016-17 fiscal year.

At May 31, 2018, the fiscal year is 75% complete (9 months/12 months) and the school year is 90% complete (9 months/10 months). Therefore, it is expected that the percentages received or spent to be between 75% and 90%. The report indicates that both revenues and expenses for the year are expected to remain within the revised budget.

REVENUE HIGHLIGHTS (APPENDICES A-1 AND B):

Total revenues received as of May 31, 2018 are \$311.9 million. This includes \$222.6 million for legislative grants, \$52.5 million for municipal funding, and \$36.8 million in other provincial grants, other revenue, and transfers to reserves. Overall, the percentage received of 76.8% is in line with 77.4% for the same period in the prior year and the expected percentage range of 75% to 90%.

The main differences between revenues received up to May 31, 2018 and revenues received for the same period in 2017 relate to enrolment growth, additional Other Provincial Grants announced, CUPE and OECTA settlements, and Other Revenue. In addition, \$1.5 million was brought into revenue from deferred Special Equipment Allocation revenue, to match the corresponding increase in expenses (as outlined in Appendix A-2).

The Ministry has announced numerous programs to enhance student achievement and professional development for staff, and these revenues are included in the "Other Provincial Grants". Appendix B outlines the "Other Provincial Grants" awarded thus far during the fiscal year, with the total amount corresponding to Appendix A-1.

Within "Other Revenue", the significant variances were from the Government of Canada, Tuition Fees, and Recoveries. The variance in the Government of Canada revenue was due to growth of the Language Instructions for Newcomers to Canada (LINC) program and Immigrant Settlement and Adaptation Program (ISAP) over the prior year. Tuition fee revenues increased over last year's by \$790,000, due to enrolment growth of the International Students program. Recoveries include the revenues received for the CUPE and OECTA settlements.

EXPENSE HIGHLIGHTS (APPENDIX A-2):

For the period ending May 31, 2018 total expenses are \$310.9 million. Overall, the percentage spent of 76.6% is in line with 76.4% for the same period in the prior year and within the expected percentage range of 75% to 90%.

Classroom expenses amounted to \$209.9 million or 75.8% of the 2017-18 Revised Budget compared to \$196.1 million or 75.3% for the period of September 1, 2016 to May 31, 2017. Increases in salary and benefits for teachers, early childhood educators, professional and paraprofessional staff and educational assistants, through staffing enhancements to address enrolment growth, represents the majority of this change.

School support services costs, including school administration, teacher consultants and continuing education, totaled \$24.7 million or 73.1% of the Revised Budget for the period ending May 31, 2018. This is consistent with \$24.1 million or 74.0% of the Revised Budget expensed for the same period in the previous year. As with classroom expenses, the year-over-year difference is due to staffing enhancements to address enrolment growth.

Other Non-Classroom expenses and commitments of \$14.9 million, or 76.8% of the Revised Budget, have been recorded for the period of September 1, 2017 to May 31, 2018. This represents an increase of \$1.1 million over the amount expensed during September 1, 2016 to May 31, 2017. The change resulted from grid movements, staffing enhancements, staff reallocations, legal costs, and higher transportation costs.

Pupil Accommodation expenses and commitments of \$33.9 million, or 81.9% of the Revised Budget, is an increase over the \$33.5 million or 83.7% from the previous year. The difference mainly relates to increases in costs for school maintenance services, contractual services and portable leases. The portable leases are higher than the previous year due to increased enrolment pressures, however there are off-setting revenues for the temporary accommodations.

ENROLMENT (APPENDIX C):

The funding allocation is based on estimated enrolment. Elementary and Secondary enrolment is based on Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) enrolment for October 31 and March 31. These two fixed-in-time FTE enrolment values are averaged to produce the annualized Average Daily Enrolment (ADE).

The 2017-18 enrolment reflects actual enrolment on October 31, 2017 and estimated enrolment on March 31, 2018, which will be reflected in the Financial Statements reporting cycle. The projected ADE of elementary students is 22,701.50 and of secondary students is 11,415.37, for a total enrolment of 34,116.87. This represents an increase from the 2017-18 Original Estimates of 286.90 ADE (or 0.8%) and an increase of 988.39 ADE (or 3.0%) over 2016-17 Actual ADE.

SUMMARY:

The percentages received/spent for the period from September 1, 2017 to May 31, 2018 are consistent with the prior year and fall within the expected range. Therefore, revenues and expenses to date appear reasonable and aligned with the revised budget.

Staff continues to monitor and control expenses against the 2017-18 Revised Budget in order to achieve a balanced position for the 2017-18 Year-End.

CAPITAL PROJECTS REPORT - As AT MAY 31, 2018

The attached Consolidated Capital Projects Report provides a summary totaling \$490.9 million of all Board approved projects since the capital funding model was changed significantly by the Ministry of Education in 1998. There have been various iterations of capital funding programs since that time, to adapt to changing funding needs in school construction and maintenance. A total of \$438.2 million has been recorded for all projects, including open purchase orders of \$9.1 million which mainly relate to the construction of St. Scholastica Catholic Elementary School (CES), the St. Nicholas CES school consolidation construction, the St. Peter CES child care addition, and the St. Mark CES classroom and child care additions.

The Board receives Education Development Charges (EDC) revenue from the four Halton municipalities, which cover the purchase and preparation costs of school sites. Since 1998, the Board purchased school sites for a total of \$132.0 million, as broken down on page 4 of this report, which includes \$7.7 million on eligible EDC expenditures that have not been associated to particular schools (these are listed on page 5). Currently, the Board has an EDC shortfall of \$30.1 million, as EDC levies are typically collected over a 15-year period.

The expenditures outlined in the individual capital project summaries on pages 6 to 13 reflect construction, site and first-time equipping costs to date. It should be noted that all of these projects have been or are expected to be completed within budget.

The Debenture Financing Summary (Appendix A-1 to A-4) provides a summary of all projects that have been financed by debentures through the Ontario School Boards Financing Corporation (OSBFC) or the Ontario Financing Authority (OFA). The last OFA debenture issued was in March 2015 for the financing of primary class size (PCS) additions for St. Brigid CES and St. Catherine of Alexandria CES. Going forward, the funding model has been replaced by capital grants approved on a project by project basis, and funded twice a year based on the March 31 Provincial Consolidation Reporting (typically paid to the Board in July) and the August 31 Financial Statements Reporting (typically paid to the Board in February).

CULTURE OF LIFE UPDATE

Purpose:

To provide Trustees information on the Culture of Life Committee and their various initiatives taking place in the Halton Catholic District School Board.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The Halton Catholic District School Board's Culture of Life Committee began around 2004 when students from all our secondary schools began attending the National March for Life on Parliament Hill in Ottawa. Numbers grew so much that the board agreed to subsidize the cost of transportation for this crucial demonstration of faith to influence Canadian law. It was deemed necessary to gather a board committee to synchronize our efforts in spreading awareness of the value of each human life. Hence, the Culture of Life Committee was formed.

COMMENTS:

The Halton Catholic District School Board's Culture of Life Committee is committed to building a deep respect for a culture of life that adheres to Catholic teachings. Through prayer, advocacy, support, and information, the Culture of Life Committee fosters the actions of secondary school student clubs that focus on chastity and start and end of life issues. The efforts of the committee promote the dignity and worth of every human being from conception to natural death.

There are three main pillars that help the committee guide the annual goals and action plans:

Respect for the Pre-Born

Chastity

Respect for the Dying

Within these three pillars are four overall system goals:

- 1. *End of Life*: To inform and educate our school communities about end of life issues in order that they can advocate for and support the right to die a natural death with dignity and compassionate care.
- 2. All Life: Provide opportunities for connecting and building relationships with community partners in order to respond to our call to reach out and love one another.
- 3. Chastity: Promote a climate of chastity built on the teachings of our faith.
- 4. *Pre-Born*: To inform and educate our communities about issues affecting the dignity and worth of the life of the pre-born.

Under each goal, the group focuses on three areas of action: to advocate, to inform, and to support.

The system-wide *Culture of Life Committee* that meets regularly. Members of this system committee include our System Chaplain, the Superintendent of Education responsible for Faith Formation, a secondary vice principal and a representative from Halton Alive. In addition, each secondary school has a representative.

The Board has encouraged and financially supported the Culture of Life initiative over the last number of years and continues to do so. The Board provides an annual budget of \$6,000.00 to support the Culture of Life events at the system level. This funding provides support for activities such as: the annual Diocesan Leadership Day, and the annual March for Life trip to Ottawa.

Some of the system planning includes:

- The Annual National March for Life: This two-day event is held in Ottawa each year in May. Students participate in a Mass, a rally on Parliament Hill, a march through downtown Ottawa, and a banquet dinner along with a youth conference.
- The Diocesan Culture of Life Leadership Conference: This yearly event is hosted by the Diocese of Hamilton and is held at the Cathedral in February. Nine students and a staff member of each secondary school are invited to participate. Attendees join with students from other school boards to take part in this one-day conference which includes a guest speaker and concludes with Mass in the Basilica. The theme changes yearly with the theme for 2018 being "Living, Dying and the Power of Presence".
- The HCDSB Pro-Life Education Day: The objective of this day is to provide students with an opportunity to learn more about the value of human life. The day provides students with the opportunity to meet and collaborate with other students and supervisors while engaging in interactive activities and listening to guest speakers. This year's guest speakers were Mark and Barb Jurgens who spoke on "The Unplanned Life".
- Chastity Speaker: Every other year, a speaker addressing all grade 9 and 10 students is brought in to speak about chastity. This past winter, Brett Ullman was the speaker.

At the school level, clubs operate locally, and in some instances are supervised by members of the school chaplaincy teams, and in some instances are supervised by other members of staff, who have an interest. Each school does fundraising to support their club's activities.

There are active groups/clubs within each of our 9 secondary schools. The chart below lists the various activities, focus areas, and names of the clubs at each of the schools (as of January 2018):

MEMORANDUM OF ORAL DECISION DELIVERED BY S. JACOBS ON JUNE 5, 2018 AND ORDER OF THE TRIBUNAL WITH REASONS TO FOLLOW

- [1] Milton appealed to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal (the "Tribunal"), formerly the Ontario Municipal Board, regarding the distribution of Trustees by the School Board. The School Board is allocated nine (9) Trustees in total, as prescribed by regulation under the *Education Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c. E-2, as amended. The School Board approved the following distribution of Trustees during its meeting on March 6, 2018:
 - One (1) Trustee for the Town of Halton Hills;
 - One (1) Trustee for the Town of Milton;
 - Three (3) Trustees for the City of Burlington; and
 - Four (4) Trustees for the Town of Oakville

The School Board's resolutions allocating the Trustees provide that the Trustees will be elected at large within each of the constituent municipalities. Milton does not dispute the at large election of Trustees; rather, Milton's appeal is specific to the Trustee distributions within the Towns of Milton and Oakville. Milton submits that two (2) Trustees should be allocated to Milton, and three (3) Trustees should be allocated to Oakville.

[2] The appeal comes to the Tribunal pursuant to s. 10 of Ontario Regulation 412/00, Elections to and Representation on District School Boards, made under the *Education Act* (the "Regulation"). The Regulation prescribes a short timeline between the time an appeal must be commenced (April 21 in the election year) and the date by which the Tribunal must determine the appeal (June 10 in the election year).

- [3] In light of this timeline, the Tribunal convened a telephone conference call ("TCC") on May 22, 2018 to discuss an appropriate hearing format and scheduling of this matter. The parties consented to hold a hearing at the Tribunal on June 4, 2018. All four lower-tier municipalities were notified of the TCC and the hearing event on June 4, 2018, however, only Milton and the School Board sought to participate in the appeal.
- [4] During the initial TCC, the Tribunal discussed the possibility of providing an oral decision at the conclusion of the hearing in order to meet the June 10 deadline, with reasons to follow after the deadline. Counsel raised no objections with this approach.
- [5] Upon the conclusion of evidence and submissions at the hearing on June 4, the Tribunal determined it would be appropriate to reconvene by TCC on June 5 in order to provide an oral decision. Out of an abundance of caution, the Tribunal again canvassed with counsel the possibility of issuing its written Order prior to June 10, with reasons to follow later in the month. Counsel consented to this approach, and agreed that this approach would not offend the Regulation. As a result, and after carefully reviewing all of the materials filed, the evidence at the hearing, and the submissions of counsel, the Tribunal provides the Order below. The Tribunal's written reasons will follow by June 29, 2018.

ORDER

- [6] The Tribunal orders that the appeal is allowed. The number of Trustees by geographic distribution approved by the School Board in Resolutions #79/18, #81/18, and #83/18 (the "Resolutions") is varied as follows:
 - Two (2) Trustees for the Town of Milton; and
 - Three (3) Trustees for the Town of Oakville.

The Resolutions remain unchanged in all other respects.

I am in complete shock and dismay after reading the agenda for the June 5th Board of Trustees meeting. You have accepted two delegations to speak on the Sanctity of Life motion. You have discriminated against me and continue to hear information on this motion past the date when all feedback was to have been collected.

So I was denied the opportunity to address the Board because numerous delegations had been done and it was the same issue. How do the 2 delegations for the June 5th meeting meeting not address the "same issue"? I suspect you were tired of hearing from me so you dismissed my concerns. You discriminated my concerns in favour of the ones you will hear on June 5th. This is wrong and I will pursue advice on how this injustice can be highlighted through the media and other avenues. To add insult to injury, one of the delegations isn't even from a constituent of this Board. You will not listen to a parent of one of your students but you will listen to unaffected persons.

The activities surrounded the Board of Trustees over the past few months has been a real eye opener for me and unfortunately, has damaged my faith in good governance; however, I still believe the Board can remedy the situation.

I accept that motion #61/18 has been reflected in policy and sent out for stakeholder consultation as per the regular, defined process for amending policies at the Board. This is good. This is what we have been asking for, and even the Trustees who supported this motion all along, should want. At the end of the day - everyone wants a fundraising policy that reflects the principles of upholding the sanctity of life in a manner that is consistent with the views of all stakeholders.

However, there is a flaw in the process. The stakeholder consultation process typically used by the Board is not appropriate for this issue. Collecting stakeholder input does not mean merely collecting stakeholder views and opinions. The views and opinions must be informed and relevant.

Currently, there is not a basic understanding of the revised policy and its implications to provide informed and relevant input. Unfortunately, when people do not understand an issue they will dismiss it and silence could be assumed to imply endorsement. I do not believe any one who says they want input, can honestly agree that, because stakeholders did not say anything, they must want this change. On the contrary, I would contend silence means they were happy with the status quo.

I am proposing that the Board pass a motion that will allow Board staff to amend the stakeholder input process for this policy change. The process needs to include an information sharing aspect where stakeholders can fully understand the intent and the implications of the policy change. I assume Board staff would be best qualified to determine the best way to disseminate this information being it a town hall, email communications, council communications, survey? ...

Secondly, the current process must accept all input from all stakeholders yet has no transparent process to weigh the input of different stakeholders. This could lead to abuse as simply as an individual could send in 1000 feedback sheets. Also, there is no impartial approved method for Board staff to say that the input received from a council is more valuable than a grandparents view from Thunder Bay. I highlight these potential abuses because I have been witness to so many and I refuse to be taken advantage of by playing by the rules when others are not. No one wants false, irrelevant input added to the stakeholder feedback.

I am aware that if the Board staff does ask for this remedy, it will not likely be passed by the majority of the Board (probably defeated 5-4) but I am willing to make this proposal because I do believe that all Trustees should want informed, relevant feedback. If nothing more than to support the original motion brought to the Board in January.

Time is of the essence with this matter because stakeholders have already received an initial email and are struggling with a response.

Please exert any influence you may have to allow for a proper consultation process to occur - everyone will benefit and nobody will lose.

Good afternoon,

I am still trying to contain my frustration with the events of Tuesday night's Board meeting when this letter arrived in my inbox. I know it is a procedural matter but it is inflammatory because it confirms the Board's approach to this motion. You have accepted all of the delegations' presentations - for information purposes only. As the Chair said, this means nothing more will be done.

Over and over last night, you were told, you had violated the requirement to seek consultation with parents, councils, and constituents of your Board. You have received this information and you choose to ignore it. At one point, Trustee Quinn, even questioned whether he had received the information that the Board was in violation of the Education Act. In fact, the Board had received the information twice that I am aware of: in an email dated Feb 26, 2018 from Mr. Harvey and again last night from Ms. Monte's presentation (item 5.14). I am not sure if either of these individuals are lawyers but you do not need to be a lawyer to understand this wording -

Ontario Regulation 612/00 19.1.iv states, "Every board shall solicit the views of the school councils established by the board with respect to the following matters: . . . policies and guidelines respecting the fundraising activities of school councils."

The Board has also ignored its own guidelines and policies.

Policy No: V-04: School fundraising is any activity, permitted under this policy, to raise money or other resources, that is approved by the school principal, in consultation with, and upon the advice of the Catholic School Council, and/or a school fundraising organization ..."

Currently, we are seeking advice on how these violations may be brought to the attention of the Ministry of Education. I believe the majority of delegations last night, were seeking to encourage consultation before moving forward. The issue is not the words or intent of the motion but the process that was followed.

You are required to consult with your constituents and I would like to know how you are planning on completing this requirement before implementing this resolution.

Hello Paula,

Thank you for confirming that the information shared with Trustees at the April 10th Policy Committee meeting, and at previous meetings regarding School Council fundraising planning, was incorrect. As you have acknowledged, the "Annual School Generated Funds Plan" does not include any information regarding external charities and in fact, that information is explicitly excluded from said report.

The "School Generated Funds Reporting Template" to which you have referred (Appendix C in the Procedure) does include a line for External Charities, however, it simply reports the TOTAL of funds raised and allocated, with absolutely no detail of the specific charities. Furthermore, this is a report of activities that have occurred, not a planning document. The information provided at the April 10th Policy Committee meeting was with respect to fundraising PLANNING.

With respect to the Audit Report comments, obviously I am not privy to what is shared in-camera, and Trustee Rowe has not commented so I don't know if he was referring to in-camera reports or not.

That said, in reviewing the audio from that meeting, I note that Trustee Rowe specifically said that "the-

Again, this does not match with my experience and I have still not been provided with evidence to the contrary, although I am still happy to receive that if it does in fact exist.

Also, again, I am not familiar with any public reporting of funds raised for external charities either by the schools my children attend, or by the school board as a whole. The only information I have seen in this regard is in recent media reports that HCDSB raised \$316,000 for external charities last year; previously this was reported as \$12 million so I have no idea if this number is accurate, or any detail by school or particular charity.

The whole discussion about what School Councils may or may not do, or report, stemmed from a concern over lack of transparency regarding charities supported. In the absence of any evidence to the contrary, it would seem that this lack of transparency is indeed a very valid concern.

Please include this correspondence in the May 15th Board report along with Appendix A and Appendix C of Policy VI-59.

You are correct in that the "Annual School Generated Funds Plan" (Appendix A in procedure VI-59 School Fundraising Activities https://www.hcdsb.org/Board/Policies/Policies/Procedures/VI-59%20School%20Fundraising%20Activities%20(status%20-%20Stakeholder%20Consultation).pdf that is posted to the school website does not include any funds raised or donations made to external charities. That said, Principals are also to report on School Generated Funds (SGF) at Catholic School Council meetings a minimum of three (3) times per year and post these reports on the school website.

The template for this SGF report is **Appendix C** in the procedure and it includes a line for "External Charities". These SGF reports can be found on elementary school webpages under 'School Council – School Generated Funds' and found on secondary school webpages where there is a link to the Catholic School Council.

As for Trustee Rowe's comment, I believe he was referencing the types of reports the Audit Committee receives about SGF audits performed on individual schools during the year and these results are presented to Trustees in-camera.

Hope that helps clarify.

I am writing to seek some clarification on information provided to Trustees at last night's Policy Committee meeting, which has also been stated several times in past Board and Policy Committee meetings, including most recently at the February 20th Board meeting.

The information is with respect to School Councils' fundraising plans, including the charities that will be supported, and that these are decided by, or in consultation with School Councils at the start of the year and then subsequently published on the schools' websites as part of the School Generated Funds plan.

I am seeking clarity because I am having difficulty reconciling these comments with my own personal experience.

In my 13 years with children in this Board, I have served a combined total of 10 years on Parent Councils, at three different schools, under a total of 5 different Principals - I have never been consulted on what charities we will support, much less seen this reported.

I have checked a few other school websites and reviewed other Councils' minutes to see if this is happening elsewhere; I can't find any evidence that it is. Perhaps it is happening at some schools, but it is certainly not prevalent, not that I can see.

In fact, this is actually the first year I have seen a School Generated Funds Plan presented to School Council, and I do see a plan published on most school websites, all using the School Generated Funds Plan template that is included as Appendix A to Administrative Procedure VI-59, School Fundraising Activities, mostly recently presented to Trustees as part of last night's Policy Committee Agenda. However, in my personal experience, this report is used for fundraising efforts to support local school initiatives. Other than providing support to families in need within our own school community, usually with school related activities (pizza day, school trips etc.,) we have never used the proceeds of the fundraising activities reported here for external charities – at least, not that I know of.

In fact, the template clearly states via note at the bottom "**Do not include....fundraisers to be donated to external charities...**" So it would seem that charities are not even *supposed* to be included on this report...the report that staff say schools are using to report the charities they support....

If you could please provide clarity on this, I would really appreciate it.

Also, Trustee Rowe mentioned last night that a list of charities is included annually in the Audit Report. I quickly scrolled through the Audit Report presented at the November 17th Audit Committee meeting but could not find the information there, either. I'm not sure if I am looking in the right place, and its a long report so I may very well have missed it; if someone could please direct me to where that information can be found, I would really appreciate that as well. I assume that would be public information.

I look forward to your response and clarification of the above.
