Purpose

Share with the board the successes of the Alternative Education Programs as it relates to the unique complex needs of student working through tier 3 mental health issues. To highlight the importance of these programs and potential for continued growth.

Background Information

Alternative Education Programs offer a supportive environment to students who struggle to attend or achieve in their home schools typically because of complex mental health or life challenges. Over the years the needs for this support has increased in its size but also in its complexity. This has challenged us to continuously grow our skills to meet these needs, but we have found that what underlies any approach is a trauma informed lens.

A PowerPoint will be shared which includes a lived experience of a student around the impact the program has on him.

Conclusion

These programs are small, but they catch some of the most vulnerable in risk youth who when supported, all express having the desire to achieve and improve their lives. Thank you for the opportunity to share this information with the hope that it informs your perspective.

Purpose

To provide Trustees with a summary of the feedback received from Halton Catholic District School Board (HCDSB) stakeholders regarding the option to expand the French Immersion Program.

Background Information

At the January 21st Board Meeting, Trustees considered a motion to expand the French Immersion Program beginning in the 2020-21 school year.

Trustees deferred making a decision until the February 18, 2020 Board Meeting, in order to allow time for us to share this information with all parents who may be impacted by this expansion.

WHEREAS, Policy V-18 clearly states: "Stakeholders directly impacted by potential changes to existing programs will be notified that the program in under review, and will be provided with the pertinent information as it becomes available, and prior to any decisions being made."

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees give direction to the Director of Education and Secretary of the Board to proceed with expansion of French Immersion programming at the Halton Catholic District School Board with Option A (presented at the December 10, 2019 Policy Committee Meeting) for the 2020-2021 school year.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the January 21, 2020 motion titled "French Expansion" be deferred until the February 18, 2020 Regular Board Meeting with Option A as a focal point.



The Consultation

On January 23, 2020, an email was sent to all HCDSB parents to share information about the potential expansion of the French Immersion Program. The email provided some basic information about the potential expansion of French Immersion Program, and included a link to the <u>HCDSB website</u> for additional details. The email also provided an invitation to share comments or ask questions.

Feedback was gathered in two (2) ways:

- I. Though an online feedback form
- II. Through email

I. Online Feedback Form

The online feedback form was made available between January 23 and February 6, 2020. A total of 990 comments were submitted.

A summary of the feedback received through the online form is attached as **Appendix A**.

II. Feedback Received Email

Parents were also invited to submit questions or comments via email to a dedicated email account. A total of 35 emails were received.

The emails received have been redacted to exclude personal information, and are attached as **Appendix B**.

Conclusion

The feedback received through this consultation is shared with Trustees to help guide the decision-making process as the Board considers the option to expand the French Immersion Program.

Introduction

This report summarizes feedback received from Halton Catholic District School Board (HCDSB) stakeholders about the current option to expand the French Immersion Program.

Background

At the January 21st Board Meeting, Trustees considered a motion to expand the French Immersion Program beginning in the 2020-21 school year.

Trustees deferred making a decision until the February 18, 2020 Board Meeting, in order to allow time for us to share this information with all parents who may be impacted by this expansion.

Feedback

On January 23, 2020, an email was sent to all HCDSB parents to provide feedback via an online form regarding the potential expansion of the French Immersion Program. The online feedback form remained open until February 6, 2020.

In total, 1027 responses were submitted using the online form, 37 of which did not include a comment, and were therefore deleted. 990 completed responses are included in Appendix A, below.

Because feedback appears as received, the dataset may contain duplicate responses. The online form was anonymous (aside from a field to include name voluntarily), and not password protected, therefore it was not possible to prevent duplicate comments from the same respondent.

Feedback Form Results & Themes

The online feedback form invited respondents to provide comments around the option to expand the French Immersion Program. 990 respondents provided a comment.

The responses have been coded into themes. These themes do not account for all opinions expressed but provide a summary of the most frequent comments.

It is worth noting that although the form did not specifically ask respondents for their position on the expansion of the French Immersion Program, 208 respondents indicated their support for the expansion of the FI program and 132 respondents stated they are opposed to the expansion of the FI program.

See Appendix A for the full list of comments.

Theme 1: Boundaries (34%; n = 339)

Approximately one third of respondents provided comments related to the potential boundary reviews. While many comments were generic in nature, there were three (3) main subthemes that emerged around boundaries:

1. Supportive of FI program expansion, but do not want students currently enrolled in FI to have to move schools. (i.e. want grandfathering of existing students in FI Program at the current locations).

Examples:

"It would be very disappointing if the HCDSB decides to uproot students who are already in the F/I Grade 1 program, and move their programming to another school. Parents have already invested in uniforms, and incurred other costs to this point."

"I think its great that there is so much interest in the program and that there's a possibility of more French classes being added. My one issue is the possible school boundary changes. My son already had to switch schools because of boundary reviews so my concern is how many times boundary reviews are going to happen over his elementary school years. I am not committed enough to the French Immersion program to move him from school to school in order to stay in it."

"We support the expansion of EFI 100% but feel currently enrolled in the EFI program should continue at their current school. Children who will be newly enrolled into the expansion phase at Gr.1 should be moved to an underpopulated school.

2. Concerned that boundary reviews that would be disruptive to students and families.

Examples:

"And with regards to adjusting boundaries, many families have chosen to live where they do in great part due to the school within that region. To change boundaries and force students to be relocated to new schools seems terribly unfair."

"Changing boundaries now for the French program would disrupt many children not interested in the French program which is unfair. It is my understanding a new school is going to be built in a couple years. Wouldn't it make more sense to wait for that new school to open to change the French program and do a boundary review? Why do a boundary review and disrupt these children twice???"

"I am all for French immersions and providing the best education for our children. However, boundary changes will be very disruptive to both parents and students. My kids love their current school...and have made many friends. Kids thrive on routine and displacing them to another school and being separated from their friends could be negative to their emotional well-being."

3. Supportive of boundary reviews if they will allow for expansion of the FI program. Many expressed the boundary reviews were happening anyway (not as a result of the potential expansion of the French Immersion Program).

Examples:

"The boundary review mentioned would be happening regardless of French Immersion expansion since the St. Mary's community is growing due to new residential developments; FI should be expanded as there are numerous students on waiting lists"

"I think boundary reviews are being used as a scare tactic so parents from english schools do not support the expansion of french immersion with the fear that their children could be displaced. Instead, education on how this would be done would be a great asset for all parents to know."

"I am in favour of expanding the French Immersion program. The option presented for expansion presented is manageable and pragmatic. Boundary reviews are necessary in all developing Boards and there are many HCDSB schools that are under utilized that could house an expanded program"

Theme 2: Staffing (10%; n = 100)

Many respondents expressed concerns around the Board's ability to adequately staff the expanded French Immersion Program.

Examples:

"I am, however, concerned about how you will find qualified/certified teachers to deliver the program. While I do see the value of a child being able to speak a second language, I feel strongly that the quality of teachers is much more important and am concerned that the board is contemplating hiring unqualified/uncertified teachers."

"This program should not be expanded. My oldest child received an "Incomplete" in core French because the Board could not find a qualified teacher. If our children's minimum education requirements cannot be met, how can you consider expanding the EFI program? Additionally, if this program cannot be offered to all HCDSB elementary students then in my opinion it should not be offered at all."

"My highest priority is the quality of teaching staff. Program expansion should only be done when there are sufficient teaching resources. Reading that there are 5 teachers working in the french program currently without proper accreditation is very concerning as a parent. What's the point in having my kids in the program if the quality is poor? I appreciate the outreach strategy, but until you have a greater pool

of candidates to chose from (and this notes a decline in graduates) why are we even considering expansion? If the quality declines, I'll have to pull my children out of the program and then you'll have a another issue all together with low enrollment in the higher grades."

Theme 3: Eliminate Waitlist/Meet Demand (9.4%; n = 93)

A number of respondents addressed the need to meet demand and eliminate the waitlist in the French Immersion Program.

Examples:

"The Board is doing the right thing with trying to accommodate waitlists into a much sought after french immersion program. I commend you for starting the expansion process and ensuring that our Catholic faith, coupled with french immersion is keeping up with high demand and current times. HCDSB is unfortunately lagging behind in comparison to other Catholic school boards that have listened and accommodated the large need and want from parents to offer more french immersion programs."

"With just over 40 spaces available each year, it exists as an exclusive program. For us, the only answer is to eliminate the wait list and expand the Early French Immersion program."

"I do not support the expansion of the French Immersion program. I feel that the 150 person wait list is not a wait list. A wait list is 10-15 students waiting to get in. If there is that much interest, this is a reason to find a separate facility. This would be a solution, not a "quick fix" as you are suggesting."

Theme 4: Portables/School Capacity (7%; n = 74)

Some respondents expressed concerns around overcrowding and the effects of additional portables on a school community.

Examples:

"NO to adding more classes to an already full school."

"Expanding the program to St.Scholastica will put unnecessary strains on a school; that already supports the Early FI Program, that is located in a rapidly developing and growing area, and is the holding school for students from the surrounding developing community, until a new school is built in that catchment."

"Our school already had a boundary change and is bursting at the seams which affects child learning. Because we are so huge, teams are limited (100 kids in the grade and

only 15 make the team), or for track only 4!! 12-14 portables since the influx from the last boundary change. No field to play on. I don't want to see anymore growth at my school. Only a reduction of students."

Theme 5: Siblings (5%; n = 51)

Respondents suggested that consideration should be given to siblings of students currently enrolled in the French Immersion Program.

Examples:

"My youngest daughter was not selected and is in the current waiting list. My elder daughter is in the program in 4th grade. Having siblings without the same opportunities creates challenges as a parent as you want to provide them equal opportunities on their education. This created lots of frustration and anger."

"I'm in support of this change. My one ask is that all siblings stay in the same school to ease logistics for parents. I have two children in the Early French Immersion program and my third child has been denied cross boundary requests to attend the same school in the English stream. I recognize that if it stays a lottery system to be admitted into French Immersion that he may not be admitted into the program when he is in Grade 1 but I am hoping that he is reserved a spot in the English stream at the same school."

"Agreed that expansion is required. Please turn your minds to the following: siblings (and option for siblings to attend the same school whether or not both are enrolled in French), commencement of French class in all schools starting in grade 1."

All Comments Shared

- *if students are already in the french program they should be able to finish the program in the school where they start- no boundary reviews for the current students it should be phased in .
- * english stream students should not be bussed to a different location to make room for additional french classes. Students should be able to stay in the home school
- * parents choose programs and homes for their family and the disruption that this french program is causing halton hills with it moving to st bridged, to st catherines and then maybe moving again! It is becoming ridiculous! The board needs to figure this out and stop piloting ideas that are not working

- * why is the french program so high on the priority list? There should be more programs available throughout the board to meet the needs of other learners: Enhanced learning plans with those who score exceptionally high but not enough to be gifted, regional programs for IB, Tech, arts
- * unqualified teachers for a program to meet the needs of a few is a mistake
- 1. Grandfather children in existing programs into their school. Transitions are difficult and parents have made long term choices based on the acceptance into these program. Stability is paramount.
- 1. The transition to a new school causes a lot of anxiety for children. Having just transitioned to fbe

Support the expansion of French Program

A change in boundaries resulting in regular stream kids changing schools with less than one year notice would be far too disruptive to kids and their families. Changing bus eligibility will also be extremely disruptive for working parents to manage with short notice.

A step in the right direction.

A welcome addition to Catholic education in Halton.

About time

Adding 2 more classes each year will only add to the existing problem of overcrowding in an elementary school. There is not enough room for kids to play outdoors due to the increasing number of portables each year. School space cannot support this.

Adding a portable or 2 is not a reason to deprive these children the programming they desire. This is their only entry point in our Board. Their only alternative is to move to the Public Board in grade 2. So it's unfathomable that anyone who is not well versed in French programming feels ok to take this opportunity away from these children for selfish reasons. Extended French is not a comparable alternative for those looking for an early start. We are a Catholic community and should behave as such. We have to meet in the middle and Option A is just that. To say that English students are suffering is ridiculous. Children who are starving, terminally ill and living in war torn counties are suffering. Let's put this into perspective.

Adding more Frech immersion classes for Grade 1 will reduce the availability of French teachers for the students in the regular stream. Supply teachers are difficult to get and sometimes the "supply French teacher" will have to use Google translator.

Adding more students regardless of language compromises the well fair of both the teachers and students. The school was not built to house so many children.

Against the expansion

Agree in expanding

All students should have the opportunity to learn both of Canada's official languages.

Although I am happy that the French Emmersion may be expanded, I do not agree that the student we are not enroll in the program may result with consequences such may have to be moved from their current schools/friends.

Although I fully support the French immersion program, adding up to two more grade 1 classes to the

Although I fully support the French immersion program, adding up to two more grade 1 classes to the school will have a huge impact on Schools such as St. Mary that are already bursting at the seams with over population.

Amazing program! Please vote for expansion

Another school needs to be built to accommodate French immersion. Our school is over capacity already. We cannot compromise our play ground anymore with more portables.

Any expansion of French Immersion (FI) is absolutely welcome. I find the existing "lottery" system almost absurd, especially knowing that children who fail the lottery are refused to join FI when there's an opening (to Grade 3), while also considering that the public school board (HDSB) has multiple FI schools in each city. It is difficult to accept that there are so few students who apply for FI in the Catholic board, relative to the public board; perhaps if there will be an expansion, there may be far more students (parents) who'll be willing to apply for FI.

Philosophically and on a pedagogical basis, the FI program should be standard in the "normal" curriculum; i.e., the FI curriculum is what all students should be taught. Most countries in the world, especially in Europe, teach multiple languages throughout the elementary grades and children become fluent in multiple languages before high school ends; Canada is officially bilingual and should do the same by teaching fluency & literature in both French & English.

As a bilingual Ontarian French is an incredible asset to have. However, if it is hard to fill French teaching positions now it will be a further challenge without significant investment and hiring incentives. No school boundary changes.

As a elementary teacher with experience in the primary grades, and specifically grade one, I am very opposed to the plan to expand French Immersion programming.

With possible cuts looming to special education, English language learners and vulnerable students needing special supports in our board, how can the expansion of an optional, non-essential program be justified? At a cost of at least \$217,466 for the first year only, with additional costs every year the program runs for staffing and transportation, this specialized programming would be diverting funds from students that are truly at risk in our board. Taking from vulnerable students to fund an advanced program is wrong.

From an education standpoint, there is no benefit to starting French instruction in grade one, as opposed to starting French instruction in grade 5, through the extended French program

that is already established in our board. As an educator, I feel that it is important for students to first establish strong literacy skills in English in the formative primary grades, especially if the child is also an English Language Learner. This foundation allows for success in the grade 5 extended program.

As a father of 2 kids attending St. Mary (no French immersion) here my concerns: Evacuation & Emergency Risk: the use over capacity (more than double) of the facilities increases the risk in case of potential danger, e.g. fire.

Safety in parking lot and adjacent roads: multiple parents driving dangerously when dropping or picking up their kids. This risk has increase exponentially over the past few years due to the over capacity.

Less opportunity for school activities: classes are restricted to participate in the school community activities, as the gym has already exceeded its capacity.

Unsustainable solution: St. Mary has approx. 300+ students (please confirm). This leaves little room for families within the boundaries. If 2 additional classes are added, St. Mary would end up with 700+ French Immersion students (more than its capacity), leaving NO room for English students within the boundaries.

Therefore, the Board must find a permanent solution for the growing French Immersion population, instead of further deteriorating the current challenging situation in St. Mary due to overcapacity. PLEASE think of schools with current lower registration for the French Immersion program

As a French educator of French immersion I cannot believe that Halton in not in board with such an expansion when all other boards are expanding these programs due to student interest but also another way to augment enrolment for the Catholic boards

As a French Immersion student myself I believe that there needs to be more access to the program especially since there has been such high demand. Not doing so would discriminate these students from the education that they seek.

As a French speaker, I want my child to have the opportunity to pursue French Immersion. As a French student in university I would have loved to have had access to the Immersion program. I don't want other students to be waitlisted forever or not have access like I did.

As a mother of 2 kids attending St. Mary (no French immersion) here my concerns:

- 1. Over capacity Challenges when responding to a potential danger (fire, evacuation, others), it's different when you have a number of students that overpass the capacity of the building
- 2. Safety in the parking lot I have witnessed an increased number of cars coming in and out of the parking lots, and the irresponsibility of some drivers that can't deal with the frustration of an overload parking lot, I have seen parents speeding, traffic issues around main intersections, etc.
- 3. School activities Last year, the Christmas concert was limited to some grades. Grades 6, 7 and 8 were excluded and alienated from the concert and couldn't participate, as they have done in years before. I don't think this reflects the inclusion we expect from catholic education. Christmas play didn't include all students

4. Portables - Multiples issues with portables: no working air conditioning, no working heating, not to say that every time these kids have to go the washrooms, they have to do it without supervision, but with a same age peer.

PLEASE use schools with low registration for French Immersion classes

As a parent I do not support an increase in French Immersion programming. The program at my daughter's school has been very divisive with French Immersion incorrectly being promoted as providing a superior educational platform.

As a parent I would like the opportunity to enrol my children in this program without having to wait on a crazy waitlist

As a parent of a child in the french Immersion program, it saddens me that I can't provide the same opportunity for my second child because of space limitation. Every child should have an equal option to learn the second official language of Canada.

As a parent of a child that is NOT in french immersion, I think it is completely unacceptable to potentially impact the vast majority of students in the English stream to accommodate the desire of those who wish to enroll their children in French.

As a parent of a child who has special learning needs I am concerned about boundary changes that will affect our family. My child would be directly disadvantaged by changing school as a result

As a parent of both an elementary and secondary school student, I am not interested in the french immersion program and therefore do NOT agree that students not interested in this program should be impacted by the school boundary changes. Parents and children interested in this program should be the ones impacted by it. I would be very disappointed if these changes mean any type of disruption to my children's routine. If parents are interested in this specialized program then they should be the only ones impacted.

As a parent of children attending St. Mary in Oakville, we DO NOT support the expansion of EFI at St. Mary. With the continued growth and popularity of the program, a more sustainable solution should be investigated and established that will meet growth demands moving forward. We cannot afford to implement an expansion that will detrimentally effect the learning and well-being of ALL students. You cannot possibly think that uprooting students from their existing catchment and school is in line with or valuing the developmental assets of children's growth. Are you really willing to interfere with the learning and well-being of 95%+ of the student population to accommodate 15-30 students on a waiting list for a program that can be offered at any building? I strongly urge you to consider other options. There are many schools in the board that are underutilized. You can recover costs from a mistake you make but you CANNOT recover lost education opportunities for students or damage to their well-being once you realize the damage you are doing by expanding a program in a school that is already at capacity. Please consider the needs of ALL students not just EFI.

As a parent of three children attending the regular track program at St. Mary, I am concerned for ALL students with the potential expansion of the EFI program at St. Mary specifically. The proposal to expand at St. Mary is neither feasible nor practical at this time given the large capacity constraints that currently exist. To expand this program at St. Mary would be to completely disregard the learning needs and well-being of ALL students. I am strongly opposing this expansion at St. Mary but I am urging you to strongly consider delaying the expansion of the program to 2021-2022 in order for you to conduct a feasibility and sustainability study that will allow you to develop and implement a long-term expansion plan that considers under-utilized schools such as St. John Paul II. There is NO MORE ROOM AT ST. MARY. You are sacrificing outdoor play space for all students while also reducing programming at the school in order to accommodate an unsustainable plan.

As a parent, I am opposed to the plan to expand the early French Immersion program.

Our schools were not designed to house specialized programs. They were designed to accommodate the needs of growing communities such as St. Scholastica, where French Immersion may not be the first priority of the families in this community. To disrupt the boundaries for ALL families, in order to satisfy the demands of a small vocal parent community, is not equitable.

The expansion of this program would involve great demands on staffing. It is already difficult in our board to hire qualified teachers for this program as it is. Hiring uncertified and unqualified teachers would have a direct impact on the quality of the program. What is the point of expanding a program, only to have the quality of education decrease for the students? Add to this the increase of the number split classes, which is not optimal for student learning or success.

The funds needed to implement this expansion (transportation, staffing, portables etc.) should be used for at risk students in our board, such as those needing targeted literacy support, newcomer students and special needs students.

As a parent, I would definitely like to see the French Immersion program expanded and be more accessible to children/ families. I feel that is an important opportunity that unfortunately is missed by many. We have registered and are currently sitting on the waitlist- and although it is not exactly a "stressful" situation- it would be helpful to find out sooner where my child's placement will be this coming September.

As a parent, there has been much debate about opening up boundary reviews. I'm ok with the boundary review, but parents should be educated that the Board would use smart judgement and put the additional french program into an area that would need more children, and not displace children from english-only schools that are already at capacity. I think boundary reviews are being used as a scare tactic so parents from english schools do not support the expansion of french immersion with the fear that their children could be displaced. Instead, education on how this would be done would be a great asset for all parents to know.

The Board is doing the right thing with trying to accommodate waitlists into a much sought after french immersion program. I commend you for starting the expansion process and ensuring that our Catholic faith, coupled with french immersion is keeping up with high demand and current times. HCDSB is unfortunately lagging behind in comparison to other Catholic school boards that have listened and accommodated the large need and want from parents to offer more french immersion programs.

As an EFI teacher my two main concerns are the lack of portable space for the EFI program to be expanded at St. Mary school and the fact that there is a real shortage of qualified French teachers to fill these new positions. We already have 8 portables on the blacktop and we have staggered recesses to accommodate our significantly large student population. We would therefore not have the space to accommodate the doubling of EFI classes incrementally over the years. The shortage of qualified French-speaking teachers is already an issue as when we call for a supply teacher, more often than not, no one takes the job because it is for a French-speaking role. The school is then left with pulling other full-time staff to cover my EFI class during their planning times or to simply pull someone out of their regular teaching role (usually a French itinerant) and those students are left without French that day.

These are just some of the concerns I have about the sustainability of the growth of the EFI program.

As far as I'm concerned, children who are not registered in the French immersion program should not be affected. I don't see why they should have to switch schools or be affected by the potential boundary switch.

As long as the kids on get to stay at St. Brigid I am fine with boundary changes. Our street has already been re-zoned and I don't want my kids going to a 3rd school after we JUST changed.

As much as I support increasing the French Immersion (FI) program, my concerns is related to the specialized/gifted programs that may be moved/impacted should the decision to increase the FI program be approved.

Currently I have a son in the gifted program at Canadian Martyrs. Canadian Martyrs is an ideal school for the gifted program as it is small and a very tight community. My biggest fear in moving the gifted program to a bigger school is that the gifted children may be targeted as being "different" resulting to isolation and in a worst case scenario being bullied for being in a specialized program.

Canadian Martyrs being so small doesn't isolate the gifted classes. All children are treated equally and participate in all events. My son is extremely happy not only being in the gifted program but being a student at Canadian Martyrs. He would be devastated if he were to move schools. Also, that may result in his classmates being separated and transferred to different schools which would devastate him as well as he would have to meet new friends / classmates.

Starting a French Immersion school instead of adding classes to current schools should be considered.

As the parent of a child on the wait list for EFI in Burlington, I am excited about the possibility of expanding the program and giving my child the opportunity to learn a second language.

I am, however, concerned about how you will find qualified/certified teachers to deliver the program. While I do see the value of a child being able to speak a second language, I feel strongly that the quality of teachers is much more important and am concerned that the board is contemplating hiring unqualified/uncertified teachers.

Another concern I have is what will happen to the English program at SHOJ. I would like to see the program continue at that school as I feel it is important for children living in the community to be able to attend a Catholic school within their community.

I would like to see the board continue the current EFI program at SHOJ and expand it to include another school, perhaps one with lower enrolment, so that the boundary changes do not negatively affect the current student population and their families. I would like the students who live in the Millcroft neighbourhood to retain the ability to attend a Catholic school in their community.

As the program is permanent, it should be treated as such. I don't recall being notified when the board expands the extended French program. There seems to be no problem adding extended French to other schools, why should it be a problem for Fl. A number of schools are under capacity, including ours, so it seems like we should be able to find room for Fl. This interim step makes sense to get the ball rolling

Expanding the French Immersion program seems like a reasonable consideration in light of the interest in the community and existing waiting list, although I do have major concerns with this proposal. I read over the proposal and my main concern is how this increased allocation of resources to this re-orginzation will affect resourcing other more pressing needs such as basic school infrastructure maintenance and improvements that affect all our students, as well as resources for special needs children. If there is a limited pool of resources for these competing interests I would hope the Board of Trustees will ensure the future resourcing of these other very important needs is not compromised. Although the French Immersion program is a great opportunity for our community, if the future progress of the more pressing needs that affect our children stagnate or suffer as a result of this re-organization, there will likely be a very public reaction to this initiative. Having read in detail pages 40-70 it seems like the most reasonable expansion is option A. It's going to accommodate twice as many families than what is currently offered. With the least amount of disruption to schools, staff and families. Every student enrolled do not stay in the program in entirety, which this proposal did not include details of. Option C and D do not make any sense and will open the door to those who make not take it seriously that could result higher amount of students dropping out mid course. Between difficultly finding qualified teachers and paying for all aspects involved option A makes the most sense.

Having read the background of the potential expansion of the French Immersion programming, which leaves out any discussions of the positive aspects of expansion, like reducing waiting lists and providing more students with access to programming, I view this "communication" and purported survey as an underhanded and strategic ploy to attempt to defer and potentially extinguish altogether expansion of the French Immersion program by a Board that's been doing its utmost to stifle the program since its inception. The Board's messaging here is highly prejudicial and discriminatory.

Having taken a high-level glance at the materials, I question the basic cost/benefit of such a move. In particular, what difference adding a maximum of two immersion classes is going to make to address the vast supply vs. demand imbalance for French-based education that currently exists. The short answer in my view is it won't. Many parents (myself among them) did not apply under the current 'lottery' system, which (in my view) fundamentally violates the principle that all students should have equal opportunity to an education (i.e. not left to luck of the draw). In all likelihood, allocating more spots will drive up the number of applicants, resulting in continued wait lists/families not being served. In my view, rather than expanding full French immersion in this way, the demand for French language education would be better addressed by offering extended French in more/every school. Children in the public system have far better access to French at an earlier grade than their Catholic counterparts. As a parent, I find this profoundly disappointing.

HCDSB has been dragging its feet on expansion and this "survey" is yet another delay tactic. It's time to start giving your students the programming they want and deserve

HCDSB should be expanding the program and seeking to identify other sites in Oakville. Having one site in the entire city which is so inconveniently located is unfair. Many students are unable to access French Immersion simply because the location is too far and many parents do not want their kids travelling across the city on a bus for 30+minutes at a time. There should be multiple sites - west, central east - to serve ALL families.

HCDSB trustees give your heads a shake! If you do not have the resources to accomodate an optional program, then you simply dont do it.

HCSB already changed the EFI school within a three year span causing all three of my children to go to different schools even though my two eldest are in the EFI program. Familes in the EFI program can not bare another school change.

Hello and Bonjour!

If I have NO other options but only four (4) to choose from - my choice is Option A. Otherwise, please curtail the FI program expansion to ensure quality, sustainability, and not a mass production in portables that serves nobody.

My child will start the Early French Immersion (FI) program in Sep 2020. However, to my surprise the majority of my friends decided NOT to participate in FI program. I was cautioned that:

- -My child may acquire neither good speaking French nor high proficiency in English unless I'm willing to pay for private tutoring for both subjects. My recent review of tutoring fees in Oakville confirmed that I would have to pay \$45 to \$60 an hour for a qualified tutor.
- -The Board's capacity for extra academic supports for struggling FI students is more limited compare to the regular English stream. And this in spite the fact that FI program is overall more demanding compare to a regular English stream.
- -There are teachers in FI program who are FSL speakers themselves. My friends questioned how this fact affects the quality of instruction.
- Acquisition of Math & Science suffers because of time & effort spent on learning French.

Hi

Thank you for the email notification and the opportunity you have allowed for parents to express their questions and concerns.

Having read all the material available, I'm still left with questions as there is no indication whether our school boundary would be affected. Such a change would have significant implications on my family and as a parent, I would ideally like to see these proposed changes before a final decision is made. The information provided so far is unspecific and leaves many outcomes open. It is not possible for anyone affected to take a rational position on this matter with so many unknown variables.

While I appreciate this is a complex decision, I would like to suggest that the proposed changes be accompanied by proposed new boundaries for everyone to consider. I'm sure I would not be alone when I say that our current school boundary was a crucial factor in my family choosing to live in our current neighborhood, which in turn affects many other aspects in our lives.

Thank you for your consideration

Hoping that students in older grades will be grandfathered to stay in their current schools and still have transportation provided to them. It can be a difficult adjustment to switch schools after having the same friends for 7 plus years.

Hoping the program is expanded

How can two additional classes create all the problems you are claiming?

How can you consider French immersion when we don't have enough French Teachers - I How dare you consider moving regular students out of their home schools to accommodate an optional program! Shame. Please do not give into the flavor of the month. Students need stability & to be able to remain in their home schools!

How much notice will be given to parents who are affected?

I absolutely support the expansion of the French Immersion programming in the Catholic Board. Our daughter was originally enrolled through the public board's immersion program out of fear that our daughter would be unsuccessful with the one-chance Catholic immersion lottery. Consequently the lack of discipline, unstructured class instruction, and systemic bullying inherent in the public school compelled us to explore the Catholic board again. Fortunately, my daughter managed to secure a vacancy in the Catholic French Immersion program and it was life changing. She excelled in the Catholic environment. We knew we could not relent on the French program as she is very adept in the language. We also recognize that learning the language will provide essential opportunities in a progressively competitive job market. Previously a flight attendant only needed to know English. Now all Air Canada flight attendants require French. Increasingly provincial and federal employment opportunities give preference to applicants with French. Because of the highly restrictive lottery system, we will now be struggling to provide our other two children with the same opportunity as their sister.

I actually don't believe the immersion program should be expanded. Instead funds should allocated to Core French so that French instruction can start earlier and reach more children. It would be a more inclusive solution. The Board's decisions are disappointing as such.

I agree and would like my daughters to learn French as a second language. It will be a must in a near future for their professional development.

I agree that expanding the French immersion program would benefit the Catholic school system in Burlington. The board would lose less students to the public board. I have three, soon to be four children in including a child with special needs. We are at the edge of the boundary. I do not want my children to have to move particularly as my special needs child is finally doing quite well. Moving could be very traumatic for her.

I agree that French immersion should be an option if children/parents wish to pursue. I do however disagree with relocating kids that are currently within a school not in the French program having to be relocated to another school. The children that do not wish to participate in French immersion should be staying in their original school. This is no different than private school, meaning, if parents want to pursue and optional type of schooling than those parents and children need to be the one's who should be up rooted and relocated. Leave the kids not participating in French immersion alone in their current boundaries, I have not asked for change-the individuals seeking a french program has asked for the change.

I agree with expanding the French Immersion Program. My daughter is in FI Grade 2. We wish for our younger daughter to also have a FI learning experience and I worried that the limited number of spots and the lottery system will limit her access to a Catholic FI education. It feels like we are being forced to chose between a catholic education and French education. Families should have greater access to opt into Catholic French Immersion.

Having siblings at the same school is an important family experience. I do not appreciate the worry that our you get daughter may not be granted a lottery entry into Gr1 FI and that this would mean she wouldn't be able to attend the same school as her sister as there is no FI in our home boundary. We have not been granted cross boundary for JK. Again, it feels like the limited FI is forcing a choice- if we want our daughters to grow up at school together, the limited access to FI forces us to chose - which do we value more educationally-FI or Catholic in school learning?

I agree with expanding the program.

I agree with the expansion however, having seen the lack of French teachers first hand, I would suggest seeing the program through grade 12 before expanding in grade 1.

I agree with the plans for expansion of the french immersion program, however, I would like to see it rolled out across multiple schools. It is hard to comprehend why the halton public board can (and has for many years) offer french immersion across multiple schools, yet the Catholic board is struggling to implement such a valuable program.

I am

I am absolutely not in favor of expansion. WE ARE AN ENGLISH BOARD!!!!

Let focus on this and think of ways to improve programming for the majority of the students within our board! French has been a topic for too long now, lets make a final decision that will benefit ALL students not just the French ones.

I am against it since I believe it will take resources out of current students and will overfill already full school.

I am all for families and children to be accommodated for their individual needs but in all fairness, My child will be attending Italian school next year. My CHOICE will not affect others or have any ripple affect on any other families. So why does she have to be affected by this French Immersion??

Parents who take an interest in changing and specializing in a French programs for their children should then only be considered to move out of boundary if that's what it takes to fulfill their wish. I am outraged by this possibility of my full time English speaking Daughter to have to take a bus to another school out of her neighbourhood. We live 1 minute away from St. Scholastica. We chose to live in this neighbourhood and to be a part of St. Scholastica well before the French program was implemented. You are playing around with something that is not broken only to break it. Don't pull my daughter out of St. Scholastica, She is very well adjusted in her school environment. I chose not to add change to my daughters current education situation by keeping her in the full time as only English and now big changes are happening anyway?? This will have a negative impact not only on my family

I am all for French immersions and providing the best education for our children. However, boundary changes will be very disruptive to both parents and students. My kids love their current school (Ascension) and have made many friends. Kids thrive on routine and displacing them to another school and being separated from their friends could be negative to their emotional well-being. If boundaries change, it would be beneficial to consider grandfathering kids already in that school and making the switch to the updated boundary school (if the boundary change affects the family) optional.

I am all for it. The earlier we can have our kids in French Immersion, and the more locations we can have, the better!

I am all for kids learning more. And I think French is very important. I however, do not think nor want the existing boundaries to be moved as it will affect a lot of kids that are jor in the "FI" program (us for one). Please DO NOT move the boundaries.

I am baffled why the HCDSB would even consider this? My kids would be devastated if they had to move schools.

I am completely against boundaries changing for all of our children.

I am completely opposed to this proposal. It is already hard enough to staff the French positions. The added bussing will be a huge expense and local children may be sent away from their home school. How can you even consider this?

I am concern with the expansion it could effect my kids and them not being able to potentially going to Our Lady of Fatima concerns me. If boarder get re adjusted and my kids are not able to go to there current school I will have a big issue.

I am concerned about the boarders changing, causing my child to have to switch schools. He is in his year one in junior kindergarten and had made wonderful progress with his peers and teachers. It would be extremely upsetting to have to switch him.

I am concerned about capacity at our school. Adding more portables will reduce our play yard which is already too small for the number of child attending our school. The school was not built to house so many students.

I am concerned about what the boundary reviews could mean - moving existing students slightly outside of the boundary to another school to accommodate French Immersion classes I am disappointed that our trustees are succumbing to the lobbying tactics of those parents who want French immersion.

First there are not enough teachers now to cover the demand of the current program. Secondly la very concerned that a majority of students and families would be affected by way of potential boundary changes to appease a minority of the student population. Thirdly the amount of funding that will go I to reviewing and expanding this program should not be the focus right now of our tax dollars. We have bigger issues to fight in English -class sizes, e learning etc. Other boards ie Peel are looking to decrease their French immersion programs due to the lack of teachers. Why Our Board thinks this is doable with current resources astounds me. Further the board is really going to undertake a massive task in the boundary review which will cause concern and potentially unfairness to anlotnof families.

Lastly studies clearly show there is no difference in terms of fluency and comprehension in French at the end of Highschool whether the child started French in grade one or grade five.

There are bigger and more important issues to deal with than French immersion.

I am extremely concerned that the quality of core English classes will be impeded by expansion of French immersion. My children will likely be re-zoned to another school which will be emotionally difficult for them. I am also concerned however that there is an underlying problem with the system that is not being addressed. I am aware that many parents are putting their children in FI just to avoid their children being placed in classes with special needs or behaviorally challenged children. The core English classes are going to be overburdened with high needs children and their education will suffer. This is not fair to teachers, or to our English children. I strongly believe that the demand for FI will decrease if the underlying problem is addressed in our classrooms.

I am extremely frustrated by the recent up coming changes. We purchased our home so we could be in this catchment and so our children can go to Sacred Heart.

One of my children needs special support and transition is not easy for him. I find it VERY UNJUST that kids who are NOT enrolled in FI would be impacted and penalize if they were to change school and boundaries.

I think it is the board's responsibility to keep in mind those families who are not enrolled and the major impact this future change would have on them.

I am happy with the potential for my children to participate in French immersion! I am happy with the way things are and would prefer to not have a change.

I am in favour of expanding the French Immersion program. The option presented for expansion presented is manageable and pragmatic. Boundary reviews are necessary in all developing Boards and there are many HCDSB schools that are under utilized that could house an expanded program.

I am in full support of the expansion of the FI program and plan proposed by the board for the 2020-2021.a boundary review is already planned for Oakville so it isn't really fair to make it sound as if the SBR is solely bc of expansion of FI.

I am in grade 3 French Immersion. I think the program should be expanded so my little sister can be in French Immersion too.

I am in support of a boundary review. I support this because I believe, and hope, that the result will be increased opportunities for French emersion in school, and in particukar, our school.

I am interested to know more and how this would potentially impact the lives of our children. for eg. would they have more children per class size, would they have to change schools if the boundaries are changed...lots of ??? at the moment.

I am not a fan of boundaries changing to add more French immersion.

I am not for expansion, as I do not wish for a change in school boundaries . Currently my children are not enrolled in French Immersion.

I am NOT for the expansion of the program. I am not happy about the boundary adjustments that might occur. There are less kids that would be affected by being on a waitlist for the French Immersion program compared to the many kids that may be forced to switch schools because they are no longer in the boundary of the school they attend. There is more of an effect on a greater number of children.

I am not in favor of a possible boundary change AGAIN. My son started JK at St. John's and as soon as he adjusted he was move to St. Michaels due to the closer. That's 2 moves in 3 years- now another potential change??? Ridiculious.

I am not in favour of expansion as I do not believe the board can have the staff to properly support it.

I am not in favour of potentially expanding the French immersion program within our board. We don't have the staff to support our current core French program as it stands, how could we possibly staff the expansion of this program with qualified French teachers. There have been many times at our school where students received an incomplete as a result of not having French teachers to teach core french. This simply isn't feasible. And with regards to adjusting boundaries, many families have chosen to live where they do in great part due to the school within that region. To change boundaries and force students to be relocated to new schools seems terribly unfair. Particularly if it is a result of expanding a program we simply can't staff.

I am NOT interested in expanding French immersion in the grade 1. I would like to see the Extended French at St Marguerite beginning in grade 5 extended to at least an additional class.

I am not interested in having my kids in the French immersion program, and would not like to have my kids be in a school that has it. I don't like how it creates a "smart class" and a "not-smart class" (even though my kids could do the French)

I am not supportive of another boundary change for this school. My family had already been impacted once and made the decision to move homes into the community to keep our children in their school. Many other families have been negatively impacted.

I am not supportive of boundary changes

I am not sure that the boundaries should be changed at this point. Maybe look at expanding the program to 3 classes instead of 4 to lessen the burden or load while still expanding it slightly.

I am on board with there being more French immersion options in south Burlington
I am on the waitlist for the program. I am frustrated at the size of the waitlist. Evidently, the program needs to be grown to prevent losing students to the public school board.

I am opposed to boundary changes at this time

I am quite confused as to how the HCDSB can justify the removal of the Extended French program from St. Matthew (using the excuse of overcrowding, lack of space, and the dependence on portables to sustain the program) and then consider, less than a year later, the expansion of the program and the endorsement of the use of portables to support such an expansion.

As a parent and educator, I am wondering if this is 1. an apparent lack of planning on the part of the Board or 2. the deliberate withholding of information regarding the Board's plans for the future of the Extended French program from the St. Matthew community? Either way, your new plan to expand the French program and your approval of the use of portables to facilitate this expansion, aligns with the wishes of the St. Matthew community to keep, at the minimum, one permanent Extended French class at St. Matthew. We look forward to this review, and expect that the Board will amend its plan to remove the Extended French program from St. Matthew and commit to its continuation at St. Matthew.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide feedback regarding the future of French Immersion within the HCDSB.

I am so glad that the board is considering this expansion. I know how important it is for children to another language and I see how much both of my granddaughters enjoy the early French Immersion and how quickly they learn. Children are like sponges and the earlier they are exposed to another language the faster they learn and retain this language. The waitlist of children to enter this program indicates the need for this expansion and continuation of this Program. Opening up more programs ensure that families will no longer be leaving the Catholic board in search of other highly sought after french programming. Thank you.

I am strongly opposed to boundary changes that would impact non French immersion students. We make decisions on our home based on boundaries and do not wanted to impact children education and friendships based on a small population of students.

I am strongly opposed to this. Expanding our Extended French programming at home schools would be much more equitable.

I am supportive of expanding French Immersion; it is a great program. However, I am not in favour of the the program moving away from Sacred Heart of Jesus where my child is already in the program. If it were to move to another school, it would create a hardship for me to transport him out of our neighbourhood.

I am very concerned about the proposed expansion of the French Immersion program and beg the Trustees to consider the long term sustainability of these decisions. We already struggle with major staffing issues when a Core French or French Immersion Classroom Teacher is absent and often have days with no supply coverage when one of these teachers is sick/away from work.

St. Scholastica, who has the largest wait list for entrance into the Early French Immersion program, there is no way to meet the needs of the children who reside in my catchment area and have a right to access their own local community school if additional French Immersion classes were to be added - even if only two more classrooms per grade. I have 23 available Gr. 1-8 classrooms in my school building. If a decision is made to add two more FI classrooms for each grade level (effective September of 2020) I would be faced with having to use 22 out of 23 of these Gr. 1-8 rooms for French Immersion students alone by September of 2024. Catholic parents of students within the St. Scholastica school community have a right to have their children housed in these interior rooms of the school.

I am very concerned that my daughter who loves her new school and friends may be forced out. I am not okay with this

I am very happy with the idea of the expansion. However, with the current French teacher crisis, I'm worried that there won't be enough teachers to fulfill the expansion. I am also worried that the program may be moved from it's current location.

I am very supportive of expanding the early French program. Learning a new language has been proven to help with many other academic skills including math and logic. I also believe it's important for us to offer French education in our bilingual cou

I am very, very much against any change to boundaries that would force my children to change schools

I appreciate the effort in attending the need of french immersion and we receive with enthusiasm the news of the expansion. I have a child joining the program by 2020/2021 and an older child going to grade 3 on that program.

I do understand that is a complex matter, yet I would like to suggest that the program may be split into 2 different schools in Oakville, covering another area of the town. note that St. Mary is at the far northwest of the town. St. Matthew might be a good option judging by the size of the school and location.

Do not think there are no repercussions on the English stream in St. Mary. As an example, my children (in the English stream) did not receive their French lesson because the teacher was pulled into the FI program to cover off. That was an unfair decision that needs to be addressed within the schools who house both English and French streams.

My biggest concern is the location of the expansion. In the delegation provided on January 21st the facts indicate that St Mary cannot take on an expansion based on projected growth in the next 2 years from the current FI program along with the growing community and new development at Bronte and Upper Middle. You need to look at a long term solution and jamming them into St Mary's is not it. I urge you to look at another school to layer the FI program into Oakville. One that is possible more central or even on the other side to allow for less busing needs.

I believe the focus should be more on math, science and computer programming and less on French as a second language. considering only 20% of Canadians speak French. (FYI I'm of French decent)

I believe French immersion should be expanded

I believe it is not necessary to expand the French Immersion program.

I believe it should be expanded-more French immersion classes should be in place

I believe it's an opportunity that should be open to more students who seek catholic education. Both my daughters are in the program but friends were very disappointed when they were placed on a waiting list.

When choosing and developing schools consider school size and capacity. St Benedict is too full. Although there are no new french cohorts they should consider moving some of the classes to St Scholastica. French shouldnt mean being stuck isolated in a portable.

The schools should also consider keeping families together.

I believe staffing is an important concern. I would also be interested to know what the student retention rates are for early french programs as well as the feasibility of beginning core french in grade one in all schools. I would prefer the trustees look into this option. This way students are exposed to the language at a young age and can remain at their home school and still have extended options (in grade 5) when they are old enough to decide whether this is something that is a fit for them. I believe this was brought up in the committee work that was conducted a couple years ago before many of newer trustees began. Staffing was a concern then and continues to be. I believe there were other recommendations from that report as well around how to proceed with extended programs. Of the options presented, if extending early immersion is the plan, then adding an additional site per region makes sense however I don't think it makes sense to implement that for the next school year considering the boundary reviews and hiring that would be needed. Thank you for your consideration

I believe that an expansion of French Immersion is unwarranted given the current lack of qualified French Teachers to administer curriculum properly and the further reductions in staff predicted as a result of the current cuts of the PC government.

I believe that as a catholic school community, we should be promoting expansion of any and all programs available, especially French immersion. We need to be able to offer our kids opportunities that public schools have.

I believe that enrolment in French immersion should be a parent to parent decisions. I believe that introducing French should commence in jk. Through song and simple words and numbers etc. And the. Structured French classes to begin in grade 2.

I believe that expanding the French immersion program will benefit the students, school community, and greater community. Having more French immersion classes in schools will allow for a greater awareness and appreciation for the French language.

I disagree with this option as the waiting list for the early French immersion is already very long and it wouldn't be fair with the Oakville population not to have access to the program in order to give priority to student from other cities outside

I do hope they are not boundaries reviews that affect kids that are not in the french inmersion I do NOT advocate for the expansion of the French Immersion program for the following CRITICAL and very simple reason:

Lack of qualified Catholic French teachers to teach the program. We are already experiencing a shortage of qualified French teachers in our Board. How can we consider expanding the program when we can not staff it in a way that maintains the integrity and high standards of the program in our Board?

We currently run 2 optional programs in HCDSB: French Immersion (FI) and Extended French (EF). Why? We have a French teacher staffing crisis in this Board. Why stretch our existing resources by running TWO optional programs? With FI already set to continue to grade 12, where are the French teachers going to come from?

A possible solution might be eliminating the optional EF program. The Board can alleviate the teacher shortage as French teachers from EF can be relocated to FI positions.

I do not agree and don't want changes.

I do not agree on the potential expansion of the FI program. The St. Scholastica community is rapidly growing, and I believe the expansion would put unnecessary strain on the school. Also, the lack of qualified French teachers on the board would create issues on expanding the program. When French teachers are away and a substitute is required, the jobs are not filled. Students are losing their opportunity to learn in French.

I do not agree with expanding this program. I feel that it is incredibly hard to staff these positions with qualified French teachers. Also I wouldn't want my children impacted by the boundary review

I do not agree with the expansion of the French Immersion program

I do not agree with the French immersion expansion.

I do not agree with the program expansion.

I do not believe that it is fair to disrupt students who have developed an attachment to their school in order to accommodate one special program. Perhaps a separate school for the French immersion program would be a better idea.

I do not believe this program should be expanded. This program is very difficult to staff and is not mandatory. I do not think it is worth the potential disruption for only a small number of students.

I do not feel that it is fair for all children to have boundary changes due to the French programming. Two of my three children went through two boundary changes while attending elementary school and it affected their mental well being.

I do not feel that this should be supported, as there is a shortage of resources for students in the main stream programs. It is also difficult to find certified french teachers, and often teachers who are not certified are teaching these programs. Students who attend french immersion are not receiving enough instruction in their core subject areas, and may find gaps in their learning (lack of English instruction).

I do not like the fact that expanding French Immersion would trigger a full boundary review. It would not be fair to non French immersion students to have to change schools in order to accommodate this. If French Immersion is being expanded it should be offered in the schools that have the space to accommodate it. It is a option and should be treated as such.

I do not like the fact that there will be more boundary changes that could possibly affect my children's place at their existing schools. This motion does not include my children so why should they be made to move schools to benefit others.

I do not support an expansion to the French immersion program if it means a boundary review and by extension potential relocation for my kids. French immersion is of no importance to our family.

I do not support any action that would result in changing the school boundaries. It is asinine to undertake the expansion of the French immersion program as it would affect the majority of students to satisfy and benefit a minority.

I DO NOT support any potential changes to boundaries or changes to any child's placement in an elementary school. We are also not interested in any expansion of the French immersion program. Please keep the status quo and DO NOT interrupt our children's lives!

I do not support boundary changes

I do not support boundary reviews for elementary schools for the purpose of offering more opportunities for French emersion. I do not feel that the broad majority of families and students should have to be impacted to appease the vocal minority.

I do not support expansion of French immersion without the addition of new schools in Milton to meet the current overall growth

I do not support French Immersion in English schools. It creates a two tier system for the students and resources are pulled from English only students.

French Immersion should only be in a separate school for those interested. French Immersion is not a good use of our tax funding.

I do not support the expansion and change of boundaries and specialized program locations
I do not support the expansion of the extended French. This would be very costly in a tough
education time right now. Having students move schools (and possibly moving special needs
students) and purchase new uniforms to accommodate a few classes

I do not support the expansion of the French immersion program

I do not support the expansion of the French immersion program and would prefer it to stay at its current size.

I do not support the expansion of the French Immersion Program. Expanding the program at St.Scholastica would put unnecessary strains on a school that already supports the Early French Immersion Program, is in a rapidly growing area, and is holding students from the developing community on the other side of Hwy 25 until a school is built in that catchment. In addition the fact that the board cannot gaurantee qualified FI teachers in the program defeats the purpose of parents placing their children in it and is shameful that there is even consideration of creating additional classes under these circumstances. Expanding the program in the proposed ways is a "quick fix", reckless and detrimental to the home school and the families that live in the area and rightfully belong to St.Scholastica School.

I do not support the expansion of the French Immersion program. I feel that the 150 person wait list is not a wait list. A wait list is 10-15 students waiting to get in. If there is that much interest, this is a reason to find a separate facility. This would be a solution, not a "quick fix" as you are suggesting. Secondly, I do not understand the logic that children in the area that already go to the school may be bussed out to bus in FI students from outside, if the school population gets too large. Not to mention annual busing costs and coordination.

The fact that you don't have enough qualified FI teachers to support the expansion but are still considering it is detrimental to the children that end up in a FI classroom with an unqualified teacher. Again if you are looking for a solution, you need to ensure that you have enough qualified FI to support an expansion.

For the sake of St. Scholastica students and the FI students, I strongly urge you not to proceed with this expansion.

I do not support the review and expansion of the French Immersion Program beginning in the 2020-21 school year if it means that there will be a boundary review.

I do not support this. Our children have already affected by one boundary change during their education. The students well being should not suffer due to the potential expansion of the French Immersion program. It is unfair and unnecessary.

I do not think it is fair that many students would have to switch schools ... lose friendships and be uprooted just because more parents want their children in French immersion! SK is way too early to decide if your child can handle French Immersion and if they will be able to survive it! Those parents have other options like wait until Grade 5 and put them in extended French or go to the public board or private school if they really want their child in French Immersion! Many parents bought homes in certain areas because they wanted their child to go to a specific school! Furthermore the public board is having issues at their schools where they have several French Immersion classes in a grade and only 1 English class ... that one class often is looked down upon because they are not in the French Immersion program and considered not as elite as their fellow students!

I do not think this is equitable or fair on multiple fronts. Do not change from the current model

I do not understand the impact. my younger son has been accepted at St. Scholastica and our home school is guardian angels. He needs to be bussed etc and I am not sure how this expansion would help us.

Please clarify.

I do not understand why the Board is even considering this motion of expanding the French immersion program as its not in the benefit of the greater good and is in violation of its fiduciary duty.

I do not want an expanded FI program. I do not want the boundaries to be impacted as a result as well. I also do not like that there will be increased transportation costs, more portables, and more split classes. FI segregates students. It is difficult to get the psyched assessments and accommodate students with disabilities or learning challenges as it is, which decreases their participation in FI, and therefore creates segregation. FI becomes the publicly funded 'private school'.

According to the Globe and Mail Education reporter Caroline Alphonso, from the article titled "French immersion causes two-tier school system, data shows": "As parents increasingly choose French immersion, new data from the Ottawa-Carleton school board show that the program is creating a two-tiered system, with new Canadians, children from low-income families and students with special needs overrepresented in English-program elementary schools."

If parents want to further enrich their children with French as second language they should do it on their own time, like done with other languages and extracurriculars.

I do NOT want the boundaries to change

I do NOT want the boundaries to change.

I do not want the boundaries to change. I think consistency is very important to my kids. Along with having to spend money for new uniforms and them making new friends, my kids teachers understand them. Both of my boys are in programs for reading and this program is working great. Changing the school boundaries should not be necessary. There should be other solutions to this problem that does not involve moving kids that do not need to. For those wanting to join the French program they can be bused as it's a program they want for their kids, other should not have to change. Sounds small minded but for the others not asking for a change you have to keep them happy as well

I do not want the expansion

I do not want the expansion of the French immersion program. Build a new school for all the children that wish to have French immersion.

I do not want to change boundaries. You should have the option for French immersion in all schools. Like the Halton public school board.

I do not want to find my children having to attend a new school to accommodate this program.

I do not wish for the program to expands. All of these changes will impact many families who are not interested in French and will result in changes they never asked for.

I don't agree that improving quality of child education will be achieved if unqualified teachers are planned to be hired. I also strongly hope my child's position at his school will continue and that he won't be put in a different school boundary

I don't agree that long term students or families who currently live in the area should not be affected by this French immersion expansion. Careful review and choices regarding our English long time students and siblings should not take precedent over our English program.

I don't agree with expanding the French immersion program

I don't agree with expanding the French Immersion programs. I have had all my children go through St. Brigid for a reason, because of the academics this school offers in the English level (with one subject being French). I agree with the way the system is now; not expanding. The feedback I receive from both parents & students of the French Immersion is they do not find it beneficial the older the students get and the less serious they take it; thus a lack of interest and a decline of grades. If French is their main concern, then there are strictly French schools that cater to these needs.

I don't agree with potential expansion of French Immersion programming

I don't agree with the boundary changes affecting the non-French immersion kids

I don't believe adding 2 FI classes into all schools will deal with the wait list issues. by doing a boundary review for students who are settled in their current schools with pre and post school care/uniforms/extra curricular activities not to mention new siblings coming into those school would a large disruption to the status quo. Additional classes/portables in current FI schools would address the wait list issue.

I don't believe the boundaries should be expanded. I would leave it as is.

I don't believe this initiative should be undertaken. The french program should remain as is. Expansion and any associated impact to students should not occur.

We do not need to spend time and financial resources on the expansion, nor on any studies including boundary re-assignment etc.

The French program is a small proportion of the entire school population. The larger school population should not be potentially impacted by the wishes of a small proportion.

I don't feel children not looking to move into an FI program should be impacted as this could be detrimental to their learning. A move for some children may have emotional consequences not being considered. For parents wanting to enroll their kids, they should live within boundaries where this is offered

I don't feel it's necessary to expand the program. Given the fact that continued interest in the program declines after the first year or two, I feel this would be a giant waste of resources that would only benefit a few.

I don't fully understand what these changes could be because the memo was vague but my concern would be if my daughters school was to become a French immersion offering school, I may wish to change my decision to not enroll in French immersion.

I don't see a need for more French immersion programs. From what I have seen students are enrolled in grade one, only to be pulled out later - why cause this much disruption for something that won't have long term impact to the students.

I don't think an expansion of the French Immersion program is necessary and think that further boundary changes will have a negative impact on students who have formed relationships and friendships at their school over the years.

I don't think french immersion should only exist at certain schools, it should be available at all schools. I'm glad this is being considered.

I don't think it needs to be expanded.

I don't think it's a good idea

I don't think the extension of the program is warranted. In your assessment you indicate that you will have to hire a number more French teachers, which all school boards are already finding difficult. In addition you indicate that in order to accommodate this, You "may need to hire uncertified and/or unqualified teachers". This is completely unacceptable to me. The public school system requires certified and qualified teachers. If there aren't enough to deliver the extra programming then it should not be offered. It's that simple. Increased combined (split) classrooms in primary grades also pose a problem and difficulty for those students who don't learn well in that environment.

It is clear that there is not a demand for French immersion in HCDSB as there is in the HD's. In other boards, parents looks to Immersion to get smaller classes and higher functioning students, not Halton.

I urge you to not live forward with this. If it isn't broken, don't fix it. Subsequent boundary reviews are not always effective and are disruptive. Our school just went though one last year. No need to do it again. Spend the time and money where it is needed in the schools and existing classes.

I don't think the review of the boundary is a good idea

I don't think they should expand the program. The kids don't want to move schools. A lot of kids end up dropping out of the French program anyway and end up in the English program as they move up the grades.

I don't think this is a good idea. You don't have the space to it and I don't what to potentially change my kid to another school

I don't understand why does the board chooses an option like French Immersion that will only impact the less possible number of kids. French should impact more kids at an early age. We have been asking for French Extension at more schools .

I don't want my child to have to change schools. This should be a change for new enrollment not current students or students with siblings

I don't want the boundaries changed. So my feedback would be no - don't expand the program if it means changing the boundaries.

I don't want the boundaries of my kids school to change which school they attend as they have become members of a great community at their school and wouldn't want to leave

I don't want the program expanded. It's already to disruptive and resources for our school are being misallocated to accomodate other jurisdictions kids.

I feel changing boundaries to accomodate elective french immersion is wrong. Those that live within current boundaries shouldn't be worried about relocation.

I feel french should be offered in all schools as early as grade 1. If not as immersion it should be part of the regular curriculum starting in grade 1 if possible as early as JK.

I feel like there has already been many changes to the boundaries as Milton is a fast growing community. I don't think constantly changing boundaries is a good option. Maybe designating a few newer schools as "French" schools would be a better option

I feel like you should offer it in all schools or none at all. The bussing and the draw for kids to go and then siblings could be separated is ridiculous. Or just increase the learning of French - can't all jk-8 have a French class 1 time a day??

I feel that expansion is not a reasonable option. Lack of space, overcrowding at schools, long bus commutes and the limited number of qualified French teachers should negate the expansion.

I feel that students living in the boundaries surrounding the school should have priority over the EFI program. Also, there is already not enough staff to fill in supply or maternity leaves for French so how is an expansion of this program?

I feel that the hcdsb changes it's mind frequently without doing research in sustainability or what is beat for the education of students. Last year French immersion for grade 1 was cancelled and now you are going to expand. This makes no sense. The constant changing of boundaries is confusing for parents and students. The French immersion program should be based in research of what is best for children's development and hiring of the best teachers.

I fully support and would like to see an expansion to the French Immersion program.

I fully support french immersion but why propose an option where you would need to hire unqualified/uncertified teachers? This does not sound like a good idea. Also if there will be 4 classes in Halton Hills why not put one in each of the 4 schools?

I fully support increasing the opportunity for children to participate in a French Immersion programmes. If that means school boundaries need to redrawn, that is worth it to me.

I fully support the expansion of the FI program. It is quite obviously in high demand with the children attending flourishing. I believe any attempt to stymie this expansion is being done out of self interest and not in the best interest of the kids.

I fully support the expansion of the FI program. My child is on the waitlist and I'm concerned about her not having enough challenge in the classroom to keep her engaged should she not get a FI spot. I agree with the recommendation of staff that Option A or B are the only viable ones (I personally think Option B is the best choice). The demand for FI in Milton will continue to grow and if the Catholic Board doesn't keep up, we will lose some to the public and French school boards. With that said, growth needs to be responsible and feasible considering the fact that schools are at capacity. With that said, more aggressive growth up front to meet demand should avoid too many boundary changes later. I would also be concerned if boundaries are changed too often, displacing students (especially young ones) who won't transition as easily. I do applaud the Board for considering increases to FI as I believe it will have positive impacts on families and the Region as a whole.

I fully support the expansion of the program as I have had many discussions with other parent that did not have the opportunity to enroll their children due to limited classes. It is a benefit readily accessible in the public system. Other ways to minimize boundary changes could possibly be designated more than one school. Additional classes will need additional resources as the children progress past grade 1 regardless so I think exploring that possibility is an option.

I fully support the potential expansion of the French immersion program as it could open up so many doors for future generations.

I greatly encourage the board to change current practices for French immersion classes. As a French speaking graduate of the French immersion system which existed in Oakville many years ago it is very important for me to send my children to a French immersion school. We now live in the St.Patrick border and are making the decision where to register our daughter who starts school next year. The catholic elementary French immersion track option for our school is unattractive as the school will be much further from our home than the public school option of Pineland. We really want to enroll her in St.Patricks as we love the school, however the possibility of her being accepted through the lottery system to a school which is so much further away has us leaning more towards Pineland. A new plan for the French immersion track in the catholic board would make the decision of her attending St Patrick's in the fall much easier. I hope that the board will consider the amount of children denied entry in the lottery system right now when making the decision, and I would greatly appreciate the effort put into creating a new plan

I guess the actual program is enough.

I hate the idea of the expansion of French in our school. I do not like that my children who live in the neighborhood could possibly have to attend a school outside of their Neighbourhood because of a French program. I feel that if you want your child to know and learn French then they should attend a French school. I do not think my children should have to potentially be in a portable because of French students. There are not enough French teachers as it is and yet the program wants to expand?? Last year the conversation was about ending the program and this year it's about expanding?? No thank you!

I have great concerns into how this will affect:

- (A) quality of education for those remaining in the English stream classes
- (B) how special education will be affected with spreading resources, and
- (C) changing school boundaries which would be incredibly disruptive.

Likewise I am concerned we are prioritizing parent pressure for French over improving core subjects such as math and English language.

I have also seen how split schools create a demographic, socioeconomic divide between students which I believe to be harmful.

I have major concerns for the program expanding if it stayed at St. Mary - there is simply put no capacity at that school for this. There is a lot of urban growth in this area and the school already has 8 portabls -no capacity for this!

I have no comments. Thank you for the update and the information.

I have read the background information. The information provided is limited at best and does not allow me to gain an appropriate understanding of what the implications are of extended early French immersion. My child is a student at St. Nicholas. The school was just built and is already over-capacity. If a border change means more students going to St. Nicholas, I am opposed. But again, you have provided such limited information that asking us for feedback is ridiculous.

I have three children (ages 5, 7 and 8) in SK, grade 2 and grade 3. My oldest two are in the French immersion program at St.Benedict. My son was accepted into the program for the coming school year which will be at St.Scholastica.

My kids love the French program. It is their favourite part of their school day.

I have long wondered about the program and how it could better be served for all involved. My thoughts always lead me back to the question of why not have a school designated for the French Immersion program? Admittedly I do not have all the details; however I feel this would support the students, the teachers, financial pressures, support staff, etc in so many ways. Of the options put forth my feeling is that Option A makes the most strategic sense until the SBR's are completed and classrooms can be secured.

In conclusion, I completely support the FI program and would love to see it expand and accommodate those who want to participate. The best option in my opinion is a school designated for the FI program.

I love the idea of the expansion!

I need more information on which families at which schools will be impacted with boundary changes.

I oppose any changes being made that will effect other children that are not in the french immersion program. We are not involved in that program and it should not effect my kids and there routine and those that are not registered in it. It is common sense to not effect the kids that are not involved in that program.

Those who have enrolled in the program should be the only ones effected and they are the ones that have already switched schools to be in the french program so I am sure they will be ok with moving again. Or just leave it as it is with no changes.

I read the French Immersion Programming Information.... it doesn't really say or explain what these changes will be. What are the boundary changes that will be happening? Please give us more detail!!

I realize that Early FI has been capped at St. Benedict but I would like to see that reintroduced so that siblings have an opportunity to be in the same school AND I would like to see the lottery removed - other boards provide access based on demand. Forcing us to attempt the lottery process, potentially get a spot and then have our child at a completely different school than the other is not helpful for working parents who cannot accommodate the school times and have to rely on before/after care.

I would also like to see a provision that allows siblings of early FI/FI students to be admitted into the non-FI at the same school to again, have an opportunity to be in same school (e.g. my son is in early FI now in grade 2; my younger son will be starting grade 1 in Sept 2021. We live outside of the existing boundary for English). I now need to apply for early FI at another

school that potentially works off a different start/end schedule or go my home school which I know for sure is a different schedule. Based on the current system, my sons will be going to two different schools. This prevents the opportunity for them to have each other as a support system at the same school.

I say no to additional French classes

I see zero downside to expanding. It can only help our kids.

As well as the inconvenience of having to purchase new uniform pieces if we were affected. I am praying that we are not affected by a boundary review.

I support the expansion of the program. There should also be consideration for expanding the grade 5 entry program.

I support the expansion, lots of opportunity for students with the future francophone university I support the initiative, and any options to implement the program to more schools.

I support this expansion as it provides greater access to an important program even if it means another boundary review.

I think expanding French immersion is a great idea and due to the fact that my kids are still young I don't believe we would be greatly affected by this.

I think expanding it to a different school in Burlington South would be much more beneficial. Many students are being transported from Aldershot area already to Sacred Heart of Jesus. I feel it would save on cost and transportation conflicts that already exist.

In addition it would force students out of their home school which is for most walking distance to have to be bussed to another school. This just does not make any sense. I think it's a great idea to expand the availability of French Immersion in Halton Region. We are becoming new residents to Milton, from the Peel District which had far more options to have our daughter enrolled in French Immersion (like her parents were growing up), and to know that there were only 2 classes for grade 1 French Immersion, of which we needed to win a lottery for to give her a better education is ridiculous. This is her first opportunity to get into French Immersion, moving to a new town and school district and she will need to wait until next year grade 2 (provided the expansion of the program still doesn't allow her to enter into grade 1 immersion this year) to try again, with no guarantees. My child's education options should not be relegated to the winning of a lottery. We already pay for her education outside of a system that should be teaching reading and phonics, and now we may have to pay an outside party to teach her French, our country's second language? This is unacceptable. This expansion needs to happen and at a larger scale.

I think its great that there is so much interest in the program and that there's a possibility of more French classes being added. My one issue is the possible school boundary changes. My son already had to switch schools because of boundary reviews so my concern is how many times boundary reviews are going to happen over his elementary school years. I am not committed enough to the French Immersion program to move him from school to school in order to stay in it.

I think it's high time that this program expand to be more inclusive to the students/families interested in pursuing french fluency in our bilingual country. I wholeheartedly support any expansion of this program.

I think it's really great to expand the FI program. Would like to see a FI grade 1 track program in a South Burlington (south of the QEW) Catholic School.

Boundary reviews and changes are not an issue for me. They're inevitable with population changes in communities.

I think it's wonderful

I think that the program is great but it would be nice to have one school that could handle all the early and extended French programs.

I think the expansion is a good idea if you begin with the kids on the current wait list. It's enough that both siblings won't be in same school, the least the board can do is grant an opportunity for siblings to learn the same language.

I think the French immersion programs we have now should stay. I do however have concerns about expanding the program. First, I would not be comfortable if the existing FI schools would be housing the new additional classes as it would take up a lot of resources at the school. Also class ratios are affected by numbers in other classes. There is a lot of evidence of how low the Fi classes get in older grades which would negatively affect the English students and their class sizes. If the additional FI classes are going to be spread out to other schools I would be ok with that or if there were designated only French immersions schools. My children attend school that does have early Fi option and there is a definite divide among the English and French classes as well as the parent council. The idea of having French immersion only schools should be considered. Thank you.

I think the school community would be served better by instead of adding 2 more classes to the existing school, adding those classes to a school in the south part of the city (St. Paul, St. John, St. Patrick, Ascension). We would love to send our son to immersion but decided against it as the travel to Sacred Heart is just too far. I think that having an immersion school in both the north and south ends of the city would open up the program to more people. As of now, I feel the north has an unfair advantage. Also it could keep fuel costs for bussing down as routes would be shorter. We would definitely register if the classes went to a school in the south end. Thank you.

I think there has been some serious parent shaming going on by the English parents about us parents who want to support and expand the EFI program. The public board is much more supportive of EFI developments than the Catholic.

Boundary reviews are inevitable for a school like St.Mary's that remain in growing communities. Perhaps upcoming EFI classes can be moved to a school with less of a school population in a few years (such as St. John Paul II which is very under populated).

I think this expansion is long overdue. The current two class situation does not allow for the interest in this program. I also feel that the board should be looking to expand their extended French program and offer it in more than one location.

I think this is a great idea and it would really allow more students to join the French immersion program. I also recommend that the program be moved to St Anne school.

I think this is fantastic. The demand is there. I know there are hurdles to overcome but more people should have the opportunity for a French Catholic education in Halton. I have honestly been contemplating moving to the public board (which I don't want to do) since my daughter is on the waiting list for EFL 2020/2021. I have an older daughter in the program already and I want them to have the same opportunities. The only reason I might still consider moving boards is that now that St. Benedict is closed to EFL, my kids will always be at different schools even if my little one does get in. This is a struggle for our family that doesn't exist in the public board. Just something else to consider. Thank you.

The more classes ofter the better. But we want to keep the quality.

I think this is unacceptable and infuriating. I don't agree with the fact children who are NOT enrolled in French program will have to pay. Why should these kids impacted. As parent I find this very concerning and do NOT support it.

I think you need to assess the impact changing schools can have on the younger children. My daughter is finally after 5 months enjoying her school. Moving kids to satisfy a small portion of the community is not in everyone best interest.

I thought there was a boundary review already in the works for Oakville because of a new development on bronte. Sounds like it is somehibg that needs to be done regardless, so makes sense to start expanding the French program

I totally disagree with this as St Mary is already a school with a large number of students (hence the increasing number of portables) and it wouldn't be fair for the local students to give this opportunity to students from another school area.

I vote for program expansion. Makes sense, other boards have it, we shouldn't be so far behind other school boards

I want to learn French

I wanted to add to my previous submission - boundary review should also consider options to include siblings of existing early FI/FI students for entry in either early FI/FI or non-FI (if they happen to live outside the FI catchment). This again allows for the continuation of a sibling support system, sense of family outside the home, and also contributes to a more effective means for parents to support both kids in the same school (transportation to school, participation in events at the school, building sense of community with the teachers).

I was concerned with the statement "We may need to hire uncertified and/or unqualified teachers". I believe we would be doing a disservice to the program by using unqualified teachers if the proper interpretation is that their French language teaching skills are not meeting the requirement. I am concerned that this would effectively dilute the value for the French immersion student population and it would be better off to be smaller if that was a constraint. If it was the case the case that it was Public School Board teacher moving to the Catholic Board I do not have an issue.

I was shocked when I'm moved to Oakville to find out that the French program was so small. We used to live and Toronto and it felt

Like every other school offered French. Starting in JK! This is crazy. Please add more classes, I would like my child to have the opportunity to be in French Immersion.

I would like the French Immersion program to be made available at St Anne rather than having to go to a different school. Being bilingual in Canada is important and would provide our children with additional tools to succeed in the future.

I would like to avoid as much school boundaries disruption as possible. My son is in an English program, and he will be suffering in the future.

I would like to expand the program to more schools in the area because I had to remove my child from a previous acceptance in grade 1 french immersion due to logistics, now I have to wait until grade 5, don't want this to happen to the kid I have in

I would like to express my concerns over the potential requirement to change school boundaries due to expanding the French program. When we moved to Oakville just a year and a half ago we specifically looked in areas that had good school ratings. I would be devastated to learn if we would need to change to a school with lower ratings than the one we are currently enrolled at. I also feel that only a small portion of the HCSB community will benefit from this expansion while potentially many more could be negatively impacted by a board wide boundary change. I would not like my child to be registered in a program when I am not sure where he will be located in years to come. Would like to have a boundary review done first, then expand the French program.

I would not like to see regular (Non-French Immersion) boundaries changed. Students have established friendships which enhance their development and I would not like to see this disrupted due to programming changes. This is especially important for my son, who like many of his friends, is an only child. My husband and I consider this so important that we have delayed moving until our son finishes school so that he can remain in the school zone.

In order to provide comments, I need to understand what changes would occur to the boundaries. Would my school boundary be expanded? Please confirm

In reviewing the plan for french expansion it does not seem well planned out! Combined grades in an FI program, especially at the primary level is a disaster and will minimize the quality of language instruction. A combined 1/2, as an example is a difficult split as the students are at such different reading levels and language acquisition. In these most formative years with the addition of second language instruction combined grades would be detrimental to the quality of the program. Also, i think that it needs to be clear how the board will be hiring these teachers when other boards in the province i.e. Peel, are decreasing their french program due to a shortage of french teachers in the country. And hiring unqualified teachers who speak french would be disrespectful to the profession and to the students in the program.

Increasing the French Grade 1 program is exactly what Burlington needs. Language education provides our children with valuable life/learning experience that will lay the foundation for character development for the rest of their lives. At the end of the day, this is what early education is all about; developing a child's character and preparing them to be the best Canadian citizens they can be.

It is a terrible idea. There is already a big shortage of qualified Catholic french teachers in the province/board. There is no point in expanding the program without qualified teachers.

It is difficult to have siblings separated now that FI has s at different schools. Having the school bus service allows the siblings to stay together on the bus at least so that it makes logistics a bit easier for parents. However, ideally, siblings would be together at the same school if they are all in FI programs.

It is extremely hard to comment on any impact when the impact is not detailed. A blanket statement that this may impact boundaries is not sufficient information to validate any decision making process. We need clear maps with new boundaries first

It is ridiculous that our Board is the only Board that can't seem to get its act together when it comes to French immersion. Every other Board seems to be able to deal with the staffing and accommodation challenges. Is it fair that only 138 kids in all of Halton Region should be able to access this programming? Hamilton, Peel, Brantford, York and Toronto Catholic boards all seem to be able to make it work. The Board needs to expand its recruitment efforts. It's time to strengthen the FSL offerings at HCDSB.

It is UNACCEPTABLE to even entertain the idea of boundary changes that will affect and displace ENGLISH speaking children from their HOME school to accommodate a small percentage of parents wanting their children in French Immersion!

It should be at two schools in Burlington. Not just one

It was briefly noted that unqualified teachers may be needed to provide the French program. This is a very bad idea and has so many faults. The separate school board should have quality and excellence as a top priority.

It was short-sighted to have this program at St. Scholastica in the first place. Our school is growing and there will be no room for F.I. in the future. You should still expand the program, but should look at moving it in future years to smaller schools in more established neighbourhoods that have more predictable enrollment.

Just keep it the way it is. Teach french from grade 4 to 8

Keep as status quo. Expansion at this time would mean that schools would be beyond capacity in some areas and impact class sizes, boundaries, over capacity on school community, school dynamics and school climate. Until renovations to schools happen to accommodate all the extra students and staff, things should be left status quo. Don't put the wagon before the horse. Implement safe schools that can accomodate for the changes before moving students into already over crowed schools. Safety of students and staff should be considered before making and implementing such changes. Schools for example like St. Gabriel for example already have ridiculously large class sizes in the English panel for those students who are in the catchment area who have chosen not to go into French Immersion. This impacts greatly on quality of education for the English stream who have an upward of 36:1 ratio in the upper grades because of kids who begin in the FI program and then all of sudden drop out of the program and end up back in the English stream again, thus putting a strain on teachers and class sizes and quality of education for these students.

Keep the status quo in all french programs. We do not have enough qualified French Teachers to cover the number of classes we have now. Don't spend the money and time on this issue.

Let expand the program, give each child an opportunity to speak french!!!

Let not deny kids of opportunities

Like many parents enrolled in the EFI program at St. Mary, it is also our home school. (changing the boundary will not affect us) We are in favor of expanding the program as long as it stays at St. Mary. I understand that there are some parents that are not happy with the french program as it increases the numbers at the school, and they are asking to move the program to another school. We are not in favor of that. We have two kids in the EFI program (we were lucky) however I understand that if you have two children and one does not get into the program it can be challenging. Both our kids have formed friendships with both the English and French students at the school and we feel that moving the program would be detrimental to their social, emotional and academic development. Therefore if expanding the program means that it will move to another school then we would not be in favor of expanding the program, unless it is grandfathered in.

Thank you for all your hard work on this program.

Looking forward to applying for my son next year, more spots would make it less stressful. Please expand

Milton needs a second FSL elementary school. The new designated school is just not practical away the complete south west end of town. Doesn't help parents at the north east side of milton.

Milton parents want FI. The waitlist proves this. This 'Boundary Review' sure looks like a scare tactic to make English parents speak out against FI. We're talking about 40 more students at 4 schools, and 7 new teachers. These aren't big numbers. With a little bit of work, these students can be accommodated for, and teachers can be found. I will be very disappointed in the HCDSB if they choose not to expand. So much so, that my children may change to the HDSB for their FI needs.

More information and details about the actual changes to boundaries should be presented, so parents see how it will impact them.

More instability & controversey is the last thing that a Catholic school board needs in this province. Extinction is never far away & is looming. Why would HCDSB even consider risk making parents angry like this?

Movement of any students that are entering grade 8 in the 2020/21 school year should be avoided. It would be disruptive in their last year in a school community to transfer and possibly be separated from their known peers.

My child has already had to be moved because of French Immersion and boundary changes. She moved in Grade 2 from St Catherine's to St Brigid. We live in Stewart's Mill and I please ask that you do not make students from SM change schools again.

My child is on the waitlist. Please give him the opportunity to join FI in September like his siblings by adding 46 spots. Thank you.

My children are both in the English program at St. Mary's in SK and Grade 3. We really enjoy the school and we would like our children to remain attending the school. I have a number of concerns with the proposals concerning French school. The first is the expansion of the program which, based on existing enrollment, will result in an increase in portables. The use of portables is less than ideal. Having a class inside the school is the preferred option, especially with younger kids with the need to go in and out of the school for various reasons. Other concerns include no cap on enrolment. If this could result in St. Mary's becoming a French immersion only school, that is a big concern to our family. We do not want our children sent to other schools in the area, likely resulting in friends being split up with children at various schools in the area. We also want to continue attending a school close to our home. A boundary review would put that in jeopardy. Our children may be separated from their friends and forced to attend another school. We hope that the concerns of the school community are taken into consideration when making this decision.

My children are enrolled in grades 3 and 7 and would not be affected. However, I would support additiona French immersion so long as it does not negatively affect teacher to student ratios for non-french immersion classes.

This is an issue with the current number of classes, not to mention the problem will be compounded if the program is expanded. What can the Board do to secure French teachers- can hiring occur earlier before teachers are done teacher's college with an intent to hire letter for candidates? When hiring is left too late candidates have been secured by other Boards. Can current French teachers be examined across the system- with applicable candidates deployed by human resources based on education and training to the best suited programs based on their training/education? There is no point to expand the program if a hiring and staffing allocation plan is not undertaken at the Board level with regards to French teachers.

If boundaries change and I cannot get a spot at a new school that is a huge problem for our family as both parents work full time. Will there be some sort of compensation for uniforms? my daughters are in extended French. French teachers are already scarce, how does the board propose to find more? earlier core French and the n adequate support of the extended French program would be a better option across all the schools.

My family and I are big supporter of the expansion for the French program, we wish to find more French programs in more catholic schools especially in Oakville, thank you for your hard work and continues hard work .

My family would be happy to have a French immersion class in our beautiful Canadians Martyrs Catholic school. It will help me to keep my kids at the same location.

My highest priority is the quality of teaching staff. Program expansion should only be done when there are sufficient teaching resources. Reading that there are 5 teachers working in the french program currently without proper accreditation is very concerning as a parent. What's the point in having my kids in the program if the quality is poor? I appreciate the outreach strategy, but until you have a greater pool of candidates to chose from (and this notes a decline in graduates) why are we even considering expansion? If the quality declines, I'll have to pull my children out of the program and then you'll have a another issue all together with low enrollment in the higher grades

Currently, I have 2 kids in the FI program at 2 different schools. Is there was a possibility of one school dedicated to the french programs, could you find savings? Since most kids are out of boundary already & transportation costs are high already, is a single, dedicated school for french learning where the program could be more fulsome (ie: french assemblies, announcements, etc).

If there comes a point where my children are learning in split grades year over year, I will pull them from the program

My kid is out of boundary and attends a non-FI school. I'm not clear how will this impact her continues acceptance at St Matthew.

My kids come from a bilingual school in Montreal, when we moved to Oakville last year, we were particularly happy to find St Mary , knowing that not only our children will continue to learn both French and English but that they will do so in a Christian environment . My oldest girl's class is in a portable and I never even once heard her complain about that, because for her it is her classroom and she find it quite fun to be the first one outside for recess. Being bilingual I can truly say that learning a second language can only benefit the children, so I hope that the board would make the right decision and expand the French immersion program .

My kids have already had their boundries switched due to the french program. It amazes me how a small percentage of the student population can effect changes to other schools. How about the needs of the other children be considered for a change?

My kids love their school. all of the there friends are at there. Please do not do this.

My kids will be Grade 6 and 8. Does this expansion affect kids who are near the end of their Primary school years? I would not be happy to have to move my children in the final couple of years due to boundary changes. While I support giving parents the option of choosing English or French instruction for their children, I don't want the English students forgotten or negatively affected in the process.

My only concern is for students. Those who are already in an extended French program should be left at the school they are currently attending and not be affected by the boundary review. The boundary review should apply to incoming students only.

My only concern is the impact on the core French program teachers as there is lack of teachers to fill current French LTO positions. When the regular French teacher was on maternity leave at my child's school this position was not filled for two months. There was many different supply teachers but the students did not receive French instruction until a French teacher was hired two months later. This was a planned, known absence. Not sure if this is a HR issue, re: supply teachers or just a French issue???

Opening up as much space as possible for all FI students who want to attend would be my preference

Option A: "grandfathering out students is too expensive" - the cost seems to override the needs of families and students well being and it doesn't seem fair to those programs they should be able to. Especially if the board is willing to spend \$200k the first year on portables and bussing! This option also has combined FI grades not acceptable for a specialized program.

With a shortage of qualified of french teachers none of these options are sustainable for the 2020 school year.

Suggestion: Hire french teachers (with the understanding that they are in a holding pattern for future FI) for regular programs and when you have enough to sustain an expansion reallocate the teachers to the french program.

Expand the program starting in 2021 when the teachers are hired and the locations sorted out so parents understand where and how long the students will be at the school. They deserve full disclosure

Our Board is an English board. In a time of scarce resources, where children are not getting the supports they need, it should focus on offering education to students in English in their home schools. French Immersion does not benefit the many children with special needs who are usually advised not to attempt the additional challenge of learning in French.

Given the scarcity of truly qualified French Catholic teachers, it would be best to scrap French Immersion and put additional resources into Core French. It is not acceptably to purport to offer a French Immersion program and then have teachers who cannot properly teach in French.

If there is to be an expansion of the French Immersion program, it absolutely should not result in boundary reviews for the English program. Students should be able to attend the school closest to their home without it being overpopulated due to children coming in to attend an optional program.

Our Board's FI program is only 2% of its total population. It's time to expand for 2020.

Our child will be entering Grade 7 in the 2020/2021 school year. He has attended SJPII since JK. If any boundary review would require him to move schools, we would be vehemently opposed to same. Our reasons for which are numerous but likely obvious to any parent.

Parents who are pushing for French immersion enrolment to be unlimited are delusional and don't understand the reality that there simply aren't enough French qualified teachers to staff the program. The board needs to stop buckling under pressure to these parents. Back in 2017 the board presented all the reasons why extended French was a more feasible program for the board to continue and recommended that the French immersion program be discontinued. However, trustees went against this solid recommendation and here we are today with many French immersion classes not having French a qualified catholic teachers. Please don't continue down this downward spiral. Out of all the options presented, choose the most conservative one of only increasing the program by another class, not the unlimited enrolment option. Please consider the boundary review impact on non-french immersion students. I do not support other children having to leave a community that have established relationships so that the french immersion program can be expanded.

Please consider the impact of a French program on those who want to keep their kids in the English stream. We believe French programming doesn't add without taking away a whole lot too. The unintended consequence of French programming is that special needs are being segregated primarily to the English stream, adding even more classroom disruptions and violence in English classrooms. Until the board tackles this issue (reduce the incidents of disruption and violence in the class, require assessments before violent children return to the class and increase funding for kids who require extra support) then adding French just exacerbates an already glaring problem. We have loads of data from the public board that French programming has significantly fewer children with behaviour difficulties. Added to this "two tiered" system is a very real lack of qualified French teachers, school capacity restrictions, class size restrictions and added administration work. The system simply cannot handle the added complexity of adding French. Even if it could, the inequities it creates in the English stream is glaring. We strongly oppose adding further French programming.

Please do not change boundaries where the English kids will be sent to a new school to accommodate more French kids. Please open a south school in Burlington to accommodate an expansion. It is completely unfair to kick out English kids in their own neighborhood for this especially since last year the board wanted to stop the program and this year you can't even get French teachers to fill in for a sick leave. Boundary changes impacting ALL students must be the result of programming that impacts ALL students. Classmates and friends who have cultivated their education together create an environment of support and comfort...boundary changes that result in students transferring schools is detrimental to students social health, learning curve, and overall feeling of community attachment and pride. Bullying, mental health, and violence can all be

disrupted negatively by large changes in daily routine, student population, teacher familiarity, and building familiarity, particularly so when the student sees no necessary reason for the change (l.e. the english stream students who comprise the large majority of the student body).

In addition, there is inconsistency in programming across all HCDSB elementary schools at present. Resources must be spent to equalize the opportunities for ALL students in the board before enhancing a french program that benefits a minority. For ex., a proper music band program.

Thanks for reviewing the waitlists and ensuring that the 180 children who are currently waitlisted, is a top priority. I support expansion of the Gr.1 program

That will be terrific

The background is sparse. I'd like to understand what implications this has for high school once the current grade 1 class is ready to graduate grade 8.

The Board needs to accept the decision of the Board of Trustees in 2017 to make FI permanent at HCDSB. They are mandated to provide the programming to their students. They are not fulfilling their mandate by capping the program at 138 students

The board needs to focus on hiring qualified french teachers to accommodate the existing programs (core extended and immersion) before it considers expansion. My child should not have to learn French from an English teacher and by watching movies in french.

The Board should expand the French Immersion program. The program has been offered by HCDSB since 2012 and has been a permanent program for more than 2 years now. Neighboring Boards, both Catholic and Public, are not only maintaining their programs at a much greater capacity than HCDSB, but are managing to expand them - some with even earlier entry points than Grade 1 - and have been offering French Immersion programming for decades, despite facing the same concerns about staffing and space. It's time for HCDSB to take affirmative action to provide the French language learning opportunities that HCDSB families want and deserve.

The board should stop making excuses and obstacles, hiring French teachers isn't impossible and boundary reviews are a normal part of any developing communities

The boundary review mentioned would be happening regardless of French Immersion expansion since the St. Mary's community is growing due to new residential developments; FI should be expanded as there are numerous students on waiting lists

The choice cannot exist for these students if the board does not expand. The pros of this program would outweigh the displacement.

The current program at which begins in Grade 5 has been very disappointing for our daughter. Her father is completely fluent in French which should have been a great asset but the real problem is the lack of committment with the French teacher, who messed up the school year twice due to maternity leaves. There seems to be a real shortage of French speaking teachers and the substitutes that were brought in to replace her mat leaves were not competent. For the French immersion to work, an investment of better qualified and more committed teachers is necessary.

The expansion should go ahead

The French programming is so much better in other Boards, why are we so far behind the times?

The HCDSB is not keeping up with the learning needs of the 21st century. Our children have been in the board now several years and have not been exposed to 21st century technology and learning practices that include collaboration, critical thinking and the use of technology as there is not enough resources at the school level. Schools need: computers, iPads, laptops, coding programs, robots, etc not spending upwards of \$100 000 per year on bussing and portables for the french program. that will only benefit the few hundred in the board that are interested instead of the vested interest of the other 29 000 (approx) students within the board. Also, the fact the board is entertaining the idea of hiring unqualified teachers for these French roles if they have to is insulting to the profession of qualified teachers and to the students you teach. As a parent of a child who will be starting FI in the fall I would withdraw my child from the program if they were not being taught by a qualified teacher & an exceptional one at that. You are willing to jeopradize the quality of the program to appease a few parents who are upset they are waitlisted. FI is not your Greatest area of need.

The host schools would become too crowded. Even with a boundary reviews, the population would be too high.

The idea that Halton students are "suffering" because of French Immersion is laughable. The program at HCDSB is not nearly large enough to cause any kind of "hollowing out" of the English streams. Portables are part of school life. I went to school in the late 80s and early 90s. My entire grade 9 and 10 years were spent in a portable. Even with the proposed expansion, the FI program will be relatively small compared to the entire student population.

The immersion program is what keeps me employed...this is worrisome that the board does not want to grow like other boards

There already seems to be a shortage of good qualified French teachers. How will the board be able to provide good qualified French teachers for even more classes when there already seems to be a shortage?

There are so many other programs offered to students, why not have French Immersion offered for those students who are gifted in languages?

There definitely needs more FI classes, but as long as students currently enrolled at schools effected by boundary changes can stay at their school

There is a portion of council that are against French language in any form and they are revealing themselves. So unprofessional to have personal agendas. We are taking this to the senior representatives of the Catholic Church provincially and nationally.

There is already a culture of elitism with he french immersion students and parents, adding more french and pushing out English in the school will further isolate the english students. The balance of English classes will also be disrupted as there will be less if a mix of grade levels in the class. Leaving level 1 and 2 learners in english and taking away the diversity that is imperative to learning from peers.

There is already a shortage of French teachers. How will you get french teachers full time and for replacement during leaves of absence that happen very often.

All students should not be re-zoned because a few families did not get into a lottery system program. 46 spots is enough.

NO to adding more classes to an already full school.

There is always so much concern that there aren't enough French teachers to staff FSL programs. However, HCDSB won't be able to attract qualified teachers by continuing to run a pilot program. the neighbouring catholic boards are all running larger programs than HCDSB and they are expanding. Every year HCDSB does nothing is another year we miss out on recruiting good teachers for the program and they are lost to the other Boards. This expansion is minor in scale and, practically speaking, will only require the recruitment of three additional FI teachers (one for site where expansion will occur - Milton, Burlington, and Oakville, as the waitlist in Halton Hills is not large enough to support an additional class. If the Board can't recruit 3 French teachers in 10 months then there are bigger issues.

There is demand for the program so expand it. Follow the HSB or they will be laughing taking our kids, because ppl are leaving our board to give their kids the opportunity.

There is not enough French teachers to execute on any of these options. According to your own documents we already have staffing issues with the current program.

There may be challenges with the administration of FI but, at the end of the day, FI is a permanent program offering at HCDSB and the Board needs to come up with strategies and find a way to make it available to more than just 138 kids annually. Strong FI programs will mean that more qualified FI teachers will be entering the workforce.

Unfair to have our children going through a change of school. We don't support this.

Until HCDSB solves its staffing challenges with all French programs (the EFI program in particular), expanding the program makes little sense. All stakeholders would end up with more frustrations as pre-existing needs are not met, particularly since the program has not yet reached its full elementary capacity (i.e. next year will be the first year with grade 8 EFI students).

I'm in favour of hiring uncertified teachers (qualified in other jurisdictions, but not yet recognized by OCT) to fill the needs, but I doubt there are enough of those to solve staffing problems. I do have other ideas which may help HCDSB make more efficient use of the resources allocated to the EFI program which I would be happy to discuss, but in the past the HCDSB has been uninterested, repeatedly saying that these ideas are not in the scope/the mandate of the committees I have sat in on.

With regards to split classes: while my children have been lucky to benefit from the absence of them, the fact that the board seems unwilling to combine students in the EFI cohorts into larger junior/intermediate single/split classes - which English stream students have - contradicts the equity policies around EFI.

Uprooting children from their home schools, neighborhoods & friends to accomodate an optional program is unacceptable. If our kids were displaced, we would certainly consider another school board.

We can not change the current system! We're going to effect the English track students for more early French immersion! We already have extended French and that has been going well for years. We're already at a crisis with government cuts, we already have unqualified supply teachers teaching French as fill-ins! The French program is already suffering with French teacher shortages! The idea is unrealistic and catering to a small group while threatening to effect EVERY school is unfathomable! The proposal states that unqualified teacher may be needed? Who wants their kids being taught by unqualified teachers? The extended program was enough! We're trying to keep up with the public board, point blank. The few people on the waiting list is not enough to change the whole system. Early French shouldn't have even been offered in the first place. The split classes are hard enough but the unbalanced classes are worse. Classes aren't blended and usually the 'stronger kids' are in French. This is challenging for regular classes. Especially if the government lifts class size caps! This option needs to be eliminated. Keep extended French only or the current early immersion model!

We certainly need to stop the expansion! We're facing cutbacks for our vulnerable students already. If we do this we create a 2 tier system of education which goes against all our Gospel values! How can we cut services to those students who need extra support and spend all this time on extra resources for a program that can be utilized in gr 5? Split classes, unbalanced classes with the "higher achievers" in french immersion, unqualified teachers, extra money on buses, portables, changing all school boundaries? Why are we even discussing this?? It seems obvious that keeping the status quo is what we need to do. This is not the time to do this. 2 tiered education is already being pushed by the government and should not be pushed by the school board as well. How will this be "education for all?" The high demand of interested applicants clearly shows that there is a definitive need in our community for this type of education and an expansion of this programme would help to enrich the quality of education for a great number of children in our community. Please consider the expansion.

We do not agree with the expansion of French Immersion programming because it will affect the special classes, Gifted Program.

We as a family have gone through great changes to accommodate our children and it would not be fair to have them switch schools again.

Thank you for your understanding

We do not support boundary changes that will affect children having to move schools. This will impact my children's social and academic well being

We do not want the boundaries changed. This would greatly impact our family in a negative way.

We have a child in French immersion. More children should be able to be in French immersion. At the end of the day, if my child has to take a bus due to a boundary change, that's fine.

We have been waiting for the expansion of French immersion for four years. Additional spots would make the process less stressful and reduce parental anxiety. My understanding of the boundary review for St Mary is that it would result in a change of school for a new development that hasn't even commenced. Furthermore, this sounds like an interim step, affects should not be long standing/lasting. Please expand the program

We have been waiting for this program to be expanded since 2016, why is this still being debated. We have lived with the uncertainty of what our 3 children will get I learn and where for 4 years. This is absurd. And so is this survey.

We have no issues with the French program. School does have many kids but kids are happy, have a lot of opportunities, participate in lots of activities- no need to detrimentally affect the program. Expansion makes sense. Too many disappointed kids and families with limited spots. Not fair

We have problems with the program. The school is no busier than other schools in the board that are capacity. Children don't complain, never mentioned any concerns. Program is beneficial, should be expanded

We lose student every year to forest trail if the demand is there as catholic we shouldn't deny it as it would be selfish. Let keep catholic to ensure we retain our catholic schools

We moved to this area because we wanted our child to attend a community school. Our older son was able to enjoy a positive experience. Unfortunately the introduction of the immersion program at SHOJ has turned the experience to be less positive for our younger son. He is not in the immersion program. The school is not equipped to handle the amount of buses coming in and out. I invite you to come one morning to experience the chaos in the parking lot and on the street. Each year we look forward to our son to be taught by certain teachers just to find out that the "best" have been scooped into the French program. This has had a negative impact on academics. I welcome you to look at SHOJ's EQAO scores which are alarmingly low. My son had to spend the first 5 years in a split class. After much campaigning by parents this is the first year that he has not been in a split. Also there is an unfortunate divide because the French kids taunt the kids in the English program. If the desire is to have an immersion program then I suggest that you designate a specific school. The decision to add the program to what was meant to be a community school has been detrimental for our son.

We must be able to hire qualified French teachers before offering this program. We do not currently have enough qualified teachers and there is no certainty that the govt will give us more money for this when they are cutting costs everywhere.

We need a potential map for the boundaries in review to provide an accurate comment.

We need expansion. Boundary reviews have to occur regardless so why are you blaming FI???

We need the program expanded (french in grade 1) so we don't have to send our three children to three different schools... starting french in grade 5 is too late for the average student (straight a student seem to do OK), bussing kids, building and tearing down down portables, ramming schools, etc. negatively impacts the environment, kids wellbeing and stresses parents, etc.

We need to keep the program as is! With government cuts how can we justify the expenditure? We can't service the minority of families. The domino effect is too substantial. Go to extended French. It works and keeps the cost down.

We need to see the boundary changes before you can ask us if we are ok with this. Is this necessary? Is there demand for this? Will this force my school to close?

We need to strengthen our Core French and ensure all student have the proper instruction with qualified teachers first. English stream students should hot have boundaries impacted due to this new program, how does that make sense?

We purposely moved not only into the Millcroft Community but also 2.0km from the neighbourhood school of Sacred Heart. Suggestion: place early french immersion classrooms in each FOS vs. clustering in 1 school putting family's school location at risk despite being in the exact neighbourhood of the school and only 2.0km away from the school. Would this not lesson transportation costs of students as well if they are more local to their FOS vs. for example from the west end of Burlington all the way up to Millcroft?

We recently moved and prioritized staying in our neighborhood so our son would not have to change schools. I would be very disappointed if the school boundary changes resulted in excluding our sons from attending St Benedict

We recently switched our child from HDSB into HCDSB. Since arriving at St Bernadette he has thrived in a way he never did in his old school. I have dealt with HDSB for 10 years and watched as it mishandled the FI program. Boundary changes, program changes, constant chaos and uncertainty. Part of the reason we moved our son is because of the negative way HDSB handled FI and how English students with reading difficulties were completely ignored. I understand the pressure by parents to increase the FI program but I urge you to be thoughtful and careful when increasing the FI program. Please be aware of all the cases of students with learning difficulties who are overlooked by FI and end up shuffled around to different programs and schools.

We should NOT expand the immersion program. It would be ridiculous to change school boundaries for this.

We shouldn't even be talking about spending this kind of money when we're already cutting services, increasing class sizes. Extra split classes in primary grades is an unnecessary outcome when we favor a particular learning group or please particular parents. Unqualified teachers will have zero effect on student learning. We have the extended french program in place and we can keep the early immersion as is. I think parents just want to compete with the public board's model. This model doesn't work for us. Why can't we introduce CORE french a grade or two earlier? Some boards have earlier CORE french and that would expose kids to the language to see if they're truly interested in it. With french immersion, the classes are so unbalanced because many of those students are strong academically, so that leaves the English class balanced, which is not fair to the English stream learners. We need to leave early immersion as is. They'll still succeed and become 21 century learners.

We support the expansion of EFI 100% but feel currently enrolled in the EFI program should continue at their current school. Children who will be newly enrolled into the expansion phase at Gr.1 should be moved to an underpopulated school.

We support the expansion of the Early French Immersion program in the Halton Catholic District School Board. We have been very fortunate to enrol three of our children in the program (two with the first come/first serve enrolment, and one with the present lottery system). Our eldest child is in grade six, and so we have witnessed the life of this program from almost its beginnings. We see the success in learning another language, while keeping up with English learning skills. We celebrate EFI!

The flaw, however, lies in its size. With just over 40 spaces available each year, it exists as an exclusive program. For us, the only answer is to eliminate the wait list and expand the Early French Immersion program.

We presently have one daughter on the waitlist (position number 70). It is our sincere hope that we can offer her the same French AND religious education as her older siblings. We urge you to vote toward expanding the program.

We welcome French Immersion expansion but would be disappointed if our boundary changed and had to be moved if our child did not excel in the program.

We will not be using the FI program, and my biggest concern is my child being relocated from his home school because the FI program is too large and pushing him out. It's happening in other school boards and I do not want it here.

We would be happy to have French offered in our school, as long as the children do not have to change schools and friends due to boundary changes

We would be upset if the boundary for our school changed and we would have to switch to a different school, even though we would not be participating in French immersion.

We would like our children to attend this program.

What happens with the other grades? The message mentioned Grade 1 only

Whatever happens I must insist on keeping the FI program at sacred heart because I have two boys in the FI program already registered and this is the reason why my husband and I moved to Millcroft (to be close to the school). I still have a third child that I need to get into the program once her time comes and I can't have my three children in different schools.

When considering the changes, no child outside the French program should have to change schools because of the changes. If parents want a child in the French program, then they may need to change schools but that is a factor they can consider when deciding whether to enter their child into the program. So no parent is forced to change schools, it will ultimately be their decision

When the extended program was placed at our school we weren't consulted . Why is there a public consultation for early French immersion ? What is the difference?

When will the final decisions regarding new school boundaries be provided

Where are you gonna put more kids? Keep the school as is so it can function as it should.

While I am not opposed to expanding the FI program, I believe that any changes to the children St Nicholas would be detrimental. The boundaries were recently changed to accommodate the merging of St Joseph & St James which was very difficult for the students. In fact, the schools are still adjusting to the merger & now to the physical new school. Modifying the make up of this particular school, especially the removal of any existing streams/programs would only result in added chaos and negative repercussions for all St Nicholas students & families. Please consider excluding this particular school from any changes as the families have already endured significant issues over the last 3 years.

While I fully support the fact that families that want their children to be in French Immersion should have the opportunity to do so, I do not think it should come at the expense of other families that currently have children in a given school. Therefore, I think that any plan to expand the FI program should be done in such a way that families with children currently attending a school should be "grandfathered" and given the option to remain part of that school community regardless of boundary changes until all their children graduate - making the new boundaries applicable only to new families or families that wish to change schools. You cannot underestimate the impact of changing schools to kids that have formed strong friendships and have become part of a community, including getting used to routines, before/after school care, extra curricular activities, etc. Thank you.

While I understand that these are difficult decisions please consider the well being of the students currently enrolled in the FI program as well as the students in the regular stream. I have kids that fall into both of these categories. These are their schools, their friends, all they have known for the last few years. Yes, the program needs to be expanded but start things off fresh at a new school without disrupting the EXISTING student base. I DO NOT agree with having a school that just has FI, the program should be offered at various schools and kids should be in school with kids that are in English stream or FI, there shouldn't be a perception that these kids are different. I have two kids in FI and one in English, they are now completely scared of what is going to happen, if they will be split, if they will have to go to different schools. They are upset, sad, angry as am I that the board can't figure this out. My kids are thriving in the FI program, they are excellent performers and I hope that all these uncertainties does not affect their well-being. Expand the program to schools that are not as populated but DO NOT impact current students, they did not ask for this.

While it sound good to expand the option for early French immersion I also would like that it can be sustainable from a teacher standpoint first and also the number of students at these specific schools that have this program.conside School capacity

While this is great for those students that have won the "lottery" it does place those not in the program at a disadvantage. If the program is offered, it should be available to all those that choose to participate i.e. offer the option at more schools in the Region. If that is not an option - offer the program firstly to those in the appropriate school zones. We purchased our home specifically to be close to our daughter's school yet this expansion may result in us having to move schools - that is not ok! If space is an issue due to the program demands, those children out of the school zone should be displaced, not families that specially purchased housing within the zones.

Our daughter is in grade 1 and is 1 of 5 girls out of 18 children in her class, that is a ratio of nearly 3-1. We were told that "it's just one of those years" however, we know that many of the girls from her kindergarten class "won" the lottery for the french program which in our opinion, threw off the ratios in the G1 classes for girls to boys.

Agreed with the expand the French Immersion program

All students should have the opportunity to learn both of Canada's official languages.

Although I am happy that the French Emmersion may be expanded, I do not agree that the student we are not enroll in the program may result with consequences such may have to be moved from their current schools/friends.

Any expansion of French Immersion (FI) is absolutely welcome. I find the existing "lottery" system almost absurd, especially knowing that children who fail the lottery are refused to join FI when there's an opening (to Grade 3), while also considering that the public school board (HDSB) has multiple FI schools in each city. It is difficult to accept that there are so few students who apply for FI in the Catholic board, relative to the public board; perhaps if there will be an expansion, there may be far more students (parents) who'll be willing to apply for FI.

Philosophically and on a pedagogical basis, the FI program should be standard in the "normal" curriculum; i.e., the FI curriculum is what all students should be taught. Most countries in the world, especially in Europe, teach multiple languages throughout the elementary grades and children become fluent in multiple languages before high school ends; Canada is officially bilingual and should do the same by teaching fluency & literature in both French & English.

As a parent, I would definitely like to see the French Immersion program expanded and be more accessible to children/ families. I feel that is an important opportunity that unfortunately is missed by many. We have registered and are currently sitting on the waitlist- and although it is not exactly a "stressful" situation- it would be helpful to find out sooner where my child's placement will be this coming September.

As a parent, there has been much debate about opening up boundary reviews. I'm ok with the boundary review, but parents should be educated that the Board would use smart judgement and put the additional french program into an area that would need more children, and not displace children from english-only schools that are already at capacity. I think boundary reviews are being used as a scare tactic so parents from english schools do not support the expansion of french immersion with the fear that their children could be displaced. Instead, education on how this would be done would be a great asset for all parents to know.

The Board is doing the right thing with trying to accommodate waitlists into a much sought after french immersion program. I commend you for starting the expansion process and ensuring that our Catholic faith, coupled with french immersion is keeping up with high demand and current times. HCDSB is unfortunately lagging behind in comparison to other Catholic school boards that have listened and accommodated the large need and want from parents to offer more french immersion programs.

As much as I support increasing the French Immersion (FI) program, my concerns is related to the specialized/gifted programs that may be moved/impacted should the decision to increase the FI program be approved.

Currently I have a son in the gifted program at Canadian Martyrs. Canadian Martyrs is an ideal school for the gifted program as it is small and a very tight community. My biggest fear

in moving the gifted program to a bigger school is that the gifted children may be targeted as being "different" resulting to isolation and in a worst case scenario being bullied for being in a specialized program.

Canadian Martyrs being so small doesn't isolate the gifted classes. All children are treated equally and participate in all events. My son is extremely happy not only being in the gifted program but being a student at Canadian Martyrs. He would be devastated if he were to move schools. Also, that may result in his classmates being separated and transferred to different schools which would devastate him as well as he would have to meet new friends / classmates.

Starting a French Immersion school instead of adding classes to current schools should be considered.

As the parent of a child on the wait list for EFI in Burlington, I am excited about the possibility of expanding the program and giving my child the opportunity to learn a second language.

I am, however, concerned about how you will find qualified/certified teachers to deliver the program. While I do see the value of a child being able to speak a second language, I feel strongly that the quality of teachers is much more important and am concerned that the board is contemplating hiring unqualified/uncertified teachers.

Another concern I have is what will happen to the English program at SHOJ. I would like to see the program continue at that school as I feel it is important for children living in the community to be able to attend a Catholic school within their community.

I would like to see the board continue the current EFI program at SHOJ and expand it to include another school, perhaps one with lower enrolment, so that the boundary changes do not negatively affect the current student population and their families. I would like the students who live in the Millcroft neighbourhood to retain the ability to attend a Catholic school in their community.

Burlington, Oakville, Milton and Halton Hills are all growing areas due to residential expansion/development; these boundary reviews, supposedly due to the expansion of FI, will have to occur at some point anyway due to new residential communities.

Children currently enrolled (and future siblings of those currently enrolled need to be grandfathered with the existing boundaries. Early French Immersion should only be offered in schools that are under capacity.

Being as sensitive as possible to those looking for French Immersion - I would argue once more that it would be much easier and less disruptive to our schools and increasing population for them to explore the options currently available vs. expansion and boundary review considerations.

Families already have to juggle so many variables in today's world, so wouldn't it be great if we could just have a little sense of comfort and normalcy with routines that work for the majority.

Having only (1) designated school per City/Town makes it difficult for all parents who live at some distance from that school.

If it is possible, for the expansion, can it mean adding 2 classes in a different school? Also, making the online application for the program a random selection, this makes it difficult for parents with multiples who want to make sure their kids are in the same school. Thank you!

Having taken a high-level glance at the materials, I question the basic cost/benefit of such a move. In particular, what difference adding a maximum of two immersion classes is going to make to address the vast supply vs. demand imbalance for French-based education that currently exists. The short answer in my view is it won't. Many parents (myself among them) did not apply under the current 'lottery' system, which (in my view) fundamentally violates the principle that all students should have equal opportunity to an education (i.e. not left to luck of the draw). In all likelihood, allocating more spots will drive up the number of applicants, resulting in continued wait lists/families not being served. In my view, rather than expanding full French immersion in this way, the demand for French language education would be better addressed by offering extended French in more/every school. Children in the public system have far better access to French at an earlier grade than their Catholic counterparts. As a parent, I find this profoundly disappointing.

Hi

Thank you for the email notification and the opportunity you have allowed for parents to express their questions and concerns.

Having read all the material available, I'm still left with questions as there is no indication whether our school boundary would be affected. Such a change would have significant implications on my family and as a parent, I would ideally like to see these proposed changes before a final decision is made. The information provided so far is unspecific and leaves many outcomes open. It is not possible for anyone affected to take a rational position on this matter with so many unknown variables.

While I appreciate this is a complex decision, I would like to suggest that the proposed changes be accompanied by proposed new boundaries for everyone to consider. I'm sure I would not be alone when I say that our current school boundary was a crucial factor in my family choosing to live in our current neighborhood, which in turn affects many other aspects in our lives.

How much notice will be given to parents who are affected?

I absolutely support the expansion of the French Immersion programming in the Catholic Board. Our daughter was originally enrolled through the public board's immersion program out of fear that our daughter would be unsuccessful with the one-chance Catholic immersion lottery. Consequently the lack of discipline, unstructured class instruction, and systemic bullying inherent in the public school compelled us to explore the Catholic board again. Fortunately, my daughter managed to secure a vacancy in the Catholic French Immersion program and it was life changing. She excelled in the Catholic environment. We knew we could not relent on the French program as she is very adept in the language. We also recognize that learning the language will provide essential opportunities in a progressively competitive job market. Previously a flight attendant only needed to know English. Now all Air Canada flight attendants require French. Increasingly provincial and federal employment opportunities give preference to applicants with French. Because of the highly restrictive lottery system, we will now be struggling to provide our other two children with the same opportunity as their sister.

I agree that expanding the French immersion program would benefit the Catholic school system in Burlington. The board would lose less students to the public board. I have three, soon to be four children in including a child with special needs. We are at the edge of the boundary. I do not want my children to have to move particularly as my special needs child is finally doing quite well. Moving could be very traumatic for her.

I agree with expanding the French Immersion Program. My daughter is in FI Grade 2. We wish for our younger daughter to also have a FI learning experience and I worried that the limited number of spots and the lottery system will limit her access to a Catholic FI education. It feels like we are being forced to chose between a catholic education and French education. Families should have greater access to opt into Catholic French Immersion.

Having siblings at the same school is an important family experience. I do not appreciate the worry that our you get daughter may not be granted a lottery entry into Gr1 Fl and that this would mean she wouldn't be able to attend the same school as her sister as there is no Fl in our home boundary. We have not been granted cross boundary for JK. Again, it feels like the limited Fl is forcing a choice if we want our daughters to grow up at school together, the limited access to Fl forces us to chose - which do we value more educationally- Fl or Catholic in school learning?

I agree with the expansion however, having seen the lack of French teachers first hand, I would suggest seeing the program through grade 12 before expanding in grade 1.

I agree with the plans for expansion of the french immersion program, however, I would like to see it rolled out across multiple schools. It is hard to comprehend why the halton public board can (and has for many years) offer french immersion across multiple schools, yet the Catholic board is struggling to implement such a valuable program.

I am absolutely not in favor of expansion. WE ARE AN ENGLISH BOARD!!!!

Let focus on this and think of ways to improve programming for the majority of the students within our board! French has been a topic for too long now, lets make a final decision that will benefit ALL students not just the French ones.

I am all for French immersions and providing the best education for our children. However, boundary changes will be very disruptive to both parents and students. My kids love their current school (Ascension) and have made many friends. Kids thrive on routine and displacing them to another school and being separated from their friends could be negative to their emotional well-being. If boundaries change, it would be beneficial to consider grandfathering kids already in that school and making the switch to the updated boundary school (if the boundary change affects the family) optional.

I am all for it. The earlier we can have our kids in French Immersion, and the more locations we can have, the better!

I am all for kids learning more. And I think French is very important. I however, do not think nor want the existing boundaries to be moved as it will affect a lot of kids that are jor in the "FI" program (us for one). Please DO NOT move the boundaries.

I am completely against boundaries changing for all of our children.

I am extremely frustrated by the recent up coming changes. We purchased our home so we could be in this catchment and so our children can go to Sacred Heart.

One of my children needs special support and transition is not easy for him. I find it VERY UNJUST that kids who are NOT enrolled in FI would be impacted and penalize if they were to change school and boundaries.

I think it is the board's responsibility to keep in mind those families who are not enrolled and the major impact this future change would have on them.

I am NOT for the expansion of the program. I am not happy about the boundary adjustments that might occur. There are less kids that would be affected by being on a waitlist for the French Immersion program compared to the many kids that may be forced to switch schools because they are no longer in the boundary of the school they attend. There is more of an effect on a greater number of children.

I am not in favour of expansion as I do not believe the board can have the staff to properly support it.

I am not in favour of potentially expanding the French immersion program within our board. We don't have the staff to support our current core French program as it stands, how could we possibly staff the expansion of this program with qualified French teachers. There have been many times at our school where students received an incomplete as a result of not having French teachers to teach core french. This simply isn't feasible. And with regards to

adjusting boundaries, many families have chosen to live where they do in great part due to the school within that region. To change boundaries and force students to be relocated to new schools seems terribly unfair. Particularly if it is a result of expanding a program we simply can't staff.

I am not interested in having my kids in the French immersion program, and would not like to have my kids be in a school that has it. I don't like how it creates a "smart class" and a "not-smart class" (even though my kids could do the French)

I am on board with there being more French immersion options in south Burlington

I am so glad that the board is considering this expansion. I know how important it is for children to another language and I see how much both of my granddaughters enjoy the early French Immersion and how quickly they learn. Children are like sponges and the earlier they are exposed to another language the faster they learn and retain this language. The waitlist of children to enter this program indicates the need for this expansion and continuation of this Program. Opening up more programs ensure that families will no longer be leaving the Catholic board in search of other highly sought after french programming. Thank you.

I am strongly opposed to this. Expanding our Extended French programming at home schools would be much more equitable.

I am supportive of expanding French Immersion; it is a great program. However, I am not in favour of the the program moving away from Sacred Heart of Jesus where my child is already in the program. If it were to move to another school, it would create a hardship for me to transport him out of our neighbourhood.

I am very concerned that my daughter who loves her new school and friends may be forced out. I am not okay with this

I am very happy with the idea of the expansion. However, with the current French teacher crisis, I'm worried that there won't be enough teachers to fulfill the expansion. I am also worried that the program may be moved from it's current location.

I am very supportive of expanding the early French program. Learning a new language has been proven to help with many other academic skills including math and logic. I also believe it's important for us to offer French education in our bilingual cou

I believe the focus should be more on math, science and computer programming and less on French as a second language. considering only 20% of Canadians speak French. (FYI I'm of French decent)

I believe that French immersion expansion is not necessary and will negatively affect the kids in English stream. People treat a French immersion as a 'free private school' and sign up their kids to the French immersion for the wrong reasons. Increased costs of the program is also a consideration especially in today's environment of cost cutting by the province and inability of the (teachers) unions and the Province to sign labour agreements without affecting the students (by school closures).

I believe that instead of expanding number of classrooms at existing schools that you should offer French immersion at more schools. I am from Quebec and would love my daughter to Start French now without having to change schools.

I believe this to be a bad idea. The board seems to have a hard time finding French teachers. Expanding the program won't solve that problem. It's a quality over quantity issue.

I couldn't enroll my daughter in french immersion program because the Burlington school that offers the program is far, if her school will have the program available next year can I enroll her then?

I disagree with it. We don't have the resources. Please do not proceed

I do not agree with expanding this program. I feel that it is incredibly hard to staff these positions with qualified French teachers. Also I wouldn't want my children impacted by the boundary review

I do not believe this program should be expanded. This program is very difficult to staff and is not mandatory. I do not think it is worth the potential disruption for only a small number of students.

I DO NOT support any potential changes to boundaries or changes to any child's placement in an elementary school. We are also not interested in any expansion of the French immersion program. Please keep the status quo and DO NOT interrupt our children's lives!

I do not support boundary changes

I do not support boundary reviews for elementary schools for the purpose of offering more opportunities for French emersion. I do not feel that the broad majority of families and students should have to be impacted to appease the vocal minority.

I do not support the expansion and change of boundaries and specialized program locations I do not support the expansion of the French immersion program and would prefer it to stay at its current size.

I do not think it is fair that many students would have to switch schools ... lose friendships and be uprooted just because more parents want their children in French immersion! SK is way too early to decide if your child can handle French Immersion and if they will be able to survive it! Those parents have other options like wait until Grade 5 and put them in extended French or go to the public board or private school if they really want their child in French Immersion! Many parents bought homes in certain areas because they wanted their child to go to a specific school! Furthermore the public board is having issues at their schools where they have several French Immersion classes in a grade and only 1 English class ... that one class often is looked down upon because they are not in the French Immersion program and considered not as elite as their fellow students!

I do not think this is equitable or fair on multiple fronts. Do not change from the current model

I do not want an expanded FI program. I do not want the boundaries to be impacted as a result as well. I also do not like that there will be increased transportation costs, more portables, and more split classes. FI segregates students. It is difficult to get the psyched assessments and accommodate students with disabilities or learning challenges as it is, which decreases their participation in FI, and therefore creates segregation. FI becomes the publicly funded 'private school'.

According to the Globe and Mail Education reporter Caroline Alphonso, from the article titled

"French immersion causes two-tier school system, data shows": "As parents increasingly choose French immersion, new data from the Ottawa-Carleton school board show that the program is creating a two-tiered system, with new Canadians, children from low-income families and students with special needs overrepresented in English-program elementary schools."

If parents want to further enrich their children with French as second language they should do it on their own time, like done with other languages and extracurriculars.

I do NOT want the boundaries to change

I do NOT want the boundaries to change.

I do not want the boundaries to change. I think consistency is very important to my kids. Along with having to spend money for new uniforms and them making new friends, my kids teachers understand them. Both of my boys are in programs for reading and this program is working great. Changing the school boundaries should not be necessary. There should be other solutions to this problem that does not involve moving kids that do not need to. For those wanting to join the French program they can be bused as it's a program they want for their kids, other should not have to change. Sounds small minded but for the others not asking for a change you have to keep them happy as well

I do not want to change boundaries. You should have the option for French immersion in all schools. Like the Halton public school board.

I do not want to find my children having to attend a new school to accommodate this program.

I don't agree that improving quality of child education will be achieved if unqualified teachers are planned to be hired. I also strongly hope my child's position at his school will continue and that he won't be put in a different school boundary

I don't agree with expanding the French immersion program

I don't believe adding 2 FI classes into all schools will deal with the wait list issues. by doing a boundary review for students who are settled in their current schools with pre and post school care/uniforms/extra curricular activities not to mention new siblings coming into those school would a large disruption to the status quo. Additional classes/portables in current FI schools would address the wait list issue.

I don't believe this initiative should be undertaken. The french program should remain as is. Expansion and any associated impact to students should not occur.

We do not need to spend time and financial resources on the expansion, nor on any studies including boundary re-assignment etc.

The French program is a small proportion of the entire school population. The larger school population should not be potentially impacted by the wishes of a small proportion.

I don't fully understand what these changes could be because the memo was vague but my concern would be if my daughters school was to become a French immersion offering school, I may wish to change my decision to not enroll in French immersion.

I don't think it needs to be expanded.

I don't think the extension of the program is warranted. In your assessment you indicate that you will have to hire a number more French teachers, which all school boards are already finding difficult. In addition you indicate that in order to accommodate this, You "may need to hire uncertified and/or unqualified teachers". This is completely unacceptable to me. The public school system requires certified and qualified teachers. If there aren't enough to deliver the extra programming then it should not be offered. It's that simple. Increased combined (split) classrooms in primary grades also pose a problem and difficulty for those students who don't learn well in that environment.

It is clear that there is not a demand for French immersion in HCDSB as there is in the HD's. In other boards, parents looks to Immersion to get smaller classes and higher functioning students, not Halton.

I urge you to not live forward with this. If it isn't broken, don't fix it. Subsequent boundary reviews are not always effective and are disruptive. Our school just went though one last year. No need to do it again. Spend the time and money where it is needed in the schools and existing classes.

I don't think they should expand the program. The kids don't want to move schools. A lot of kids end up dropping out of the French program anyway and end up in the English program as they move up the grades.

I don't want the boundaries changed. So my feedback would be no - don't expand the program if it means changing the boundaries.

I don't want the program expanded. It's already to disruptive and resources for our school are being misallocated to accomodate other jurisdictions kids.

I feel like you should offer it in all schools or none at all. The bussing and the draw for kids to go and then siblings could be separated is ridiculous. Or just increase the learning of French - can't all jk-8 have a French class 1 time a day??

I feel that expansion is not a reasonable option. Lack of space, overcrowding at schools, long bus commutes and the limited number of qualified French teachers should negate the expansion.

I feel that students living in the boundaries surrounding the school should have priority over the EFI program. Also, there is already not enough staff to fill in supply or maternity leaves for French so how is an expansion of this program?

I fully support and would like to see an expansion to the French Immersion program.

I fully support the potential expansion of the French immersion program as it could open up so many doors for future generations.

I greatly encourage the board to change current practices for French immersion classes. As a French speaking graduate of the French immersion system which existed in Oakville many years ago it is very important for me to send my children to a French immersion school. We now live in the St.Patrick border and are making the decision where to register our daughter who starts school next year. The catholic elementary French immersion track option for our

school is unattractive as the school will be much further from our home than the public school option of Pineland. We really want to enroll her in St.Patricks as we love the school, however the possibility of her being accepted through the lottery system to a school which is so much further away has us leaning more towards Pineland. A new plan for the French immersion track in the catholic board would make the decision of her attending St Patrick's in the fall much easier. I hope that the board will consider the amount of children denied entry in the lottery system right now when making the decision, and I would greatly appreciate the effort put into creating a new plan

I hate the idea of the expansion of French in our school. I do not like that my children who live in the neighborhood could possibly have to attend a school outside of their Neighbourhood because of a French program. I feel that if you want your child to know and learn French then they should attend a French school. I do not think my children should have to potentially be in a portable because of French students. There are not enough French teachers as it is and yet the program wants to expand?? Last year the conversation was about ending the program and this year it's about expanding?? No thank you!

I have great concerns into how this will affect:

- (A) quality of education for those remaining in the English stream classes
- (B) how special education will be affected with spreading resources, and
- (C) changing school boundaries which would be incredibly disruptive.

Likewise I am concerned we are prioritizing parent pressure for French over improving core subjects such as math and English language.

I have also seen how split schools create a demographic, socioeconomic divide between students which I believe to be harmful.

I need more information on which families at which schools will be impacted with boundary changes.

I shall vote in favour of the expansion of French Immersion program.

I think it's an excellent idea and hope it is offered at St. Patrick's School.

I think it's really great to expand the FI program. Would like to see a FI grade 1 track program in a South Burlington (south of the OEW) Catholic School.

Boundary reviews and changes are not an issue for me. They're inevitable with population changes in communities.

I think the school community would be served better by instead of adding 2 more classes to the existing school, adding those classes to a school in the south part of the city (St. Paul, St. John, St. Patrick, Ascension). We would love to send our son to immersion but decided against it as the travel to Sacred Heart is just too far. I think that having an immersion school in both the north and south ends of the city would open up the program to more people. As of now, I feel the north has an unfair advantage. Also it could keep fuel costs for bussing down as routes would be shorter. We would definitely register if the classes went to a school in the south end. Thank you.

I will not be happy if my English speaking children are relocated from our HOME school to another due to this change. I will remove my two children from hcdsb and send them to Florence Meares due to location as a result. I am not interested in busing my walking children to another catholic school.

I would be against it as it would separate kids from their friends. As lots of kids have trouble in a social environment and making friends is very hard for them, re-doing the boundaries is not a good decision.

I would be cautious about changing boundaries. Please remember that as parents/consumers (taxes to Catholic education) that we have a choice.

If we are no longer within the boundary of our current school we have a choice to take our children and in essence our monies to the Public board and school in our neighbourhood. That's what I will do. We will move our children over to the Public School in our neighbourhood.

I feel this would allow the program to be accessed by a wider number of families regardless of socioeconomic status.

I would like to voice my disapproval of the plan to expand the French program.

I would love for FI to be available at St.Elizabeth Seton. Currently the demand is way greater than the supply. As a multi-lingual family we welcome the idea of FI expansion

I would love the chance for my so to go to FI, he is currently number 10 in the waitlist in Burlington. We were kore than disspointment that he was not picked. If this means he would get in we are all for it

I would NOT like if the boundary review to affected my children (either directly or indirectly - if it affected their classmates/friends). Please leave as is! Thank you

I would suggest that you consider the addition of the French Immersion to another school and kept the boundaries as is to the existing schools.

Perhaps a school in South Burlington for those who are interested in sending their children into the French Immersion track and for those who are being bused to North Burlington.

I know if you change my boundary and my children are affected - 3 affected out of our 5 children. We would enrol them in the public school closest to us.

If the boundaries are changed and we are no longer in the boundaries a school move will affect my child's mental health as she has a very hard time coping with change and just started at st.john last year.

If there is an interest in French Immersion programs, I'd be very disappointed if our children would be forced to move schools. I think having a French Immersion school on it's own would be a better option. Those students could be bused.

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If they do a boundary change then we will be taking our kids out of the Catholic board and putting them in the Public school that is walking distance from our house. If they want to expand the program, they should look at doing a school in the south of Burlington to cover the city evenly.

If trustees decide to do this, I will definitely move my kids to the public board.

I'm in support of this change.

My one ask is that all siblings stay in the same school to ease logistics for parents. I have two children in the Early French Immersion program and my third child has been denied cross boundary requests to attend the same school in the English stream. I recognize that if it stays a lottery system to be admitted into French Immersion that he may not be admitted into the program when he is in Grade 1 but I am hoping that he is reserved a spot in the English stream at the same school.

Thank you for trying to explore this option - I know it isn't easy!

I'm not in favour of expansion if it impacts school boundaries. To think our school community would be impacted, never mind the waste of money, to benefit a small portion of families is ridiculous.

I'm not in favour of the possible changes to the current elementary school boundaries if this means that my children will have to moved to another school. They dont need to feel like they're being punished by having to leave the school and friends they have just to make way to expand the program.

It is extremely valuable to our children to have the possibility to have French Immersion Catholic school as an option. Increasing classes from 2 to 4 classes provides more opportunities to more students.

It should be at two schools in Burlington. Not just one

It would appear that there is once again a potential for families to be impacted by a decision that benefits the few. My school community was negativity impacted by the decision to move our school start time by 10 mins,in order to accommodate busing (which in my viewpoint is unnecessary). This resulted in families leaving our school. I would not want to see any further impacts on the Ascension community with changes to school boundaries only to accommodate a handful of parents who are interested in pursuing French Immersion for their children.

It's disheartening that FI is being blamed for inevitable boundary reviews. Please expand for 2020.

It's time yo take this small step towards expansion. Adding a maximum of 46 spots per city is better than nothing.

Just don't force my kids to change schools. They are both in walking distance from home, we chose to live where we are because it is close the elementary and secondary school. You will get a lot of angry parents if you force them to switch schools. Did you even ask parents if French Immersion is that important to them?

Just keep it the way it is. Teach french from grade 4 to 8

Keep as status quo. Expansion at this time would mean that schools would be beyond capacity in some areas and impact class sizes, boundaries, over capacity on school community, school dynamics and school climate. Until renovations to schools happen to accommodate all the extra students and staff, things should be left status quo. Don't put the wagon before the horse. Implement safe schools that can accomodate for the changes before moving students into already over crowed schools. Safety of students and staff should be considered before making and implementing such changes. Schools for example like St. Gabriel for example already have ridiculously large class sizes in the English panel for those students who are in the catchment area who have chosen not to go into French Immersion. This impacts greatly on quality of education for the English stream who have an upward of 36:1 ratio in the upper grades because of kids who begin in the FI program and then all of sudden drop out of the program and end up back in the English stream again, thus putting a strain on teachers and class sizes and quality of education for these students.

My children have adjusted really well to the school. I want them to keep going to the same school until grade 8. They really enjoy the French immersion program and do really well.

My daughter is not currently enrolled in French in st Johns but if the option was available at St. John I would enroll her. In my opinion if St. John's had more French options that would be a strength to further enhance the school.

My daughter, is a special needs student, if the boundaries were to change and she had to attend a new school, it would be a huge detriment to her progress. She has made so much progress over her last three years at St. Timothy's school. We love the staff and other families that attend, it's a very close community. They created a sensory room at the school which has been a great tool/reward for my daughter. She has special supports set up in the bathroom and staff who are familiar with her needs and always there to help her. I know arrangements will be made wherever she goes, but the staff members and friends she has made will not.

I know the emailed stated the vote will be on Feb 18/20, at this point in time do you know which schools will possibly be affected by the boundary change? Or when this information will become available? There are many factors that need to be taken into consideration. Registration for the YMCA before and after school program will be starting soon. If boundaries change and I cannot get a spot at a new school that is a huge problem for our family as both parents work full time. Will there be some sort of compensation for uniforms?

My family would be happy to have a French immersion class in our beautiful Canadians Martyrs Catholic school. It will help me to keep my kids at the same location.

My only concern is the impact on the core French program teachers as there is lack of teachers to fill current French LTO positions. When the regular French teacher was on maternity leave at my child's school this position was not filled for two months. There was many different supply teachers but the students did not receive French instruction until a French teacher was hired two months later. This was a planned, known absence. Not sure if this is a HR issue, re: supply teachers or just a French issue???

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My only concern is the potential change in boundaries for schools. If there is a change to the boundary lines, I would strongly suggest exempting existing students so that they are allowed

to remain in their respective schools until graduation and only enforce the new boundaries on future students.

My son is accepted to the gr 1 French immersion program. I have been advised that my daughter who starts JK next year almost certainly won't be accepted into sacred heart of Jesus school for JK due to boundaries. Siblings should stay together.

My understanding is that there are not enough qualified French language teachers to fulfill the needs of the existing early and middle immersion programs. Without fluent French teachers who are also primary qualified I don't see how this expansion is a possibility.

Our Board is an English board. In a time of scarce resources, where children are not getting the supports they need, it should focus on offering education to students in English in their home schools. French Immersion does not benefit the many children with special needs who are usually advised not to attempt the additional challenge of learning in French.

Given the scarcity of truly qualified French Catholic teachers, it would be best to scrap French Immersion and put additional resources into Core French. It is not acceptably to purport to offer a French Immersion program and then have teachers who cannot properly teach in French.

Reject the proposal to expand. This is an english board. The french program is a complement to, not replacement for, the excellent english and religious programming of the HCDSB. Boundary changes impacting ALL students must be the result of programming that impacts ALL students. Classmates and friends who have cultivated their education together create an environment of support and comfort...boundary changes that result in students transferring schools is detrimental to students social health, learning curve, and overall feeling of community attachment and pride. Bullying, mental health, and violence can all be disrupted negatively by large changes in daily routine, student population, teacher familiarity, and building familiarity, particularly so when the student sees no necessary reason for the change (l.e. the english stream students who comprise the large majority of the student body).

In addition, there is inconsistency in programming across all HCDSB elementary schools at present. Resources must be spent to equalize the opportunities for ALL students in the board before enhancing a french program that benefits a minority. For ex., a proper music band program.

The background is sparse. I'd like to understand what implications this has for high school once the current grade 1 class is ready to graduate grade 8.

The board needs to focus on hiring qualified french teachers to accommodate the existing programs (core extended and immersion) before it considers expansion. My child should not have to learn French from an English teacher and by watching movies in french.

The information you have given out is very vague. You have not addressed busing. As my son is in the gifted program at Canadian Martyrs is there any impact to him or the gifted program??

The main concern is disrupting children in their current school where they have friends and know the teachers. If boundaries change i strongly feel that they apply only to new registrations or students have the option to stay or go to their new schoo

The verbiage in your correspondence is intentionally promoting negative feedback. Expansion is well overdue.

We do not agree with the expansion of French Immersion programming because it will affect the special classes, Gifted Program.

We as a family have gone through great changes to accommodate our children and it would not be fair to have them switch schools again.

Thank you for your understanding

We moved to this area because we wanted our child to attend a community school. Our older son was able to enjoy a positive experience. Unfortunately the introduction of the immersion program at SHOJ has turned the experience to be less positive for our younger son. He is not in the immersion program. The school is not equipped to handle the amount of buses coming in and out. I invite you to come one morning to experience the chaos in the parking lot and on the street. Each year we look forward to our son to be taught by certain teachers just to find out that the "best" have been scooped into the French program. This has had a negative impact on academics. I welcome you to look at SHOJ's EQAO scores which are alarmingly low. My son had to spend the first 5 years in a split class. After much campaigning by parents this is the first year that he has not been in a split. Also there is an unfortunate divide because the French kids taunt the kids in the English program. If the desire is to have an immersion program then I suggest that you designate a specific school. The decision to add the program to what was meant to be a community school has been detrimental for our son.

We must be able to hire qualified French teachers before offering this program. We do not currently have enough qualified teachers and there is no certainty that the govt will give us more money for this when they are cutting costs everywhere.

We need to see the boundary changes before you can ask us if we are ok with this. Is this necessary? Is there demand for this? Will this force my school to close?

We need to strengthen our Core French and ensure all student have the proper instruction with qualified teachers first. English stream students should hot have boundaries impacted due to this new program, how does that make sense?

We purposely moved not only into the Millcroft Community but also 2.0km from the neighbourhood school of Sacred Heart. Suggestion: place early french immersion classrooms in each FOS vs. clustering in 1 school putting family's school location at risk despite being in the exact neighbourhood of the school and only 2.0km away from the school. Halton Hills is different than the rest of the board, not a lot of schools and the decision should be made carefully.

Every effort should be made to keep families together. If all members are in eng or Fi programs they should not be split between schools.

Everything about this proposal upsets us. As a family with a child who didn't get into early FI due to a lottery a few years ago and another child about to start FI in the fall we find this proposal absurd. Parents will get over if their child does not get into the FI program. Perhaps, if the lottery isn't working equitably we should be applying for the program based on a variety of critieria: academic achievement in K, behaviour, parent commitment to learning etc. Expanding the FI program to accommodate a few hundred students on a waitlist in a school board of over 30, 000 students is absurd. Do I want my third child to have an option of FI, of course, but not at the cost of English programming, boundary changes etc. The idea of potentially bussing English stream students out of their home school in Halton Hills needs to be removed from the options because there are so many neighbourhoods in Halton Hills without a school in the neighbourhood and families that live in a walking distance to a school chose their home deliberately for that reason and for their children not to have to be bussed to school even if the home was more money. This expansion needs to be withdrawn.

Halton Hills is 85% English speaking and only 1.9% have French as their mother tongue (1135 people at last Census). It is NOT reasonable to displace English speaking kids from their school via a boundary review to accommodate this small French group.

I would love to be able to enroll my grade 5 daughter in the French program at her existing school but registration is not available for next year. My other 2 kids are currently in the program, the school is in walking distance and I don't want to separate my kids

I wouldn't like to see the french immersion program be moved to another school as has happened in the past. This cause families with more than one child to have to go to more than one school to drop off and pick up their kids if they want all of them be in the french program. This is a common concern and complain of many families in Georgetown.

If the board terminates French immersion programs this will mean job loss at the secondary level for the future

In reviewing the plan for french expansion it does not seem well planned out! Combined grades in an FI program, especially at the primary level is a disaster and will minimize the quality of language instruction. A combined 1/2, as an example is a difficult split as the students are at such different reading levels and language acquisition. In these most formative years with the addition of second language instruction combined grades would be detrimental to the quality of the program. Also, i think that it needs to be clear how the board will be hiring these teachers when other boards in the province i.e. Peel, are decreasing their french program due to a shortage of french teachers in the country. And hiring unqualified teachers who speak french would be disrespectful to the profession and to the students in the program.

It is difficult to have siblings separated now that FI has s at different schools. Having the school bus service allows the siblings to stay together on the bus at least so that it makes logistics a bit easier for parents. However, ideally, siblings would be together at the same school if they are all in FI programs.

It is great for new students. I just wish this was considered 2 years earlier when my child was trying to get into the program when it was capped at 2 grades, causing my child to not make the cut.

It is UNACCEPTABLE to even entertain the idea of boundary changes that will affect and displace ENGLISH speaking children from their HOME school to accommodate a small percentage of parents wanting their children in French Immersion!

It will be really hard on my children if they have to attend a different school.

It's great that the French Immersion program is expanding. But I certainly do not think it would be fair to move around the boundaries. My son started JK in September, he loves his school St. brigid, he loves his classmates. To think he would basically be starting over terrifies me. As most kids his age change isn't a good thing. We are blessed that he has found his 'home' away from home. Please to do not impact these little beings who find change so difficult.

Option A: "grandfathering out students is too expensive" - the cost seems to override the needs of families and students well being and it doesn't seem fair to those programs they should be able to. Especially if the board is willing to spend \$200k the first year on portables and bussing! This option also has combined FI grades not acceptable for a specialized program.

Option B: negatives - combined grades, extraordinary cost, unqualified teachers, no real plan to recruit teacher, schools can't hold the students which means lots of students will be uprooted.

OPTION C: Completely unrealistic.
OPTION D: unrealistic and expensive

With a shortage of qualified of french teachers none of these options are sustainable for the 2020 school year.

Suggestion: Hire french teachers (with the understanding that they are in a holding pattern for future FI) for regular programs and when you have enough to sustain an expansion reallocate the teachers to the french program.

Expand the program starting in 2021 when the teachers are hired and the locations sorted out so parents understand where and how long the students will be at the school. They deserve full disclosure

Our concerns stem from keeping siblings in the same schools. Our eldest started the Grade 1 Extended French Immersion program in the 2017-2018 school year, at St. Brigid's.

The program has since been moved to St. Catherine's, where in 2020-2021 our youngest child will start the Grade 1 Extended French Immersion program.

We have learned that we are not the only family affected by this change, having multiple children in different schools.

We would like to see a change that would allow for the program to be offered at one school only.

We like sibling to be kept together.

Students currently in a school should not have to change schools to accommodate a new program.

The HCDSB is not keeping up with the learning needs of the 21st century. Our children have been in the board now several years and have not been exposed to 21st century technology and learning practices that include collaboration, critical thinking and the use of technology as there is not enough resources at the school level. Schools need: computers, iPads, laptops, coding programs, robots, etc not spending upwards of \$100 000 per year on bussing and portables for the french program. that will only benefit the few hundred in the board that are interested instead of the vested interest of the other 29 000 (approx) students within the board. Also, the fact the board is entertaining the idea of hiring unqualified teachers for these French roles if they have to is insulting to the profession of qualified teachers and to the students you teach. As a parent of a child who will be starting FI in the fall I would withdraw my child from the program if they were not being taught by a qualified teacher & an exceptional one at that. You are willing to jeopradize the quality of the program to appease a few parents who are upset they are waitlisted. FI is not your Greatest area of need.

As a elementary teacher with experience in the primary grades, and specifically grade one, I am very opposed to the plan to expand French Immersion programming.

With possible cuts looming to special education, English language learners and vulnerable students needing special supports in our board, how can the expansion of an optional, non-essential program be justified? At a cost of at least \$217,466 for the first year only, with additional costs every year the program runs for staffing and transportation, this specialized programming would be diverting funds from students that are truly at risk in our board. Taking from vulnerable students to fund an advanced program is wrong.

From an education standpoint, there is no benefit to starting French instruction in grade one, as opposed to starting French instruction in grade 5, through the extended French program that is already established in our board. As an educator, I feel that it is important for students to first establish strong literacy skills in English in the formative primary grades, especially if the child is also an English Language Learner. This foundation allows for success in the grade 5 extended program.

As a French speaker, I want my child to have the opportunity to pursue French Immersion.

As a parent of a child in the french Immersion program, it saddens me that I can't provide the same opportunity for my second child because of space limitation. Every child should have an equal option to learn the second official language of Canada.

As a parent of a child who has special learning needs I am concerned about boundary changes that will affect our family. My child would be directly disadvantaged by changing school as a result

As a parent, I am opposed to the plan to expand the early French Immersion program.

Our schools were not designed to house specialized programs. They were designed to accommodate the needs of growing communities such as St. Scholastica, where French Immersion may not be the first priority of the families in this community. To disrupt the boundaries for ALL families, in order to satisfy the demands of a small vocal parent community, is not equitable.

The expansion of this program would involve great demands on staffing. It is already difficult in our board to hire qualified teachers for this program as it is. Hiring uncertified and unqualified teachers would have a direct impact on the quality of the program. What is the point of expanding a program, only to have the quality of education decrease for the students? Add to this the increase of the number split classes, which is not optimal for student learning or success.

The funds needed to implement this expansion (transportation, staffing, portables etc.) should be used for at risk students in our board, such as those needing targeted literacy support, newcomer students and special needs students.

Being a french speaking francophone and having had some issues and pulled my son from the french system I believe this opportunity to extend more french immersion classes so that more families could benefit from this opportunity.

Has the staffing of this expansion been fully considered? With all the difficulties with staffing right now what solutions do you have in place?

Having read in detail pages 40-70 it seems like the most reasonable expansion is option A. It's going to accommodate twice as many families than what is currently offered. With the least amount of disruption to schools, staff and families. Every student enrolled do not stay in the program in entirety, which this proposal did not include details of. Option C and D do not make any sense and will open the door to those who make not take it seriously that could result higher amount of students dropping out mid course. Between difficultly finding qualified teachers and paying for all aspects involved option A makes the most sense.

I am outraged by this possibility of my full time English speaking Daughter to have to take a bus to another school out of her neighbourhood. We live 1 minute away from St. Scholastica. We chose to live in this neighbourhood and to be a part of St. Scholastica well before the French program was implemented. You are playing around with something that is not broken only to break it. Don't pull my daughter out of St. Scholastica, She is very well adjusted in her school environment. I chose not to add change to my daughters current education situation by keeping her in the full time as only English and now big changes are happening anyway?? This will have a negative impact not only on my family

I am concern with the expansion it could effect my kids and them not being able to potentially going to Our Lady of Fatima concerns me. If boarder get re adjusted and my kids are not able to go to there current school I will have a big issue.

I am concerned about the boarders changing, causing my child to have to switch schools. He is in his year one in junior kindergarten and had made wonderful progress with his peers and teachers. It would be extremely upsetting to have to switch him.

I am happy with the way things are and would prefer to not have a change.

I am in support of a boundary review. I support this because I believe, and hope, that the result will be increased opportunities for French emersion in school, and in particukar, our school.

I am not supportive of another boundary change for this school. My family had already been impacted once and made the decision to move homes into the community to keep our children in their school. Many other families have been negatively impacted.

I am not supportive of boundary changes

I am not sure that the boundaries should be changed at this point. Maybe look at expanding the program to 3 classes instead of 4 to lessen the burden or load while still expanding it slightly.

I am on the waitlist for the program. I am frustrated at the size of the waitlist. Evidently, the program needs to be grown to prevent losing students to the public school board.

I am opposed to boundary changes at this time

I am very concerned about the proposed expansion of the French Immersion program and beg the Trustees to consider the long term sustainability of these decisions. We already struggle with major staffing issues when a Core French or French Immersion Classroom Teacher is absent and often have days with no supply coverage when one of these teachers is sick/away from work.

St. Scholastica, who has the largest wait list for entrance into the Early French Immersion program, there is no way to meet the needs of the children who reside in my catchment area and have a right to access their own local community school if additional French Immersion classes were to be added - even if only two

more classrooms per grade. I have 23 available Gr. 1-8 classrooms in my school building. If a decision is made to add two more FI classrooms for each grade level (effective September of 2020) I would be faced with having to use 22 out of 23 of these Gr. 1-8 rooms for French Immersion students alone by September of 2024. Catholic parents of students within the St. Scholastica school community have a right to have their children housed in these interior rooms of the school.

I believe French immersion should be expanded

I believe it's an opportunity that should be open to more students who seek catholic education. Both my daughters are in the program but friends were very disappointed when they were placed on a waiting list.

When choosing and developing schools consider school size and capacity. St Benedict is too full. Although there are no new french cohorts they should consider moving some of the classes to St Scholastica. French shouldnt mean being stuck isolated in a portable.

The schools should also consider keeping families together.

I believe that an expansion of French Immersion is unwarranted given the current lack of qualified French Teachers to administer curriculum properly and the further reductions in staff predicted as a result of the current cuts of the PC government.

I believe that expanding the French immersion program will benefit the students, school community, and greater community. Having more French immersion classes in schools will allow for a greater awareness and appreciation for the French language.

I believe that the French Emersion in home school of the child would be ideal as it's more convenient for the parents. The expansion should happen in order to allow more kids to learn a second language. Ontario lacks of bilingual (French and English) speakers due to the fact that the school boards did not make French a priority.

I cannot see an negative in making the decision to expand the offering of Fl.

I choose not to expand the French Immersion Program or make any changes that will effect my kids and other kids that have no association in french immersion.

Parents that choose to be in the French Immersion Program should be the only ones effected because that is a change and addition they have chosen and want for their kids and are ok with switching school in the first place to be in the program but other families are not and it should not effect the ones that are not making those choice or want that change.

If I wanted to include my children in the French Immersion Program then I would be understanding to change and would accept it as it wold of been my choice but not for other who are not in the program. I do not think it should effect others who are satisfied with the full time English program and live 20 seconds away from there school and alter young children's lives making them upset and stressed for kids and the parents. This is not fair for many students and families who are not in the program.

Please leave it as it is or just consider moving the ones in the french immersion program.

I do hope they are not boundaries reviews that affect kids that are not in the french inmersion I do not agree on the potential expansion of the FI program. The St. Scholastica community is rapidly growing, and I believe the expansion would put unnecessary strain on the school. Also, the lack of qualified French teachers on the board would create issues on expanding the program. When French teachers are away and a substitute is required, the jobs are not filled. Students are losing their opportunity to learn in French.

I do not feel that it is fair for all children to have boundary changes due to the French programming. Two of my three children went through two boundary changes while attending elementary school and it affected their mental well being.

I do not like the fact that there will be more boundary changes that could possibly affect my children's place at their existing schools. This motion does not include my children so why should they be made to move schools to benefit others.

I do not support expansion of French immersion without the addition of new schools in Milton to meet the current overall growth

I do not support the expansion of the extended French. This would be very costly in a tough education time right now. Having students move schools (and possibly moving special needs students) and purchase new uniforms to accommodate a few classes

I do not support the expansion of the French immersion program

I do not support the expansion of the French Immersion Program. Expanding the program at St.Scholastica would put unnecessary strains on a school that already supports the Early French Immersion Program, is in a rapidly growing area, and is holding students from the developing community on the other side of Hwy 25 until a school is built in that catchment. In addition the fact that the board cannot gaurantee qualified FI teachers in the program defeats the purpose of parents placing their children in it and is shameful that there is even consideration of creating additional classes under these circumstances. Expanding the program in the proposed ways is a "quick fix", reckless and detrimental to the home school and the families that live in the area and rightfully belong to St.Scholastica School.

I do not support the expansion of the French Immersion program. I feel that the 150 person wait list is not a wait list. A wait list is 10-15 students waiting to get in. If there is that much interest, this is a reason to find a separate facility. This would be a solution, not a "quick fix" as you are suggesting. Secondly, I do not understand the logic that children in the area that already go to the school may be bussed out to bus in FI students from outside, if the school population gets too large. Not to mention annual busing costs and coordination.

The fact that you don't have enough qualified FI teachers to support the expansion but are still considering it is detrimental to the children that end up in a FI classroom with an unqualified teacher. Again if you are looking for a solution, you need to ensure that you have enough qualified FI to support an expansion.

For the sake of St. Scholastica students and the FI students, I strongly urge you not to proceed with this expansion.

I do not support this. Our children have already affected by one boundary change during their education. The students well being should not suffer due to the potential expansion of the French Immersion program. It is unfair and unnecessary.

I do not understand the impact. my younger son has been accepted at St. Scholastica and our home school is guardian angels. He needs to be bussed etc and I am not sure how this expansion would help us.

I do not want the expansion of the French immersion program. Build a new school for all the children that wish to have French immersion.

I don't agree that long term students or families who currently live in the area should not be affected by this French immersion expansion. Careful review and choices regarding our English long time students and siblings should not take precedent over our English program.

I don't believe the boundaries should be expanded. I would leave it as is.

I don't see a need for more French immersion programs. From what I have seen students are enrolled in grade one, only to be pulled out later - why cause this much disruption for something that won't have long term impact to the students.

I don't think an expansion of the French Immersion program is necessary and think that further boundary changes will have a negative impact on students who have formed relationships and friendships at their school over the years.

I don't think french immersion should only exist at certain schools, it should be available at all schools. I'm glad this is being considered.

I don't want my child to have to change schools. This should be a change for new enrollment not current students or students with siblings

I feel like there has already been many changes to the boundaries as Milton is a fast growing community. I don't think constantly changing boundaries is a good option. Maybe designating a few newer schools as "French" schools would be a better option

I feel that the hcdsb changes it's mind frequently without doing research in sustainability or what is beat for the education of students. Last year French immersion for grade 1 was cancelled and now you are going to expand. This makes no sense. The constant changing of boundaries is confusing for parents and students. The French immersion program should be based in research of what is best for children's development and hiring of the best teachers.

I fully support the expansion of the FI program. My child is on the waitlist and I'm concerned about her not having enough challenge in the classroom to keep her engaged should she not get a FI spot. I agree with the recommendation of staff that Option A or B are the only viable ones (I personally think Option B is the best choice). The demand for FI in Milton will continue to grow and if the Catholic Board doesn't keep up, we will lose some to the public and French school boards. With that said, growth needs to be responsible and feasible considering the fact that schools are at capacity. With that said, more aggressive growth up front to meet demand should avoid too many boundary changes later. I would also be concerned if boundaries are changed too often, displacing students (especially young ones) who won't

transition as easily. I do applaud the Board for considering increases to FI as I believe it will have positive impacts on families and the Region as a whole.

I fully support the expansion of the program as I have had many discussions with other parent that did not have the opportunity to enroll their children due to limited classes. It is a benefit readily accessible in the public system. Other ways to minimize boundary changes could possibly be designated more than one school. Additional classes will need additional resources as the children progress past grade 1 regardless so I think exploring that possibility is an option.

I have no comments. Thank you for the update and the information.

I have three children (ages 5, 7 and 8) in SK, grade 2 and grade 3. My oldest two are in the French immersion program at St.Benedict. My son was accepted into the program for the coming school year which will be at St.Scholastica.

My kids love the French program. It is their favourite part of their school day.

I have long wondered about the program and how it could better be served for all involved. My thoughts always lead me back to the question of why not have a school designated for the French Immersion program? Admittedly I do not have all the details; however I feel this would support the students, the teachers, financial pressures, support staff, etc in so many ways.

Of the options put forth my feeling is that Option A makes the most strategic sense until the SBR's are completed and classrooms can be secured.

In conclusion, I completely support the FI program and would love to see it expand and accommodate those who want to participate. The best option in my opinion is a school designated for the FI program.

I wrote so much more but had to cut it down as the survey would not accept all the information I wrote.

I hope this moves forward and goes ahead. French Immersion is an important program and is very beneficial for the children to learn another language properly. Also, it will set them up for success for their future, teaching then many skills, not just the language.

I hope to allow crossboundry to let siblings to be in the same school if of is in French immersion & the other is not

I oppose any changes being made that will effect other children that are not in the french immersion program. We are not involved in that program and it should not effect my kids and there routine and those that are not registered in it. It is common sense to not effect the kids that are not involved in that program.

Those who have enrolled in the program should be the only ones effected and they are the ones that have already switched schools to be in the french program so I am sure they will be ok with moving again. Or just leave it as it is with no changes.

I realize that Early FI has been capped at St. Benedict but I would like to see that reintroduced so that siblings have an opportunity to be in the same school AND I would like to

see the lottery removed - other boards provide access based on demand. Forcing us to attempt the lottery process, potentially get a spot and then have our child at a completely different school than the other is not helpful for working parents who cannot accommodate the school times and have to rely on before/after care.

I would also like to see a provision that allows siblings of early FI/FI students to be admitted into the non-FI at the same school to again, have an opportunity to be in same school (e.g. my son is in early FI now in grade 2; my younger son will be starting grade 1 in Sept 2021. We live outside of the existing boundary for English). I now need to apply for early FI at another school that potentially works off a different start/end schedule or go my home school which I know for sure is a different schedule. Based on the current system, my sons will be going to two different schools. This prevents the opportunity for them to have each other as a support system at the same school.

I say no to additional French classes

I support expansion since my child is on wait list for grade one French program.

I support expansion. It will be great to have extra classrooms for more children to learn French.

I support it since my child is on wait list now and if they add more classes he would get in.

I support the expansion of the French immersion program

I support the expansion of the French immersion program if the interest is there. However, I would be deeply unsatisfied if this affected my family in terms of boundaries. I have no interest in having my 4 children switch schools due to boundary changes. We have built a rapport with the teachers, staff, and school community. As well as the inconvenience of having to purchase new uniform pieces if we were affected. I am praying that we are not affected by a boundary review.

I support the expansion of the program. There should also be consideration for expanding the grade 5 entry program.

I support this expansion as it provides greater access to an important program even if it means another boundary review.

I think expanding the FI program is great, we were on the waiting list for the lottery when my daughter entered grade one so more available spots are needed. One thing to consider is

that kids have to have new uniforms when the boundaries change and that is not fair to parents so this needs to be addressed.

I think in order to provide feedback I would want to know what some possible scenarios are...it is hard to understand how widespread these changes may be from the info presented. Saying every student may be affected is very vague.

I think it is unfair for my children to potentially have to change schools because the boundaries have changed.

I think it's a good idea.

I think it's a great idea I would love my kids to learn French

I think it's a great idea to expand the availability of French Immersion in Halton Region. We are becoming new residents to Milton, from the Peel District which had far more options to have our daughter enrolled in French Immersion (like her parents were growing up), and to know that there were only 2 classes for grade 1 French Immersion, of which we needed to win a lottery for to give her a better education is ridiculous. This is her first opportunity to get into French Immersion, moving to a new town and school district and she will need to wait until next year grade 2 (provided the expansion of the program still doesn't allow her to enter into grade 1 immersion this year) to try again, with no guarantees. My child's education options should not be relegated to the winning of a lottery. We already pay for her education outside of a system that should be teaching reading and phonics, and now we may have to pay an outside party to teach her French, our country's second language? This is unacceptable. This expansion needs to happen and at a larger scale.

I think it's a great idea to expand the FI program. I have one child in G1 FI and would like the opportunity for my youngest to apply and have a good chance of getting in 2 years from now.

I think it's a great move to add more French classes. It will distinguish our students and from having 2 kids in the program, I can tell you that it's worth spreading

I think it's a great program and the expansion would only help our students reach their potential by giving them a great opportunity to learn another language

I think it's a wonderful idea I have had 3 children in the french immersion program and has been a wonderful experience for both my children however my 3 and youngest daughter is wait listed she wants to learn french which we practice at home but at school would reforce her learning. How're she is waitlisted and with the expansion she could have the opportunity. We do have 2 official languages in Canada and I beve we all should have this opportunity if we would like to and not be waitlisted.

I think it's high time that this program expand to be more inclusive to the students/families interested in pursuing french fluency in our bilingual country. I wholeheartedly support any expansion of this program.

I think it's wonderful

I think that the program is great but it would be nice to have one school that could handle all the early and extended French programs.

I think the expansion is a good idea if you begin with the kids on the current wait list. It's enough that both siblings won't be in same school, the least the board can do is grant an opportunity for siblings to learn the same language.

I think this expansion is long overdue. The current two class situation does not allow for the interest in this program. I also feel that the board should be looking to expand their extended French program and offer it in more than one location.

I think this is fantastic. The demand is there. I know there are hurdles to overcome but more people should have the opportunity for a French Catholic education in Halton. I have honestly been contemplating moving to the public board (which I don't want to do) since my daughter is on the waiting list for EFL 2020/2021. I have an older daughter in the program already and I want them to have the same opportunities. The only reason I might still consider moving boards is that now that St. Benedict is closed to EFL, my kids will always be at different schools even if my little one does get in. This is a struggle for our family that doesn't exist in the public board. Just something else to consider. Thank you.

I understand the situation but I disagree if this decision is going to affect boundaries in the area. This should not be the case. I'm really happy with the school. I proactively found a place close to St Scholastica and my kid loves the school. Hope this can be managed in a different way without affecting the emotional and academic stability of my kid. Thanks

I wanted to add to my previous submission - boundary review should also consider options to include siblings of existing early FI/FI students for entry in either early FI/FI or non-FI (if they happen to live outside the FI catchment). This again allows for the continuation of a sibling support system, sense of family outside the home, and also contributes to a more effective means for parents to support both kids in the same school (transportation to school, participation in events at the school, building sense of community with the teachers).

I will have more feedback once I see what the boundaries are changed to and what decision process was made.

I wish you can add more classes as I have 2 kids in st Benedict school French immigrants and 1 kid in st scholastica school French immigrants and my son is in Sk this year and he got number 80 in the waiting list into the lottery program and I wish for him to have the same education as his siblings.

I would like to have the program in more than one school

I would like to see an expansion of the French Immersion Program

I would like to see the program expand as I have a child in kindergarten who I would like to enroll in the grade 1 program. The more opportunity for this, the better.

I would love to see the program expand and open up to more students currently on the wait lists. I think that the opportunity to learn French starting in grade one should be make available to all those who want to take advantage of it, not just a select few.

I would not like my child to be registered in a program when I am not sure where he will be located in years to come. Would like to have a boundary review done first, then expand the French program.

I would prefer my child's school did not rearrange boundaries.

I would prefer to have more classes for French immersion programs. As We are getting more new houses in Milton, the population is growing and young families are moving to Milton. French is going to be more important for our kids in near future. I would like to put my kids in French immersion program too. Thanks.

I would prefer to keep the limit to 2 French immersion classes per school.

I would support any decision made to accommodate students. As a parent, I am personally invested in my child and would endure small inconveniences such as driving further so that my child would have the opportunity to attend FI.

I would support this expansion. I think it's a great idea that would benefit all students.

I would very much like to see the French immersion program expanded.

I would vote against the expansion. A lot of families picked their homes to go to a specific school or have planned their daily lives around it and a major change can cause a lot of problems

If it is being expanded, it should be available at all schools, not a select few.

in addition, many of the children impacted were not able to attend French immersion program without taking on yet another move. Now these students are in older grades and the option for French immersion is no longer an option-negatively impacted again

In all honesty it is EXTREMELY unclear what this expansion means....does this affect students in EFI in older grades currently? Would the gr 1 EFI that is assigned to current locations be moving to an entirely different school?

Is this going to impact school size and class size

Is this necessary? Could this money go to support a wider range of students, or fund special education programming and support.

It is imperative that we offer such programming to our students so that they may have the same opportunities afforded in other school Boards.

It was briefly noted that unqualified teachers may be needed to provide the French program. This is a very bad idea and has so many faults. The separate school board should have quality and excellence as a top priority.

It was short-sighted to have this program at St. Scholastica in the first place. Our school is growing and there will be no room for F.I. in the future. You should still expand the program, but should look at moving it in future years to smaller schools in more established neighbourhoods that have more predictable enrollment.

It would be great to have the program run in more than one school so children in the same family are not separated. Having one child get into the FI "lottery" and not others is very stressful and difficult for parents and siblings

It would be important to add more locations to the Extended French program, especially in Milton, giving a chance for the students who were not able to access the EFI program, to still have access to another more intensive French Language program.

It would be nice for siblings to be able to go to same French immersion school. Can we keep it in the same place or have the additional classes in different school to provide more options.

It would be very disappointing if the HCDSB decides to uproot students who are already in the F/I Grade 1 program, and move their programming to another school. Parents have already invested in uniforms, and incurred other costs to this point.

It's time to expand like every other Board in the province

Milton needs a second FSL elementary school. The new designated school is just not practical away the complete south west end of town. Doesn't help parents at the north east side of milton.

Milton parents want FI. The waitlist proves this. This 'Boundary Review' sure looks like a scare tactic to make English parents speak out against FI. We're talking about 40 more students at 4 schools, and 7 new teachers. These aren't big numbers. With a little bit of work, these students can be accommodated for, and teachers can be found. I will be very disappointed in the HCDSB if they choose not to expand. So much so, that my children may change to the HDSB for their FI needs.

More information and details about the actual changes to boundaries should be presented, so parents see how it will impact them.

More instability & controversey is the last thing that a Catholic school board needs in this province. Extinction is never far away & is looming. Why would HCDSB even consider risk making parents angry like this?

Movement of any students that are entering grade 8 in the 2020/21 school year should be avoided. It would be disruptive in their last year in a school community to transfer and possibly be separated from their known peers.

My children will not be attending the French Immersion program and as such I do NOT like the idea of them potentially being moved from their home schools to accommodate this program.

My concern is if they don't allow the program to phase out at St Peter school like they promised when they moved it to St Benedict's. there are two more years left to phase it out and I would not be happy if my child has to move to another school.

My concern is the long term capacity to an ever growing school population.

My concern with expanding the program lies with the ongoing issue of finding French teachers both long term and on an LTO basis for various types of teacher leaves. This is an issue with the current number of classes, not to mention the problem will be compounded if the program is expanded. What can the Board do to secure French teachers- can hiring occur earlier before teachers are done teacher's college with an intent to hire letter for candidates? When hiring is left too late candidates have been secured by other Boards. Can current French teachers be examined across the system- with applicable candidates deployed by human resources based on education and training to the best suited programs based on their training/education? There is no point to expand the program if a hiring and staffing allocation plan is not undertaken at the Board level with regards to French teachers.

My highest priority is the quality of teaching staff. Program expansion should only be done when there are sufficient teaching resources. Reading that there are 5 teachers working in the french program currently without proper accreditation is very concerning as a parent. What's the point in having my kids in the program if the quality is poor? I appreciate the outreach strategy, but until you have a greater pool of candidates to chose from (and this notes a decline in graduates) why are we even considering expansion? If the quality declines, I'll have to pull my children out of the program and then you'll have a another issue all together with low enrollment in the higher grades

Currently, I have 2 kids in the FI program at 2 different schools. Is there was a possibility of one school dedicated to the french programs, could you find savings? Since most kids are out of boundary already & transportation costs are high already, is a single, dedicated school for french learning where the program could be more fulsome (ie: french assemblies, announcements, etc).

If there comes a point where my children are learning in split grades year over year, I will pull them from the program

My only concern is for students. Those who are already in an extended French program should be left at the school they are currently attending and not be affected by the boundary review. The boundary review should apply to incoming students only.

My son deserves the chance to continue his studies in French Immersion to develop his skills. No changes to the existing boundaries

Offering French Immersion programming is wonderful, however if it causes a boundary review that would move children out of their school community, it shouldn't be done. It is not right to move students just for new French programs.

OLF had a french immersion program which was cancelled and now it's expanding again? If children have to move to another school because of boundary reviews it is not always positive. Some children don't like change and it impacts their attitudes.

Our family does NOT support the expansion of the FI Program to St.Scholastica.

Expanding the program to St.Scholastica will put unnecessary strains on a school; that already supports the Early FI Program, that is located in a rapidly developing and growing

area, and is the holding school for students from the surrounding developing community, until a new school is built in that catchment.

Lets not forget the fact that the board cannot gaurantee qualified FI teachers in the program, which defeats the purpose of parents placing their children in the program to begin with and is completely shameful that there is even consideration for creating additional classes within the FI program under these circumstances!

Expanding the program in the proposed ways is a "quick fix", that is reckless and detrimental to the home school and the families that live in the area and rightful belong to St.Scholastica's School geographical area.

STOP disrupting so many families lives over insufficiently supported programming! Families take a lot of consideration into school location when purchasing their homes, only for the board to consistently make ridiculously lousy boundary changes!!!!

Please expand the French Immersion programme! I am an elementary school French teacher in Peel and am devastated that my daughter didn't get accepted into the program in Halton where we live. We are absolutely loving the Catholic education she is receiving at St.Scholastica and it feels so unfair that we have to now leave so someone else can have her spot at the school. Putting her in the public board is not what we want but we are being forced to in order for her to attend French Immersion. Prefer the Boundary Review for French Program.

Stop expanding French Immersion!!

Students in Halton Catholic must be competitive with other Boards as well as other provinces.

The current program at which begins in Grade 5 has been very disappointing for our daughter. Her father is completely fluent in French which should have been a great asset but the real problem is the lack of committment with the French teacher, who messed up the school year twice due to maternity leaves. There seems to be a real shortage of French speaking teachers and the substitutes that were brought in to replace her mat leaves were not competent. For the French immersion to work, an investment of better qualified and more committed teachers is necessary.

The expansion should go ahead

The French programming is so much better in other Boards, why are we so far behind the times?

The impact of a boundary change for the children just to accommodate French Immersion is detrimental to so many students.

Students have been at Holy Rosary since JK and have to sacrifice leaving their learning environment and life long friends to accommodate French Immersion?

Do we not have French schools being built or completed in Milton already that parents have opportunity to enrol their children. Milton also has numerous larger schools in area that accommodate French Immersion opportunities.

You are proposing a plan here that will deteriorate the opportunity for future / current Catholic students that want an English education. The language that is actually used in Ontario and rest of Canada.

If the demand for French Immersion schools is in that high of a demand, than why is HCDSB not building such schools currently?

Catholic enrolment will be impacted as you force parents to enrol in Public Schools for boundary concerns. Has this concern been addressed?

HCDSB mission is to provide a Catholic Faith based education for students in Halton ... It is not to accommodate a language program that by the time kids reach High School is no longer used.

The only reason my kids do to this school is because it is close to the house (& we like the teachers). If my kids get moved to another school, I am putting them in the public board school which is just down the street.

The program must be expanded so that all students can have access to French programming. It's only fair.

The reason my kids do not want to go to the French immersion program is because they do not want to move to another school. And now, HCDSB is saying they might be forced to move anyway!?? What is going on with HCDSB?

The waitlist of 108 in Milton speaks for itself. Please expand and at least give an additional 46 students FI. The 46 current spots are not enough.

There are so many other programs offered to students, why not have French Immersion offered for those students who are gifted in languages?

There may be challenges with the administration of FI but, at the end of the day, FI is a permanent program offering at HCDSB and the Board needs to come up with strategies and find a way to make it available to more than just 138 kids annually. Strong FI programs will mean that more qualified FI teachers will be entering the workforce.

There will be confusion with parents interested in enroling their child in the French program if expansion is done right now. It would be better to have the boundary review done first and then the expansion.

Think it's great the school board is trying to expand programs, however I do not think that students that are not enrolled in the French Immersion should be affected AT ALL by boundary changes or other reasons. I would be extremely disappointed if my child, currently in walking distance to school, had to be moved to a different school (likely by bus in that case then), due to addition of a new program at her school.

What is the change in mentality that the French program was taken away from grades 1-3 for a 40min period every day, to now adding French Immersion starting in grade 1 onward? Perhaps this could be addressed?

This is fantastic news! Much needed in the growing community of Milton

This needs to be offered at more schools! I was very disappointed when I found out only 1 school offers it and we unfortunately did not get accepted.

This school was not built to be a "French" school - it was built to provide a Catholic, English education to the students who live in this community. It will not be fair to them to see such a large number of students being bussed into their home school community. In addition, there

is already a shortage of qualified French teachers. It is not feasible to increase the program by this proposal in such a short period of time. With all the cutbacks being proposed, why are we considering this expansion? The bussing alone will be a huge expense.

Until HCDSB solves its staffing challenges with all French programs (the EFI program in particular), expanding the program makes little sense. All stakeholders would end up with more frustrations as pre-existing needs are not met, particularly since the program has not yet reached its full elementary capacity (i.e. next year will be the first year with grade 8 EFI students).

I'm in favour of hiring uncertified teachers (qualified in other jurisdictions, but not yet recognized by OCT) to fill the needs, but I doubt there are enough of those to solve staffing problems. I do have other ideas which may help HCDSB make more efficient use of the resources allocated to the EFI program which I would be happy to discuss, but in the past the HCDSB has been uninterested, repeatedly saying that these ideas are not in the scope/the mandate of the committees I have sat in on.

With regards to split classes: while my children have been lucky to benefit from the absence of them, the fact that the board seems unwilling to combine students in the EFI cohorts into larger junior/intermediate single/split classes - which English stream students have - contradicts the equity policies around EFI.

Uprooting children from their home schools, neighborhoods & friends to accommodate an optional program is unacceptable. If our kids were displaced, we would certainly consider another school board.

Very happy about it, fully support expansion.

We are excited to read about the potential expansion of French Immersion. As a parent/educator we want what's best for our children/students. When there currently is a very limited space it is limiting children out of a great growing opportunity for their future. Other school boards have found a way to make this program easily accessible so we are hoping the catholic board finds a way to make it easier for children to join as well. It currently is very stressful waiting to hear whether or not your child can have the opportunity to attend the French immersion program and thinking about what the next step is for us as a family if they do not get it. Yes I have read. I think that option A will give the kids the best avenues for success as it would be easier to find a smaller # number highly trained teachers. I also feel that french immersion offered at multiple schools is better than just one school for (transportation and community building with Parents and classmates). If full french immersion cannot be accommodated, maybe more schools with late immersion may be a better option. I am interested in enrolling my child in french immersion. They are currently in JK and would prefer to stay closer to home.

Yes, I have no problem with the program expanding. However, it would be terrible if it affected students that were not in the program and have to change school because of boundary changes.

Yes, it's not clear to me the impact that it'll have on current EF students. Could you please clarify?

Yes. The boundaries need to be reviewed regardless of the French Immersion programming. If our family moves to Timberlea we have to go to Holy Rosary which is way further than St. Peter. Traffic bad; travel dangerous. 6+ public schools enroute!

. I do not understand why the Board is even considering this motion of expanding the French immersion program as its not in the benefit of the greater good and is in violation of its fiduciary duty.

A change in boundaries resulting in regular stream kids changing schools with less than one year notice would be far too disruptive to kids and their families. Changing bus eligibility will also be extremely disruptive for working parents to manage with short notice.

About time

Adding 2 more classes each year will only add to the existing problem of overcrowding in an elementary school. There is not enough room for kids to play outdoors due to the increasing number of portables each year. School space cannot support this.

Adding a portable or 2 is not a reason to deprive these children the programming they desire. This is their only entry point in our Board. Their only alternative is to move to the Public Board in grade 2. So it's unfathomable that anyone who is not well versed in French programming feels ok to take this opportunity away from these children for selfish reasons. Extended French is not a comparable alternative for those looking for an early start. We are a Catholic community and should behave as such. We have to meet in the middle and Option A is just that. To say that English students are suffering is ridiculous. Children who are starving, terminally ill and living in war torn counties are suffering. Let's put this into perspective.

Adding more Frech immersion classes for Grade 1 will reduce the availability of French teachers for the students in the regular stream. Supply teachers are difficult to get and sometimes the "supply French teacher" will have to use Google translator.

Although I fully support the French immersion program, adding up to two more grade 1 classes to the school will have a huge impact on Schools such as St. Mary that are already bursting at the seams with over population.

Amazing program! Please vote for expansion

Another school needs to be built to accommodate French immersion. Our school is over capacity already. We cannot compromise our play ground anymore with more portables.

As a bilingual Ontarian French is an incredible asset to have. However, if it is hard to fill French teaching positions now it will be a further challenge without significant investment and hiring incentives. No school boundary changes.

As a father of 2 kids attending St. Mary (no French immersion) here my concerns:

Evacuation & Emergency Risk: the use over capacity (more than double) of the facilities increases the risk in case of potential danger, e.g. fire.

Safety in parking lot and adjacent roads: multiple parents driving dangerously when dropping or picking up their kids. This risk has increase exponentially over the past few years due to the over capacity.

Less opportunity for school activities: classes are restricted to participate in the school community activities, as the gym has already exceeded its capacity.

Unsustainable solution: St. Mary has approx. 300+ students (please confirm). This leaves little room for families within the boundaries. If 2 additional classes are added, St. Mary would end up with 700+ French Immersion students (more than its capacity), leaving NO room for English students within the boundaries.

Therefore, the Board must find a permanent solution for the growing French Immersion population, instead of further deteriorating the current challenging situation in St. Mary due to overcapacity. PLEASE think of schools with current lower registration for the French Immersion program

As a French educator of French immersion I cannot believe that Halton in not in board with such an expansion when all other boards are expanding these programs due to student interest but also another way to augment enrolment for the Catholic boards

As a French Immersion student myself I believe that there needs to be more access to the program especially since there has been such high demand. Not doing so would discriminate these students from the education that they seek.

As a mother of 2 kids attending St. Mary (no French immersion) here my concerns:

- 1. Over capacity Challenges when responding to a potential danger (fire, evacuation, others), it's different when you have a number of students that overpass the capacity of the building
- 2. Safety in the parking lot I have witnessed an increased number of cars coming in and out of the parking lots, and the irresponsibility of some drivers that can't deal with the frustration of an overload parking lot, I have seen parents speeding, traffic issues around main intersections, etc.
- 3. School activities Last year, the Christmas concert was limited to some grades. Grades 6, 7 and 8 were excluded and alienated from the concert and couldn't participate, as they have done in years before. I don't think this reflects the inclusion we expect from catholic education.

Christmas play didn't include all students

4. Portables - Multiples issues with portables: no working air conditioning, no working heating, not to say that every time these kids have to go the washrooms, they have to do it without supervision, but with a same age peer.

PLEASE use schools with low registration for French Immersion classes

As a parent I do not support an increase in French Immersion programming. The program at my daughter's school has been very divisive with French Immersion incorrectly being promoted as providing a superior educational platform.

As a parent I would like the opportunity to enrol my children in this program without having to wait on a crazy waitlist

As a parent of a child that is NOT in french immersion, I think it is completely unacceptable to potentially impact the vast majority of students in the English stream to accommodate the desire of those who wish to enroll their children in French.

As a parent of both an elementary and secondary school student, I am not interested in the french immersion program and therefore do NOT agree that students not interested in this program should be impacted by the school boundary changes. Parents and children interested in this program should be the ones impacted by it. I would be very disappointed if these changes mean any type of disruption to my children's routine. If parents are interested in this specialized program then they should be the only ones impacted.

As a parent of children attending St. Mary in Oakville, we DO NOT support the expansion of EFI at St. Mary. With the continued growth and popularity of the program, a more sustainable solution should be investigated and established that will meet growth demands moving forward. We cannot afford to implement an expansion that will detrimentally effect the learning and well-being of ALL students. You cannot possibly think that uprooting students from their existing catchment and school is in line with or valuing the developmental assets of children's growth. Are you really willing to interfere with the learning and well-being of 95%+ of the student population to accommodate 15-30 students on a waiting list for a program that can be offered at any building? I strongly urge you to consider other options. There are many schools in the board that are underutilized. You can recover costs from a mistake you make but you CANNOT recover lost education opportunities for students or damage to their well-being once you realize the damage you are doing by expanding a program in a school that is already at capacity. Please consider the needs of ALL students not just EFI.

As a parent of three children attending the regular track program at St. Mary, I am concerned for ALL students with the potential expansion of the EFI program at St. Mary specifically. The proposal to expand at St. Mary is neither feasible nor practical at this time given the large capacity constraints that currently exist. To expand this program at St. Mary would be to completely disregard the learning needs and well-being of ALL students. I am strongly opposing this expansion at St. Mary but I am urging you to strongly consider delaying the expansion of the program to 2021-2022 in order for you to conduct a feasibility and sustainability study that will allow you to develop and implement a long-term expansion plan that considers under-utilized schools such as St. John Paul II. There is NO MORE ROOM AT ST. MARY. You are sacrificing outdoor play space for all students while also reducing programming at the school in order to accommodate an unsustainable plan.

As an EFI teacher my two main concerns are the lack of portable space for the EFI program to be expanded at St. Mary school and the fact that there is a real shortage of qualified French teachers to fill these new positions. We already have 8 portables on the blacktop and we have staggered recesses to accommodate our significantly large student population. We would therefore not have the space to accommodate the doubling of EFI classes incrementally over the years. The shortage of qualified French-speaking teachers is already an issue as when we call for a supply teacher, more often than not, no one takes the job because it is for a French-speaking role. The school is then left with pulling other full-time staff to cover my EFI class during their planning times or to simply pull someone out of their regular teaching role (usually a French itinerant) and those students are left without French that day.

These are just some of the concerns I have about the sustainability of the growth of the EFI program.

As the program is permanent, it should be treated as such. I don't recall being notified when the board expands the extended French program. There seems to be no problem adding extended French to other schools, why should it be a problem for FI. A number of schools are under capacity, including ours, so it seems like we should be able to find room for FI. This interim step makes sense to get the ball rolling

A proper rezoning must be done before an expansion can take place. There is simply not enough space or resources remaining at St Mary's to support even more classes added to the school population.

Expanding the French Immersion program seems like a reasonable consideration in light of the interest in the community and existing waiting list, although I do have major concerns with this proposal. I read over the proposal and my main concern is how this increased allocation of resources to this re-orginzation will affect resourcing other more pressing needs such as basic school infrastructure maintenance and improvements that affect all our students, as well as resources for special needs children. If there is a limited pool of resources for these competing interests I would hope the Board of Trustees will ensure the future resourcing of these other very important needs is not compromised. Although the French Immersion program is a great opportunity for our community, if the future progress of the more pressing needs that affect our children stagnate or suffer as a result of this re-organization, there will likely be a very public reaction to this initiative. I am also concerned that despite best efforts to estimate the resources needed to complete this project, actual needs and timelines are often greater than planned and overages risk progress in other school priorities.

If I have NO other options but only four (4) to choose from - my choice is Option A. Otherwise, please curtail the FI program expansion to ensure quality, sustainability, and not a mass production in portables that serves nobody.

My child will start the Early French Immersion (FI) program in Sep 2020. However, to my surprise the majority of my friends decided NOT to participate in FI program. I was cautioned that:

My child may acquire neither good speaking French nor high proficiency in English unless I'm willing to pay for private tutoring for both subjects. My recent review of tutoring fees in Oakville confirmed that I would have to pay \$45 to \$60 an hour for a qualified tutor.

-The Board's capacity for extra academic supports for struggling FI students is more limited

compare to the regular English stream. And this in spite the fact that FI program is overall more demanding compare to a regular English stream.

-There are teachers in FI program who are FSL speakers themselves. My friends questioned how this fact affects the quality of instruction.

- Acquisition of Math & Science suffers because of time & effort spent on learning French.

How can you consider French immersion when we don't have enough French Teachers - I

I agree and would like my daughters to learn French as a second language. It will be a must in a near future for their professional development.

I agree that French immersion should be an option if children/parents wish to pursue. I do however disagree with relocating kids that are currently within a school not in the French program having to be relocated to another school. The children that do not wish to participate in French immersion should be staying in their original school. This is no different than private school, meaning, if parents want to pursue and optional type of schooling than those parents and children need to be the one's who should be up rooted and relocated. Leave the kids not participating in French immersion alone in their current boundaries, I have not asked for change-the individuals seeking a french program has asked for the change.

I am against it since I believe it will take resources out of current students and will overfill already full school.

I am completely opposed to this proposal. It is already hard enough to staff the French positions. The added bussing will be a huge expense and local children may be sent away from their home school. How can you even consider this?

I am concerned about capacity at our school. Adding more portables will reduce our play yard which is already too small for the number of child attending our school. The school was not built to house so many students.

I am concerned about what the boundary reviews could mean - moving existing students slightly outside of the boundary to another school to accommodate French Immersion classes

I am disappointed that our trustees are succumbing to the lobbying tactics of those parents who want French immersion.

First there are not enough teachers now to cover the demand of the current program. Secondly la very concerned that a majority of students and families would be affected by way of potential boundary changes to appease a minority of the student population. Thirdly the amount of funding that will go I to reviewing and expanding this program should not be the focus right now of our tax dollars. We have bigger issues to fight in English -class sizes, e learning etc. Other boards ie Peel are looking to decrease their French immersion programs due to the lack of teachers. Why Our Board thinks this is doable with current resources astounds me. Further the board is really going to undertake a massive task in the boundary review which will cause concern and potentially unfairness to anlotnof families.

Lastly studies clearly show there is no difference in terms of fluency and comprehension in French at the end of Highschool whether the child started French in grade one or grade five.

There are bigger and more important issues to deal with than French immersion.

I am extremely concerned that the quality of core English classes will be impeded by expansion of French immersion. My children will likely be re-zoned to another school which will be emotionally difficult for them. I am also concerned however that there is an underlying problem with the system that is not being addressed. I am aware that many parents are putting their children in FI just to avoid their children being placed in classes with special needs or behaviorally challenged children. The core English classes are going to be over-burdened with high needs children and their education will suffer. This is not fair to teachers, or to our English children. I strongly believe that the demand for FI will decrease if the underlying problem is addressed in our classrooms.

I am quite confused as to how the HCDSB can justify the removal of the Extended French program from St. Matthew (using the excuse of overcrowding, lack of space, and the dependence on portables to sustain the program) and then consider, less than a year later, the expansion of the program and the endorsement of the use of portables to support such an expansion.

As a parent and educator, I am wondering if this is 1. an apparent lack of planning on the part of the Board or 2. the deliberate withholding of information regarding the Board's plans for the future of the Extended French program from the St. Matthew community? Either way, your new plan to expand the French program and your approval of the use of portables to facilitate this expansion, aligns with the wishes of the St. Matthew community to keep, at the minimum, one permanent Extended French class at St. Matthew. We look forward to this review, and expect that the Board will amend its plan to remove the Extended French program from St. Matthew and commit to its continuation at St. Matthew.

I am strongly opposed to boundary changes that would impact non French immersion students. We make decisions on our home based on boundaries and do not wanted to impact children education and friendships based on a small population of students.

I appreciate the effort in attending the need of french immersion and we receive with enthusiasm the news of the expansion. I have a child joining the program by 2020/2021 and an older child going to grade 3 on that program.

I do understand that is a complex matter, yet I would like to suggest that the program may be split into 2 different schools in Oakville, covering another area of the town. note that St. Mary is at the far northwest of the town. St. Matthew might be a good option judging by the size of the school and location.

Do not think there are no repercussions on the English stream in St. Mary. As an example, my children (in the English stream) did not receive their French lesson because the teacher was pulled into the FI program to cover off. That was an unfair decision that needs to be addressed within the schools who house both English and French streams.

My biggest concern is the location of the expansion. In the delegation provided on January 21st the facts indicate that St Mary cannot take on an expansion based on projected growth in the next 2 years from the current FI program along with the growing community and new development at Bronte and Upper Middle. You need to look at a long term solution and jamming them into St Mary's is not it. I urge you to look at another school to layer the FI program into Oakville. One that is possible more central or even on the other side to allow for less busing needs.

I believe it is not necessary to expand the French Immersion program.

I believe staffing is an important concern. I would also be interested to know what the student retention rates are for early french programs as well as the feasibility of beginning core french in grade one in all schools. I would prefer the trustees look into this option. This way students are exposed to the language at a young age and can remain at their home school and still have extended options (in grade 5) when they are old enough to decide whether this is something that

is a fit for them. I believe this was brought up in the committee work that was conducted a couple years ago before many of newer trustees began. Staffing was a concern then and continues to be. I disagree with this option as the waiting list for the early French immersion is already very long and it wouldn't be fair with the Oakville population not to have access to the program in order to give priority to student from other cities outside

I do NOT advocate for the expansion of the French Immersion program for the following CRITICAL and very simple reason:

Lack of qualified Catholic French teachers to teach the program. We are already experiencing a shortage of qualified French teachers in our Board. How can we consider expanding the program when we can not staff it in a way that maintains the integrity and high standards of the program in our Board?

We currently run 2 optional programs in HCDSB: French Immersion (FI) and Extended French (EF). Why? We have a French teacher staffing crisis in this Board. Why stretch our existing resources by running TWO optional programs? With FI already set to continue to grade 12, where are the French teachers going to come from?

A possible solution might be eliminating the optional EF program. The Board can alleviate the teacher shortage as French teachers from EF can be relocated to FI positions.

My child is on the waitlist. Please give him the opportunity to join FI in September like his siblings by adding 46 spots. Thank you.

My children are both in the English program at St. Mary's in SK and Grade 3. We really enjoy the school and we would like our children to remain attending the school. I have a number of concerns with the proposals concerning French school. The first is the expansion of the program which, based on existing enrollment, will result in an increase in portables. The use of portables is less than ideal. Having a class inside the school is the preferred option, especially with younger kids with the need to go in and out of the school for various reasons. Other concerns include no cap on enrolment. If this could result in St. Mary's becoming a French immersion only school, that is a big concern to our family. We do not want our children sent to other schools in the area, likely resulting in friends being split up with children at various schools in the area. We also want to continue attending a school close to our home. A boundary review would put that in jeopardy. Our children may be separated from their friends and forced to attend another school. We hope that the concerns of the school community are taken into consideration when making this decision.

My children are not in the French program. They are settled in their school and would be devastated if they were forced to change school. We do not support a boundary review for existing children in the school. Major disruption

The Board should expand the French Immersion program. The program has been offered by HCDSB since 2012 and has been a permanent program for more than 2 years now. Neighboring Boards, both Catholic and Public, are not only maintaining their programs at a much greater capacity than HCDSB, but are managing to expand them - some with even earlier entry points than Grade 1 - and have been offering French Immersion programming for decades, despite facing the same concerns about staffing and space. There is always so much concern that there aren't enough French teachers to staff FSL programs. However, HCDSB won't be able to attract qualified teachers by continuing to run a pilot program. the neighbouring catholic boards are all running larger programs than HCDSB and they are expanding. Every year HCDSB does nothing is another year we miss out on recruiting good teachers for the program and they are lost to the other Boards. This expansion is minor in scale and, practically speaking, will only require the recruitment of three additional FI teachers (one for site where expansion will occur - Milton, Burlington, and Oakville, as the waitlist in Halton Hills is not large enough to support an additional class. If the Board can't recruit 3 French teachers in 10 months then there are bigger issues.

We can not change the current system! We're going to effect the English track students for more early French immersion! We already have extended French and that has been going well for years. We're already at a crisis with government cuts, we already have unqualified supply teachers teaching French as fill-ins! The French program is already suffering with French teacher shortages! The idea is unrealistic and catering to a small group while threatening to effect EVERY school is unfathomable! The proposal states that unqualified teacher may be needed? Who wants their kids being taught by unqualified teachers? The extended program was enough! We're trying to keep up with the public board, point blank. The few people on the waiting list is not enough to change the whole system. Early French shouldn't have even been offered in the first place. The split classes are hard enough but the unbalanced classes are worse. Classes aren't blended and usually the 'stronger kids' are in French. This is challenging for regular classes. Especially if the government lifts class size caps! This option needs to be eliminated. Keep extended French only or the current early immersion model!

We certainly need to stop the expansion! We're facing cutbacks for our vulnerable students already. If we do this we create a 2 tier system of education which goes against all our Gospel values! How can we cut services to those students who need extra support and spend all this time on extra resources for a program that can be utilized in gr 5? Split classes, unbalanced classes with the "higher achievers" in french immersion, unqualified teachers, extra money on buses, portables, changing all school boundaries? Why are we even discussing this?? It seems obvious that keeping the status quo is what we need to do. This is not the time to do this. 2 tiered education is already being pushed by the government and should not be pushed by the school board as well. How will this be "education for all?" We need a potential map for the boundaries in review to provide an accurate comment.

We need the program expanded (french in grade 1) so we don't have to send our three children to three different schools... starting french in grade 5 is too late for the average student (straight a student seem to do OK), bussing kids, building and tearing down down portables, ramming schools, etc. negatively impacts the environment, kids wellbeing and stresses parents, etc.

We need to keep the program as is! With government cuts how can we justify the expenditure? We can't service the minority of families. The domino effect is too substantial. Go to extended French. It works and keeps the cost down.

We recently switched our child from HDSB into HCDSB. Since arriving at St Bernadette he has thrived in a way he never did in his old school. I have dealt with HDSB for 10 years and watched as it mishandled the FI program. Boundary changes, program changes, constant chaos and uncertainty. Part of the reason we moved our son is because of the negative way HDSB handled FI and how English students with reading difficulties were completely ignored. I understand the

pressure by parents to increase the FI program but I urge you to be thoughtful and careful when increasing the FI program. Please be aware of all the cases of students with learning difficulties who are overlooked by FI and end up shuffled around to different programs and schools.

We shouldn't even be talking about spending this kind of money when we're already cutting services, increasing class sizes. Extra split classes in primary grades is an unnecessary outcome when we favor a particular learning group or please particular parents. Unqualified teachers will have zero effect on student learning. We have the extended french program in place and we can keep the early immersion as is. I think parents just want to compete with the public board's model. This model doesn't work for us. Why can't we introduce CORE french a grade or two earlier? Some boards have earlier CORE french and that would expose kids to the language to see if they're truly interested in it.

With french immersion, the classes are so unbalanced because many of those students are strong academically, so that leaves the English class balanced, which is not fair to the English stream learners. We need to leave early immersion as is. They'll still succeed and become 21 century learners.

We support the expansion of EFI 100% but feel currently enrolled in the EFI program should continue at their current school. Children who will be newly enrolled into the expansion phase at Gr.1 should be moved to an underpopulated school.

We support the expansion of the Early French Immersion program in the Halton Catholic District School Board. We have been very fortunate to enrol three of our children in the program (two with the first come/first serve enrolment, and one with the present lottery system). Our eldest child is in grade six, and so we have witnessed the life of this program from almost its beginnings. We see the success in learning another language, while keeping up with English learning skills. We celebrate EFI!

The flaw, however, lies in its size. With just over 40 spaces available each year, it exists as an exclusive program. For us, the only answer is to eliminate the wait list and expand the Early French Immersion program.

We presently have one daughter on the waitlist (position number 70). It is our sincere hope that we can offer her the same French AND religious education as her older siblings.

We urge you to vote toward expanding the program.

While I am not opposed to expanding the FI program, I believe that any changes to the children St Nicholas would be detrimental. The boundaries were recently changed to accommodate the merging of St Joseph & St James which was very difficult for the students. In fact, the schools are still adjusting to the merger & now to the physical new school. Modifying the make up of this particular school, especially the removal of any existing streams/programs would only result in added chaos and negative repercussions for all St Nicholas students & families. Please consider excluding this particular school from any changes as the families have already endured significant issues over the last 3 years.

While I fully support the fact that families that want their children to be in French Immersion should have the opportunity to do so, I do not think it should come at the expense of other families that currently have children in a given school. Therefore, I think that any plan to expand the FI program should be done in such a way that families with children currently attending a school should be "grandfathered" and given the option to remain part of that school community regardless of boundary changes until all their children graduate - making the new boundaries applicable only to new families or families that wish to change schools. You cannot underestimate the impact of changing schools to kids that have formed strong friendships and

have become part of a community, including getting used to routines, before/after school care, extra curricular activities, etc. Thank you.

While I understand that these are difficult decisions please consider the well being of the students currently enrolled in the FI program as well as the students in the regular stream. I have kids that fall into both of these categories. These are their schools, their friends, all they have known for the last few years. Yes, the program needs to be expanded but start things off fresh at a new school without disrupting the EXISTING student base. I DO NOT agree with having a school that just has FI, the program should be offered at various schools and kids should be in school with kids that are in English stream or FI, there shouldn't be a perception that these kids are different. I have two kids in FI and one in English, they are now completely scared of what is going to happen, if they will be split, if they will have to go to different schools. They are upset, sad, angry as am I that the board can't figure this out. My kids are thriving in the FI program, they are excellent performers and I hope that all these uncertainties does not affect their well-being. Expand the program to schools that are not as populated but DO NOT impact current students, they did not ask for this.

While this is great for those students that have won the "lottery" it does place those not in the program at a disadvantage. If the program is offered, it should be available to all those that choose to participate i.e. offer the option at more schools in the Region. If that is not an option offer the program firstly to those in the appropriate school zones. We purchased our home specifically to be close to our daughter's school yet this expansion may result in us having to move schools - that is not ok! If space is an issue due to the program demands, those children out of the school zone should be displaced, not families that specially purchased housing within the zones.

Our daughter is in grade 1 and is 1 of 5 girls out of 18 children in her class, that is a ratio of nearly 3-1. We were told that "it's just one of those years" however, we know that many of the girls from her kindergarten class "won" the lottery for the french program which in our opinion, threw off the ratios in the G1 classes for girls to boys.

Impact on boundaries and program changes, without any high level indication to the degree of impact or potential change, comes across as misleading and a little alarmist when the impact in actuality may be much less than parents may assume after reading that communication. Program expansion has lagged for years, so I am hopeful that the movement forward will continue without further setbacks.

I'm also writing to understand more about access to FI at my son's current school, He is currently in Gr. 1, so my assumption is if the expansion happens, and is offered at his school for the 2020/21 school year, he will have missed the opportunity for inclusion given he will be starting Gr. 2. He unfortunately placed far down on the list for the Gr 1 FI lottery, so our family has had to decide between prioritizing his access to a bilingual education and keeping him in his current HCDSB school. Given access to the extended French program in Gr. 4 also operates within a lottery program, he will be leaving and will be attending next year. This decision weighs heavily on our family, and certainly has not been made lightly, as our desire was to keep him in a full-time Catholic learning environment, but the desire to offer him the learning opportunities and benefits FI offers has taken priority. It has been extremely disappointing to see the HCDSB lag so far behind other Catholic School boards in implementing a widely available early French Immersion program. My younger son begins JK at a next year. My hope is that FI is made available to him in Gr. 1, otherwise he will unfortunately follow the same path as my oldest. If any part of my understanding of the FI access and availability at is incorrect, I would very much appreciate if someone could please reach out and clarify any details I may have overlooked or misunderstood.



The potential impact for boundary changes for our English students is unacceptable. Also, putting unqualified teachers in our schools is also detrimental to all student growth and development.

It has been proven that numbers in French Immersion drop over time. Behaviour, social and academic problems push children out of the program and back into the English stream. This leaves the French classes without a balance of students with differing abilities and behaviours, as well as much lower class size numbers than their English counterparts. This essentially creates a two-tiered education system that has no place in our Catholic school system.

Thank you for your consideration.

Good Evening Trustees, Director, and Superintendents. Thank you for affording me the chance to speak this evening. My name is Matthew Salvaterra, and I am an HCDSB parent from Milton. I've come here this evening with other parents from Milton, to speak to the expansion of the French Immersion program for the upcoming school year. I understand that potentially this evening's vote hinges on the result of the survey sent out to parents in late-January. Although it may have been a genuine way to engage parents, this survey and the graphic that accompanied it were both confusing and misleading.

The email I received from HCDSB stated in bold letters "The option to expand the French Immersion program would require system-wide boundary reviews next year, which may impact many HCDSB elementary students and families" and was enough to make me jump up out of my weekday evening spot on the couch. Boundaries changing, programs moving, this was serious stuff. Words in the email like "may impact many families". Impact implies negative change. The email came across as a call to action against French Expansion. With 98% of parents being English-stream parents who are not stakeholders in FI, there's no doubt that the survey results will be overwhelmingly negative. Moreover, I don't see how adding 46 spaces to a grade 1 class in South-West Milton, will affect a grade 6 class in North-East Milton. People are resistant to change. This is a fact. Threatening change on an entire system to accommodate FI expansion is of course going to illicit negative responses. Since this email came out, I've heard worrisome comments made about FI students overpopulating my daughter's school. Let's remember that every child deserves to be in Halton Catholic Schools.

The reality of expansion is, the vast majority of English-stream students won't be impacted by FI expansion in years to come, and in the first year of expansion there would be no impact on any students, English or French.

Moreover, I said that the email and graphic were confusing and misleading. The expansion that is proposed on the graphic is 2 new classes in Milton, 2 in Oakville, 2 in Burlington, and 1 in Halton Hills. This is 7 classes. The graphic states in bold "7 more FSL teachers" will be needed. How is this correct? 1 FI teacher is needed per location. 1 FI full-time teacher can teach one class in the morning and the other class in the afternoon. So how are 7 teachers needed? Furthermore, the statement on the graphic "we may need to hire uncertified and or unqualified teachers" sounds fairly far-fetched, considering we're talking about 3 teachers, wanting to teach in one of the fastest growing, safest, most prosperous locations is Canada.

Also, this graphic has a piggy bank stating the costs of expanding the program. Costs... again with the negative, but no revenues. What about the FSL allocation money that the Board would receive for expanding the program? And the revenue from families not having to flee to the Public board to access French Immersion.

Overall, this graphic seems to have been created to evoke a negative reaction, and while doing that, it inaccurately tells half the story.

So what are we expecting from the survey results tonight? The facts are that only 2% of parents surveyed are FI parents, 98% are not. French expansion has been painted in an unflattering light, and French expansion has been tied into a

boundary review that would happen regardless. This should not inform our decisions.

What we do know is that there are 108 parents on the waiting list in Milton. This is data. Parents want this program. This is a fact. The demand is growing. This is a fact. The board deemed the feasibility of this expansion. Look at your countless delegations supporting this program.



Purpose

The purpose of this report is to recommend the purchase of the Grade Seven, Growing In Faith, Growing In Christ, Complete Print and Digital District Implementation Package to support the implementation of the Ontario Catholic Elementary Curriculum Policy Document for Religious Education, Grades 1-8, 2012.

The Halton Catholic District School Board's investment in classroom learning materials ensures the provision of appropriate resources that support the Catholic faith Tradition as well as the Ontario Curriculum.

Background Information

The Ontario Catholic Elementary Curriculum Policy Document for Religious Education, Grades 1-8, was completed in 2012 and created to support the academic and spiritual development of students in Catholic schools. This Policy Document is founded upon the General Directory for Catechesis and is rooted in the call to a New Evangelization. The Assembly of Catholic Bishops of Ontario (ACBO) collectively set the Religious Education program through their Education Commission and the Institute for Catholic Education (ICE) and in May 2013, approved it for implementation. It has been forwarded to the Vatican and has been foundational in the creation of the new Religious Education program Growing In Faith, Growing In Christ.

In order to support the Ontario Catholic Elementary Curriculum Policy Document for Religious Education, Grades 1-8, 2012, the Assembly of Catholic Bishops of Ontario announced that Pearson Canada was the publisher awarded the contract for a new Religious Education program for Catholic schools. With the participation and contribution of bishops, theologians and Catholic School board representatives from Ontario, Alberta and Saskatchewan, the new resource Growing in Faith, Growing in Christ was developed.



The following is a schedule of the Growing in Faith, Growing In Christ purchase by the Halton Catholic District School Board:

This exceptional resource reflects current pedagogical understandings that support all curriculum all the while rooted in Scripture, Catholic Tradition and Catholic theological thought. In a statement on the value of the program, the Ontario and Western Bishops say:

Growing in Faith, Growing in Christ creates strong links between home, school, and parish. The classroom experience helps students to deepen their love of God and their neighbours. Using the best pedagogical practices, the program seeks to engage students in knowing and living their faith. This will not only help them today but will also prepare them for tomorrow as they grow and mature and make significant contributions to our society as faith-filled Catholics who radiate the joy of believing.

Achieving

Trustee Suan and Trustee Caratao hosted a conference call with the Lead Senators on February 4, 2020 to discuss how the current Student Trustees can work proactively with the Student Senators to encourage student voice in their schools and to develop their skills. Previously, Student Trustees considered hosting a leadership conference for transitioning Senators and existing Senators. However, due to mounting feasibility, budgetary, and planning difficulties, staff advisors suggested providing professional development sessions at Senate meetings. Lead Senators discussed multiple topics at the call, including but not limited to:

- How to run effective meetings; that is, how to control debates and control them so that they
 are focused on an issue
- How to take meeting minutes properly
- How to create constructive action plans
- How to give good presentations

All three Student Trustees are committed to working on developing professional development important workshops for the Senate. Student Trustees are investigating whether they will host these workshops themselves or with experienced professionals. Notably, Lead Senators explored the option of involving elementary students in student voice. One suggested that principals select one or two students who have expressed leadership and interest, to become involved with the Senate. Others were concerned that introducing Student Senate to elementary students could be overwhelming and complicated. Trustee Suan noted that the former has been introduced successfully in several Catholic boards across the province, such as Toronto Catholic District School Board (TCDSB) as well as Niagara Catholic District School Board (NCDSB). Trustee Caratao noted its presence in the coterminous board (HDSB). Trustee Suan stressed Lead Senators would have to take responsibility for much of the work of this initiative, including meeting with students in their feeder schools. The minutes are attached to this report as Appendix A.



Believing

All three Trustees will be attending OSTA-AECO's Board Council Conference from this Thursday, 20, 2020 to Sunday, 23, 2020. Catholic Board Council (CBC) held a brief call on February 13, 2020, informing Regional Representatives that they will be hosting breakout sessions with their respective Student Trustees, part of the council's second pillar, "Faith in Action". CBC also requested that Student Trustees bring socks to donate to the organization called The Ottawa Mission, as socks are a basic and oft-overlooked necessity for homeless individuals. CBC is also planning to volunteer at the mission, whose goal is to provide care to those without a home of their own or are in need of basic necessities. Furthermore, Student Trustees announced planning for Senators to attend Catholic Youth Day with the staff advisors on May 4, 2020 in Toronto.

Belonging

At the February 11, 2020 Student Senate Meeting, Student Senators voted in favour to pass a motion proposed by Trustee Caratao to change the election process for Student Trustees. The new policy (Appendix B) would change the system to allocate votes for each Student Senator, not by school, as well as to introduce a ranked-ballot. The process will go forward in determining the Student Trustees for the 2020-2021 school year, and any other elections thereafter. The results were that 32 Senators voted in favour of the motion, 16 voted against and 7 abstained from voting. The reformed election process is currently undergoing minor technical revisions to ensure complete clarity and will be presented to HCDSB's Board of Trustees in the next Student Trustee Report. When finalized, it will be the first Senate policy in recorded history.

Director of Education, Pat Daly came to speak briefly at the meeting in light of the upcoming Student Trustee elections that will be taking place on February 25, 2020 at St. Ignatius of Loyola Catholic Secondary School, as well as embracing student voice and the importance of mental health.

In addition, the HCDSB's Chief of Mental Health Programming, Glenda Brown, and Chief Social Worker, Patricia Codner, were invited to discuss the Mental Health Strategy and Addiction Plan to the Senate. They discussed the priorities and purpose of the strategy, as well as broader information and education on the realities of mental health. Student Senator Katelyn Weinstein noted the importance of creating a safe space for Senators to express their own ideas and experiences on this issue and led by example at the meeting. Student Senators took part in breakout sessions, where they answered pertinent mental health questions. Dozens of other questions from Senators were forwarded to Ms. Brown and Codner by Trustee Suan. The intention behind this is to solicit student consultation in updating the Mental Health and Addiction Strategy for the next three years. Trustee Suan and Katelyn Weinstein, as part of the Mental Health and Well-Being Advisory Committee will meet imminently (February 17-21st) to debrief and to plan feedback for the Senate meeting in March. They will attend the Mental Health and Well-being Advisory Committee meeting on February 26th, 2020 to discuss how student consultation has been incorporated into the development of the strategy.



Lastly, all three Student Trustees have invited Dr. Lisa Collimore, Chief Research Officer to have her speak at one of our Student Senate meetings. The details are being discussed. As Trustee Caratao observed in the January 14th Policy Committee Meeting, Dr. Collimore presented an action report recommending the replacement of active consent with passive consent, due to students' low response rate in surveys. The importance of the School Climate Survey will be made clear to all Senators and more will become inclined to take the survey.

1. Updates:

 - Google Doc shared on Teams for questions related to Glenda Brown's discussion regarding anything about Mental Health (it either has to entail some sort of discussion, or can be a genuine question regarding Mental Health). All questions due BY THE LATEST February 6th or 7th, 2020.
- b. Voting Questions for Student Senate Policy VI-01 any unanswered and outstanding questions, please forward them to me, Malika, or Davin by February 6th or 7th, 2020. Any questions taken afterwards will not be accepted, as the voting procedure has to be voted at this meeting.
- 2. Higher Engagement for Senate Meetings (Offering PD sessions)
 - Nick Gubert: How much will this cost? Who will run it?
 - Remember that the Senate does not have a budget. We have to pre-approve the costs of any sessions that we host (usually, the costs are provided through a honorarium)
 - Mark: Handbook dynamic from year to year, very helpful for new senators
 - Katelyn, Nick: PD will improve more than a handbook, but the handbook can be useful in some situations.

 Dylex: The handbook is important in the sense that it provides a reference, to be even a student senator. The constitution on the other hand, provides a backbone and structure of what is the Senate, how the Senate is run, etc. Once this is ratified by the majority of the Senate, the Constitution lives on forever. Note that amendments can be made, but at the core we establish the framework.

Things to consider:

- How to run effective meetings → how to establish debate and control it so that it doesn't go everywhere.
- How to give good presentations
- How to get back on track when you go on a tangent
- How to take effective minutes (when is too much, when is too little)
- How to go about getting things done (action plans)

Given the need for students to be learning at these meetings, PD Sessions may be offered starting the meeting after the Senators have elected the Student Trustees for 2020-2021 school year. The logistics need to be worked out, but it may be that the Student Trustees for the next school year will help with providing these sessions.

3. Improving Senates At Your Schools

- Hailey wants to make promotional material for the Student Senate.
 - For instance, creating posters! Hailey would love to volunteer to create the posters (so then we can try though it may be better to talk more about this near the end of the school year (May or June).
- Share Instagram account (@hcdsbsenate) with the student councils.
 - We need to publish more content on the Senate accounts. Get the word out as much as you can!

4. Message about Communication on Teams

a. Please check Teams regularly for any updates. Dylex echoed the importance of checking Teams. While group chats are useful to keep in

touch with the School Senates, most of our updates for Senate will HAVE to come through Teams (as it is an approved service for the Board).

5. Constitution Committee (who will participate)

- Many lead senators are too busy with other commitments to participate in the committee.
- The role of being on this committee is not clearly defined, and that is why most Senators have not expressed their interest. Keep in mind that time is still an issue.
- Dylex and Davin will send out a document on the Lead Senators chat and General chat outlining the responsibilities and roles of a member of this committee ASAP (*ideally, by the end of this week:* February 7, 2020).
- We need everyone to reach out to their Senates; we will post a document outlining all of the roles and responsibilities at least by the end of this week (February 7, 2020).

6. Elementary Outreach

- a. Other ways to reach out besides "See the Problem, Be the Solution"?
- Viability of an elementary student senate?
 - Nicole: Appealing to elementary students may not be beneficial, especially if we raise Student Senate. What might have to be done is that we promote this after students have settled into their high school.
 - Mark: Echoed the same responses as Nicole. It's another responsibility that may not necessarily be beneficial to most students as they are already preparing to make that transition. Perhaps, we need to wait a little bit afterward after they have become used to the school environment.
 - Nicole: Mentors can act as a bridge because their main role is to connect students currently in Grade 9 to the school community; so, if there's a problem with anything, they are the ones to address that issue. Again, it's most likely that this would be most beneficial when the students are already established
 - Nicholas: Why don't we have representatives at the elementary school, where they would voice their concerns?

- Some other ideas: get one or two students elected
- Oplex: This was stated at one of our conferences (OSTA-AECO Fall General Meeting in October). Elementary outreach should encourage student voice, and raise any sort of concerns that they may have. This is not new in the province; many school boards, such as HDSB and TCDSB have implemented similar processes, where the Elementary Student Senators are chosen by the Principal and/or Vice-Principal. Could be implemented, but the will of the Lead Senators to carry on such a project will dictate that.

VI-26 Student Trustees

Purpose

One of the responsibilities of the Student Senate is to elect the student trustees on the school board. This is the most important, board policy-required responsibility of the Senate. As such, its process should be perfected and recorded. As no written record, only a custom exists, a new process is recorded here.

This policy implements an IRV voting system, and seeks to eliminate the potential for an individual to be elected with a minority of the vote. This policy gives a voice and vote to every Student Senator.

Application and Scope

This internal Student Senate procedure applies to the process of electing Student Trustees by Student Senators, to the Halton Catholic District School Board's Board of Trustees.

Definitions

IRV, or Instant Runoff Voting, is the electoral system where each voter ranks the candidates, rather than selecting a single preferred candidate. The first-choice votes are counted, and if no candidate has a majority (50%+1 votes), then the last-place candidate is eliminated and their second-choice votes are redistributed.

A Student Senator is a member of the Student Senate, including both Senators who regularly and typically attend Senate meetings, and Home Senators, who represent the Senate at their own schools.

A voting Senator is a member of the Student Senate who votes in the Student Trustee Election.



Principles

- The election of Student Trustees by the Student Senate is an important and compulsory responsibility.
- In accordance with Policy I-26, "student representation is determined in an open and democratic manner", this policy ensures a majority electoral support for student trustees.
- Ensures that no Student Trustee will be elected with a minority of the vote.
- Student Senators can give their first-choice support to whomever they choose.
- Student Senators will vote as student leaders and representatives.
- Attendance for the Senate meeting where the Student Trustee Elections are held is critically important.

Requirements

- The elections will be held by IRV, except where there are only two (2) candidates in a region, where IRV becomes, functionally, First-Past-The-Post. If there is only one (1) candidate, they are acclaimed.
- There are three (3) races and regions for Student Trustees; Oakville, Burlington, and North Halton.
- On election day, each voting Senator will be given one (1) ballot for each race. Each school may have up to eight (8) voting Senators.
- Each voting Senator is entitled to vote in each of the three (3) races, with the following exceptions:
 - Senators not present or too late to view the speeches are not entitled to vote.
 - If a Student Senator is not able to attend the meeting, a home Senator who does not
 typically attend the meetings may attend the election.
- Each voting Senator will rank the candidates of each given race in order, with 1 being the first-choice, 2 being the second-choice, and 3 being the third-choice, and so on if applicable.
 - The voting Senator cannot give two candidates the same rank.
- The first-choice votes will be tallied, but if no candidate has more than 50% of the total votes plus one (1), then the last-place candidate is eliminated and their first-choice votes will be redistributed to the second-choice candidates. Whomever now has 50% of all votes plus one (1) is elected Student Trustee in their respective race.
- Any ballot supporting the eliminated candidate as a first-choice and does not have a second choice, is removed from the number of total votes.
- In the event of a tie in the first round, the candidate to be eliminated is chosen randomly, and in the event of a last-round tie, the candidate with the most first-choice votes is elected Student Trustee.


