## Dear friends:

Fr Con, our Vicar for Education in the Diocese of Hamilton, posted the following link on Twitter a couple of days ago, and when a

friend – thank you, Andrew, – also sent it to me today, I felt it was a sign that I should share it. One of my great-grandmothers was Irish, a younger daughter of the Guinness family known for the black brew: that may be one of the reasons why I feel so much of the Irish story-telling and music in my bones. When I clicked on the link to play it I expected to hear "May the Road Rise to Meet You"; instead it was the beautiful hymn, "Be Thou My Vision", sung by people from churches in every county on the island we call Ireland. This grandmother was Scottish and married to the Grand Master of the Orange Lodge in our small town. My upbringing in faith was shared by my very Calvinist Presbyterian grandparents and my Scottish Episcopalian Godmother. That I became a Catholic is a story for another time; suffice it to say that Catholic/Protestant divisions in 1950's Scotland were every bit as vicious as in Ireland and my growth in faith has been a



very interesting journey.

It is always worth asking ourselves, what is my vision? Especially our vision for Catholic Education? If you haven't read it for a while, may I challenge you to reread the passages of "Renewing the Promise"

which apply to you specifically. It might be an interesting experience to draft a personal vision and mission statement.





Do our students clearly understand that the Ontario Catholic School Graduate **Expectations** are that: not an idea or a suggestion – but expectation that they will go into the world outside our schools continuing to develop all of the qualities described in this list as a framework for their life? Do we acknowledge the students who have shown a very clear understanding of what it means to be a follower of Christ to
