Participant Responses

Between February 11th and February 18th, 2021, HCDSB stakeholders were asked through email invitation to provide feedback on suggested changes to each of the Mission, Vision, and Values statements for the next HCDSB Multi-Year Strategic Plan. Overall, this report contains the data from 2159 survey responses.

This report summarizes all complete submissions received from stakeholders. Any partial responses have been removed from this report (n = 11). Responses have been grouped and are discussed below.

Survey Results

Overall, 2147 respondents completed this question. As illustrated in *Table 1*, the majority of respondents were *HCDSB Parents/Guardians/Caregivers* (n = 1427; 66%).









Appendix A

Responses for those who selected the *Original* Mission Statement:

Because ""inclusivity"" has become a catch-all for creating spaces of hypersensitivity, victimology and constant offense taking, at the expense of truth and reason.

Catholic faith is based on equal treatment and respect for all

""Equitable"" implies equality of outcome, which excludes equality of opportunity/choice; equality of outcome and equality of choice can only exist together if everyone makes the exact same choices. As Christians, we know that choices matter, and we shouldn't be focused on trying to undo the effects of everyone's choices. The original mission statement is enough. Inclusivity is implied, although you can pepper in ""for all"" somewhere, if that helps. ""Equity"" is nowhere in the Bible. Seek first the kingdom. - ""culture of life"" is vague/imprecise does it refer to the ""Pro Life""/anti-abortion movement, respecting living things in the environment, being vegetarian? What does it mean? Plus, it just seems like an unecessary ""add on.""
- ""culture of life""....would not want this linked to assisted Dying debate
- ""fostering a culture of life"" what does that even mean? It seems as though this section was changed just for the sake of saying you revised it. It's not better.
- ""Fostering a culture of life"" appears to politicize a stance that is inappropriate in a school setting.
- ""fostering a culture of life"" does not represent the values of many in our community. It goes without question that all people value life. My concern is where it situates our community in relation to sanctity of life issues, which I believe have no place in education, other than discussion. Our board has no business taking sides on these issues.
- ""Fostering a culture of life"" doesn't make sense.
- ""fostering a culture of life"" evokes controversy unnecessarily I don't agree with integrating this into the board's values statement
- ""Fostering a culture of life"" is opposite of an inclusive and equitable mission and vision statement. It's exclusionary by the words alone.

I know it says that you are celebrating diversity (instead of just respecting), and I do like the word celebrate more than respect. Some may argue that 'diversity' and 'multiculturalism' mean the same thing, but removing it feels like you are actively trying to ignore the differences that you claim to be wanting to celebrate. It feels wrong to take the word out and like it will spark a debate that I don't think actually exists. I don't think opening the door for that is the right way to approach it. Ideally the statement

would read as it originally does but says that we both celebrate AND respect diversity AND multiculturalism, as well as honour individual rights and so on.
